Teachers Convention Held At Santa Barbara



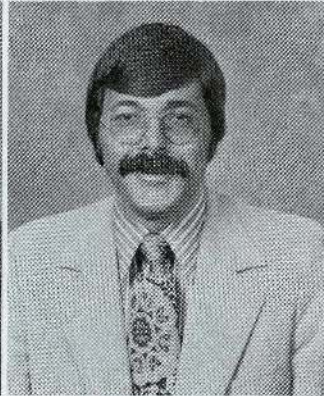

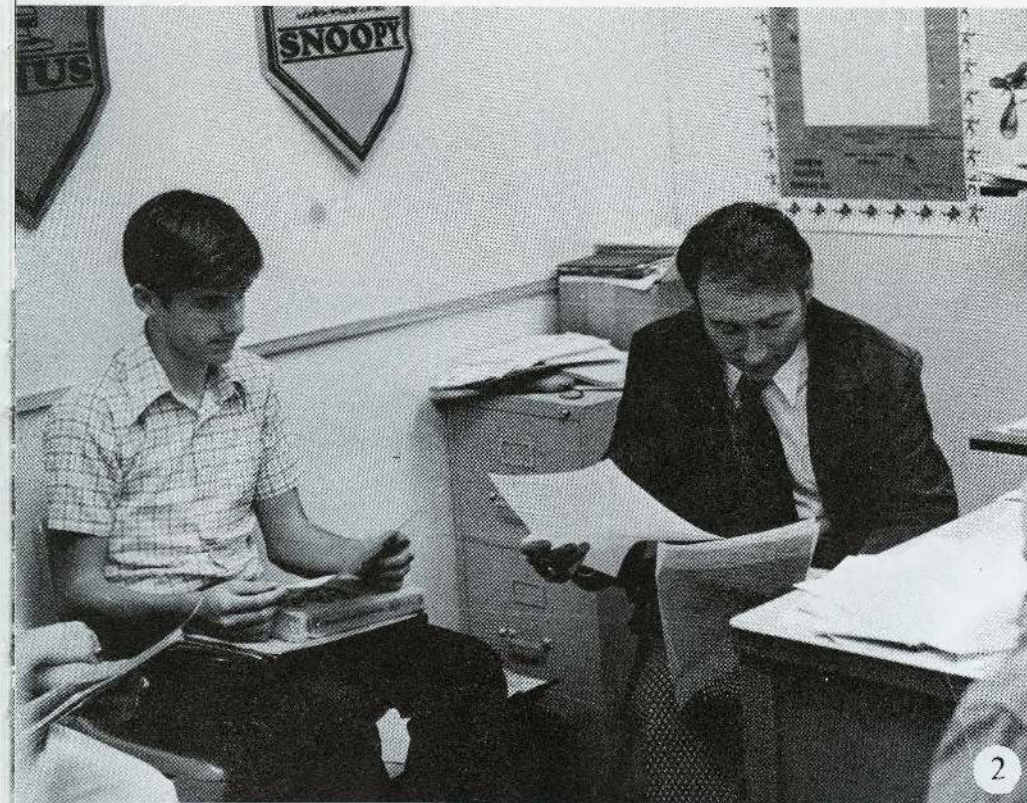


Counseling Staff Increases In Size

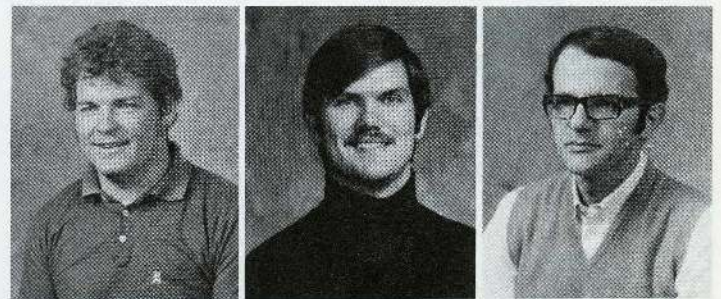

History Looks Toward The Future



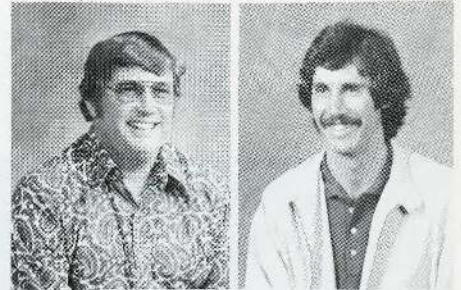

