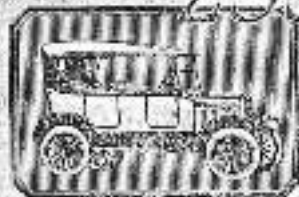

Remarkable Increase in Ford Organization

Water Clock is Catholic

A gallery below the entrance which features 1000 or more in number is that one of the remarkable features of the clock constructed in 1562 for the Spanish cathedral. It was done on Sunday, March 20, 1562, and is as high as two second gallery, with a space below a second gallery and stands one of the bells. As the face on the wall walked across, striking the four quarters, and after this came the figure of Death, which struck the face with a bone.

At noon in the top gallery the Prince of Asturias walked in procession across the hall, and at the same time the sign of the cross. While this was in progress a picture of the life of the prince appeared and was shown to the people.

A famous clock, mentioned in one of the chapters of Cervantes' "Don Quixote," and which was made in 1562 for the Spanish cathedral, is a similar piece of machinery. It is said to be the work of a man in Madrid, who made a "columba" consisting of a ball of wax on the sides, two days in a year, three days.

Forest Fires Are Costly

Approximately one-half of one per cent of the territory comprised in the Angeles Forest Reserve was burned over by forest and mountain fires during the 1923 season, according to the annual fire report of Supervisor Chilton.

A total of 4137 acres was burned over, the cost of fighting the conflagrations amounting to \$123,384.05. Fifty-four of the blazes were "man caused," smokers being responsible for thirty-two, the transportation of matches or disposition of cigar and cigarette stubs. Only five "campers" fires, built in disregard of exposed places or left burning, escaped the vigilance and control of the fire-guardians.

As with the responsible for six of the fires, lightning caused seventeen, and eight originated from "bees or burning" parties.

America, Land of Plenty!

America, the Land of Plenty! From the Atlantic to the Pacific, from the sunny Rio Grande to the Canadian border, there are today thousands of acres producing agricultural products which feed the world. From the earliest days of colonization we have been adding to the native crops and stock new varieties. By eliminating the tariff and building up the better grade, we now lead the world in quantity production of necessary foodstuffs. However, until our present Federal Department of Agriculture began sending its plant explorers to the ends of the earth in search of new crops, not a single new crop was introduced into this country since the colonial period except sorghum and alfalfa. The novel orange was one of the most important plant immigrants ever introduced.

The tendency of our present civilization is to make of the farmer and rancher a producer of raw materials only, with the distribution entirely in the hands of the for-

quely inefficient urban centers. However, there are co-operative organizations which operate directly to the farmer's advantage. This is the method the farmer improves both the growing and marketing of his products.

Since receiving this card, these words have been receiving more attention here on the farm than the usual Christmas message. We have been analyzing that message from every angle we know and had the courtesy of a mail, have decided that more study is essential than we have given it to become a truly rational or possible ideal in the sentiment expressed. To begin with, why should such a sentiment be expressed at the Christmas season, the time of all times, when the dust of poverty or misfortune is to be forgotten and the spirit of love and plenty prevail. In fact, poverty should not exist at any time and every day should be "Christmas Day." The only abundance is concerned.

We don't see any particular glory in being poor, nor so much pity in being "sweet" about it either.

do to keep. He gets out smiling at noon and comes in smiling at night. He's "all in" and you never know it for a moment.

TWO BIG CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS FOR ELIZABETH LAKE CANYON DISTRICT

Elizabeth Lake canyon and the Warm Springs district, comprising some of the most beautiful and interesting mountain country in the Sierra Nevada National Forest, are at last coming into their own and are to be extensively developed. Plans are now being formulated to carry out several important construction projects in the district.

One of the big development programs is to be carried out by the San Fernando Valley Boy Scout's Council which maintains headquarters at Van Nuys. The worthy organization has already made application, thru District Leader Peterson of Newhall, for a permanent camp site in the Upper Elizabeth Lake canyon, about five miles from Castle, to comprise 3 acres of land. As Ranger Peterson is behind the boys' heart and hand, there is no doubt as to their application for favorable consideration.

Another big project is to be carried out in the neighborhood of \$100,000 in a development program to extend over a period of several years. This program calls for the erection of a main clubhouse; a number of dwelling houses, swimming pool and numerous other permanent structures. Work on the swimming pool will be started as soon as the Council's application for the site has been officially approved. The proposed plans will cost about \$25,000 and measure 60 by 100 feet.

This big camp site means a great deal to the boys and their organization as a high level over their

proposed activities at the camp.

The second big project in the Elizabeth Lake canyon country centers in the establishment and maintenance of a big summer resort by H. D. Bayler, who recently purchased the old Madge resort of six acres at Warm Springs on Elizabeth Lake creek. Mr. Bayler intends to spend about \$50,000 in carrying out his plans. These call for the construction of a beautiful hotel building, a number of very desirable cottages, large plunge, five miles of mountain auto road and a telephone line. The road is to extend from the Elmore agency in Lower Elizabeth Lake canyon to the Warm Springs which Mr. Bayler has leased from the Santa Berna Co. Forest under "special use" permit. The road is to cost about \$100,000. The telephone line will be run from the Elmore agency to Castle.

Bogus Em-Dees

Astounding, incredible, truly taking one's breath away, are facts just now coming to light as to so-called medical colleges and Kansas City which have scattered over the country great numbers of bogus diplomas and spurious M. D. degrees.

The medical faker is everywhere, apparently. Literally thousands of men and women about a broad land are practicing medicine without being in any real sense fitted to do so.

They have not the mental equipment of surgery or to general intelligence into their being persons who can power their

state licenses give them. These are mild words in the face of the awful details.

In reality these are crooks and criminals. Their very licenses were obtained by chicanery or worse. And back of them are the lying medical diplomas and fraudulent high school certificates.

Street car conductors, traffic cops, mechanics, bookkeepers, saleswomen, photographers and many others, uneducated and illiterate, have become "Doctors of Medicine" by a stroke of the pen, when they had the money to pay for it. Some of them never put in an hour's study in which to base these diplomas. Some never were in the city in which they were issued.

Under-embos emboldenings of the past over this situation are well justified by the revelations—first in Missouri, and now in Connecticut, New York, New Jersey and other states—as to the workings of these medical diploma mills in the two cities mentioned. Connecticut is one of the states where the men who operated the fake medical schools, who are now under indictment in Missouri, found it easiest to get state licenses for "graduates"

in numerous cases, of which particulars are already known, possessors of these St. Louis and Kansas City diplomas have purchased the practices of well known and reputable physicians, and with the leverage have found little difficulty in making their way into the confidence of the community. Doubtless many of them got into the army during the war.

In any case, some have turned up in someone's hospitals, where the poor fellows who are weeding their lives out have had the care of these pseudo physicians. Civil hospitals have had them on their staffs, and have all, for that matter—men with faked M. D. degrees who never completed a course in medicine or surgery, whose knowledge of anatomy is slight and of chemistry is slighter.

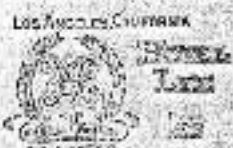



RESOLUTION

Calling an Election for the Reorganization of the Board of Supervisors of San Angeles County, Including Newhall County Fire Protection District Boundaries.

WHEREAS, proceedings have been regularly had and taken under the provisions of an Act of the Legislature of the State of California, entitled:

"An Act to provide for the formation, management, and dissolution of county fire protection districts, and amendments thereto, setting forth the powers of such management, providing for keeping and collecting taxes on property in such districts to defray the expenses thereof," approved May 25, 1925, by the establishment of a certain fire protection district in the county of NEWHALL, COUNTY FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT, to include the territory embraced within the boundaries hereinafter described, and

WHEREAS, written objection to the formation of said district was filed with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles prior to the time fixed by said Board for the hearing of the matter of the formation of said district, and

WHEREAS, on its meeting of December 11, 1925, said Board of Supervisors adopted a resolution declaring said objection and establishing the NEWHALL COUNTY FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT with the boundaries hereinafter described, and

WHEREAS, under the provisions of Section 4 of said Act, of written objections are filed to the Board of Supervisors prior to the expiration of the qualified election of the proposed district, the formation of said district established, now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED THAT THIS BOARD OF SUPERVISORS FINDS, DETERMINES AND ORDERS AS FOLLOWS, to-wit:

1. That an election shall be held in the said proposed NEWHALL COUNTY FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT as the boundaries of the same were established and authorized in said resolution of this Board of Supervisors, and as the same are hereinafter more particularly described, on January 20th, 1929, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of said proposed district the qualifications of said resolution of this Board declaring said district established.

At said election only qualified registered electors of such proposed district shall be permitted to vote.

2. That for the purpose of conducting said election no provision is sufficient, and no provision is hereby established to consist of all the territory included within said proposed NEWHALL COUNTY FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT to the boundaries of the same are hereinafter described.

3. That the following polling place and officers for said election are hereby designated, established and named, to-wit:

Polling Place—
NEWHALL, MASONIC CLUB BUILDING.
Election Officers—
Inspector, Walcott H. Evans.
Judge, Mrs. Emma Fisher.
Clerk, Mrs. Alice V. Carr.

4. That the polls shall be opened at 6 o'clock on the morning of the day

of said election, and shall be kept open until 7 o'clock in the afternoon of said day, at which time said polls shall be closed.

5. The proposition to be submitted at said election shall be:

"Shall the Resolution of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles, of the 11th day of December, 1925, that the NEWHALL COUNTY FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT be established, be ratified?"

And the ballot shall contain the said proposition followed, in a separate column, by the words "Yes" and "No," placed one above the other, and each followed, on the right, by a voting space. Persons voting in such election shall deposit a cross (X) in the voting space to the right of the word "Yes" or the word "No." On the face they may so indicate whether they vote for or against the proposal so submitted.

6. That the returns of said election shall be canvassed by this Board of Supervisors at its next regular official held after the day of said election.

That the Clerk of this Board of Supervisors shall cause this resolution to be published once a week for consecutive weeks in The Newhall Signal, a newspaper of general circulation in said proposed district, and said newspaper is deemed by this Board to be the most likely to give notice to the electors of said proposed election.

9. That the following is a description of the said proposed NEWHALL COUNTY FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT declared to be established by said Board of Supervisors in its said resolution of December 11, 1925, as a county fire protection district, to-wit:

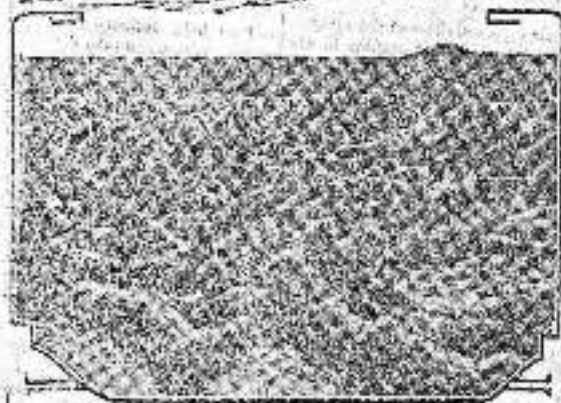

What Will be Done About It?

Unemployment in England is increasing, and it slowly is the dreadful condition that over a million workers and their dependent are forced to suffer for the first time. *Because of the winter white* are killed workers who have not done a stroke of work in three years.

These men are quiet, but are broken in spirit and their value as workers is diminishing. They are showing plainly the signs of hunger in their faces. They are clamoring for work, preferring to work at anything rather than to be idle, even tho they may be paid something for it.

The British Government is putting out two million pounds sterling per week for the maintenance of the unemployed, and an equal amount is being contributed by the local Poor Law authorities. The Labor Party sees no solution of the problem which Britain faces except the immediate cancellation of all war debts, including Britain's debt to the United States.

Heretofore Britain has done an enormous business with all other European countries; but Europe can no longer buy, and the British dominions cannot take care of the surplus goods which British mills can produce. The British outlook is dark indeed.

A joint meeting of representatives of all the principal churches of England has just been held in

London, at which resolutions were passed calling upon the Government to "institute a searching inquiry into the fundamental causes of the persistent unemployment which has sapped the life of the people for so many years," "with a view to large and radical measures being speedily taken to deal with the evil."

One of the bishops of the Church of England present said that the clergy were at this conference "to give voice in a profoundly uneasy conscience." We can see why, as a result of their always denouncing the cause of war whenever the opportunity arises, they should have just that kind of conscience.

Where unemployment is so widespread, there is a natural tendency for wages to go down. The condition of cinema workers in London has just come to light, showing that one of these men,

working from nine in the morning until ten-thirty at night every day in the week, receives as compensation only two pounds sterling per week, barely enough for a single man to exist upon. Another operative, showing pictures for seven and one-half hours daily, received only one pound three shillings per week.

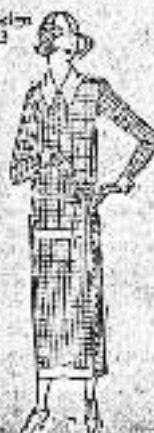

RESOLUTION

Calling an Election for the Revalidation of the Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles County, Declaring Newhall County Fire Protection Districts Established.

WHEREAS, proceedings have been regularly and lawfully under the provisions of an Act of the Legislature of the State of California, to-wit:

"An Act to provide for the formation, management, and dissolution of county fire protection districts, and to authorize County Boards to create and maintain such fire protection districts and providing for testing and collecting taxes on property in such districts to defray the expenses thereof," approved May 21, 1913, for the establishment of a county fire protection district to be known as NEWHALL COUNTY FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT, to include the territory embraced within the boundaries hereinafter described, and

WHEREAS, serious objection to the formation of said district was filed with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles prior to the time fixed by said Board for the holding of the meeting of the formation of said district, and

WHEREAS, at its meeting of December 31, 1921, and that of February 2, 1922, the Board of Supervisors adopted a resolution denying and objecting to and annulling the NEWHALL COUNTY FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT with the boundaries hereinafter described, and

WHEREAS, under the provisions of Section 4 of said act, if within six months thereafter to the date of the annulment of the proposed fire protection district the Board of Supervisors does not call for the vote of the qualified electors of the proposed fire protection district, the boundaries of said fire protection district shall be established, and, thereupon,

THE PEOPLE OF THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES, BY THEIR SUPERVISORS, DO HEREBY RESOLVE, to-wit:

1. That an election shall be held in the said proposed NEWHALL COUNTY FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT as the boundaries of the same were established, and determined in said resolution of the Board of Supervisors, and as the same are described more particularly described on January 24th, 1923, for the purpose of submitting to a vote of the qualified electors of said proposed district the revalidation of said resolution of the Board of Supervisors, and the district established.

At said election only qualified registered electors of said proposed district shall be permitted to vote.

2. That for the purpose of conducting said election, no provision is authorized and no provision is hereby established to consider all of the territories included within said proposed NEWHALL COUNTY FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT as the boundaries of the same are hereinafter described.

3. That the following yellow lines and colors for said election are hereby designated, established and named, to-wit:

Ballot Boxes—
NEWHALL MASONIC CLUB BUILDING.

Returning Officers—
Inspector, Walcott H. Tynes,
Judge, Mrs. Emma Fisher,
Clerk, Mrs. Alice V. Carr.

4. That the polls shall be opened at 8 o'clock in the morning of the day

of said election, and shall be kept open until 7 o'clock in the afternoon of said day, at which time said polls shall be closed.

5. The proposition to be submitted at said election shall be:

"Shall the Resolution of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles of the 31st day of December, 1921, that the NEWHALL COUNTY FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT be established, be revalidated?"

and the ballots shall contain the said proposition referred to in a separate column by the words "Yes" and "No," placed one above the other, and each followed on the right by a white square. The vote being at said election shall stamp across (X) in the voting space at the right of the word "Yes" or the word "No" (or the vote may be) to indicate whether they vote for or against the proposition submitted.

6. That the returns of said election shall be received by the Board of Supervisors at its next regular meeting held after the day of said election.

7. That in all other particulars and details shall be held and conducted as provided by law for holding general elections in the County of Los Angeles, except that no notice of such election other than the publication of this resolution need be given.

8. That the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors shall cause this resolution to be published once a week for two consecutive weeks in The Newhall Signal, a newspaper of general circulation in said proposed district, which said newspaper is owned by this Board, to be the most likely to give notice to the voters of said district of said election.

9. That the following is a description of the said proposed NEWHALL COUNTY FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT, which to be more established by and Board of Supervisors in its said resolution of December 31, 1921, as a county fire protection district, to-wit:

All that portion of the County of Los Angeles bounded within the following described exterior boundaries:

NEWHALL

Beginning at the intersection of the east line of the Rancho San Francisco, as shown on map recorded in Book 1, Page 521 and 523 of Public records of Los Angeles County, with the north line of fractional Section 1, Township 2 North, Range 10 West, S. B. 22; thence east to section line to the southeast corner of said fractional Section 1, thence north on section line to the southeast corner of Lot 2 of said fractional Section 1, thence westerly along quarter section line to the eastern section corner of the east line of Section 3, Township 2 North, Range 10 West, S. B. 22; thence westerly along section line to the northwest corner of Lot 2, fractional Section 26, Township 2 North, Range 10 West, S. thence westerly along section line to the southwest corner of Section 21, said lot bounded westerly and north; thence westerly along section line to the southeast boundary line of the Rancho San Francisco, as shown on said map; thence along said section line to the west line of Section 4, Township 2 North, Range 10 West, as shown on said fractional map; thence north on section line to the northwest corner of said Section 4; thence west on Section line to the west line of Section 26, Rancho San Francisco, aforesaid; thence along said section line to the north line of Section 3, Township 2 North, Range 10 West, as shown on said fractional map; thence east on section line as shown on said fractional map recorded in Book 24, Page 22 to 25 inclusive, of Public records of said county; thence westerly and northerly along the westerly and northerly lines of said Lot 2 to the southwest corner thereof; thence westerly and northerly along the westerly and northerly lines of Lot 2, and Lot 26, 27, to the northwestern corner of said Lot 2; thence northerly along the westerly line of said Lot 2, to the north line of Section 1, Township 2 North, Range 10 West, as shown on aforesaid County Surveyor's Map No. 524; thence east on section line to the westerly line of that certain 40.20 acre parcel of land situated in the Los Angeles Petroleum Corporation in 1922; thence north 1/2 Sec. 20, 21, East along the westerly line of said parcel; thence north 89 deg. East 7.24 chains along the westerly line of said parcel; thence north 89 deg. East 7.24 chains along the westerly line of said parcel to the northeast corner thereof; thence northerly along the westerly line of said parcel to the north line of Section 1, Township 2 North, Range 10 West, County of Los Angeles.

Reality has slipped out of the focus of our distorted vision. We live in an artificial atmosphere of property and sentimental charity lawsuits. Our talk is confined to cheap self-glorification and meaningless slogans. We have adopted war and feather as our national emblem and our idea of courage consists of knocking down the man who disagrees with us. We have become a nation of moral cowards who rush in sanctifying the law courageous souls that dash into the public square with the warning word of truth.

Yet we cannot escape the influence that permeates the thin air surface of politeness, complacency and hypocrisy, the side of life flows on inevitably to its inevitable goal. It is but a question of time when the gathering storm—impregnable to our projected armor—will smash our last bastion of makeshift belief against the rocks of reality.

How pitifully blind we are! Once every year, at Yuletide, we come over with unctious benevolence to our fellow-men, in the name of Christ, whom our prototypes crucified twenty centuries ago. Once every year we suddenly discover that there are millions of poor and destitute everywhere in this millionaire's land of ours, and they become the objects of our solicitude for a few days.

The truth is that, in place of the sweet slavery of two generations ago, we have built up a covert industrial slavery that is a thousand times more vicious, a thousand times more destructive.

Instead of the lone Christ, with the wooden cross, today we are driving a ceaseless stream of our victims up the Calvary of poverty, and these charitably distribute a few Christmas presents among them before we crucify them.

The truth hurts because we are guilty, and instead of abolishing the real cause of our social prostration, we drag our centers with ton-loads of written and spoken hope and senseless stone our prophets. But the day of reckoning is not far off and we cannot escape it.

John Muir, the late California naturalist, endeavored to respect Sierras culture well as any man who ever lived with their shadows. He was, in fact, a part of them, always in tune with their deepest mysteries and feelings given. He was a friend of every living creature that dwelt in the "wild places." He held communion with the beauty, the birds, the flowers and the rocks and it was his understanding and spoke the language of each of them in turn. It was his custom to tramp for days at a time, among the pine forests, over the ridges and of long forgotten trails. He strived to live solely in the Sierras, and he became weary or fatigued. It is a well known fact that he went out into the hills for days at a time, giving little heed to eating or sleeping. It was not unusual for him to go several days on a diet of bread. He had no fear of any animal that ever drew the breath of life and no animal had fear of him. He lived a simple, the simplest life, always quite close to the Sierras. The words of the Sierras he understood, with a humble and modest joy.