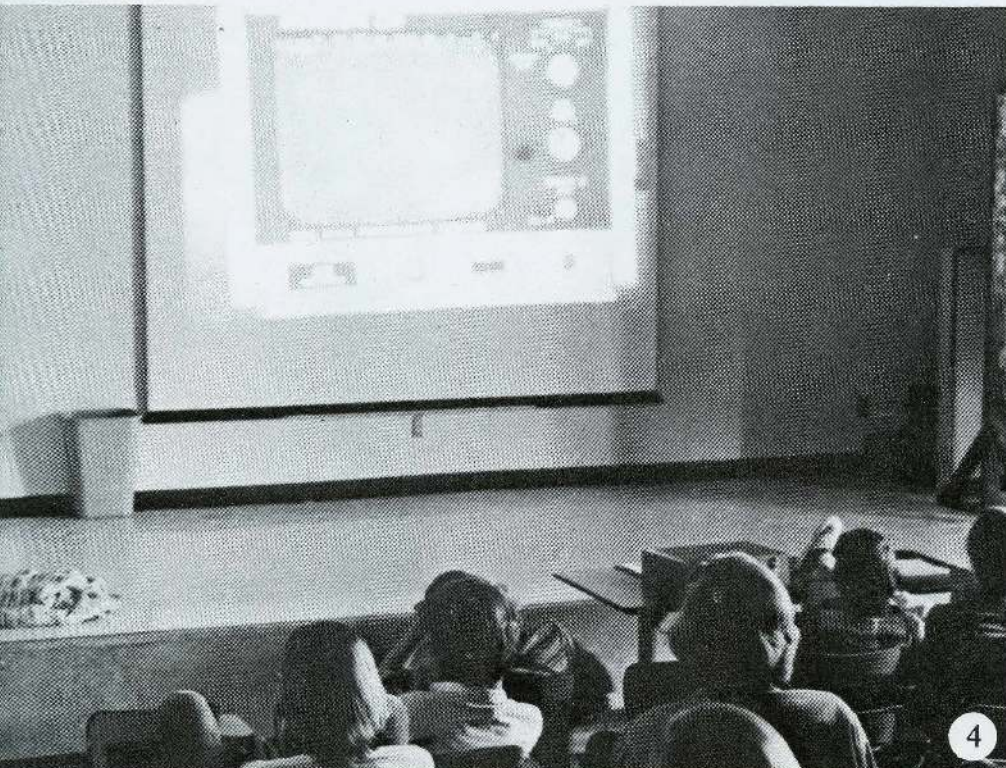
Films were frequent in both Mr. Hammond and Kevorken's classes. Some of the more unforgettable flicks were "Red Asphalt" and "The Life You Save."

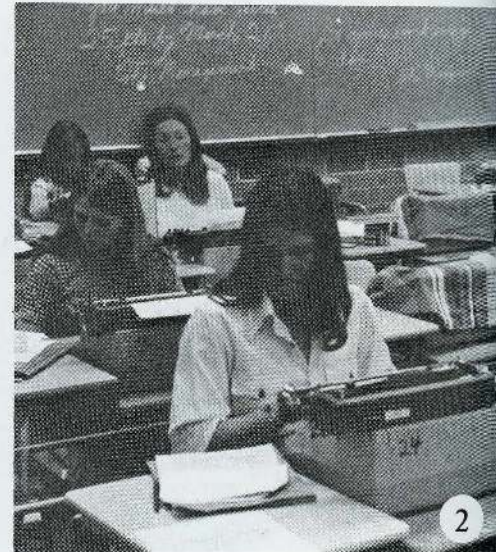
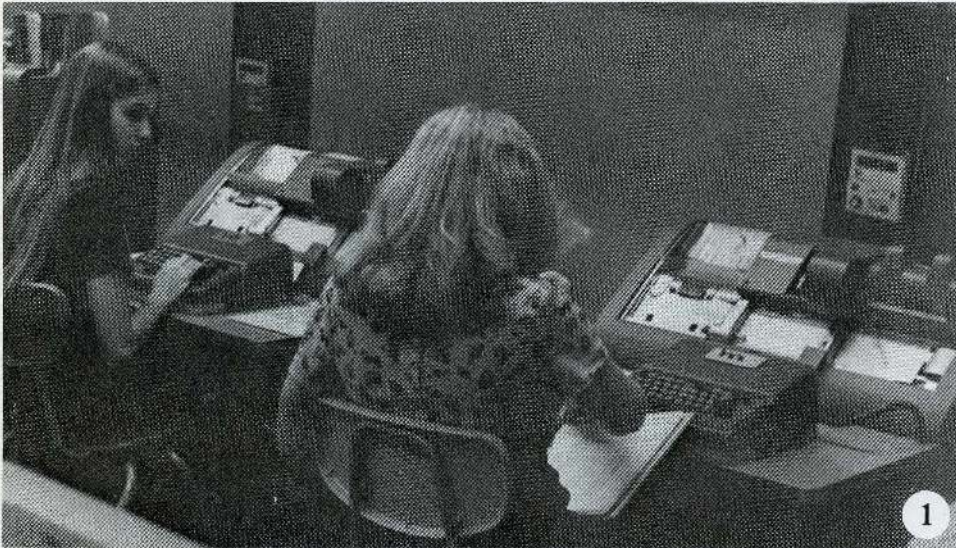