He would have already profited greatly from the faith of Owen Wister, and it will profit much more as the years roll by and humanity in general draws closer to Nature.

What's great wealth of understanding Muir afforded in the following lines: "Climb the mountains and get close good things. Nature's peace will flow into you as sunshine flows into trees. The winds will blow their

own freshness into you, and the storms their energy, while waves will drop off like ancient leaves."

POSTAL SERVICE 30 YEARS
REPORT GHOST

The history of the postal service goes back to the dawn of civilization, B. C. and may be called the handmaid of civilization. We can trace it from the Egyptian boats of the Nile to the Roman roads for the empire service of the present day.

In the boat of Sutekh in the delta you will find how boats were used thousands of years ago. There it sits the King Akhsath, leaning upon Green Lumber that flows and outlasts the days of all the Jews in the land, carrying the loads to call together the world and send letters to every province of the kingdom or across the universe. This is the same that denotes the sending of the messages.

And he comes in the King Akhsath's boat, and sends it with the King's flag and seal letters to assist on accident, and makes no matter, and his passing is everywhere.

The Romans, too, sent their letters by mounted messengers, or "horsemen" as they were called. The messenger would carry messages about being by water, when he would come to a "post" where another messenger was waiting with a fresh horse. The horse, could be replaced by still another carrier when he reached the next post. Thus early also, when the letter was sent on so fast as ever, and horse could carry it well as fast it arrived at its destined "post" stopping station or stopping place, and it is from this word that we derive the word "post" or "postal" or "postoffice, postcard and many similar words.

Regarding Motorists Who
Carry Revolvers

Motorists carrying revolvers or other deadly weapons concealed on their persons or in the automobile are in danger of arrest and conviction unless they have a special license, according to the State Motor Vehicle law as explained by the legal department of the Automobile Club of Southern California in a recent bulletin.

The law now declared it unlawful for any person to carry a revolver concealed without a proper license, and it makes this a misdemeanor.

Motorists desiring to carry such weapons in a motor vehicle must apply to the sheriff, the chief of police or a justice of the peace for a license. Such applications must be made in writing, giving the name, occupation, business and residence address, description of the applicant and specifying the need of weapons. It is proposed to make licensees for carrying a weapon also must be given.

One of the exceptions in the law is that it is permissible for licensed hunters or fishermen to carry revolvers while engaged in hunting or fishing or while going to or returning from such excursions. There are other exceptions with reference to peace officers, members of the navy, army and national guard.

There are also made provisions with reference to blackbirds, and other ornamental birds. It is a felony for any person to carry concealed upon his person any such weapon, it is permissible to carry a hunting rifle, even in a closed automobile from the state. Persons also may be carried openly in vehicles.

The law imposes severe penalties upon any person who carries any firearm while driving a motorized vehicle. At least two years with hard punishment for carrying such a weapon without a license may be given.

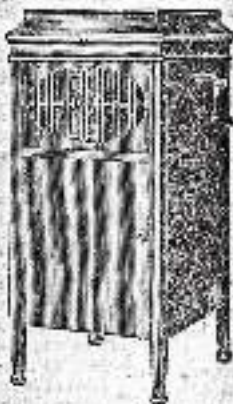

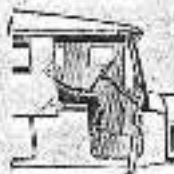

Hoof and Mouth Disease --Warning!

Dr. C. J. Wallen representing the veterinarian department of Southern California and Dr. Kirkpatrick of the County health office were in this section Tuesday to overlook the stock situation in regard to the hoof and mouth disease. In company with Constable Filcher they made an extensive trip during which many different stables were visited, but they came across no cases of the disease.

We give as follows the important part of the Governor's proclamation:

San Francisco, Alameda, Contra Costa, San Joaquin, Stanislaus, Mariposa, Merced and Los Angeles and certain areas of Solano and Napa Counties shall be known and designated as the Closed Quarantined Area regulated as follows:

From and after the 25th day of March 1920, every person, person, firm, corporation, company, estate and servants are prohibited from transporting or shipping or receiving for transportation or shipment any live stock including poultry for the purpose of being transported or shipped from place to place within, or from the said Closed Quarantined Area.

Every person, person, firm, company, corporation, their agents and servants are prohibited from carrying any domestic animal including poultry in vehicles on or across the public highways or roads of said Closed Quarantined Area.

Every person, person, firm, company, corporation, their agents and servants are prohibited from driving, moving or allowing to roam any live stock including poultry on or across the public highways or roads of said Closed Quarantined Area, provided, however, that nothing in these regulations shall apply to horses and mules when actually working in harness when such horses and mules do not bring or have not entered premises where foot and mouth disease infection exists.

The Menace of Dope

The "menace of Dope" is the most terrible, most insidious and most destructive menace in the world. It has increased a hundred-fold since the world war, regardless of the strenuous efforts to abate it. Every country in the world is within its grip. It lures out its prospects and secures its victims from every walk of life, from the newboy to the Wall Street financier. Once a person is enticed into its clutches it is almost impossible to break away, except thru death.

The liquor evil, degrading as it may be, is not one-tenth as degrading, demoralizing or destructive as the dope menace.

There are many kinds of dope. Some are smoked, some are eaten and some are injected into the body with a hypodermic. It would take a huge book to outline in detail the various kinds of dope, their individual peculiarities and their effects on the human body. Suffice it to say that cocaine, morphine, heroin, marijuana and opium are the chief ones to which addicts have fallen.

We believe that many members of the medical fraternity in America, have a great deal to answer for as far as the dope menace is concerned, especially as to the use of cocaine, morphine and opium, which is criminal. Of the three dopes which have claimed the greatest number of victims.

It is a well known fact that most doctors give dope to their patients in one form or another, to ease pain or quiet the nerves. This habit of luxury on the part of many doctors has without a doubt started a number of persons on the road to the dope habit. Many a patient has come out of some doctor's care as "hopped-up" and acknowledged that the dope habit has claimed him without a struggle.

All doctors do not resort to the use of dope in practicing medicine, but most of them do.

Incidentally, we may add that the medical fraternity in America is so substantially organized and so powerful that it is extremely difficult to get its members to discontinue any custom which they wish to maintain.

Several pitiful "dope habit" cases in our own township have recently been brought to our attention. They are not uncommon cases.

We sight one case in particular. It seems that a certain doctor in Venice has for some months past been paid a liberal sum to care a couple of addicts. He put them out on a homestead, in an isolated section of Soledad and instead of making any effort to cure them he let them have all the dope they could use.

The dope ring in this country is equally powerful with the medical trust in keeping alive the "dope menace." The arms of the ring extend from San Francisco to New York and it has agents in the Orient and all the principal seaports of Europe. Tin Juana is a regular "dope case."

Dope is smuggled into America in enormous quantities each month. Formerly 5,000 y. lb. of dope embraced \$10,000 worth dope thru the post and in one way or another finds its way to its users.

A dope addict will resort to any sort of a crime to get a "shot" of dope when he runs out and will commit any kind of crime when under the influence of a "shot." Police records show that many of the most elusive and dangerous criminals are dope fiends.

Harry Dunlap is an example of the dope criminal.

Breaking up the dope menace is a toughy game, not mapped out for cowards. It is a game that requires skill, tenacity, shrewdness and super courage.

Until the "dope fighters" have formed a combative organization equal to the medical trust and the dope ring, little can be accomplished in ridding America of the menace.

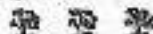
In "The Mystery of the West," shown at Cody's the early part of the week, Miss Marshall proved her ability beyond a doubt.

TAKING TO BATTLE FOREST FIRES IN MOUNTAIN

THE Southern Pacific Railroad has just been equipped with a fire fighting tank-car for use along the forest land right of way. Much of the territory of the road runs through heavily wooded areas and out-lying areas. The tank-car is to be used in combating the fire which often occurs in these areas. The car is equipped with a water tank, a pump, and a hose. A water tank, mounted on a 24-ton body has a capacity of 8,000 gallons. A

water pump is on the top of the tank, to which a 300-foot fire hose is attached. The tank is pulled to the scene by a tractor. The tractor is equipped with a complete set of tools, and is also equipped with a complete set of tools. This equipment is a real innovation in forest fire protection. Other railroads will probably acquire similar equipment in the future.



IF YOU LIVE IN AUTO ACCIDENTS IN 1923

LOST TO 19,000 lives were lost in auto accidents in the United States during the year of 1923. It is claimed that this estimate is not too high, and is a revelation appalling.

The lives which are being lost are an increasing number each year. The automobile accidents are, very largely, cases of killing. Approximately one-half of the deaths from this cause occur among those under fifteen years of age. It is over the life time, and any progress is made in the suppression of fatal automobile injuries, that progress will continue, very largely, a step in the direction of the conservation of life. If we were to disregard for a moment the automobile which is the most dangerous of motor vehicles, and consider the relatively small number of deaths which are caused by the automobile, the fact that the automobile would be such a large percentage of the total.

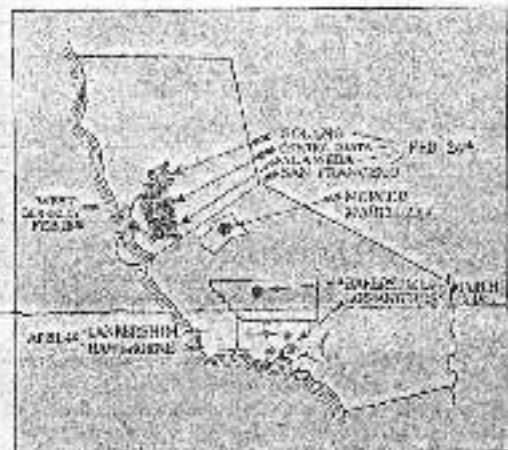

From information furnished by the Foot and Mouth Control Emergency Committee of Los Angeles, it is possible that our crops may be embargoed against all shipment if the malady continues to spread. It is also possible that our cattle may be destroyed.

The Foot and Mouth malady appears to be limited to cloven hoofed animals. It is extremely infectious and moves with great rapidity once it gains a foothold. Quarantine regulations cannot be let alone and rely to the designated Federal and State authorities. Every citizen, man, woman and child, must feel their individual responsibility and lend every effort to stop this appalling plague.

The disease has moved since Feb. 18, 1920, from West Oakland to Merced County and from Merced County to Los Angeles County and within the past week to Kern County at Bakersfield. We are completely surrounded.

IT MUST NOT SPREAD

California is totally surrounded by great agricultural and animal industry states, the safety and

will be impossible for us to ask, or they to permit any escaping in the hope of quarantine enforcement until we ourselves are entirely rid of the malady.

It is a simple matter for a citizen to do his duty, which means "Strict Obedience to the Law." With a full understanding of the possibilities of contamination and infection, each of his inhibitions placed upon the citizen must be accepted by him as necessary measures in the reestablishment of the line of his individual property.

Observe a few DON'T'S which must be observed:

Don't allow any livestock of your premises.

Don't associate with an assembly of people.

Don't go camping.

Don't move livestock feed stuffs without special permit and supervision.

Don't move livestock unless imperatively necessary, then only by permit.

Don't enter any infected or quarantined area.

What Judge Jeffries Thinks of Henry Ford

THE time has come in the industrial life of our country when we must separate the sheep and the goats. Henry Ford is the first man of his class to see the line of demarcation between legitimate and illegitimate industry.

If legitimate industry is to survive upon the competitive basis, it must have the full freedom of competition. The chain-of-command must be opened and placed within the reach of legitimate industry. It is the duty of the virtuous system to be

maintained and enforced with sternness and justice must be as clear-sighted as to be responsive to all industrial effort.

Henry Ford is a student of practical modern life, he has a head, and he has the courage of a lion. The chief difference between him and those who are offering themselves for the Presidency is that he talks little but does much, while the others talk much but do little. What he says he means; what they say they do not always mean. That is why Wall Street and practical industry are afraid of him.

And that is why I am for him for President!

True Mercy

TURNING loose from prison and returning to American citizenship 100 men who deserted from the Army and the Navy after the termination of hostilities and before the formal declaration of peace, President Coolidge pardoned a humane and commendable act.

These men were punished as deserters. Technically, they left their posts of duty in war-time. Since the earliest times when man began to glorify war and courage, the fight from a post of duty in war-time has been deemed cowardice, and as such punished with the utmost severity.

The men whom the President freed belonged to this technical category. They deserted in war-time. In truth, of course, they were not cowards, because their flight came after the war had become a mere paper war. In releasing them and pardoning them in entirety, the Chief Executive recognizes that the war-time standards have ceased to govern.

Indeed, there is ground for every argument that the President's clemency should go all further and be extended to those now in prison, who were sentenced for long periods for actual flight in battle. First, the highest authorities say, is an uncontrollable impulse, due to the stress of actual and physical health which the individual possesses.

Conspicuous in war-time, on which so many officers who once saw the front line trenches and who knew nothing of battle conditions, imposed severe sentences on men who committed to hysterical fear and fled. Some of the men who were sentenced to

long terms in prison had not a high degree of patriotism in their souls, and in fact, finally fallen victim to a pathological condition over which they had no control. The release of such men from punishment at this time could not be harmful to the principle of military discipline in war-time. And it would be an act of Government mercy which would be generally appreciated.

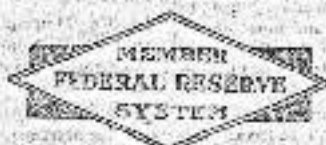

Does it pay to raise chickens? Our answer is yes, provided you have the money, inclination and time to give to the care of the feathered creatures. We know of a chicken raise in Mint Canyon who a year ago bought his first thousand day old White Leathers chicks from Mr. George England of Escondido. By constant application, good feeding and care and the aid of the young mother at hatching period, 405 fine pullets were left, which began laying at five months. While these chicks cost nearly double the ordinary price, they proved their worth for layers, size and strength. Up to the present time they have laid 12,867 eggs and still on the up, last Thursday Mr. England collected 1100 day old chicks of the same variety to the same chicken ranch.

A 12 x 8" medium binder, loose, equipped with 100 sheets of paper, must be so designed as to be easily inserted.

County Forestry Dept. in Charge of Quarantine

The Los Angeles County Forestry Department has been placed at the head of quarantine administrative work throughout the entire county and is going ahead with its work in a very systematic way. All the boys are being quarantined in work in holding down the hoof and mouth disease.

Paul Miller has been placed in charge of the Newhall district, exclusive of operations at the "dip" on Newhall bridge which are in charge of Constable Fisher. Peter Duran is in charge of San Jacinto Road division while George Taylor is taking care of the Soledad and desert divisions. There are four men in charge of 80 guards, most of whom are stationed at the entrance of each important canyon in the district.

Henry West and J. B. Perret are handling the distribution of supplies to quarantine stations.

Telephone Company to String New Frisco Circuit

The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company is planning to establish a construction camp at DeBull's store, at Covina, about May 1. A second camp will be established near Newhall about June 1. The company plans to construct a new circuit in San Francisco, as well as repair the present one. About \$100,000 will be expended by the company within the next few months to carry out the above program.

Fined on Quarantine Violation

J. N. Olson was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Jack Wilcott, of Los Angeles, for violating the quarantine law. Olson was transporting a dog over the Ridge. The dog was confined in a parking box which was covered over with suitcases to avoid suspicion. When Wilcott stopped Olson, the latter denied having a dog in the car. However, the dog appeared at a certain moment and gave his owner away. Constable Pitzer and Deputy Ed Brown took Olson into court and Judge Miller fined him \$25.

Big Land Deal Consummated

A. C. Needham this week closed a deal for the Newhall Land and Farming Company which covered approximately 300 acres of the company's land to Frank W. Neal, Vernon Del Paso and Stanley E. Lawrence. The land lies in the Soledad Valley fronting the 2000 Canyon road and adjoining Soledad to the east.

Mr. Neal is a well known resident of this section, having lived here all his life. Messrs. Del Paso and Lawrence are extensive stock raisers of the Van Nuys district. The land purchased will be used to pasture them in conjunction with their dairying business.

Deputy Constable Ed Brown Grabs Store Robbers

John and Arthur Chubb, said to be realty agents of Los Angeles, were arrested at Saugus by Deputy Constable Ed Brown and Officer Kennedy and locked in jail on suspicion. On investigation it was learned that the Chubbs had robbed the Royal Grocery at 4801 and Western Ave., and were attempting to make their getaway when they were stopped at by Brown.

The alleged thieves had abandoned their own car in favor of a Chevrolet coupe which was stolen from a Mr. Miles. The coupe was loaded down with stolen groceries when stopped at Saugus. The trial of the men was set for today before Judge Miller.

Sunrise Services Called Off

With regret the Women's Club of Covina has announced that the Easter sunrise services will not be held in the Greek Theatre of that place, as pointed, by account of the regulations for stamping out the foot and mouth disease. The west end of the San Francisco Valley has thus far escaped the mauling and it is hoped that by rigid observance of the quarantine regulations the large and valuable lands of that section may not be apprehended.

It is claimed by A. J. Mitchell, of Palmdale, that Lane and Bomer are the men who recently attacked him at his home and then took a shot at him with a shotgun.

R. W. Ford, Jr., son of a former prominent newspaper owner, of Los Angeles, was arrested April 14 for carrying a revolver. He was given three days to produce a permit or face the gun.

John Jackson, colored, was arrested at Saugus April 18 for carrying a .38 Smith & Wesson. He failed to appear for trial and the gun was confiscated.

J. D. Thomas was arrested for carrying a concealed weapon. His trial is set for April 22. Others arrested on a similar charge who appear in local court are Jim Miller.

The trial of Charles Brown has been set for April 26 in Dept. 12 of the Superior Court, Los Angeles.

Jack Fisher, of Los Angeles, was arrested at Saugus April 13, for violation of the Wright Act. Judge Miller fined him \$75.

United States Dry Chief Playing With Fire

On April 14, United States dry chief Haynes, of Washington, D. C., issued the following regulation, as a revision of the dry law, to become effective May 10, 1924:

"The advertisement, sale, etc., of stills, parts of stills, worms or coils, maki, maki extract or systems, hops, ironglass, fruit juices, such as grape, dried fruits and fermentable materials, as well as recipes or formulas for the manufacture of liquor for use in the home or elsewhere for beverage purposes, are prohibited."

We have for some months been laboring under the impression that Commissioner Haynes was a highly inefficient individual.

On analyzing his wild, chaotic and sweeping ruling, especially as it applies to the sale of fruit juices and dried fruits, we are obliged to change our opinion at once.

The regulation is plainly a blow at "home brewers" but it doesn't stipulate any exceptions. It is the king-pin "official" rule of 1924.

If Haynes imagines that he can force any such rigid measure down the throats of the American people and get away with it, he certainly needs to have the interior of his head examined.

There is such a thing as carrying prohibitory measures too far and this law will undoubtedly become evident to Mr. Haynes when he attempts to enforce his new regulation.

We contend that the people of this country still have a right to SOME personal liberty whether certain of our leading politicians favor it or not.

Putting a ban on the sale of grape juice would not be the best way on the books of the Welch Grape Juice Company and the Amour Packing Company—both multi-millionaire concerns. It would make a number of smaller concerns equally unprofitable. We are not so optimistic as to believe that "big business"

will bow humbly to the dictation of Commissioner Haynes. It is just possible that the drug-stores and soft drink establishments will have something to tell the dry chief also.

Trying to put a ban on the sale of dried fruits is without doubt one of the stupidest schemes we have heard from dry headquarters for many a day. Such rigidity and conceit is truly pathetic.

It is safe to say that the people of the State of California especially will tell Mr. Haynes where to get off when he starts to enforce the ban on the sale of dried fruits.

As a matter of fact, the dried fruit industry is one of the chief industries of this state. Raisins, dried figs, dried peaches and dried apricots are typical California products and their propagation, preservation and distribution—thousands of Californians enjoy their livelihood.

When he starts to enforce his recent radical "dry brain" scheme, we predict that Mr. Haynes will "discover" California with quite as much disgust as Kaiser Bill experienced when he discovered America in 1918.

There is an old adage that applies very fittingly to the scheme which Commissioner Haynes proposes to put over on the American public. It goes something like this:

"You can lead a horse to water but you cannot make him drink."
And that's that!

Edison Company's Florence Lake Tunnel

So successful has been the application of new inventions and modern methods, that the great Florence Lake tunnel which the Southern California Edison Company is driving under the Kaiser range in the high Sierran mountains of northeastern Fresno County, will be completed one year and four months ahead of scheduled time, according to an announcement received this morning by District Manager D. H. Rowan from R. H. Ballard, vice president and general manager.

This tunnel which is nearly 14 miles in length and which, when completed, will be the longest tunnel of its kind in the world, will increase the water supply of the Edison Company's chain of power houses on the Big Credit-San Joaquin River project from 112,000 acre feet to 100,000 acre feet per year, or more than 200 per cent. Explaining the importance of this development, Electric Manager Rowan pointed out that it is now generally estimated that the average progress on the tunnel for the year will be in excess of 17 feet per day per heading on each of the six headings on which a force of about ten thousand men are now working. This year, however, the force has reached a total of 3000 men, the maximum daily payroll being \$52,000. This assures the completion of the tunnel by about March, 1925, in ample time to catch next spring's runoff from the enormous water sheds which lie between the Kaiser range and the Sierran range thus diverting the upper waters of the San Joaquin River into the Huntington Lake reservoir.

During the past winter such remarkable achievements have been made in special records as to attract the attention of the engineering fraternity all over the world. The Florence Lake tunnel on the Los Angeles aqueduct, which is a hard rock tunnel almost identical with the rock excavations for the Florence Lake tunnel, held the world record for its time, which was a first ever eleven heading feet per day. During the past year the maximum weekly progress attained on the Florence Lake tunnel at the market point was 140 feet at the average of 20 feet per day. The maximum weekly progress for all of the six headings was made during the month of November of last year and was 167 heading feet per day. The maximum monthly progress for a single heading was made at the market point at Huntington Lake. At this point, 270 feet of tunnel was driven in March of this year at an average rate of 27.5 heading feet per day.

The Florence Lake tunnel when completed next spring will increase the Southern California Edison Company's supply of water power generated electricity more than one billion kilowatt hours annually. The application of modern methods will save

more than one million dollars in the cost of construction.

Some of these are extremely unique. By installing "dining car service" in carry meals to the men working in the tunnel such time is saved. A train of electric trolley car drives into the miles of excavated tunnel at most time bearing hot food to the men.

Another invention known as the "air curtain" by which jets of air from the gas fans, permits the men to go back to their work after blasting much more quickly than was formerly possible. This saves about one hour's work on each of the six headings per day.

There have also been some other wonderful improvements in "auditing" (checking out the excavated rock) and by the introduction of high speed drills and steel the length of which have been increased to 20 feet.

When the Florence Lake tunnel was started, the most conserv-

ative estimates placed the time of its completion for the summer of 1925. The cost was then estimated at \$18,000,000, but skill and efficiency will reduce this at least \$2,000,000. Engineers meet a schedule of 12 feet per day per heading as the highest average

progress which could possibly be obtained. District Manager D. H. Rowan says that the skill, experience and initiative of the company's construction and engineering departments has speeded up the work by about one year and four months.

Homesights on Santa Barbara National Forest

The Santa Barbara National Forest has long been a favorite region with campers, sportsmen and mountain climbers. Nowhere in California are there trails possessing more charm for the hiker than those along the Coast Range from Gavilan on the west to Ojai Valley on the east. Live oak, more beautiful than those along the Santa Ynez River, at Oak Lot and in Bogart Canyon are not to be found anywhere. The waters of the Santa Ynez, Sespe and Piu Rivers abound with fish. Deer and quail are plentiful in the chaparral. The climate is ideal. Even in winter there are few days when outdoor life is unpleasant.

It is not every one however, who enjoys tent life and sleeping in the open. There are many who want comfort and conveniences in camp life. For those desiring comforts the Forest Service has made possible new sorts of outings--sightings spent in permanent camps or in summer houses built on sites rented from the Government.

The most desirable localities in the Santa Barbara Forest for this purpose have been set aside and surveyed into lots. These lots can be rented for periods of from one year to fifteen and at rentals ranging from \$10 to \$25 a year.



In Southern California Most Forest Fires are Man-Caused

Practically all the mountain and forest fires in Southern California are man caused. Out of 84 fires on the Santa Barbara last year, just one resulted from the Act of God--lightning. The fire problem in the Santa Barbara is an extremely difficult one because of the fact that the vast forest watershed areas are highly inflammable over a long season. Fires start readily and burn rapidly. All the more reason why we should be doubly careful, since our wealth--water--is conserved in these watersheds.

A law should be passed, requiring everyone who goes into the mountains to use safety matches and "home-made" cigarettes.

Forest Protection Week and Arbor Day --- 1924

By the President of the United States of America
A PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, it is essential to the continued comfort, welfare and prosperity of the people of the United States that abundant forests, widely distributed and maintained in a condition of high productivity, be forever wisely conserved as one of our greatest natural resources; and

WHEREAS, because of our constantly increasing need for wood and other forest products, together with our past failure to provide for reforestation, we are drawing upon our supplies of timber four times as fast as they are renewed thru growth; and

WHEREAS, the most formidable enemy of forest destruction and prevention of reforestation is fire and, of the fires which annually devastate vast areas, four-fifths are attributable to human agencies; and

WHEREAS, I, CALVIN COOLIDGE, President of the United States, urge upon the Governors of the various States to designate and set apart the week of April 21-27, 1924, as Forest Protection Week, and, wherever practicable and not in conflict with State law or accepted customs, to celebrate Arbor Day within that week. I also urge all citizens, either in association or as individuals, all schools and the press of the land to give earnest thought to the protection of our forests from fire, to the end that, in the future as in the past, these forests may supply us with wood, protect the purity of our streams, and otherwise serve the people of the United States.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the City of Washington this fifth day of February, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and twenty-four, and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred and forty-eighth.

Once upon a time an old Indian was asked the difference between a white man and an Indian and the latter replied, "White men build me big big fire,--sit way back; Indian build me little bit fire,--sit close up." So, in building your camp fire, be an Indian.



Nearly 5,000 recreational special use permits are in effect in California National Forests. The permittees are from all walks in life and the cabins, residences, lodges, hotels and resorts built by them, range in cost from \$200 to \$40,000.



The recreation area is particularly active in the Sierrita and valley areas are taking advantage of the opportunity to have a home in the mountains. Sixty-five residence permits have been issued on the Santa Barbara since January 1, of this year.



The Boy Scouts have established a number of camps on the Forests during the past two years. These Scout camps are maintained on the Santa Barbara and at least one more will be established this summer.



The Santa Barbara was host to 1,430,000 visitors last year, of which number a million were transient motorists.



The slogan of our fire fighting organization is "Get 'em while they're little!" Last year, 85 per cent of our fires were held to 10 acres or less. Over 60 per cent burned less than one-quarter acre each--BUT, we had three fires on the Santa Barbara last season that burned 100,000 acres.



Smoking in the woods and camp fires left unwatched, cause a majority of the forest fires each year. It is surprising the number of people who don't know that a pot of wet coffee grounds will not put out a camp fire.

Help Protect California's Forest Wealth

A Suggested Address for Schools,
Compiled by N. E. Peterson,
District Ranger, Newhall

WHAT WE reduce in
leaves in California by
individual co-operation
and care, or allow our valuable
forests to become unproductive
scrub and an overwhelming public
burden?

"Forest Protection Week," proclaimed by President Coolidge in accordance with precedent first established in 1921 by the late President Harding, will be observed throughout the nation during the period April 21 to 27, inclusive. Of the next 5 weeks, dedicated to forestry, the most closely related to the continued well-being and prosperity of California as this week, which has for its objective the awakening of the public conscience to a realization of the value of our magnificent forests and the necessity for their wise use and preservation.

Throughout the centuries, world civilization has been constructed on a foundation of wood, and the high plane of American culture, of which we boast, is due primarily to industrial and social progress made possible by an unlimited wealth of forest resources. "A country without trees is a country without hope," and the pages of history are replete with examples of nations that have lost their high places in the council of the world thru the careless destruction of their forests.

The specter of waning timber resources has already cast a lengthening shadow over a large part of the United States. The vast pineries of Maine and the Lake States have passed into history; the "inexhaustible" forests of the south are rapidly following in their wake, and "the most wonderful forests the world ever knew," the heritage of every American, are making their last stand against the westward sweep of civilization in the

ragged mountain ranges that overlook the Pacific. Fifty per cent. of all the virgin timber left in the United States today is confined to three states, California, Oregon and Washington. Of this supply 14 per cent. is in California.

The forest lands of the Golden State are one of its greatest natural assets. They cover a total of 15,500,000 acres, an area greater in size than the combined area of New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut. In value they represent over 750 million dollars. They contain sufficient lumber to build 41,000,000 five room bungalows. More than 25,000 men are engaged in lumbering and wood using industries which annually turn out products valued at \$100,000,000.

We may treat all this wealth of forest resources like those that are "mined," never to be replaced; or we may, by combining scientific management with sensible utilization and protection, make them sufficiently productive to supply all our future timber needs.

The greatest destruction agency to the forests is FIRE. California, which was once the fireless land of the Union in 1925, 70 per cent. of the 240 fires that occurred being man-caused, this catastrophe.

It is the duty of everyone who has the interests of California at heart to make every week—

Quarantine "Don'ts"**

Here are a few DON'TS which must be observed:

Don't move any livestock off your premises.

Don't congregate with an assembly of people.

Don't go camping.

Don't move livestock feed stuffs without special permit and supervision.

Don't move livestock unless imperatively necessary, then only by permit.

Don't enter any infested or quarantined area.

Don't allow outside livestock to enter your premises.

Don't fail to report owners—cattle, sheep, hogs, dogs, cats and chickens.

Don't relax vigilance for an instant.

Don't fail to construct a sheep or crocodile dip disinfecting trough so that all vehicles, or animals that might pass in or out of your premises will be disinfected as to hoofs, tires or wheels.

AND ABOVE ALL:

Don't fail to notify or report to your nearest Veterinarian as the first symptoms of anything unusual in your livestock, such as drooping ears, lameness, stammering or reduced milk supply.

Do not forget that many cattle graze on the National Forest range.

When the water supply is limited, camp should be made far enough away from water to let stock use it. Dogs should not be allowed to run loose, and indiscriminate shooting may cause the loss of human life, as well as of livestock.

Metals Are Transparent When Subjected to Heat

Very thin films of certain metals become transparent at least one tenth of an inch thick. The thickness of the film is a factor of gold leaf somewhat greater than the paper on which this is written and held it by an electric current is transparent at about 1,000 degrees Fahrenheit. It will become an insulator as a piece of glass under glass. It normally had been shown very much like metal of gold leaf and that is looked by using the film on a piece of mica or glass and holding the screen through the metal strips with clamp each end of the film.

Then this is done with gold leaf of other substances the thickness of the film varies and the current is gold leaf increased with the temperature reaches 2,000 degrees Fahrenheit. The heat becomes not very transparent, but transparent, so that it is actually possible to see through it. The apparatus is very simple. A thin film of gold leaf requires only 2,500 degrees to make it nearly transparent, above a still higher one. Copper film has also been made transparent in this way, but possibly only for a short time, as it oxidizes with the action of air when heat is applied, and the resulting substance is not transparent.

Yucatan's Vehicles

Yucatan uses an antiquated system of transportation, which includes the ox-cart, the mule, the yoke and the wheelbarrow, although the introduction of motorized vehicles has started to change this. Authority to issue and sell \$10,000,000 of new value of the present Preferred stock, known as Series "B", was granted to the Southern California Edison Company by the State Railroad Commission on Thursday. Proceeds from the sale of this new issue will be used for generating plants, both water and steam, which are now in course of immediate construction or soon to be started and whose completion will greatly increase the capacity of the company for service.

Explaining the details of this Series "B" issue, District Manager D. H. Rowan said: "This stock will be offered to the company's 50,000 stockholders at the price of \$10.00 per share. Any of the issue not taken by stockholders after the close of business May 2nd, will be offered to the general public, chiefly in the East, thru the issue of R. H. Bullen & Sons, acting as agents for the company. It is expected that this whole issue will be placed within a few days. This new stock should not be confused with the seven percent Preferred Series "A" stock which the company has been selling thru its Investment Department and district offices during the past year. The price of the seven percent Preferred Series "A" stock continues to be \$105 per share cash and \$100 per share on the installment plan. The new six percent Series "B" stock has complete equality with the seven percent Series "A", except as to amount of dividend.

Wherever you camp in the National Forests, don't forget for the camp fire is fire, as its forage for snails and park lures of those invading thru the forests in old-time's fashion. Free use of Government telephone lines at ranger stations may be had for the asking.

Telephone Company Evading 24-Hour Service

In the window of the telephone office there hangs a sign which bears the following "apostrophe":

"This office is open from 7 a. m. to 7 p. m. business days. When this office is closed, long distance calls may be placed at Newhall 21, Coast Pitcher, Conestoga, or Newhall 21, Forest station or residences."

Thought is somewhat unintentional as it does not "tell all." The calls which may be put in over the two phones mentioned above are emergency calls only. Emergency calls are calls for a doctor in case of serious illness, or assistance in the case of a death, for an undertaker.

Either Constable Pitcher or Ranger Peterson will get up any time of the night in case of calls of this nature and are quite willing to do so. But they refuse to be disturbed from their slumbers for any but emergency calls.

All telephone calls in this situation in Newhall are made on over-every independent. Partially limited for 12 hours a day, business on Sunday, or Holiday services.

Bakersfield, who are paying a fairly substantial rate for phone service, are only getting half-way service.

There are many important calls that subscribers should be able to put through, like 7 p. m., as well as on Sundays and Holidays, that are not strictly emergency calls.

And the transient trade, which does not come in the emergency cases, would also be quite a item.

Twenty-four hour service for Newhall, every day of the year, is being made too much of the Telephone Company. If this organization has any logical argument to offer we would like to hear it and let it be known to the general public.

Commons Term of Last
Federal Prisoner

James Price, who was sentenced to "mising" with the other federal political activist commutation of sentence, was in San Quentin prison. He had been sentenced under the California criminal syndicalism law while out on bail from the federal prison. The commutation of Price's federal sentence clears the last of the federal prisoners, except for the still unsettled deportation cases. But Price and other men are still in state prisons under federal conviction and criminal record.

Student Putsch

Partly as an outgrowth of the recent discussion of war at the Student Volunteer Convention at Indianapolis, and partly because of the general increase of peace circumstances through American colleges, many evidences of the growing conviction against war have lately been given. At Syracuse, Roy C. Hitchcock, an undergraduate, has refused to return to the R. O. T. C. or the National Guard in the college, because it would be "poor reparation for the misery." At Illinois, E. C. Lockwood, recently served a five-day sentence for refusing to serve out his time in the "Brown Buttery," a voluntary field activity and organization to which Brown men belong. Two more Brown students are taking the same stand. Lloyd Dietherbocher, a theological student at Penn State College, has been suspended because he would not take part any longer in military training. At Pomona College, California, co-ed members of a rifle team, called off a match with Northwestern University, giving as their reason that "Pomona has joined the college movement for world disarmament and does not wish to accept arms and ammunition from the government."

Profits on Food

Ten corporations manufacturing or distributing food together report for 1923, profits to stockholders totaling \$300,000,000, after all deductions are made for depreciation, taxes, and bond interest. According to the New York Federal Reserve Bank, profits of the food products industry in 1923 exceeded those of 1922 by 21 per cent. The highest dividends were paid by Great Western Sugar, 65 per cent; Fleischmann Co., 114 per cent; and General Baking Co. with a return of \$11.18 a share on the 20 per cent common stock. The two big packing companies—Armour and Swift—show dividends of less than 10 per cent, but their capitalization has been subject to so much change that the rate of profit on original investment is obscured.

First Statue 5,000 Years Old

A rapid search has been made by one of the many wire sales classified for excavation recently made on the site of Old In Massachusetts. The search was due up to the ruins of a temple dedicated to the moon god, whose worship was observed there for probably 4,000 years. It is a figure of Kamevar, King of Lagash, who lived about 2400 B. C. What is looked like is impossible to discover on the level of the statue is missing. Records show the temple to have been built in 2900 B. C. after many centuries of war. It was considered by Nebuchadnezzar and again by Cyrus the Great in the fifth century B. C. This was probably the last alteration to have been a century later the Persian Empire was founded and the temple and traces of the temple were never rebuilt.

BANKERS HAVE NOTHING TO DO WITH QUARANTINE

Many people in this community seem

to have gained the impression that the managers of the National Forest Service are in charge of quarantine activities in Los Angeles County. This is a mistake. Closing canyon roads and controlling access is entirely in charge of the County Forestry Department and the managers, or Federal forest men, have nothing whatever to do with the quarantine work.

The term "forest ranger" is applicable only to those in the employ of the United States Forest Service.

County forest officers are not rangers, but are known as County Foresters or County Wks, Fish and Game Wardens.



BE A GOOD WOODSMAN

Don't get excited in camp, or pick the land to be used for a tent.

Sleep or pitch on the fire in burning places, especially in places where exposure of trees.

Build a wind break fire in the corner of a cleared space, never against a tree or log, or near brush.

Before leaving camp, get out every spark of your fire with a plentiful supply of water, then cover it with a large mound of earth.

Do not pollute the water of lakes or streams.

Bury or burn all refuse promptly—never let it rot.

Don't build a campfire without first notifying a Camp Fire District, from a National Forest office or agent.

Live up to the law and game laws.

Keep in touch with the forest ranger in whose district you camp. If a fire starts anywhere in your vicinity, get word to the ranger as soon as possible.

Leave a clean camp and a clean record. Talk of the fellow who comes after you.

Wonder if they'll take the trouble to keep the eagles and buzzards from opening the hood and mouth of man?

The Rule of the Home

BROOKLYN JUDGE asserts that more than eighty per cent of our criminals are under twenty-five. Another New York jurist declares that the average hardened criminal is about seventeen and that the age at which the largest numbers of prisoners are committed to jails and reformatories is thirteen. This implies a youth situation of alarming proportions and implications.

How can this frightful wastage of young life be arrested? Those nearest to the facts tell us that it is not the fault of a crime wave that inevitably follows in the wake of war. The evil is so much deeper. In the final analysis the principal culprit lies upon our institution only and that institution is the average American home.

The top root of the situation is contempt for rightly constituted authority. A generation ago the parents governed the family. Today the tables are turned and the family policy is dictated largely by the children. Consequently, hence either the school or the church can assume any guardianship, the seeds of potential disorder have been sown. Nothing is gloner than that moral education, like charity, must begin at home.

The child who has not learned a wholesome respect for home-law will have nothing but disdain for school-law. The youth who has not been disciplined in regard either will leave school around fourteen and go out to defy all law. And when he falls into the stern hand of the guardians of the law he will have his parents to thank most of all.

The remedy is not better laws or better schools or better churches. It is better homes and better parents.

Brisbane Likes Them Old-Fashioned. Well—

Arthur Brisbane says that King George is guided by his wife who "is a middle-aged woman, wearing dresses of the old kind and high shoes that button up." Are we to take it as final that every woman not wearing old-fashioned clothes is lacking in wisdom? There is progress in everything, even in clothes and a clinging to old wearing apparel might mean an entertaining of and belief in old ideas which is not so good even in a ruler. And anyhow will bet that King George enjoys the vision of an up-to-date flapper ALMOST as much as listening to the sensible advice of Queen Mary.

U. S. EXPERTS LEAD WAR ON FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE



This is Dr. C. E. SACRAMENTO, CALIF.—The full force of the United States government has been brought into play effectively against the foot and mouth disease in California. The disease has been confined to certain limited districts in the state and the work of stamping it out is proceeding rapidly, under the direction of Dr. C. E. Brock, (see special representative of Secretary Wallace, department of agriculture, who has complete command of the outbreak) federal and state forces. "Every method justified by our past experience and by scientific study is being used to prevent the possibility of spread of the disease and to wipe it out as thoroughly as there will be no chance of its recurrence," said Dr. Brock. "There is no chance of spread of

the disease through shipment of traffic originating or being destined from the great non-infected areas of California. We know of no instance where the disease has been carried by such shipments," Dr. Brock said. Complete confidence in the plan in the field was expressed by Dr. J. H. Wallace, chief of the division of animal pathology, bureau of animal industry, in a message to Dr. Brock and the local federal inspectors. "We have in California," he said, "the best organized force of inspectors that was ever assembled on a foot and mouth death. "The methods are not experimental, but have been weighed in the balance of practical experience and have always produced the expected results."

The following article written by John H. Atwood, a prominent attorney appeared in the magazine "The Christian Business Man".

THERE was a time in the history of our country when there was a need of such organizations as the Business Men's Christian Unity, that time is now. It seems to me that perhaps more than all other factors responsible for the present apparent moral degeneration was the false standards that have obtained among us for too many years. We have been using as the standard by which successes are measured, the one thing that perhaps more than all things explains the situation. That success is measured by money; that it matters not how one gets money, if he gets it. The expression, "rummy mail," explains the present day attitude in no small degree. I do not refer to the man who is simply striving to gather to himself a competency, something that in reason shall serve his wants and protect him in the means of helping his neighbors, but I have reference to the man who is reaching for something that is not needed.

A government such as ours must rest upon an honest people or we shall find that it is resting upon sand. Probity and honesty must obtain in the great mass of the people if the republic is to endure, for after all is said and done, the servants that we select are from among ourselves and as we are, they in some measure at least, will be. Much of the Christ must be injected into the commercial codes of the nation. There must be more recognition of the two additions to the Ten Commandments that are embodied in the Sermon on the Mount and in the Golden Rule, the recognition that there is something more than the mere acquisition of money and the retention of it. Of all

the things taught by the Master, the one thing that seems to be above all others is the proclamation of the brotherhood of man and the duty that we owe to one another by virtue of that brotherhood. We are the sons of one, we are the brothers of all and a failure to recognize the duty that flows from us toward each of our fellows because of that brotherhood is a failure to recognize that which is supreme.