Business Department Follows

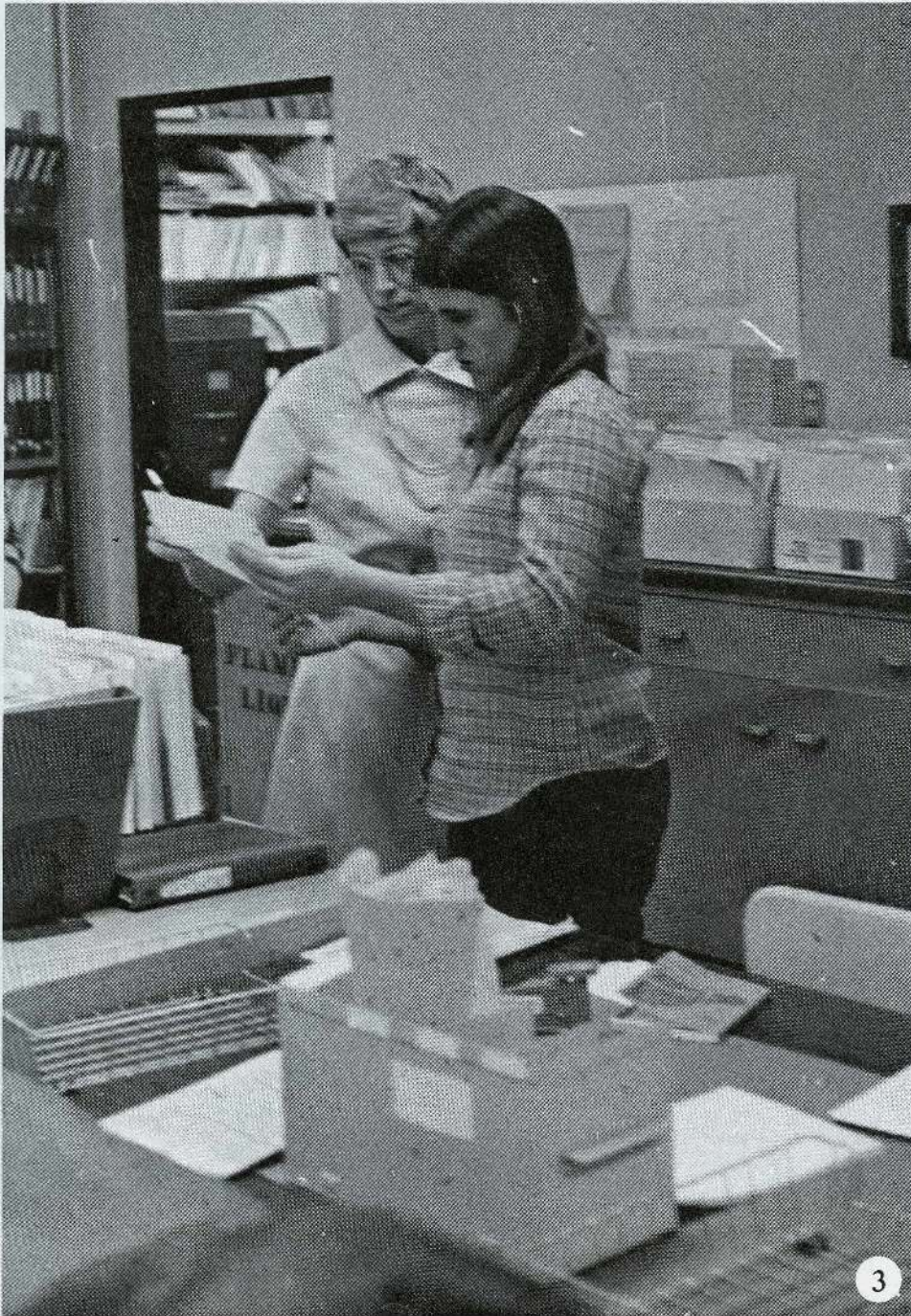

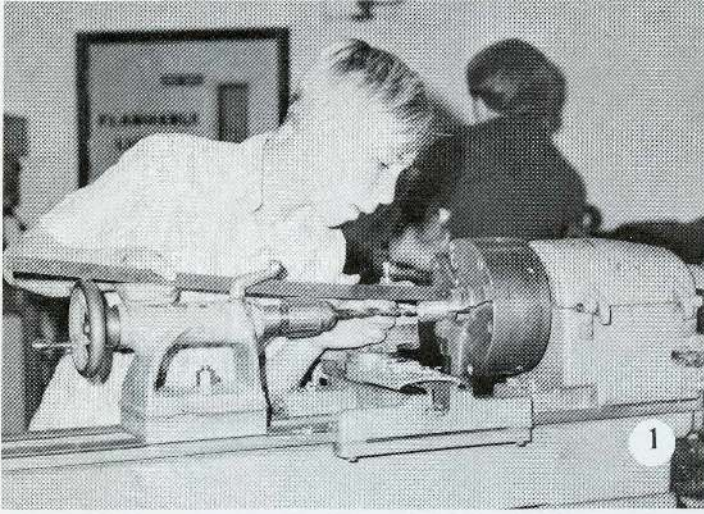

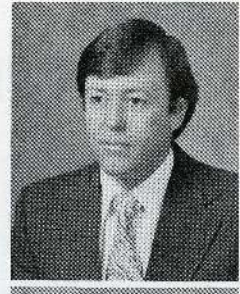


The Industrial Arts department included auto mechanics, motorcycle repair, wood shop, graphic arts, metal shop, photography, and home renovation classes.

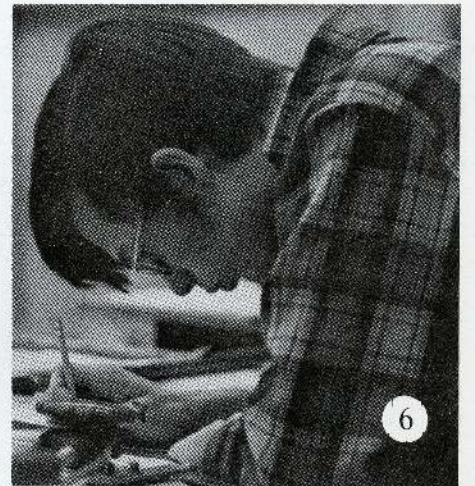

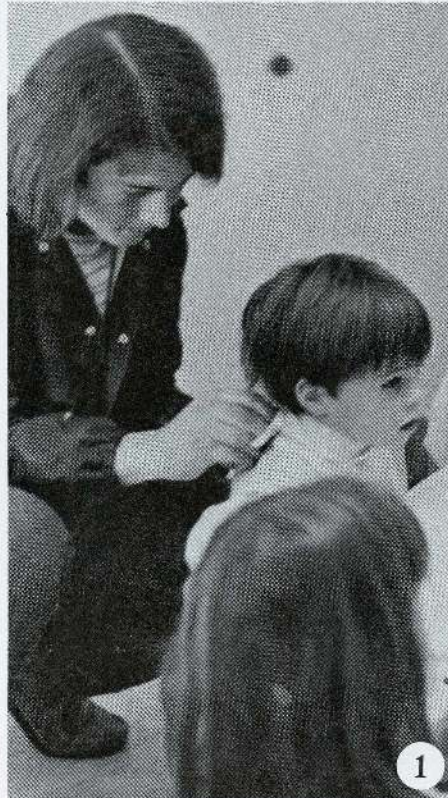
Childhood Aide Class Gains In Popularity