In the attainment of our success, we must learn to be kind. We must first be tolerant, because tolerance is the father of kindness. When we have become kind we have gone a long way along the road of adherence to the doctrine that we have been talking about and we realize that lighter than the accumulation of wealth is the recognition of the brotherhood of man and that we recognize the Golden Rule as a controlling factor in the business world.



New Quarantine Rules Issued By State Department

Foot C. Miller received from the State Department of Agriculture, Wednesday morning, a bulletin regarding certain rulings which went into effect May 24. The rulings apply to the quarantined area of Los Angeles County, which includes all the territory south of eastern the boundary of the Santa Barbara and Angeles National Forests, on a line running east from Ventura County and San Bernardino County, just north of the towns of Sunnyside, San Fernando, Altadena, La Cressona, Glendale, etc.

According to these new rulings, movement of live stock, feed, poultry and such products, is prohibited within the area mentioned except under special permit.

Dogs and cats may be transported under such order.

All persons other than owners or employees, are prohibited from entering or trespassing on any private ranch, range or pasture, and upon, in or around which, any disease-infected animals are kept, except by special permit.

Section 2 of the quarantine laws prohibits hunting or fishing in lakes within the restricted area.

Houses and other dwellings which may be moved on roads only, provided they are under saddle or in harness or on by rope or halter; otherwise only by special permit.

Quarries of stray animals will be arrested, and the animals turned over to the nearest pound.

If dead animals are found, a report should be made to the supervising veterinarian of inspection as that proper disposition may be made of the carcass.

Special permits may be secured from the County Horticultural Commission or State or Medical Department of Agriculture in the Pacific Finance Building, Los Angeles.

Boost School Bonds.

J. U. Ingles, of Van Nuys, and H. L. Fraser, of San Fernando were in Newhall Monday evening in the interest of the school bond election to be held June 2. They gave some startling figures in regard to the present attendance, the phenomenal increase in the newer districts, and the terrific congestion that in the older sections has forced more than 20,000 pupils to half time attendance. An increase of 25,000 within a short time has made additional rooms to the number of 800 necessary, and the city and county attendance is rising faster each month. The use of the veto power, and the tendency of executives, both national and state, to dictate to legislative bodies, are matters requiring careful attention, or our representative form of government is apt to become a farce. Only two grounds for veto were doubtless intended by the original framers of our national constitution; one that an act was unconstitutional, and the other applying to plying to bills appropriating money, this providing a check on a tendency to governmental extravagance. And both of these grounds were supposed to be very apparent, to be tenable.

But of late years, in fact, beginning in President Cleveland's administration and continuing down to the present time, we find the national executive interposing vetoes based on personal beliefs and feelings, and seldom based on points of law. Not only that, but there is a general tendency on the part of executives, both national and state, to dictate to legislation, and to demand passage of certain laws, and to use political power or prestige to enforce these demands. It is a tendency which in time might easily result in the perversion of a representative form of government into a dictatorship. Given a compliant legislative body and the easily-imagined accident of a corrupt or power-loving executive, and the task might easily be turned.

There should be a movement to restore the balance of power between the legislative and executive branches of our national and state governments, and it is refreshing to see a strong tendency in Congress to correct this matter, even tho' as upright an executive as the present occupant of the presidential chair had to get the lesson.

Must Warn Eastern Tourists

Eastern motorists who are beginning to invade this section by thousands should be warned, personally or by circular envelopes, with file in the national hotels, according to an announcement by the touring bureau of the Automobile Club of Southern California. It is pointed out that while residents of this section are familiar with conditions and know that the long dry season makes extra precautions necessary, the stranger does not realize the danger of leaving camp fires burning and nobody throwing away light matches or trailing cigarettes.

One fire will make a million matches and match will destroy a million acres," is the lesson that should be impressed on all motorists entering the national forests and other sections where the dry undergrowth readily ignites and readily gets beyond control. With attention carefully exercised, thoughtfulness and every prudent precaution it is safe to traverse, generally the best road sections from other sections.

There are nearly 4,000,000 acres in the national national forests in California, the scenic beauty of which are open to the public. The only provision that Uncle Sam makes at least is that the visitors be extremely careful with their camp fires and matches, and that they refrain from poisoning streams and poisoning wildlife.

Last year more than 4,000,000 persons enjoyed the national forests of California and 65 per cent of those and their own automobiles for companions.

During the winter season additional campers are placed in the forests. Fireship patrols are maintained, radio broadcasting at night, and a mass attractive system of collection of trees and visitors is placed in effect.

Every possible safeguard will be employed this year, as it is expected that at least 5,000,000 persons will accept Uncle Sam's invitation to enjoy recreation periods in his beautiful and grandest country.

"Know Your State Capital"

Personally conducted sight-seeing trips will be provided by the Sacramento Chamber of Commerce without charge for excursion parties from California cities. It was announced today in a letter received at the local Chamber of Commerce from Irvin Engler, Secretary Manager of the Sacramento civic organization.

"Know your State Capital" is the slogan of this new movement by the Sacramento Chamber. In his letter Engler says:

"California has the most attractive Capital building and the most extraordinary Capital grounds of any state capital in the United States. Thousands of Eastern tourists visit the building and grounds each year, but a great number of our own Californians have never seen it. A visit to Capitol Park with its hundreds of rare varieties of trees

and plants and exceptionally beautiful surroundings, is alone worth a trip to Sacramento.

"There are other attractions, too, such as Sutter Park, the most famous of Gold Rush landmarks with its interesting collection of relics, and Crocker Art Gallery, which houses one of the most valuable collections of paintings in the world.

"We urge the various clubs, societies and other organizations in California cities to arrange excursions and visit their capital. We will furnish automobiles to take them on a sight-seeing trip and they will be accompanied by a lecturer who will give informa-

tion on all points of interest.

"The graduating class of Livermore High School made such an excursion and was delighted over their visit. A Chico Sunday School class is also arranging an excursion. We will be glad, indeed, to co-operate with any excursion group and will make their visit well worth while."

Campaign subdivisions on the western of Los Angeles had to come. The mountains in the vicinity of any large city are dotted with the cottages of country loving folk, who have to live in the city to gain their livelihood but leave for the open for their holidays.

And Newhall is the most logical place for such a community. Its proximity to Los Angeles, combined with its great natural beauty, and the ever greater beauty of its draws and canyons, dotted with trees, are such a magnet that even a casual visitor to the contrary could not hold such colonization back indefinitely.

Four years ago, Newhall people may recall that, at the time of the Newhall Improvement Association, the writer tried to impress upon the association the extreme desirability of attracting attention to Newhall by advertising and other necessary means to try to get our spots of the Los Angeles people first established in the various activities.

No concerted attempt has yet been made to call attention to the rare beauty of our Newhall hills. The Chamber of Commerce has certainly done little in that respect. It has been left to private enterprise to start the campaign. It is slow work. So many of the morning world read Newhall as a way station on the highway with nothing to distinguish it from the rest of the small California towns, that it is sometimes hard to convince them that such a worth venture will open up the beautiful hill country adjacent to the Happy Valley and the Pico road. They seem to think that if there were such beauty, they would have heard of it.

Pioneering in any new enterprise is costly. This first attempt to place Wildwood Canyon before the public is no exception. Before anything could be done in that regard, roads had to be constructed through rough canyons and extensive development, such as surveys, and the installation of utilities undertaken. Newhall has as yet no recreational facilities that would be attractive to the work-end pleasure seekers, and Wildwood Community facilities had to be provided by developers succeeding that venture.

This current year is being widely well called by irresponsible press and terms. In fact, if the buying public were to figure their propositions out carefully, they would realize that the 1933 returns from such campaigns would not allow of the expensive attractions promised for some future date. Yet Wildwood Canyon has to compete with those

The fact that it is contagious and infectious disease points the way for medical research. Let there be no delay in making a beginning, and enough progress in the work, so the next outbreak can be controlled by good veterinarians instead of poor butchers.

Treatment of Poison Oak

Poison oak, ferns of stone poisoning areas from the poison tree, commonly known as poison oak.

The poison is due to a powerful vegetable oil that is most apt to enter through the open skin pores when the victim is scratching. Many persons believe they are immune from oak poisoning, but it really immunity is very rare.

No shock should be taken in any of the so-called remedies for poison oak,

other than the fact is that the remedy exists. The disease is obliged to run its course regardless.

The first thing to be done in case one is aware of having been in contact with poison oak is to attempt to wash off the dangerous oil before it has an opportunity to penetrate under the surface of the skin. This can best be done by repeated washings with cheap lye soap. If the washing has been thorough the character of the poison will not set in.

After the skin is washed and well dried, the rash which should be directed toward preventing the spread of the poison by means of its lymphatics.

Many sources suggest immediate relief by the simple method of leaving the patient alone in plenty of hot water.

Do not use aspirin-plant upon the open poison oak wounds, since there is always danger of heat poisoning. Even zinc oxide, another favorite "remedy," should not be used until the severity of the disease has been checked and the open areas have contracted to heal.

MAN with a wife and two little children belongs to it by word—forgot the name of his employer to a check for \$120 and was sentenced to prison for four years.

In the latter case, the stocker paid his \$5 fine and said he was sorry. He went his way with an identity on his chest and with no consciousness of the injuries, damages, wrongs, by his criminal negligence, destruction of timber—destroyed millions, dried-up waterfalls; destroyed millions of game, forests—destroyed rolling country of employment and the nation of wealth which will take generations to restore.

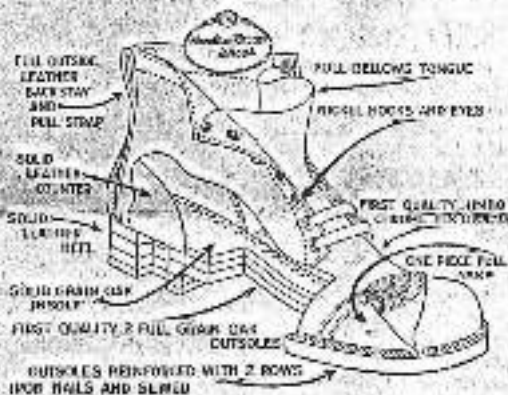

wildness as well as with the best-located campsites, of which there are many, and many of which are in mountains, or localities where there is connected continuously and conveniently to keep their advantage before the public.

For more accurate comparison, there are widely advertised campsite propositions within an hour's ride of here, where, for instance, the lots are greater, or smaller. The smallest lot in the Wildwood tract has four acres more in it. The largest lot has three-fourths of an acre. The average lots are a fourth of an acre. By the majority of advertised campsite subdivisions sell under great deals, or even losses, the first being no title protection, the second not even being a title. Such conditions are to be found on subdivisions based upon tax titles, divided titles, and other devices, signs of circumventing the real estate laws.

In comparison with such conditions, every lot in Wildwood Canyon carries individual Certificate of Title Insurance.

Many of the valuable subdivisions have no proper road facilities. You "park" in to your lot over another's property. In Wildwood Canyon the lots are on a forty-foot road and you can drive your car direct to any Wildwood lot.

Our city leader is an aesthete. First, so Wildwood Canyon is able, preparing plans and putting the water mains in front of each lot—and to avoid future argument over water, the water plant is included in the community improvements decided to be for owners. The Edison lines will be extended to Wildwood Canyon as the developer's expense, thus furnishing electricity for cooking and lighting.

For recreation, the Wildwood Canyon lot owner will have his Community House, situated in Community Park, and within a stone's throw of the swimming pool. These enterprises are not public, as they are owned by the lot owners in Wildwood and could be leased, loaned or otherwise utilized by the public or large only with the consent of all the lot owners.

The Community House is be-

ing equipped for dancing as well as other entertainments.

From the foregoing, some of the difficulties in promoting a Newhall campsite subdivision may be seen. Development is not a job of roads. A survey a mile and a half of roads have been built by local men to open this tract and wherever possible all the development money has been, and is being expended in Newhall. On the other side, it has been most surprising and justifying to see the individual responses from Newhall citizens to the enterprise. Newhall people were among the first to purchase property in Wildwood and at all times a wonderful spirit of co-operation has been shown. With Wildwood Canyon a success, within three years, the Newhall Assessment Roll will have doubled and reached the figure necessary to let us cut vote out of the Los Angeles High School District and build our own High School. Our assessment district will be so productive that the expense of municipal improvements, such as the curbing of the streets, may be undertaken and the work itself will be well on the way to introduction. An act now most impractical because of our small size. Think of the difference in the assessment roll when acreage of \$3 to \$4 assessment benefits developed into improved lots of eight to twelve hundred valuation. Other developers (legitimate builders of the country) it is deserving to be honest) will soon

be had like over and develop our present waste land.

By a hard, long, rough and extensive road, trying to attract attention to a district that had had demand for so many years as has this one. Co-operation and pegging will overcome the handicap. The developer of Wildwood Canyon appreciates the complaints already offered them (as, for instance, the opening of the "Signal's" columns in this article), and do assure Newhall residents that their city friends, in the market for a cabin site, cannot do better than investigate Wildwood Canyon. Your friends will be pleased and our Newhall community will have made another stride towards their ultimate, civil independence.

But the demand for his resignation, in that event would, be too unanimous to be ignored. And the ally defense of his right of free speech, in such an event, would never be dreamed of.

And considering the fact that back of the campaign for repeal is unlimited money, might not one with propriety inquire whether Dr. Murray has thought of recompense for his influence? A. B. T.

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

FARMS TO BE RESTOCKED WITH HIGH PRODUCING ANIMALS



H. B. Hodge, Bureau, State Department of Agriculture, who states farmers to replace cattle, hogs in production of food and wealth through with only high producing grade and pure-bred animals.

Stocking California with high producing animals is the aim of H. B. Hodge, Bureau, State Department of Agriculture. He followed in the footsteps of California, Texas which have been recipients of such stock during the recent feet and health disease epidemic.

With the cooperation of Sam H. Hodge, secretary California Dairy Council, the State Department of Agriculture has started a campaign for high duty grade and pure-bred animals from its laboratories and its associates, in various States, including California, Hodge said.

"Many farms are now again or will shortly be ready for raising and rearing of a willing supply in the advantage of the farmer. It follows that consequently the milk and animals produced, the matter of lowering production capacity, and consequently the farm through conservation.

"There are important matters which should be given the most attention as efficiency or lack, may be the cause of success or failure.

"In the light of our knowledge on the subject of pure stock, breeding it would seem that every farmer and other livestock men was, are receiving the same, would be surprised. But

many farmers have made the mistake of buying inferior and cheap quality stock. We would recommend that while good breeding stock is paid for to start with, it is essential in the long run. Hodge also has recommended that a poor producing animal is worth of any price.

"Purchasing animals must be a serious and careful transaction. Production records are the only reliable guide to the quality of dairy stock.

"The advice in these columns who have contemporary maintenance in to select their animals carefully and so far as possible, if other conditions are equal, animals of pure breeding should be selected at least for foundation stock."

Mr. Hodge further stated that the subject of labor-saving, it is essential which the world also needs a type of machine. His advice is to select and raise such animals free from this disease.

"For these animals they know, the production of high quality stock is made the success of production has been kept close to a minimum," Mr. Hodge urged. "In all matters, to raise the animals have successfully gained the reputation and better produce. The possession of a high quality stock is an acquisition well worth any reasonable price and will prove a source of profit to the owner."

ARISE RAISE IN RATES

Accounting for the current year the lower water supply in history, the Southern California Edison Company last week filed with the Railroad Commission an application for authority to put into effect an emergency increase in rates during the period of July 1, 1924, to March 31, 1925.

The Company's application contains that the cost of power production during this year will be \$1,500,000 greater than the cost of producing an equivalent amount of power during an average year of year.

"The extreme dry season," stated S. H. Ballard, vice president and general manager of the company, "has necessitated placing in operation all of the extra plants of the company and making full use of interconnection with the Colorado system pending rains." Work is also being done on an additional steam plant at Long Beach of 200,000 horsepower capacity, of which 50,000 horsepower will be ready in July and the remainder of the plant by the end of this year.

"This has provided the necessary power supply to meet the increased demands of our consumers which are greatly augmented due to the dry season. The effect has been to increase our operating expenses from a total of \$500,000 under normal conditions, to an actual expense for this year of \$1,500,000.

"On account of the \$2,000,000 excess production cost for this year, we are applying for a temporary increase in rates, which will provide about \$1,000,000 of this increased cost, during the 9 months' period from July 1 of this year, to April 1 of next year when another season's water supply will be available. Funds available from our Contingency Reserve accumulated under orders of the Railroad Commission for this purpose will further serve to meet the increased cost to the extent of \$1,500,000, leaving a remainder of approximately \$500,000 to be made up in future years when the water supply is more abundant.

"Our entire application is verified by a sworn engineer, and the most rigid scrutiny is applied to each item of cost.

"The company's water supply will probably be reduced by the completion of one of the new Hoover Dam. This is a dam which has been under construction for the past four years and which we

expect to place in operation by April 1st of next year.

CALIFORNIA ROAD SIGNS

"By this sign ye shall know." This was the written of the highway markers in Southern California, but it might well apply. This season, more than ever before, will the wanderer have his pathway pointed out by emerald and steel signs and his safety assured by warnings of grades, railway crossings, slippery hills, fire stations and dangerous corners.

A check shows that in the 35,000 miles of paved and secondary highways in this section there are placed nearly 215,000 signs of more than thirty classifications. The job of bringing this high state of efficiency has been going on for ten years and is still going strong. The work is done by the sign posting department of the Automobile Club of Southern California, which has 20 men and seven trucks in this service. During the past 12 months these trucks have covered 222,441 miles or a distance equal to nearly five times around the world.

So completely has the work been done that today about 70 per cent of the effort is in maintenance and renewals. Last year there were placed 7,000 signs looking to safety of drivers. Temporary signs denoting detours, closed roads, rangers, etc., numbered 6,422 and caution signs 5,155.

THE FIRE SEASON IS ON



THE FIRE SEASON was advanced into the Newhall-Santa Barbara divide Friday, the 23rd of June, by a stubborn, smoky fire in Milk canyon. Workers and fire fighters battled the blaze from early afternoon until midnight. The fire burned over about a 1,000-acre tract. The Milk Canyon school was in the path of the flames, but was saved by concentrated effort on the part of the firemen. It is understood that a County highway crew has been notified for the fire.

A fire started Saturday in upper San Francisco canyon and burned over about 200 acres before being lost under control Tuesday evening. Suppressor forces consisting of over 100 men were in charge at Knight Park, Deputy Supervisor, Mendocino, of Santa Barbara and George Robinson, of San Francisco, assisted by all the Greek in the Newhall district.

The 21st position of County Forester and Deputy County Forester

are now greatly appreciated by the National Forest men. The fire is said to have been started by a L. A. City development crew working in San Francisco canyon, as a result of blasting operations.

A small fire was discovered in Placenta Canyon last Saturday night by Forestier Wicks, about from the Kennedy place. H. E. Peterson and J. E. Collins were clearing land and burning without a permit. On completion of work, the two men escaped when Judge Miller. Each was fined \$25 and given a suspended jail sentence.



RANGER MEETING POSTPONED

The ranger meeting which was to have been held at the Newhall station last Monday was called off on account of the heavy fire in San Francisco. All guards are now on duty for the winter. Several changes in the personnel of the protection force are in evidence this year. Leslie Wright is on the Salsado division, G. W. Deane has the Ridge Road division, while Ted Lane has charge of the Pine Creek division.



FOUR NEW COMFORT STATIONS

The Los Angeles County Health Dept., in charge of Dr. J. L. Perry, has erected two large comfort stations at Oak Camp in Milk canyon, and two at Camp 5 in Ridge Road. These stations are all within the National Forest and will be greatly appreciated by the traveling public. Funds for four more stations have been promised by Dr. Perry, two of which are to be placed on Rockwell Forest line and two at Camp 2, Broughton canyon. The stations are maintained by the County Health Department.



LA JOYA KEEPS GUARD

The forest fire in San Francisco and the canyon should be sufficient warning to the owners of the La Joya Lodge to get a forest office in good position to protect their interests during this particularly hazardous season. It wouldn't take a very large fire to completely wipe out the La Joya holdings. It is too bad that the promoters do not seem to realize the fire hazard that hangs over the Lodge this season. A warning has been issued to the Lodge owners by National Forest men who have the situation. Getting a \$20 to lose \$1,000,000 is a very poor business and we hope the La Joya people will see it this way for their own good. And guarding La Joya is not a "kid's" job. It's a job for a man with actual experience in fire prevention and suppression work.

Guard Doolie who was on patrol in Broughton Canyon last Sunday got out three more fire that campers had just extinguished. What chance prove that there are many campers who have never "paid" the pleasure of fighting a mountain fire.

WHY ELECTRICITY MUST BE SAVED

On account of the unusually light rainfall during the past winter, power companies throughout the state who use water power for the generation of electricity are now faced with an acute shortage.

On the Edison system the two principal sources of water power supply are the Kern river east of Bakersfield and the tributaries of the San Joaquin river northeast of Fresno.

Kern river is now carrying only 25 per cent of the water usually available on this date.

On the Big Creek system where water is stored in Huntington lake the amount available is less than 25 per cent of normal. This lake which has a capacity of 88,000 acre feet now holds less than 20,000 acre feet and practically no more will flow in until next April.

Under the supervision of the Railroad Commission plans have been formulated to protect the requirements of all power users throughout the state. This will be done by directing the use of the power so that non-essential service will be curtailed until the present situation is relieved.

In this and the Edison Company has prepared a power budget which assigns to each of its operating districts the amount of power available for each month. The district manager in turn will arrange so that this power will be distributed equitably among all the consumers of his district.

To accomplish this some rigid rules will be put into effect which will eliminate the use of certain kinds of service which the committee representing all of the interests throughout the state considers unnecessary.

The situation is unforeseen and absolutely unavoidable. Whatever restrictions are made they are necessary to conserve the power for the use of farmers to mature their crops and to supply industry and maintain pay rolls. Without supervision the crops would suffer and industrial workers would be laid off.

We ask our consumers to aid in every possible way by reducing the consumption of electric energy by shorter hours of use and, wherever possible, the substitution of other devices to conduct their work.

A recent great earthquake has served to fix more than ever the attention of the world to this country which, from a point of vantage in the Asia area, has reached to become one of the foremost factors in the world and a world power overlapping in its potency many of the old powers of Europe.

This island empire came to receive its name and has occupied the main of the Far East. Like the British Isles the Japanese islands form the fringe of a great continent; both now in the hands of petty kings and now in a centralized nation fast looked about for expansion, and both have been noted that their (32) and have prosperously developed, hardly on any power.

But there are differences as well as likenesses between these two island nations. There was known to some that an empire Great Britain has doubtfully found her lack on France in war as an imperial possessions are concerned, and has not her contacts with the main part of the world. Japan, on the other hand, has occupied large fields of the relationship world-wide, but has expanded somewhat in other directions also. Great Britain has become the headquarters of a world-wide, though empire. Japan has remained so for the name of her empire, with her power when drawn into the world, slowly about the world.

For there is one

The ranger and one of the fire fighters looked him down to a native look and when he came to they told him how to get in the car and advised him to walk off, back to his headquarters, and back.

Here! Now teller Hanks, unless you can deliver the goods.

FAMOUS LAST WORDS

THE FIRE WHICH STOOD

All the fire which stood, the woodlands of California, no other is so beautiful as the fire. Mountains and forests are spring from more different causes. The fire is the chief cause. Besides and for the clearing land or burning grass and brush after the fire to escape. Because many drop a burning match, cigar or cigarette from the pipe, lantern, camp or cigarette may light a bush, and the fire spreads. Most of the very destructive fires occur in the fall, but at all times they are a terrible menace. Their destruction is more deeply largely on the west. They cannot travel against it, except on all, and not over them, if the fire is burning. Persons of any kind are absolutely prohibited within the boundaries of any National Forest. There are no exceptions in this regulation, which will be enforced the same to the letter.

HISTORIC POKER-FLIES

The three worst forest fires that have occurred in the United States in that order: Minnesota fire in 1857, which started 60 miles above Minneapolis, New Jersey, also, in 1878. It destroyed a belt of timber 50 miles long and 10 miles wide, 1,000 square miles. Almost every living thing was killed within this area. A number of towns were wiped out; 500 buildings were destroyed; 100,000 persons perished and 1,000,000 head of cattle.

Powder, fire in Wisconsin, in 1871, burned over 200 square miles, destroyed 1200 and 1000 people, including half the entire population of Plover.

Blackleg, fire in Minnesota in 1894, destroyed 100,000 acres, 100,000 head of cattle, 100,000 head of horses, and 500 live people.

usual, slept, took breakfast, but he was here, and there and looking after every detail. Our conductor is always here. He said, "I will be with you until it is dark, for the night coach, when we must get up." Again, he is a personal conductor. When I was in Washington, I accompanied a party on a sight-seeing trip to Mount Vernon, Alexandria, Arlington, General Lee's Home, the capital of our nation, the White House, the company harbor and many other places. I could do this for two days because I had a personal conductor who knew the way, knew the Cambrian, knew the works, so far as before that and in the weeks that he would have to go. I noticed that this personal conductor in Washington knew every particular on the way, and he would say, "We have two passengers going, and could do better than this. Now, see personal conductor, know us, for the West tells us that he calls his sheep by name and he will not let any other sheep come to such pasture. He follows them out in the field, and he loves them with an unending love. In the next place, he is a safe conductor. When I reached New York City it was almost dark, and, through some mistake, no one was there to meet me. I asked the station master to tell me where I could get a hotel near the station. He told me to go two blocks north on Black Court and I would find the hotel, but "that was, and he don't go on one of the side streets." I had only five dollars in my pocket, and was obliged to get me to my home out of the side streets because, they said, it was a short cut. They were the side streets and I did not follow them.

It is a great thing to have a conductor who takes an interest in your welfare. I had the pleasure of visiting the Museum of Natural History in New York City and had for my guide the youngest member of our own Mr. Dill. He gave me a very careful hearing and for one hour and a half he guided me through the various of that wonderful Museum explaining so many things that only he could take the trouble to do, because he was interested in me. I shall never forget his kindness, or the great Museum of Natural History.

In the last place, our conductor guided me to an old home in California. The old home that my grandfather built, 1820, and there I received a warm welcome. I was invited to have a glass of beer, and if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you with respect. I was also told, "I pray that you may be one year as I and my father are here." And I could not help but think of those words when I received a telegram in the Federal City of my old home. In the early years, my grandfather helped to build the Baptist Church and my grandfather was a charter member of the Presbyterian Church, and when they would come to town on Sunday morning grandfather would stop at the Presbyterian Church, and some of the children would go with grandfather, the others would accompany grandfather to the Baptist Church. Many years passed by, grandfather and grandfather had gone to their reward, and the West's way was on. The Baptist minister passed the responsibility to go to the service as a Chaplain, but failed in the physical construction. The Presbyterian minister passed the construction and was accepted. The sympathy of the whole nation goes to President and Mrs. Coolidge in their sorrow for the loss of their son. And none will share their grief more sincerely than those of us who have passed through the same bitter experience.

The immense volume of truck transportation over California roads is bringing a real problem that cannot be postponed much longer. Some action, some additional facilities, either widening or building exclusive truck roads, or some other practical way, will be necessary to keep transportation going. And the movement should not be too long delayed, or the present roads will weaken and break under the strain. Beyond depositing time to begin plans, for the demand will even then be unfulfilled until the pressure becomes too great to be ignored.

The democratic convention at New York is still in session at this writing, and seems at last to be nearly tangled as ever. McAdoo finally withdrew, in favor of Meredith, of Iowa, so it is very unlikely that this will help Meredith's case, because it has been evident from the start that the South delegates are against everything McAdoo is for. Chances are very great now that there will be no nomination, unless the delegates leave for home in such numbers that a few men can dictate the nomination. In that case the nominee will have about as much chance of election as has the proverbial snowball in the hot place. And while Al Smith has also withdrawn, his supporters may be able to nominate him. In which case the democratic fireworks will be well worth observing.

The writer has no particular interest in the candidacy of Congressman Lushbarger, but when an opponent is brought out against him on the sole ground that he did not support President Coolidge's

vote of the bonus bill, it is time to call a halt. To demand that every congressman obey the president is contrary to American principles, and cannot be too strongly condemned. It must never be permitted an executive to dictate who shall make the laws, and what laws they may or may not support, in order not to incur executive wrath.

And no man should THINK that his fire was out when he left it. He should KNOW! It is generally conceded that a ranger will give a person a second chance who thoughtlessly or unknowingly commits a minor offense contrary to forest regulations. But to those who are carelessly leaving a burning campfire in a place that an officer ranger will show to be dangerous.



SAVING PAPER SAVES WOODS

The paper manufacturers of the United States alone pay for waste paper

over \$2,000,000 a year. And this represents about two million tons of waste paper, which is the average consumption of the mills of the country. Were it not for the utilization of waste paper, there would be a depletion of the forests amounting to some three hundred thousand acres of timberland every year.

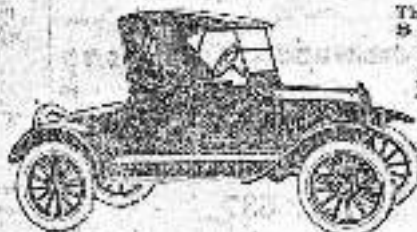

Fine Camp Ground

Three of our readers who are intending to go on a little camping trip and ten far from home, the Live Oak Springs Cabin Site property will be of interest.

These grounds are located two miles above the Salsmit Grocery and altho there is plenty of shade, it is an open space which eliminates the chance of fire. There is plenty of water for campers use.

This place is owned by a company of Hollywood men and to date 100 to 200 cabin sites have been sold. People are encouraged to camp, but campers are not under any obligation to purchase sites.

There is a dancing floor and player piano for the use of those camping on the grounds. And Mr and Mrs Miller, will serve hot dog, coffee and rock drinks.

As many places are now closed to campers because of fire hazard, this place will be a welcome haven.

Telephone Service Extended

A telephone has been installed at McGinnis & Urbe's confectionery store, and it has been made a pay station, so anyone wishing to do so can put in a long distance call until the store closes at 11 o'clock.

This will be appreciated by our people, for there has been considerable dissatisfaction because telephone service ceases at 7 o'clock p. m. The new arrangement will permit of long distance calls being put in four hours longer.

If we keep on hoping, we will eventually get 24 hour service. All other telephone service can be had at Wood's Garage at Saugus.

Southern California Road Building

Southern California during the first six months of 1924 has contracted for more than two million cubic yards of concrete, one third of which has been state road, and the remaining available for the counties. The amount of concrete used is 2,000,000 cubic yards.

The 200 miles of highway here was 200 different projects undertaken.

In addition to this road work there were 100 bridges placed under construction, totaling nearly 2,000 feet in length and involving expenditures of more than \$1,000,000.

These figures are estimated from records of the engineering department of the Automobile Club of Southern California, which organization has always been a strong supporter of good roads, and which keeps tabs of the highway construction through this section.

The four projects approximate 20,000,000 in expenditures and include 100 miles of gravel road in Imperial County; 200 miles of concrete and gravel concrete road grading in Los Angeles County; 200 miles of grading and Portland cement concrete in Orange County; 200 miles of grading, concrete concrete, widening and seal work in Ventura County. In Orange County, now the state is building a 200 mile wide strip for Santa Ana River.

"County" highway construction shows 400 miles of asphalt concrete to Kern County, approximately 400 miles of road work in Los Angeles County of practically all classes; 200 miles of grading, asphalt and cement concrete, and widening in Orange County; nearly 200 miles of concrete in Riverside County; 100 miles of widening and concrete, and seal work in San Bernardino County; 100 miles of cement concrete in San Diego County; 20 miles in Santa Ynez Valley in Santa Barbara County; and 200 miles of asphalt concrete in Ventura County.

Had the flames gotten a good start, the fire would have undoubtedly caused much damage. A hard wind was blowing from the south, and several residences and business places would have been in direct line of the fire.

The fire was started by sparks from the forge.

The insurance on the building had been renewed shortly before the fire.

THE RADIAN SPRINGS FIRE

A ranch bank and rim-formation appeared in the early morning during the "live" stage of the Radian Springs fire, that it flourished at least thousands of feet above the level to which the fire was known to rise. The area between the ridge and the canyon floor never was there again that was known to be on the ground at that time. According to reports by forest officers from Bishop, the highest level of Elizabeth Lake canyon was covered in volcanic ash. These ashes were blown to the ground. Lower Elizabeth Lake Canyon from Radian Springs to Johnson's ranch, a distance of nine miles, was liberally swept clean of timber and brush. Aside from this spectacular run, the fire ate up most of the vegetation of every kind, including such valuable timber as Pine and Spruce forests, also in a portion of Fish Creek canyon. One side of Sawmill Hill and one side of Bart's Peak were burned over. The forest climbed to the highest elevation at the summit of Bart's Peak. The fire started at about 5 o'clock, Wednesday evening, July 18, and was not hot under control until late in the evening of July 19.

On account of the serious fire hazard this season, camp-fire permits for the Bishop-Lake Division will be issued for the following locations only: National Forest Inn, Alto Str

and Station, Tangle-Lee, Kelly's and Southfork's. No camp-fires will be allowed along the highway between Austin's and Sawtooth's except at the places named.

The thoughtful hospitality and general cooperation of Mr. Austin of the Kingsley Lake resort during the trying days of the recent Radian Springs fire is greatly appreciated by the boys of the Forest Service. Each day a number of Redwoods were treated to bathing, and a fine view in the lake. Mr. Austin was also right in the way of helping out in the matter of aerial fire-protection. He was able to send out some highly effective work on the fire.

The following National Forest officers were in charge of suppression crews on the recent Radian Springs fire: Wm. Manschall, Deputy Supervisor, Santa Barbara; N. E. Peterson, District Ranger, Newhall; Ranger Vetterli, Chief Guard Forester, at Tangle; Howard Ziegler, Newhall; Ranger Robinson, San Francisco; and Guard Decker, of National Forest Inn. County Forester, officers, Thomas, Thurston and Graves. The successful and generous cooperation of National Forester Thurston in the hours of greatest need is especially appreciated by the Service.

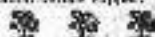

To do this and make the process as painless as possible, all sorts of devices have been invented.

Los Angeles, for example, has not only on its street lighting 90 per cent but has abolished all lights on street light nights—a man of no little head and heart of a saint.

The city also has a good share of its street lights and hundreds of Boy Scouts watching out for vandals.

San Bernardino did a unique thing in getting electricity on the "hourly" system originated by about California—no, general—their electric lights were on for 15 minutes in the same way, closed on for 45 minutes in the power.

To discourage vandals, inclined to start the emergency order, the town of Perris adopted the pithy slogan: "The Highway Here is open to the Forest Place to Park."

The Los Angeles Electric and Gas Company, in cooperation with their numerous delivery men, maintains to carry the necessary message into thousands of homes.

Whittier sets its street lights on for 15 minutes, 20, 30, 45, 1 hour, 1 1/2, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12.

The Whittier Water Company put in a street light and saved \$1000 K. W. U.

The General Petroleum Company (Whittier) made its power in fifteen all sorts of ways. In the town, Associated Petroleum, Whittier and Shell.

An ingenious Los Angeles citizen, donated the water from an old Ford Motor and fitted it in a pressure, thereby getting 100 per cent money to his credit.

San Diego, with plenty of "power" made from steam jobs, and is really, but, used a pressure regulator into the grid of the Los Angeles companies.

To save water the Southern has shown to public spirit in adding the common cause. Now it remains to be seen how well they will keep up the good work.

A reader complimenting the Signal on its editorial, asks, "Why pick on Charley Bryan? So it is naturally up to the writer to answer why.

The first objection to him has developed since his nomination, and that is the pretense that under any circumstances he represents the farmers of the west, or of any other area. He is NOT a farmer and never has been. He owns some Nebraska land, the same as many bankers and business men do who make no pretense of being farmers. His first act as governor was directly opposed to the interests of the farmer, and his second was like unto it. The auto license tax in Nebraska is \$10 and up, as the advertising agency, 65 per cent of a gain by persons in cities and villages and 35 per cent by the farmers, while 100 per cent of it is used to build and repair country roads. Governor Bryan fought for a bill cutting the license in two. He opposed with all his might a bill appropriating money to meet the government appropriation for the eradication of tuberculosis in dairy herds, and would have vetoed the bill if it had not been passed by more than a two-thirds vote, which made a veto impossible.

The second objection to him is that he is not sincere in politics, and never has been. Pretending to be progressive, he tied up with the

reactionaries in his own party, in order to gain the governorship. He told the people he was in favor of the repeal of the coin law of his state—and presented a bill repealing it, but at the same time filed forty separate bills re-enacting it with every iota of executive power vested in his hands, the very thing against which he made his campaign. And when the legislature passed a bill modeled on the same lines as given in Bryan's own political platform simplifying the state government, he vetoed it.

He pretends that he was instrumental in reducing the price of gasoline, because he sent a telegram to the Standard Oil Co., ordering the reduction. As a matter of fact the telegram was sent after the local agents had their order for price reduction from headquarters, which reduction was a result of the nation-wide gasoline fight among the companies. He was outdistanced in this by Governor McMasters of South Dakota, who put gas on the market without waiting for anything, and saved his people thousands of dollars by selling it at nearly wholesale price.

He pretends that he saved the people of Nebraska millions on coal, when the Farmers' Union—after the war—began buying his prices for years with better coal, purchased direct from the mines. Bryan did sell a cheap quality of coal from the municipal yard to the less progressive citizens of Nebraska's capital city, and as a result Lincoln is known as one of the smokiest, dirtiest looking places in Nebraska, when it should be the prettiest and cleanest.

To sum up, his whole political life in Nebraska has been pretense as to what a super-honest man C. W. Boyer is and how disinterested every other man is, added to the reputation gotten by his relation to W. J. Bryan. A. B. T.

The latest addition to the National Forest has finally arrived at "Pollyanna," a fifty-hundred acre "straw dog" that weighs hardly more than a squirrel, yet grows and fights just like a regular dog. The fire for it

is the property of Eastern Idaho. The fire was finally of three days, and cost two rangers, birds and a gold fish. Some rangers, well yes.



DURING the past week, a great deal of useful, un-estimated and un-American criticism has been heaped upon the shoulders of the National Forest Service. Citizens and large public officials, who have undoubtedly "killed me" in their dealings with the feds, or taken scattered pocket money, while rangers and fire-fighters have been building the "red plague," also have the most persistent and the loudest, justified in condemnation of the Forest Service.

With the exception of President Coolidge, Radio Workmen of the Los Angeles city council, and Colonel Anderson of the Navy Corps, we have heard thousands of the Forest Service's faults. We think it is about 1926 somebody unloaded his belt, found his gizzard had waded into the wind and "blacked."

Governor Richardson's "watchful waiting" attitude and Gill's policy is applied to the use of Federal troops for forest fire duty, with selecting children and extremely inconsistent with a spirit of public co-operation. But due to the fierce attack of one own Paul H. Redington, District Forester, and the sincere co-operation of Colonel Anderson, California, will have another point of head-on look and, regardless.

Nevertheless, District of Redington, has attacked the Forest Service by its blame for the forest fire danger in California, adding that the Service has been building up an insular organization rather than having fire. This statement has a lot of fire in it and is seriously and unjust.

We are amazed to admit that the Service is still trying to build up an organization and, in numerous instances, it has proved a very substantially local and cable organization, regardless of its field operations. It has received support from all other organizations. We are, Assemblyman Tucker is, it is able to express, we think that forest fire can be fought without an organization.

We wish to add for Mr. Redington's aid, then fire some organization has fought and studied several hundred forest fires in the National Forest of California, since January 1st, 1934. And we think very much of Assen. Myrtle Tucker's story appeared on a fine slip as a co-ordinator on any one of the several hundred fires referred to.

It is no matter to sit back in a velvet chair and condemn, that it is to grab the business end of an axe or shovel and cooperate.

President Woodruff's nomination, recently presented to the Los Angeles city council, condemning the government's attitude as the government, was not adopted by his colleagues because they claimed the fire code in California has passed.

Many forest officers in the State know that the forest has NO power. The greatest danger is yet to come.

Whereas, the Forest Service is taking things into its own hands and has secured authority to close all camps to hunters, fishermen and anglers, which is the loss of selling conditions, present are several fire hazards.

The men who handle the big affairs of the Forest Service are not asleep. And they are not to be deceived by the simple building of un-lighted fires or withered, old forests. They have been trained by experience to discover the "red plague" fire-fighters, written on the walls of California mountains and mountains and they are paying for their ability to raise God and man may be accused, rather than demonstrated by their clear condemnation.



When you see a mountain fire in progress, don't sit in your arms alongside the road and try to force who are trying to get out the forest. Get a shovel and get into the battle, or get out of the canyon and give the fellows with a shovel a chance.



The following roads in the Ridge Road division have been closed to hunting, fishing and camping by order of the Forest Service: Oak Flat and upper Pine Creek roads; road to Bear's creek, Holly ranch road, Whiskey Gap road at Terminal Inn, Southburg and Bagg's ranch and the Red Rock trail. With the exception of legal accidents, of the different locations these roads have had people having some public business to attend to along the roads mentioned, no person is allowed to pass beyond the close designating a "closed area," without special permit from the District Ranger or Deputy at Newhall. Trespass on "closed area" constitutes a felony.