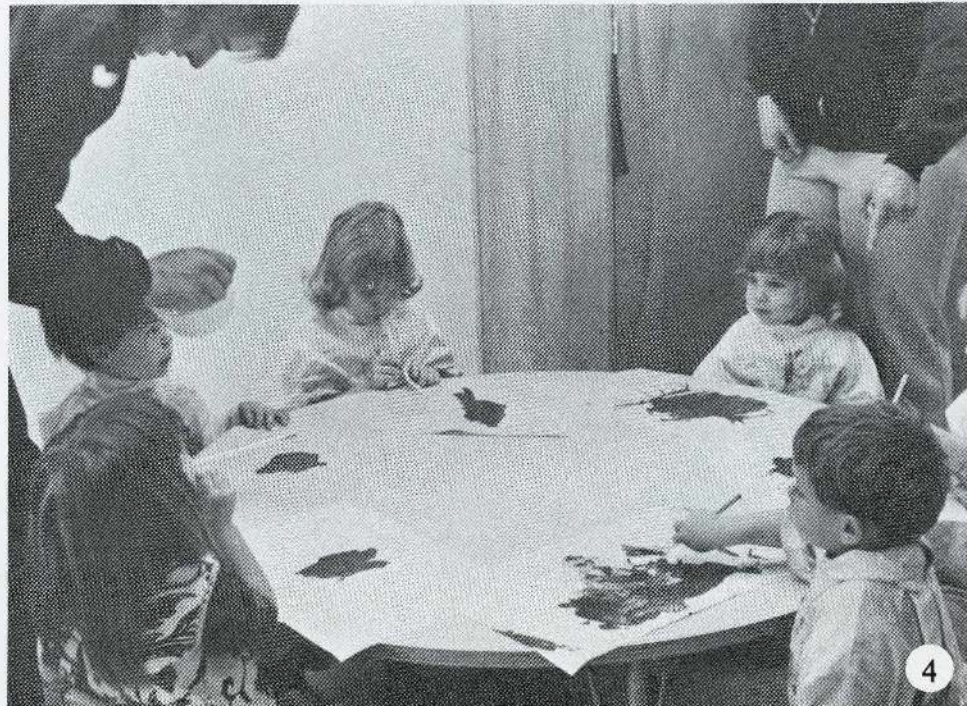
D building was converted into a nursery school as busy parents dropped their children off for students to entertain.