THE ANIMALS PREFER CARIBU HUNTERS

When a fox receives an invitation to go hunting today he is hard put to it to decide which he will take his gun to the woods, for the kind of hunting is almost as much "the thing to do" as the other. The wild animals no doubt appreciate the picture hanging the best, and their own would be naturally in favor of the camera. However, the wild ones are almost as shy of the camera as of the man, to get a picture of a deer or a moose you often must "shoot" from a blind.

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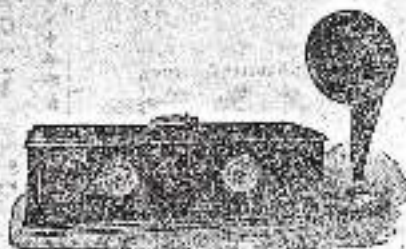

Among the many thousands of members of the great Ford family that have joined in the motor games, they have gathered this historic day, was an estimated car with approximately 500. This was at Omaha, and the old Ford product of 1900 vintage, by perfect behavior and performance in the parade, seemed to secure the passing year.

At Rapid, Wyo., a unique feature of the welcome was the appearance in the parade of the original Deauville stage coach, which was driven by the cowboy in full regalia, gaiters, cowboy hat, and all.

Passing along the Lincoln Highway last night, through the meadowing car, to Mr. Ford, who has given them transportation facilities and facilities power engagement and endorsement of but a few years ago. It didn't take mobilization or de-lancey day to find our laws. Governor Bryan would act, and how little the government could depend on him, if there were real war in sight.

Eastern people who buy California real estate and then go back and wait for it to make them rich are apt to get a big surprise when they inquire about taxes, if they have not been very careful. They will never get any notice of taxes, and are likely to find it sold for non payment. And if it has gone too long, redemption rights expire, and some tax shark will get it. The laws as to notice are defective, and the tax shark finds rich pickings.

It is the usual thing to roast the international bankers, and I think as little of them as anyone when they try to get our government into some of their deals. But if they can buy-in these European nations and make them behave by having them money, they may do a good thing. The trouble with them so far is, they want Uncle Sam to get into the game by joining a political union, so they can use American soldiers as policemen, and then make Uncle Sam pay the bill. Let the international bankers fix up their deals if they want to, and furnish the money, if

they wish, and let all the fool Americans that want to put money into the deal go ahead—but for goodness' sake keep the government out of it. One of the bankers helping organize the deal to solve Europe's troubles told the bunch over there some very plain truths. He told them no money would be paid over, if some government was going to grab the whole thing—if anybody hesitated to loan things, or would not agree in advance to behave, not only for a year or so, but for fifty or sixty years at least, the whole deal would be off. This would seem to indicate pretty good sense.

Residents of Newhall school district will do well to remember the meeting called for Tuesday evening, August 12, at the school house. The question of the location of the new school house will be discussed, and probably decided at that meeting. And if anyone wishes to present the advantages of any location, that is the time to do it. Promises after a thing is settled do very little good.

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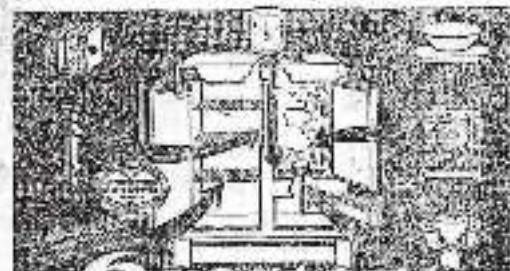

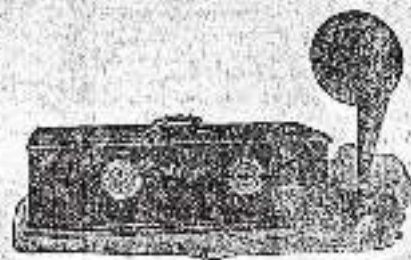

Great Newhall Tunnel Is Completed

The Southern Pacific Completes Great Engineering Task

The last work in July saw the completion of a great engineering feat, the enlargement and concrete lining of the great Newhall Tunnel of the Southern Pacific railroad about two and a half miles south of Newhall, one of the longest, if not the longest in the United States.

This great tunnel was not then the Santa Barbara road just west of the famous Fremont Pass. The El Estero tunnel was cut, some forty-five years ago, the only communication between the Santa Clara Valley and Los Angeles was thru the famous Fremont Pass, a narrow rut, about fifty feet deep, and reached by a steep, rough mountain road. The rail tunnel at its deepest place is about a hundred feet below the surface. It is one mile and a quarter in length, and until the last six years was lined entirely with timber. The keeping of the lining in repair, together with the trouble resulting from the seeping, settling and bulging of the rock, made it necessary to keep a large force of men, constantly at work, to enable trains to go thru. Six or seven times a day 500 feet of concrete lining was put in at the most troublesome point, and this was followed by the presence of a permanent, reinforcing force of about 100 men, and this force has been steadily at work for several years.

Not only was the tunnel lined with concrete, but it was enlarged, being made five feet higher, and two or three feet wider. It is now sixteen feet wide, and twenty one feet high, being the size required under the new law.

The work of enlarging and connecting the tunnel had to be done without any interruption of train service, which made it a very slow job. All work had to be suspended the week around, of the way, and all lights extinguished when the rails came. First came the enlarging gang, and then the forms were built into place, after which the concrete was "shot" into place; this was connected with the big mixer at the mouth of the tunnel, and driven by compressed air. The "shot," consisting of the proper proportions of gravel, cement and water, was placed in the mixer and the air turned on. In almost less time than it takes to tell it the

excavator would drive into place several feet of complete lining, it being carried nearly half a mile part of the time. During the last few months the work progressed at the rate of about fifteen feet a day.

Want Rail Crossing Opened

R. R. Parolan of the Cotyway Tunnel office and G. F. Cooley of the Road Department were here Tuesday looking up data in regard to the railroad crossing at the depot. While the crossing is as old as the town, the company seems to have regarded it as only for railroad purposes, and it is said to have declined to recognize the country's demand for a highway, and the request of the automobile for a driveway leading the crossing to be kept open for travel was to be argued at a meeting of the Railway Commission in Los Angeles but began to press too early to get the decision, if any, also it will probably be taken under advisement.

The last impression was that the company would have the crossing closed entirely, which was not done. After the matter was understood a petition was drawn up presenting the Commission to give the crossing legal status, and a large number of signatures were obtained. This will be made a part of the record.

These things are the dirt chasers, and have enabled the great mass of farmers, who were not too deeply mixed in land speculation, to keep going, and they will still do their part.

Agricultural Rate Unchanged

During recent operating expenses of the year slightly in excess of all expenses of the company, comprising agricultural operations, and the Southern California Edison Company is the first order in the decision of the State Railroad Commission, as shown in the full text of the order which was received by Electric Manager D. H. Rowan of the company this morning.

The Commission's decision grants to the company a 10 per cent increase on all rate schedules excepting agricultural schedules 124 and 211 for a limited period of eight months beginning September 1st.

"The evidence in this case is in effect uncontradicted, showing that the Commission during the spring had estimated for this year," states the Commission, "that the drought conditions of 1924 are so serious that their operation is to be restricted only at rare intervals. The flow of the streams in the Sierra Nevada from which this Company derives the bulk of its water power appears to be below such flow during any of the dry years that have occurred since reliable records have been kept. These conditions have, of necessity, resulted in greatly increased operating expenses, and have required a partial meet in the rate of power by artificial means.

"It may be true, it need not be, that the cost of the territory is dependent upon the operating ability of the assets of the public to meet the demands for power. This condition alone supports the company's request for a special rate of power than that in force of industry. Artificially restricted, under the conditions such as this year presents, to break into a financial position such as may cause serious detriment to the essential development, which is rare would increase to the public because of inadequate power supply in the future.

"A large community depends upon this territory for the supply of electricity essential to its prosperity, and it is highly important that the company maintain its development work and keep the supply of power at least abreast of the demand.

The Commission's decision means that during the increase of earnings for this year as supplied by the group of rates, the company net earnings this year will fall \$1,700,125 below 7% net cost return upon the rate base and that maintaining the amount as established from contingency reserves in previous years, the earnings will still be \$1,121,000 short.

"It would seem fair that the company and the ratepayers share the burden imposed by the unusual condition," says the Commission. "And on one basis the Commission's order provides for increased rates sufficient to give the company additional revenue of \$1,100,000.

Regarding the agricultural operations, the Commission says: "The several seasons former in California and elsewhere have experienced many difficulties. Price levels have been low. The farmer has sold his produce at low prices compared with the prices he has paid for the articles he has been compelled to buy. Few farmers operated on a profit last year, and this year their situation seems to have improved. During the early part of the year the market for California prod-

ucts made the state war severely localized work. The contrary dry weather now prevailing has further imposed unusually heavy and additional burdens.

"As pointed out by Mr. Devell in his report, the former power bill, already increased by the necessity of annual stamping to suppress the deficit surplus also has been further increased by flooding underground water levels necessitating the use of more power to lift the same amount of water.

"Four one-sixth of the company's gross revenue is derived from the sale of power for irrigation pumping and the distribution to the agricultural schedule from those to which the emergency increase is to be applied will, therefore, not result in the addition of new material credits to other classes of consumers. In view of the conditions in the agricultural industry generally, however, it appears entirely reasonable that, during the present emergency, the agricultural consumers should be protected from any increase in rates."

MUST SMOKE AT HOME ONLY

Superior Fire Ordinance In Interest of Fire Control

By the terms of an ordinance now in force considerable restriction is placed on smoking the superfluous desiring to eliminate as much of the fire hazard as possible. The ordinance reads December 1, unless sooner repealed. The provisions of the ordinance are as follows:

Section 1. Declares an emergency.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful during the period of this emergency to smoke or to use any pipe, cigar, cigarette, or other smoking or other substance, in any house, land or land covered with brush, grass, or other inflammable material in the county of Los Angeles outside of incorporated cities except as provided in Section 3 hereof.

Section 3. This ordinance shall not apply in the case of a party while on his own land, nor shall it apply to the discharge of firearms by peace officers in the performance of their duties.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the County Fire Warden to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 5. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not over five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the County Jail for not over six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon the passage hereof, because the adoption and enforcement hereof is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety by reason of the fact that the public peace, health and safety is menaced by the dryness and inflammable conditions of the vegetation of the County of Los Angeles. It shall remain in effect until December 1st, 1935, unless the board shall sooner declare that the emergency and the reasons for the public peace, health and safety shall have ceased to exist.

3. Look out for children. You never can tell what they will do, and you are always in the wrong if you hit one.
4. Try to help instead of hinder the traffic officer; he is there for your good and he's got a tough job.

6. Read and obey the warning signs; they are not put up as mere decoration.

Do it when it won't kill anybody but yourself.

HIGH TAXES

Don't complain of high taxes, if you mean those imposed by the national government.

Unless you pay income tax, you don't need to care.

If you only pay a small income tax, it will not hurt you.

If you have to pay a big income tax, you have had the money; why kick about doing your share?

We had a big war. They said if we lost, it would cost us twenty million in tribute to Germany.

We're not paying tribute.

We borrowed a lot of money which our officials loaned to European governments. Most of it we'll never get back. Might as well call it a cost.

Why don't our thousands of unemployed officials spend the money? Probably will never get it anywhere.

Remember that the staggering war debt exists; no need to worry over that. That and the government expenses must be paid. The constructive thing to do is to be sure next time that no one makes any profit from next war—and it is not likely to come.

Americans want to remember one thing, and that is, the government of the United States has no money to loan. The special arrangement by which European governments get money from our

government had no precedent and we hope it will never have a repetition. On the other hand, it is a common thing for the citizens of one country to buy the bonds of another. That is practically what the present arrangement of the European difficulty amounts to. If the American people are wise they see that it is kept on that basis.

Some of the church folks are gradually worked up over the question of evolution, and the age of man. It seems to me, if I read the bible aright, that The Great Master concerned himself far more as to the kind of a life a man led than he did about the man's ancestors, whether monkeys or men. Since the opening of the construction campaign in charge of District Supervisor H. G. Butler, one mystery has deepened with the passing days. What was Commander Butler with his varied interests that he left seven-and-a-half hours' time to come from an innumerable crowd and what the reasons of his conduct might seem to be?

California Highway Program

That California will have to maintain full speed ahead on its highway program is indicated by the National traffic census taken in June. This indicates an increase of approximately 45 per cent over the figures for 1933, the date of the last census. Surprisingly enough this is equal to the increase that was recorded for the period between 1920 and 1932 and shows that the traffic explosion is keeping pace with the growth in the number of motor vehicles.

The results of the two hundred checks on traffic in all parts of the state appear to indicate that there has been a constant annual increase in the use of the roads since 1925. In the future it is to be judged by the past, similar growth will be recorded in 1935, unless it is imperative that every possible vehicle be employed in maintaining existing highways, widening those that are overburdened with traffic, and providing new roads to relieve the more congested sections.

It is pointed out by authorities on highway construction that the success in a continuous job, to add roads and concurrently in need of repairs and the rapid increase in vehicle miles, the road makes pressing need for additional outlays.

The Automobile Club of Southern California, the State Highway Commission and various boards of supervisors after thorough investigation are agreed with the fiscal commission appointed by the governor that new methods of financing highway construction must be adopted. It is generally conceded that plans must be devised that will be capable of furnishing a steady and ample source of

revenue to provide for a systematic and adequate highway development program.

Power Conservation Results

The present water and power shortage may be partially dependent upon not only the lack of irrigation, but also upon the present conditions.

This is a serious paradox that is exhibited by the irrigation systems. The plan is to conserve water by these power storage "dams," one of which is that many have in the past been paying for more water than they needed.

Then, in the words of H. C. Walling, former former supervisor for Orange county, the shortage has been a "dam to dam." A few growers who made a study of the needs of the land have been using the present amount of water, but according to this authority, there has been a waste in the total of 25 to 33 per cent.

This estimate was borne out by the testimony of C. H. Kelly, an expert in the four year war between the Los Angeles irrigation district and the Los Angeles and Southwestern district in Tulare county. Mr. Kelly said he found many instances in that county where farmers had used far more water than was to cover their land area. The amount of water pumped showed enough to cover the land in fact.

It has been said that a good water conservation policy is one which is a four minute waiting, and will never go back to the old schedule, said one orange grower.

The State Agricultural Experiment station points out that better results are obtained by irrigating a portion of the land thoroughly than by watering the entire area to a limited depth. "Consistent penetration with minimum of surface watering."

The authority declares that we have been drawing to an extraordinary and unsafe extent upon the underground waters, which have been properly replenished by rain, besides using all that runs down. From this source comes the warning that the "wasting on the bank account" can't continue if California hopes to have water enough for future development.

"My business is selling electricity, but if there is any way by which we can make a foot of water wet twice as much as we have been watering, we will spend money to help the farmer save money."

WALTON and FERGUSON

Within the past year three governors have been removed from office on criminal charges. In one case the charge did not involve official acts, being an offense committed as a private citizen. The other two were removed on the charge of wrongdoing as officials. Both Walton and Ferguson have been "dedicated" Walton by winning the democratic nomination for senator from Oklahoma, and Ferguson, of Texas, by having his wife nominated as governor on the claim that Ferguson was the victim of the K. K. K. The innocence or guilt of the two men, as a result of the procedure followed, will have been the same.

This being the case, a rather peculiar state of affairs seems to have developed. Unless the courts reverse the cases, which so far has not been done, both men stand convicted. Then from the verdict of the voters we must infer that a large per cent of the voters prefer these men as officials. The issue of Klan and anti-klan was made in both cases so strong that the question of guilt or innocence was entirely forgotten. Leaving the blue question out of it, as regarding the merits or failings of the voter, we cannot help wondering if the people of Oklahoma and Texas didn't let prejudice get some-

what ahead of their reason, in the matter.

Briefly summed up, the matter is this way: Both Walton and Ferguson have been legally convicted and removed by the regularly constituted authorities of their states. Attempting to punish those who are charged with securing the convictions is only justified on the ground that both men are innocent. This may be true, but it has not been shown as yet.

The redeeming feature of the Texas fight is that Mrs. Ferguson is highly spoken of, and it elected, will be very apt to give her state a good administration.

Of all the disgusting news that have been broadcast of late, the story of hundreds of Africans crowding the boat on which the Prince of Wales comes to America is a little the worst so far. It will only be equaled by the silly letters and royalty worshipers who will make life a burden to him after he arrives. Newspapers would do their readers and the country a service, by cutting out a lot of this ridiculous nonsense, which must be embarrassing to the young man, who seems to prefer life with his mother.

The failure of the Italian aviator and his party in the trip from Iceland to Greenland, was rather to be expected. With no provision against accidents or for help, he dashed away to the west, not even waiting for the American. That he and his party were found alive was due to American foresight, and a cause for thankfulness, that the rash adventure ended safely.

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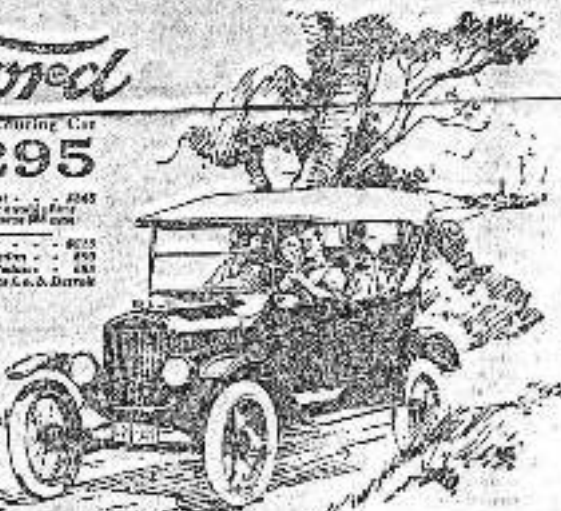

On all trips, requiring 16 to 26 hours to negotiate, two drivers, equally competent, should drive eight hours of time is why. Truck companies probably wouldn't like this sort of an arrangement. The public, at large, however, would undoubtedly like the concept of such a law to the end of time. We don't think the truck boys would like either.

Foreign travelers are of course welcome to come and go as they please in the United States, but an observer rather disgustedly remarked recently that there was one else that ought to be reminded in a very pointed manner that their room is better than their company. They are the ones who spend their time criticizing everything we do, and everything they see, from the time they land until they go back. In short, they seem to have but one idea of our country, and that is, "It's all wrong." Maybe so, but up to date none of these critics have brought over any credentials as to success in correcting any of the evils of their own countries. Uncle Sam is rather careless as to who he lets stick around, and a little more careless as to how some of us behave, but we'll venture a guess that if he compelled these critics to exhibit pictures of their own back yards, while hunting for litter in ours, they would have a whole lot less to say.

One can get an idea of the appalling damage from careless driving by noting the dozens of wrecks that take place every week on the boulevards adjacent to Newhall. And while some of these are unavoidable, nearly all could be prevented, with ordinary care. Unless motorists themselves bring the change for greater safety, they are

going to bring upon themselves some drastic laws in the near future. Among the laws already discussed are: rigid examination for operators' license; automatic suspension of both car and operator's license in accidents until innocence of blame is shown; bonded drivers; and many others that will certainly prove irksome to careful and honest drivers. It would be far better if motorists would unanimously agree to observe present traffic laws, and thus make it reasonably certain that more drastic ones will not be enacted.

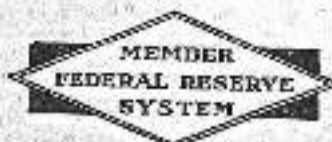

Proposed Auto Regulations

Believing that motor vehicles may be made safer by legislation and better rules by prohibiting incomplete present loan landing cars, the Automobile Club of Southern California is investigating various regulations for drivers in other states, with the view of determining the best method of raising standards.

In one Eastern state the last automobile accident in 1924 year less than they were in 1919, in spite of the enormous increase in the number of vehicles in use during that period. It was found that from 30 to 35 per cent of those applying for the license of operating a motor vehicle, so the highway were unable to demonstrate their fitness to be allowed the privilege. This prohibition of licenses to drive have correspondents. It holds one of the chief causes for the marked reduction in auto accidents since it deems undesirable to automobile drivers.

The situation in California today, it is pointed out, is that any person, irrespective of mental and physical qualifications may obtain a license to operate a car. As far as the law is concerned, the applicant may be an imbecile, or a fool, for the road-testing, but if he can fill the little card required by the motor vehicle department, on which the color of the hair, eyes, and a few inconsequential details are filled a license is granted. It has been demonstrated that the chief cause of motor vehicle fatalities throughout the United States is incompetent handling of cars, so that it would appear that if incompetent

drivers can be weeded out, an appreciable reduction in the number of motor vehicle accidents will result.

As a further argument for the consideration of motorists, it is shown that there are many dangerous and slippery, unsafe to read or understand road signs. This makes it impossible for those to interpret the warning signs which have been so generally dictated by the Automobile Club of Southern California to call attention to dangerous spots on the highway, or for them to read even the most simple provisions of the state law covering the operation of motor vehicles on the highway. The condition alone, in a prolific cause of many accidents of the traffic regulator.

Other organizations are expected to join the Automobile Club in testing ways and means of remedying the daily dangers created by incompetent drivers.

Jerry Ryan Passes On

Jerry Ryan of Ladoga, San Francisco Canyon, was found dead at his home on the morning of September 4th, the cause of his death being given as cerebral hemorrhage.

There are some peculiar and at the same time highly important questions before the American people today, and some of them are full of danger to our national life. One of the most important of these is that of so-called militarism and its opposite question of so-called pacifism. Neither term is to my mind correct, but I much doubt if there are any either soldiers or civilians who really believe in aggressive warfare without reason, or in absolute non-resistance under all circumstances. But there are many who in their fear of war and endeavor to find a remedy are apt to forget some important facts in their study of the question, and come to wrong conclusions. They are apt to forget that for two thousand years the rule of selfishness has continuously warned against the forces of peace, and but for the sturdy resistance of the lovers of the right, would have put

the world back to the depths of savagery from whence it has been raised. We may come to the time when our government's power will be exerted on behalf of wrong, but I believe that time has not yet come. It would be ideal if the whole world would talk only in terms of peace. But human selfishness is strong in the world, and the only successful resistance so far in the struggle against armed injustice is armed national resistance to oppression. Beyond this, we should all be pacifists. But in war to resist oppression all should be patriots. Any other rule will result in national extinction. — A. B. T.

OFFICERS MEET BULLETS IN ATTEMPTED ARREST

Gas LeBren, Crossed by Deaf and Jealousy Fights Till Dead; Fatally Wounds Ed Brown

As a climax to the tangled love and business lives of Gas LeBren and Jennie Darling, or Nellie Brown, LeBren was killed and Deputy Constable Ed Brown mortally wounded in a three gun fight which took place about 9:30 Sunday morning when Constable Jack Philips and Mr. Brown drove to the Darling ranch to arrest LeBren, who, the woman claimed was willing to kill her.

As the officers drove into the ranch, which is about a mile south of here, along the railroad, LeBren jumped from behind a barn and ordered them to throw up their hands, at the same time connecting them with his rifle. Mr. Philips seeing the car advance to the barn was toward LeBren, just as the latter opened fire. The first shot came from the back seat and cut in the stomach close to Mr. Philips' head. The officers turned themselves out of the car and secured the fire. Both Brown and Philips made their shots count, and after emptying his rifle, standing part of the time from the ground, LeBren cried, "You've got me, boys, I'll quit." The officers had escaped injury so far, and wanted now to secure LeBren. As he crawled on the ground, his hands clapping his body. As they stepped to get him up, he suddenly jerked a large revolver from beneath his jacket and fired two shots, one at each officer. Nelson got a flesh wound officers fired, and it was the finish for LeBren. Brown stopped his hand to the side, remarking, "Well Jack, he got me this time." Mr. Philips saw that Brown was hurt, and hurried him to town, where Dr. McAdory gave him first aid. He was then removed to the General Hospital at Los Angeles, where an operation was performed but the wound was found to be in vital parts, having gone entirely thru the body just below the ribs. He never rallied from the operation, and passed away about four o'clock Sunday afternoon.

Captain Bright, of the sheriff's office, came on Sunday afternoon, and after viewing LeBren's body, turned it over to undertaker Nuhls of San Francisco.

LeBren's body bore half a dozen wounds, any one of which would have proved fatal, and a large part of the fight including the killing

of Mr. Brown, took place while he was in a dying condition. He was apparently "crazed" of what happened to him, and fought desperately to the last.

Gas' trouble with Brown Darling began when he went to the jail for her and followed her up with his work. His legal in's letter written a few days before the crime that she had promised to marry him—he would loan her \$300, which he stated in his letter he did, only to have her kick him then, and "give him the horse laugh." That letter was written a week before the crime and was a long rambling account of the affairs of himself and the woman, close with the message that he was going to and the inside part into which he alleged was had typical an expressed a determination to fight to the end, would never feel anybody else as she had him. The following statement of Gas was taken, Judge Miller regarding the matter and drawing up the note of \$300, the amount agreed on at the amount Gas LeBren, Mrs. Darling stated and Gas accepted and agreed to stay away from the ranch.

But on Sunday morning in a jail attempt to be armed himself with the rifle and revolver and drive to the ranch. The woman had been away from home, and drove back Sunday morning, to be confronted, the eyes, by LeBren with the rifle, who told her he was going to kill her and himself. She says she pointed, and retiring, pleaded her time to get something to eat, and tried to send him for some food. He refused to go, she said, but finally allowed her to go, with the strict injunction to come right back, and bring her the officer or he's got them too. She came to Newhall and notified Judge Miller of the matter.

Ed Brown was a fine official, absolutely fearless in the discharge of his duties, and was loved and respected by all who knew him.

Gas LeBren had lived a life practically all his life and was once known as a "bad man" when under the influence of liquor.

The interment was presided by the most beautiful and impressive funeral service of the order of which he was a member. Interment was in Grand View Cemetery.

Many beautiful flowers and floral pieces were evidence of the esteem of his friends. The business houses of Newhall were closed during the hour of the funeral, as a token of respect.

It is with saddest indeed that we write of the passing of Ed Brown, who lost his life Sunday, while in the line of duty as deputy constable, as related elsewhere in these columns.

Ed Brown was born in Missouri thirty-two years ago and was one of a family of seven, brothers and sisters. About fourteen years ago he with his wife came to Empire from Nevada, where they have since lived with the exception of the year spent on their ranch at McParland.

About two years ago he was appointed deputy constable and at once made his mark as a honest, efficient and capable officer.

We are at a loss to find words that would express the esteem in which Ed Brown was held by his fellow citizens. Every one loved and respected Ed Brown, loyalty, honesty, integrity and courage were attributes of his daily life, both as officer and citizen. In his untimely death, the community loses a man whom it can be proud and whose upright and kind life will ever be a pleasant memory to all who knew him.

California motorists are watching with interest the enforcement of the new state motor vehicle law in New York which goes into effect on October 1. New York is the only state rivaling California in the number of automobiles and its problems are somewhat similar. The particular feature of the new law that is attracting the attention of the Automobile Club of Southern California is the provision for the elimination of unsafe drivers of motor vehicles.

A corps of 125 inspectors has been trained and enrollment is being ready for service when the new law goes into effect.

Regarding the elimination of unfit drivers, Commissioner Charles A. Hammond in the New York paper, says:

"Primarily the work of this force will be to pass upon the competence of every driver applying for a license, since we will have accomplished the removal of a large number of unsafe

drivers.

"As I see it, the law very important for the protection of all the people and no one is entitled to use a car will be shown any favoritism. A person is either safe or unsafe as the operator of a motor vehicle. The unsafe driver must be eliminated, regardless of who he is, and the responsibility for passing upon his qualifications rests largely with the inspectors on the highways.

"Any inspector who knowingly issues an incompetent or unsafe driver or allows such a driver to retain a license is potentially guilty of whatever crime that driver may be accused of as the licensed operator of a motor vehicle.

"With proper administration of the law, plus the sincere cooperation of the public, there can be no question as to the success of our new venture. We are ready and anxious to do our part. I may be your wife's mother, child or other relative who will be affected on the altar of a negligent and careless motor vehicle operator tomorrow. Let us all unite in an effort to prevent that very thing happening."

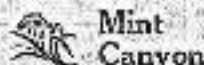

The Power Situation

Cities and towns of Southern California are to be put on probation by Power Supervisor H. C. Butler.

A new order has been issued by that official permitting a resumption of the wretched outdoor lighting for business houses, but it has a string of conditions. It is based upon the power supervisor's belief that this relaxation will not be abused, for the need of conservation is not "past." If extravagance or waste of "juice" results, it will be necessary to withdraw the privilege now granted.

Restrictions have not removed, and the power supervisor, on present schedules of street lighting, on power consumption, or on domestic lighting. The order is limiting power consumption from taking on new burdens until the shortage is over its maximum. The present order merely extends to the use of light for strictly business purposes.

It is made possible because, up to the present time, the communities involved have given both heavy, public-spirited support to the power saving program by keeping within the quotas assigned to them that the situation is well in hand, and there is no further necessity of imposing loss on business. There is now sufficient supply of power to permit this exception to the usual no-accumulation restriction. It is completed in November to overcome the deficiency caused by the drop in hydro-power.

"I wish to warn the public," said Mr. Butler, "that there are two contingencies under which the new order have to be put to sleep. One is any reaction to the order of today that should lead to extravagance in the use of lighting current. The other is that some disaster might happen to one of the large steam plants. That would not be such a bad thing where we were in June, and the next such restriction would have to be imposed."

"This is the beginning of the end of the emergency which you are in charge of what threatened to be a bad situation, but it is not yet the end, and I hope everybody will realize that. We have managed so that agriculture and manufacturing industries have suffered a minimum of loss, and with good luck we shall come out of the emergency with no one very much harmed, and with a fine example of California resource and team spirit having been given to the world."

"With enterprises now under way that will soon greatly increase our supply of power, it looks as if we shall never again have a shortage requiring a restriction of this summer's relief."

Some time or other someone is going to get run over and killed, right in the business part of Newhall, by a car or truck going from thirty to fifty miles an hour. And the driver who happens to get arrested for the "accident" is going to be awfully surprised to find that the speed limit in town is only 15 miles an hour. And at this time we suggest that a "15 mile limit" sign be set up at each side of town on the boulevard.

Those political pundits who figure Nebraska for the democratic party may not know that the state is normally republican by thirty five thousand; that the factions of the republican party in that state in 1932, this year, is never before in a dozen years. The La-Follette vote will come from the district that voted for the se-republican candidate for governor two years ago. They'll not vote for Bryan this time, however.

What California needs is a few less "booster" papers for impossible a lifeline and inaccessible sites for inconvenient homes, and a few that will tell customers the real truth about the state. They need to be told that work is no easier here than elsewhere; that the gold in the ground costs what it is worth; that everything is pretty much the same here as elsewhere.

EXCEPT the climate: They can be told that the bitter cold of winter, and the storms of winter and summer can be avoided. But the representation that the mud in unalloyed happiness and untold wealth lies in the purchase of half an acre of land, or a tiny town lot only leads to disappointment, and disaster. If real estate agents were rigidly compelled to make good every statement they make in the sale of California real estate to un-informed customers, the state would have a much better reputation east of the Rocky Mountains.

As part of a state-wide investigation of marketing agencies and of the California plan of Farm Bureau and Agricultural Extension organization, President Bradford of the American Farm Bureau Federation, together with E. P. Taylor and A. R. Simpson, also of the national organization, officers and state and county Farm Bureau officials, met at Santa Ana, September 6, at a conference at which the different functions of the Farm Bureau organization, both national, state and county, were discussed and their relationship to other agencies considered. Special credit was given to drainage and soil erosion, the program of work on the farm home and publicly.

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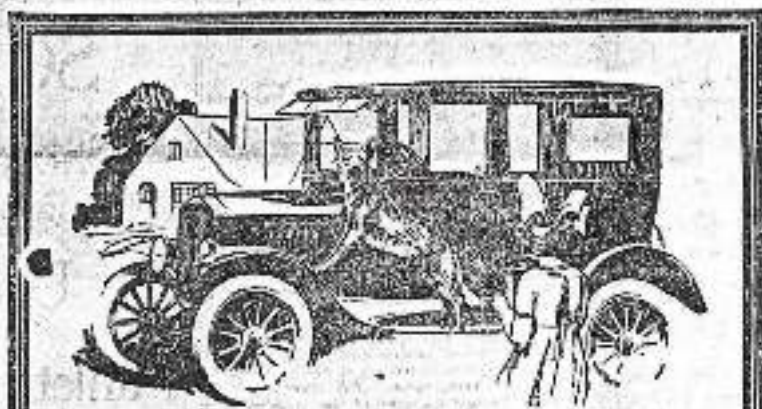

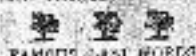

The supreme court of California by a four to three vote has decided that the LaFollette electors' names cannot go on the ballot for the November election. The decision is probably strict law, but the courts generally have given very liberal construction to all laws regarding the placing of the names on the ballot, their chief concern being the prevention of fraud in the election, rather than to secure the advantages of some candidate in the primary. The decision, in fact, being a divided one, is of doubtful value, from any point of view.

There is little need or use to try to recover any of the vast sums squandered and stolen during the great war on the pretense of building American airplanes. But it is very necessary that a big line of planes be built now, and there is need to see that the planes be made to keep hands off for the records show that the government not only charged and collected for machines of the very highest quality, but manufactured and delivered machines so flimsy and cheap that they were nearly useless for

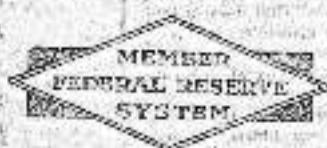
Supporters of the League of Nations in the United States can find some good material for reflection in the fact that Asiatic members are demanding that questions of immigration come under the jurisdiction of the League. The net result of this action, were the United States a member, would undoubtedly be the abrogation of all our immigration laws as to quantity or nationality. Restrictions as to character and fitness might be left to us, but naturally disputes on these points would finally go to the League for settlement. Do real Americans, native or adopted, want their country placed in such a position?

The proposal for an examination of applicants for motor license have had no relevance in one very important point, and that is what, for lack of a better name, we will call mind character. There is little doubt but that every reckless, dangerous driver in the country would pass a first class examination as to ability. There would, of course, have to be the provision made under which beginners could learn to drive. But with the reckless ones described, nothing would be gained. We suggest one possible solution that drivers in accidents be required to furnish a bond. Inasmuch as being permitted to drive after an accident, and be compelled to carry as part of the license plate the words "bonded car and driver," it would be possible, by increasing penalties for repeated accidents to gradually eliminate the reckless ones who are the real menace of the road.

With the new drivers and gliding wheeling, it is continually being new speed records, it is interesting to note that the battle against high speed cars in the highways started in the United States nearly 200 years ago.

When the world's first steam driven engine was built in 1769, it was so slow and noisy that it had

to be driven at a snail's pace, but since that time it has become a speedy means of transportation. A planer, however, at the Automobile Club of Southern California, indicates that our state regulations applied to motoring vehicles were back in 1757, when the city fathers of Boston passed the first speed law.

The council of selectmen of the capital of Massachusetts had the town streets to control when a collision occurred between a horse-drawn wagon and a stagecoach. To stop all this mischief and to penalize the speeders, the city authorities in 1757 passed the following ordinance:

"Owing to great danger arising from wagons, sleighs, chaises and other vehicles on the city's ways, as people are prohibited or coming from the central churches in this town, being driven with great rapidity, and the public worship being otherwise much disturbed by such vehicles, it is therefore ordered and decreed that no coach, stage, chaise or other carriage shall at

any time be driven at a greater rate than a foot pace, on penalty to the driver of the slave of \$20 and on driving of the sum of ten shillings."

The Pastor will take for his morning subject, "A New Testament."

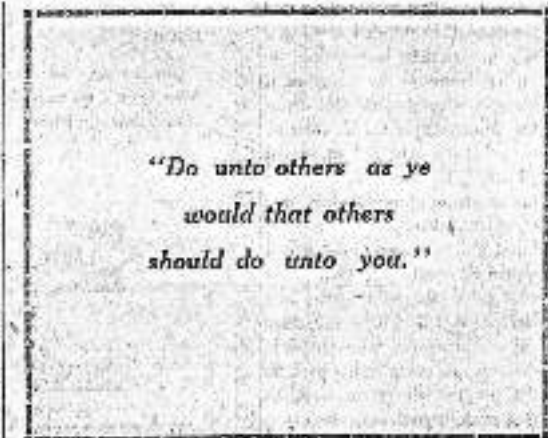
The subject of the Sunday School lesson is "The Sermon on the Mount. The golden text is: 'Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done.'"

There is a very queer thing in that base ball bribery case. There is the utmost haste in declaring the case closed. It would look to an observer from a distance as if the whole New York organization, if not in on the alleged bribery plot, are suspiciously averse to any investigation. There are people well up in the base ball world who believe there is something wrong, and the chances are that matters will not be improved until the thing is brought to light and disposed of.

The tendency of the voters to support LaFollette comes from two sources; the first that after the so-called patriots had branded LaFollette as a traitor, they proved to be the real traitors by shamelessly robbing the government in the name of patriotism. The second source of the LaFollette sentiment is from those who saw the gigantic peep of 1920, and believed that an era of honesty was at once dawning, naturally blaming the administration for what is full short of what was expected. That it did fall short was very natural, but it is also a reasonable certainty that

whoever is elected at this time, he also will fall below the expectations of his followers. And the greater the promises the greater the disappointment is likely to be.

Those who find fault with the courts should remember that in a great measure the correct decisions are correct interpretations of the law, not made by judges, but by the legislators or by congress. It is also a singular fact that decisions most complained of come on laws that are intended to prevent all wrong. For instance, California has an almost absurdly strict primary law, intended to prevent all fraud, and to guarantee an honest choice of candidates. That those who were successful under that law would defend their advantage one would expect. The fault is in the law, and going further back is the people, who seem afraid to trust even themselves in electing.

It is hoped the rain of Sunday settles the fire problem for the year.

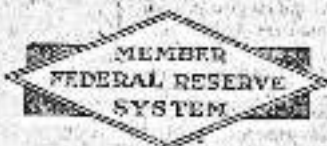

Pan-American Building Pipe Line

Col. Wilson, chief engineer in charge of the surveying for the pipe line which the Pan-American Oil Company is constructing from the Kern County oil fields to the coast and to Los Angeles, has had his men in this vicinity for some time. Now the construction gang is approaching from the north, and will soon be digging the ditch down town. It follows Newhall Avenue thru town, striking the boulevard at the south end of town and going under the parking in the south side of the Union Oil plant, when it turns and follows the railroad to near the big tunnel at the north end. Here it changes course and going thru the Madlum farm, crosses the boulevard again at the Crawford oil wells near the end of the boulevard tunnel, following the old Fremont Pass over the mountains.

This much of the work will be done while the construction goes for its headquarters at Newhall, and has not yet been completed. It is to be completed in about two weeks.

For the past few months, the company has had a large force of men at work in the mountains to get the line over the mountains and down into the valleys on each side before the snows come.

The application for right of way in Los Angeles gives the size of the pipe as twelve inches in diameter, and the total cost at from twelve to fifteen million dollars.

Aviator Falls to Death While Doing Movie Work

Dick Kerwood, aviator, of Los Angeles, was instantly killed Wednesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock when he fell from the airplane in which he was doing an air stunt. The movie camera which was being aimed by the Franklin Barnum Company.

The company was working on location about three miles west of Newhall. Frank Tomak was pilot of the machine on which Kerwood was working. Kerwood and Tomak had gone up to a height of about 500 feet. While busy with the machine, Tomak lost sight of Kerwood and thought he was under the plane to land, but on looking down was horrified to find that Kerwood had disappeared.

"He must have fallen," said Tomak, "for he never got on the wing at all, and must have fallen just as he stepped out of the ship. I have worked with him for four years, and he has done the stunts he was working on hundreds of times. He got used to get down on a rope ladder below the plane, and swing."

Kerwood fell in the brush about two miles north of the location. No one happened to see him fall, but Lee Hagner, one of the movie boys, noticing that he was gone and located the body after a short search.

Kerwood was about 35 years old and has two children, who were said to be in care of a sister. The body was removed to the Noble undertaking parlor, San Francisco.

Newhall As An Oil Field

With the bringing in of the first oil well in Elko Canyon over forty years ago, there began a period of shallow development which as the years went on, gradually spread until the whole of the Santa Clara valley was either under lease, or being worked. The Standard acquired the Pico field next going into Blamers Canyon for another bunch of shallow wells. The property known as the Republic was drilled under several leases, which were finally consolidated. The Champite field adjoins the Standard's Blamers property, and was originally a part of the Newhall ranch. The Crawford Syndicate is developing a 43 acre tract near the highway tunnel, and has two wells. The Rosney Oil Co. with a 25 barrel producer, completes the list of Newhall's producing fields.

The Oklahoma, Texas, and California deep well fields with enormous production and high gravity oil not only resulted in transferring interest elsewhere, but dropped rates below any profit. As a result there has been practically no development here as compared to other fields.