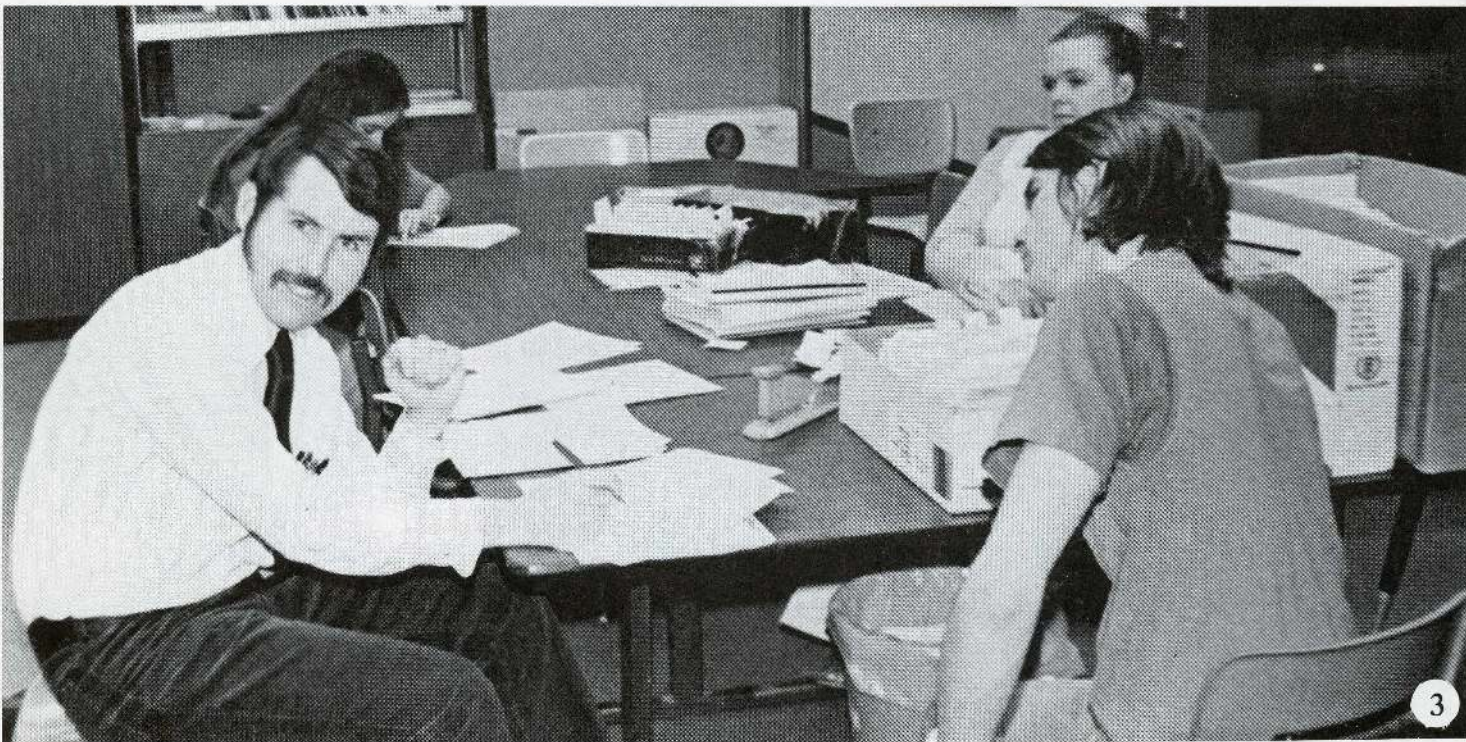

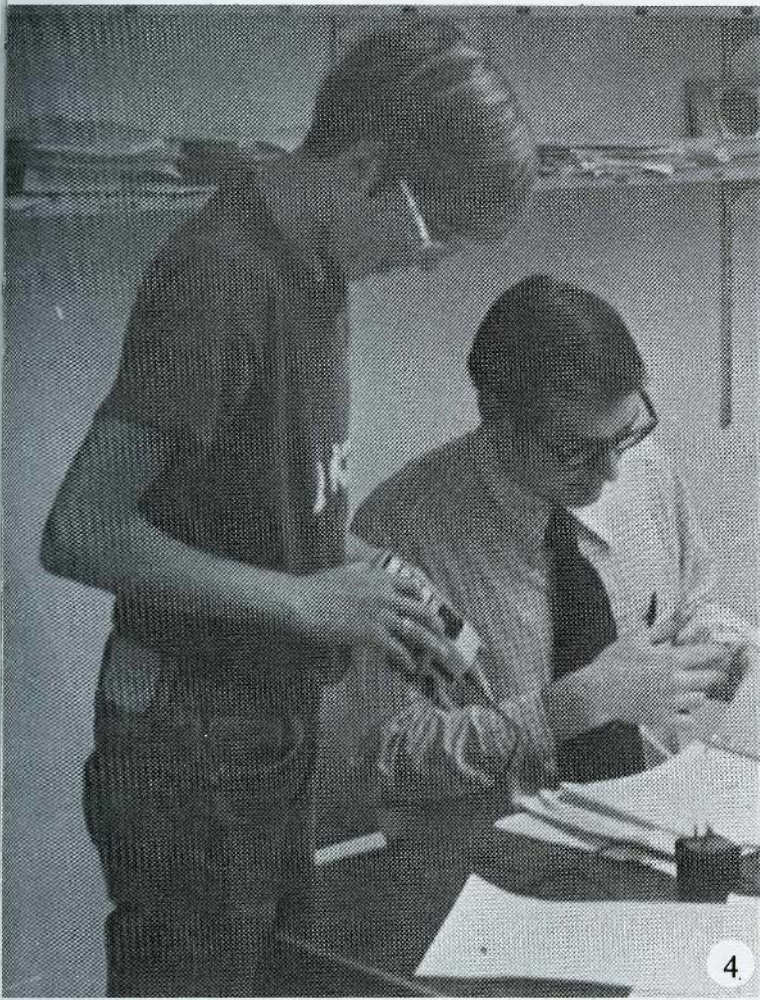
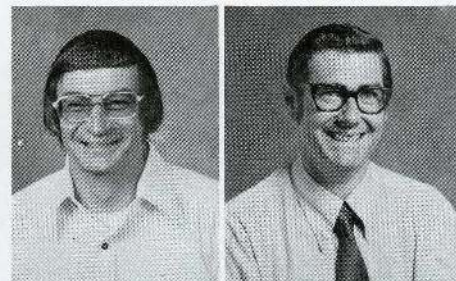