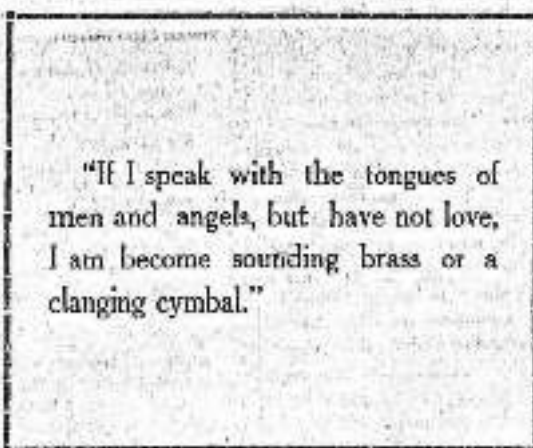
But with the steadily dropping oil supply and the certainty of a rise in prices, interest in the oil situation is rapidly reviving. The Union whose founder was a pioneer in the business here, has put in a five rig one mile north of Sougas, and has gone down about five hundred feet, using cable tools. The company expects to go down until it finds oil or demonstrate there is none there.

The Associated Oil Co., which started work a short time ago a few miles west of Castale Junction with a rotary rig has made a depth of 500 feet. The company, like the Union, has unlimited resources, and will solve the oil question for that locale before it stops.

Those who wish to prevent the lavish use of money in campaigns could succeed in part by forbidding the use of any money by candidates or committees—and this shot off practically all information in regard to office seekers except what might be such news as the papers cared to print, and making limitless the charges for agent and unlawful combinations that are in a measure impossible now. Put these facts down as established. All political parties and committees get all the funds they can and wherever they can, and they all have demands for funds far more than they can supply. It follows, then, that about all the law can do is to reveal the source of campaign funds, and let voters use it as they please in deciding how to vote.

\$4000 from William Scott, 1200th from from Simon, five thousand to her name, one thousand in Washington, D. C. was a number of smaller subscriptions, constituted 81 per cent of the total amount collected. The remaining 19 per cent was secured from Southern California in four subscriptions, the largest being by John B. Haynes of Los Angeles, \$4000; William Train, \$1500 and two other subscriptions of \$35 each.

The above statement of contributions raised shows that the local committee is actively promoting this measure, considered 35 per cent of the funds, and the remaining 5 per cent was secured from the general public.

The above statement of debits includes the payment to Pacific Electric Publishing Agency, of \$2075.94 for its services over a period of six months, including the mailing of all publicity literature, salaries paid officers of the Light and Power Committee at the state for their services in conducting their own business. Salaries of agents, lecturers received in salary and expenses the sum of \$2,145.42. Signature cards secured to the initiative petition by the professional campaigner for

\$12,932.21 and the remaining expenses for rent, telegrams and miscellaneous items amounted to \$491.65.

It is becoming more apparent that this proposed measure is the creation of William C. Coffey, who is a strong labor union backing and whose records in official records, there is little more substantial water proof than in Southern California.

With four men contributing 95 per cent of the campaign funds, it would be fair to assume that these four men would expect to occupy four of the seats of the five commissioners who would administer and control the expenditure of the \$20,000,000 which they are asking the people by this act to vote in their hands.

Pearls Gathered in Many Parts of World

The pearl is a glistering gemstone found in the shells of certain bivalve mollusks. Highly valued for ornamental purposes, and dressed in many ways. The principal sources of pearls are the pearl-oyster, found throughout the Pacific coast; the pearl nautilus, and the freshwater mussel. The most pearl fisheries are those of China, carried on principally in the Gulf of Manchu. Those of the British East were known to the ancients. Pearls are also obtained from the Salt water mussel, the western Herring, the Ostracoda, Gulf of Mexico, and Australia. Native divers descend 20 or 25 feet, weighted by a stone and ascend from a boat by a rope. They carry a net and gather the small oysters in it. They usually labor for 20 or 40 seconds at a time, and are tended in the surface after signaling with a rock. The oyster was returned to rest on the beach in the same way. These divers are awarded the deeded oysters are awarded for pearls.

All-India pearls are largely made in France, Germany, and Italy, and those for a little price of glass and nitre with a minimum of success, and the silica.

The credit of the state is needed for schools, roads, institutions, public works and many other things necessary to the wellbeing and progress of the state. The issuance of \$200,000,000 in low-interest bonds would reduce the interest rate on all other public bonds hereafter issued, thereby directly increasing the income of all citizens and making constructive investments for the public welfare more feasible.

To bond the State of California for \$200,000,000 for an undertaking of this sort means that every taxpayer must receive the risk of a heavy percentage payment which at best would merely provide security against the people of the state without public debt, present liability or the like.

This act enables us to control development and not to the lesser distribution of the waters of the state to irrigate the great valleys. The state has expended \$22,000,000 and is now expending an additional \$10,000,000 to prepare a co-ordinated plan for the better distribution of waters for irrigation. A comprehensive report will be made to the legislature next January. This act provides an unqualified plan under free water or power.

Nowhere in the United States is hydro-electric energy being developed on so great a scale, with such high efficiency and splendid results as in the State of California, and nowhere

is water so plentiful as in this state.

The act enables the water and power act (No. 75) to be better with the United States government project in developing the Colorado River and Boulder Canyon Dam. This act provides not only power by using water or power from the Colorado River. It is also clear that water and power are available in the state and possibly better than elsewhere. Dam projects will be developed in the Colorado River.

The water and power act was overwhelmingly defeated by the voters of California in 1922. It must be defeated again.

Chambers of Commerce and business organizations generally throughout the state have adopted resolutions condemning this act and urging the people in order to safeguard and continue the progress and development of California, to vote against it.

WHAT IS THIS WATER AND POWER ACT?

An initiative measure (No. 12) on the November ballot, which if carried, will enable a bond of five million dollars to be levied on the children of the State of California, to be used for the purpose of building a hydroelectric power plant. The measure is now being discussed by the board of public works in San Francisco. The measure is not sufficient, but would cover more than half the cost of the project.

The act provides that if the savings on the money invested are not sufficient to provide for principal and interest payments, then the board, without consulting the legislature or the governor, may take out of the state treasury sufficient funds to make up the loans and the people must be TAXED to replace the money so loaned.

The bond will NOT be cleared by the people, but will be approved by the legislature, and it will last indefinitely, one of all the members of the state legislature, before being voted upon in two years, to remove any of the board members from office. The governor may not remove them.

Under the act, the board may exempt any water for electric energy that is taken, without control or regulation by the people or the State

San Fernando Road To Be Widened

The Chambers of Commerce of San Fernando, Rosam, Burbank, and other towns located along the San Fernando Road are working on a movement to widening the highway from Los Angeles to Newhall. This movement should be strongly supported by every locality along, or dependent on the highway for transportation. Linking all the north canyon, and the heavily traveled Ridge Route, to the Los Angeles system of highways, the road is entirely inadequate. In addition to the other travel, a heavy trucking business has developed, and it will soon monopolize the road to such an extent that light cars will not have much chance. Moreover the road was not built to sustain heavy loads, and despite constant repairs is steadily becoming a wreck. The road will need entire replacement and if possible should be kept free from underground pipes which make cuts in the pavement necessary.

We suggest that the Newhall Chamber of Commerce come alive and do its share toward helping the widening movement along.

Newhall Improvements

Despite the uncertainties of this year, and the need in drought, Newhall continues slowly but surely to grow. The great demand for dwelling houses is resulting in some new structures, and indications point to many more in the near future.

Mr. Mayhew has put up a building on the front of the property occupied by Mr. Vaughn. This is to be occupied for business purposes by the Vaughns.

Mr. Bates, who recently purchased the Gilson lot north of the blacksmith shop, is putting up a residence, which will be occupied by Miss Kilby, the real estate lady as soon as completed. It is probable that a most business building will be erected on this lot, in the near future.

Power Conservation to End

To the extent of the cost necessary, if they fail to the extent of one cent or thereabouts, will come to an automatic end the electric power saving campaign that has raged throughout Southern California since July 1st last.

According to the report from the business, the conservation on the part of power will, if no serious accidents occur, to start plans now used to stop on the hydro scale, will be off on December 1st.

Accompanying in this effort was made after a conference of Power Supervisors F. E. Butler and Assistant Manager F. E. Lewis of the Southern California Edison Company.

During the past week, for the first time in many months, there has been a rise in water in Huntington Lake, Eri-

son's storage reservoir, which raised the level on that reservoir higher than ever. On Wednesday last there was no drift and the water level today had to be raised nine feet on Thursday. It is estimated that there will be a rise of 20 feet in the next few days and a rise of 30 feet in the next few days.

Street cars, trolleys, motor plants, truck companies and industries generally are still on a conservation of about 20 per cent and agriculture is under orders to do 10 per cent of its irrigation of crops.

With the impending crisis of the necessity for power, water, and crops, it is not surprising to find for the quality of business, but, consideration, and water efficiency shown by the power supervisor. Occupying a better position between the public utility companies and consumers, as has been the case, the committee of maintaining all parties and bringing about their team-work which has been the result of what would have been serious results under a less efficient hand.

Mr. Butler is an associate of the State Natural Commission, which selected him for the post, but is a private consulting engineer of San Francisco and was selected because of his skill as displayed in similar situations week ending, no time consumption.

The Crusan Mine

Clarence Crusan was a Signal caller Monday. He and his father, W. H. Crusan, are owners of the Old Rock mine and had mine, and are holding it by doing the required assessment work. This mine is in Tracy Canyon, and has been known for many years, a man named Bush being the owner and doing the assessment work for a long time. Finally something happened, it is not known what, and in a day or two was found dead in the mine, probably due to some explosion he had in blasting. He was kept up Bush's claims so finally the Crusans acquired it. The father and son, and a few others are doing the work now. There are four claims, each of seven acres, and one each there is a tunnel one is 125 feet long, another one 75 feet, one 60 feet, and another 25 feet. In one of the tunnels is a "retort," which means a horizontal shaft that starts inside of a tunnel instead of from the surface. Silver and lead ore has been found in all of them and Mr. Crusan brought in several tons of copper. The drawback of the mine is the distance, therefore miles from a railroad. Mr. Crusan had a sample sent him which he said would prove to be 75 per cent metal, and 75 per cent of the metal was silver.

There are doubtless more than 500 people calling themselves residents of Newhall, but whether there are enough in a tract that could or could not ask for incorporation, the writer neither knows nor cares. One thing is clear: no matter by what means it is done, some of the streets MUST be improved if we continue to travel them, or someone will have a damage suit against the county for a wrecked car.

SCHOOL HOUSE PLANS ADOPTED

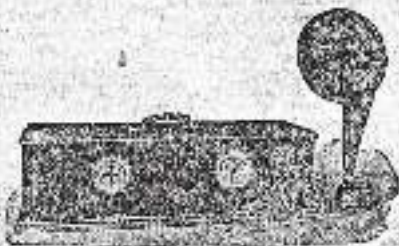

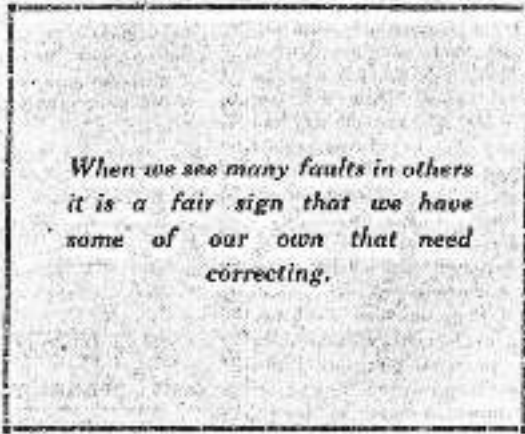

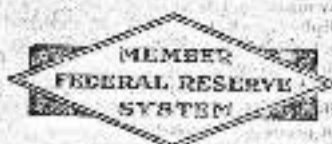

Big Power Appropriations

Twenty-five million dollars was authorized by the directors of the Southern California Edison Company this morning at the Company's new commencement budget for the year 1925. This is believed to be one of the largest annual appropriations ever made in the United States for hydroelectric development and the stabilization of electricity. In commercializing this investment in Electric Storage, Chief Engineer, Vice-President and General Manager, H. B. H. Dinkler called attention to the fact that including the hydro power tax money, the company will have spent an authorized two hundred and forty-five million dollars for electric development and distribution since the start of the World's War.

The report came at the early completion of the Long Beach station, which marks the end of the power shortage which existed during the past season and the indications of large business increases and generally recently had a hearing with the directors upon passing the appropriation for the coming year. While District Manager J. H. Brown has not yet been advised of the amount that the company will expend this winter and next, he is believed to be the most anxious for work to be done, he has been notified in a general way that the appropriations have been given very full and liberal consideration.

The twenty-five million dollar budget for 1925 will be expended on the following items:

For hydro electric development and construction the Big Carbon program development \$ 2,525,000
For completion of steam plants now under construction 4,945,000
For increasing the 40,000 Volt transmission facilities between Big Creek and Southern California 1,500,000
For extension of distribution system and better service in this and other districts 2,500,000

The Florence Lake Tunnel which will cost when completed approximately seventeen million dollars will be finished early in March, and the construction program on the Big Creek-San Joaquin River project will increase the water power generating capacity during the coming year by 50,000 h. p., which will bring the total generating capacity of the company to water and steam up to six hundred and eighty-seven thousand horsepower, including the new one hundred and twenty-seven thousand horsepower steam plant, it is thus to carry the expected increase in business for next year.

While the company spent about thirty million dollars last year in new construction, approximately ten million dollars were spent for the study of new construction, which was speeded up at an exceptional rate to relieve the water power shortage which existed. With the close near to Long Beach nearly completed and the work at that place very nearly taken care of by the 1924 budget, the 1925 appropriation will provide largely for hydro electric development.

The expenditure of the company for 1924 and 1925 which will aggregate

thirty-five million dollars will make a total of the electric production of the year of 1924 responsible, so far as service on the system of the Southern California Edison Company is concerned.

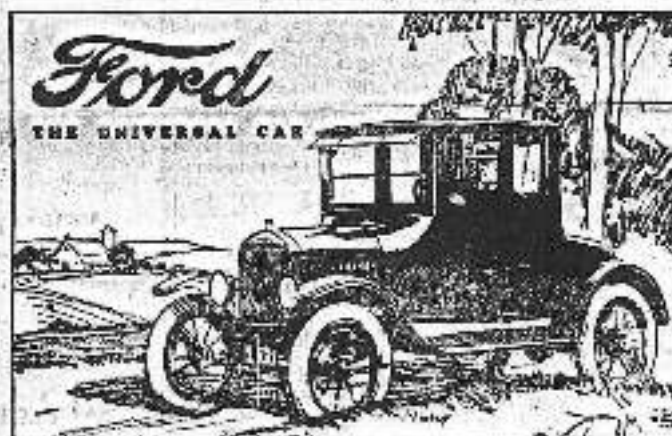

The annual inventory day for a review of the things we are supposed to be thankful for, very likely meant to most people only a little vacation, or at most a thought of our adversity or prosperity, with the idea of thankfulness or unthankfulness predominant, as we have been prosperous or otherwise during the year.

One who has only this view of Thanksgiving can get little good out of it from any point. To be thankful for what we have, to make an honest, decent living, a group of congenial friends, a conscience void of offence toward any and so clear that you can look any man straight in the eye—all of these are greater causes for thanksgiving than success in acquiring great wealth.

General Calles, the newly elected president of Mexico, talks foreign capitalists just how welcome they are in Mexico. They must respect Mexican law, and treat labor decently. That is only reasonable, and we hope he will see to it that they do. Heretofore the Mexican labor has been exploited

and treated little better than slaves. In fact, the peonage system has been in vogue. If President Calles can remedy this, he will do his people the greatest service imaginable.

Once more has it been shown how utterly futile to prevent war, and how little the great nations care for the League of Nations. An Egyptian bandit murdered an English officer, England demanded \$2,500,000 indemnity, and it was promptly paid—but England took forcible possession of Egypt, and announced her intention of staying for the present. And yet both of the nations are members of the League.

Put it down now that the government under which we live is the best in the world, and that if it has faults they can be fixed to successfully and incompetent officials, rather than the system. It may be popular in some places to curse Uncle Sam, but Americans who do can well be spared. Patriotism needs to be taught to some who in some way have absorbed the idea that there is no such thing as America.

Wouldn't a good thing for the credit of Newhall if means could be arranged by which the new church could be completed? It has been more than a year since it was begun, and much longer since it was decided to build. It is barely possible that some do not think a church necessary, but attractive, pleasing and desirable towns are not built that way. Perhaps all have done their best, but this is not likely. Let's have a little hands-loust and see if it cannot be put over.

Here's hoping that the Thanksgiving turkey was properly disposed.

There will be special praying and a vocal solo by Dr. McAuley, at the morning service.

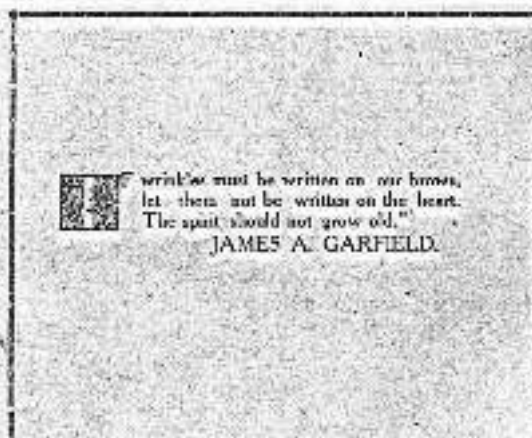
Don't forget the evening service. There will be an all-time gospel song service, followed by a great C. E. service. The groups will be there in full force. Yes, there will be some surprise numbers.

A visit to Harry Carey's Trading Post last Sunday brought to mind the trading posts that were characteristic, maybe, of the old pioneer days on the frontier in California.

On the walls were hung blankets and along with these, Indian poles of all colors and sizes. Saddles laid on a moment's warning, if need be could be lifted from the pegs on the low log-cased ceiling and thrown across the floor of the ponies that sometimes stand in a row along the hitching posts as they were seen last Sunday while pictures were being taken. The long adobe building has a porch extending the entire frontage. A "barroom" is strongly featured, with high stool and a real foot rail where spiced beers and weary feet may rest. Card tables come also in evidence. The floor are all of concrete, even in the street front. A large wood or coal stove occupied the center of the room, and around it the heavy built-in fireplace, about four feet wide and five feet high. And on Sunday during the long winter evenings will be seen many a tilted chair around the fireplace, whose occupants will bet as to which one can count the seconds or even the straightest with a quill of tobacco, or expectorate, or lie prone, in a certain corner of the log, or perhaps hit a "nips" that has been thrown into this generous receptacle.

Whether this be true or not, and traditionally carried out, and the world be founder leading game, is just merely surmised, but as a glance that is what the picture captured. However, in this day and age, and in a civilized land, with patrons mostly screen stars and "picture persons" whom together come in their fire cars instead of driving yoked oxen, and lovers of the sunny south like to hark to the cloudless skies of winter, those are the guests to whom Mr. Carey will be host.

A more picturesque touch sets might not have been chosen than that in San Francisco, Calif., with broad fields in the foreground and the long line that has no turn, leading to the ranch house, with the caretaker's house and the new trading post are in close proximity on the highway.

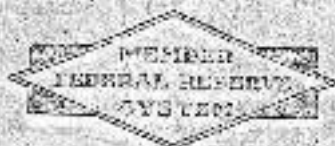

If that were the rule, and the salary were made adequate, there might be some reason in it. But if it is not adequate, therefore the supervisor, if he wishes to be fair, both to the litigating public, the court and constables here, ought to throw his influence toward clearing up the situation.

This is not written in the interest of any official, and none have been consulted. It is only a fair statement of a situation which needs a remedy, and that soon.

Call on the part of greedy employers and heartless parents, let us have the national amendment, and then laws to enforce it. Then follow up with some remedy for the sweatshop system. But every step of the way will be characterized by selfishness, even one that profits a dollar by child labor. And that selfishness is glaring in its work, right from the start.

One cannot read of the things of rich Americans in Europe without a feeling of disgust for the

breed. Gambling and drinking, and worse things than these, dance on vile that even the French police find it necessary to break them up in fact every sort of delinquent that the corrupt mind can conceive is indulged in, without any effort toward concealment, the intent seeming to be to advertise to the world how utterly depraved Americans can become if they try. But for the leavening influence of the great common people who believe in and practice decency and good morals, this nation would soon sink, and certainly deserve the destruction that has come upon every corrupt, rotten, immoral nation since the world began.

In the death of Gene Stratton Porter, American literature suffers an almost irreplaceable loss. She was a great writer in every sense of the word, and the beauty of her language made up for being for the pure and unadorned thought that seemed to glitter like diamonds in every page she wrote.

Besides her great novel "The Girl of the Limberlost," "Franklin's Larkin," and which no better have been written in this century, she was a great authority on a naturalist, her volumes on bird life always popular, and she wrote with the great mass of stuff written by contemporaries. Mrs. Porter's writings are as pure gold to worthless rubbish. Her writing out of the things really worth while in life are in vivid contrast to so many others, who have been content to tear down the ideals that have contributed to the world's progress that they contained. Her class of literature is too scarce, and we wish she could have many more.

It looks as if "It Ain't Gonna Rain No More" were out of date. Help make your town grove.