Math Students Work At Their Own Pace

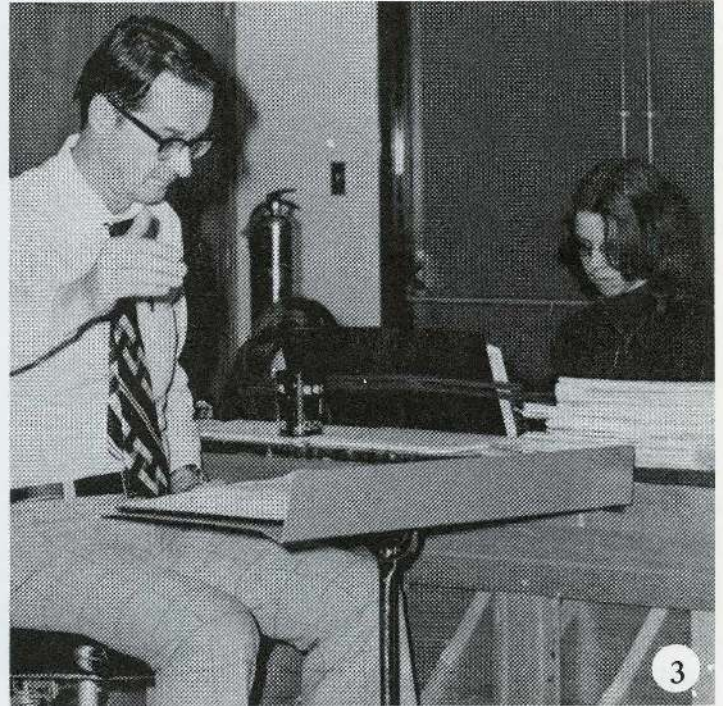

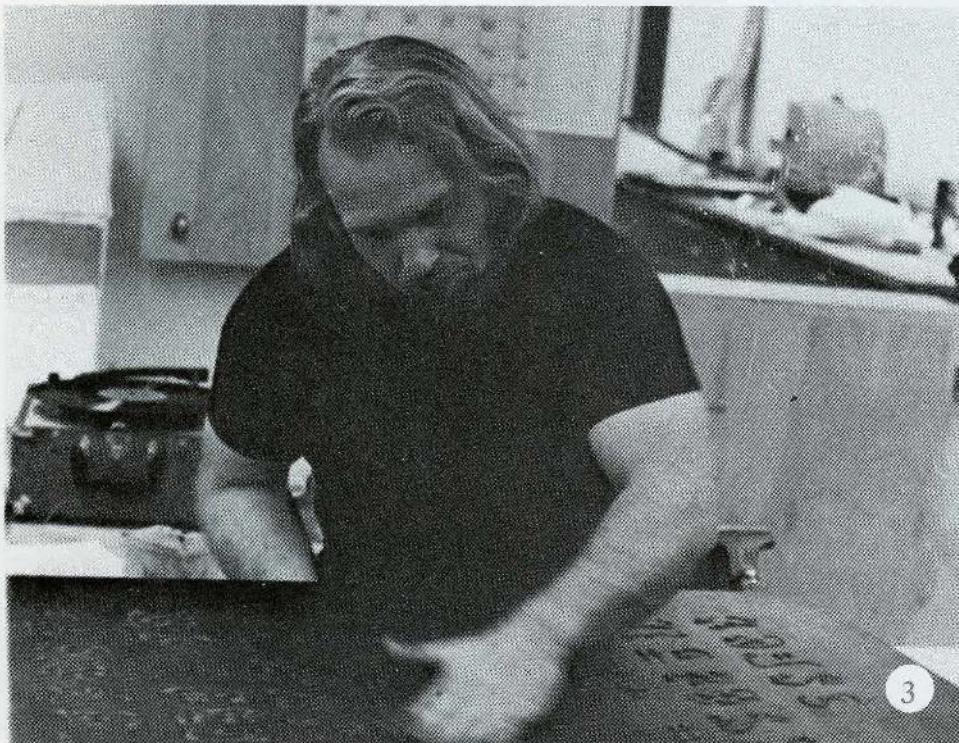

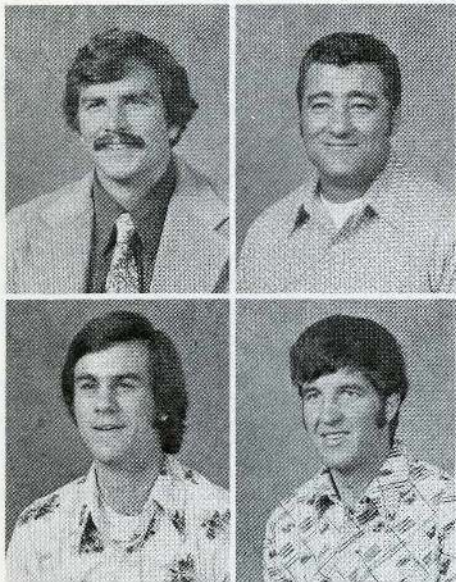

Exploratory Programs Offered At Canyon

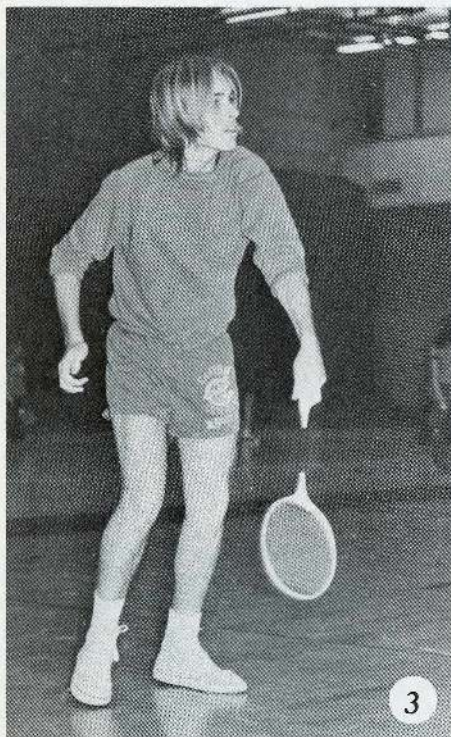

The beginning Science Coarse at Canyon this year was Introduction to Physical Science (I.P.S.). 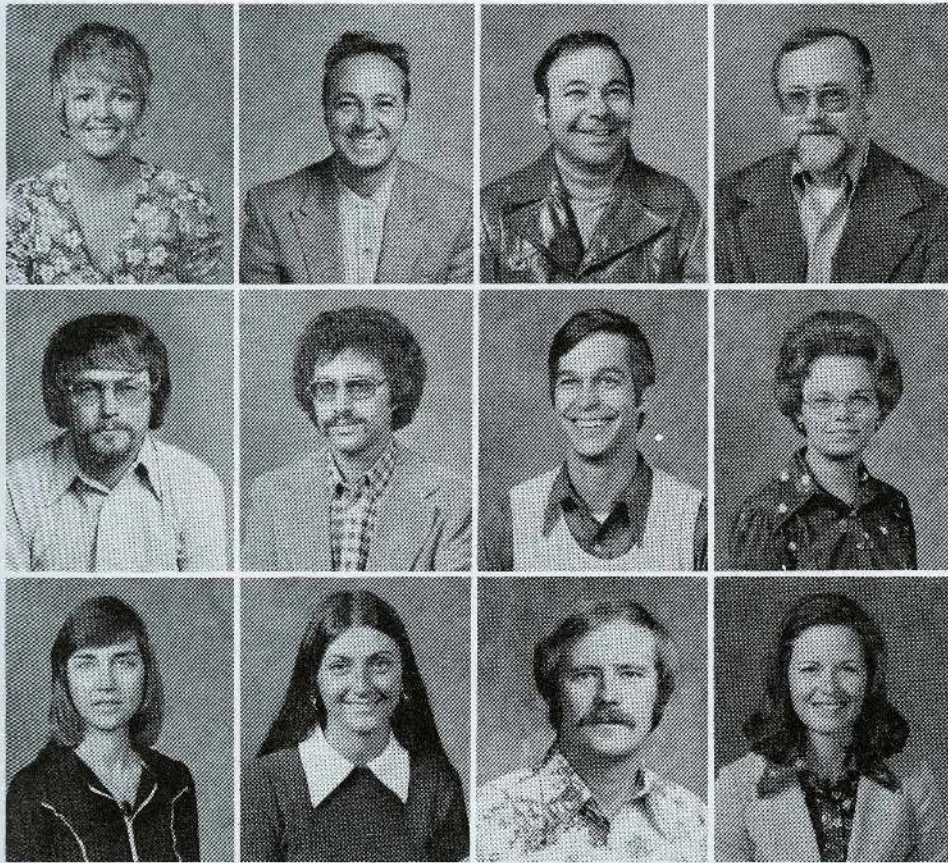

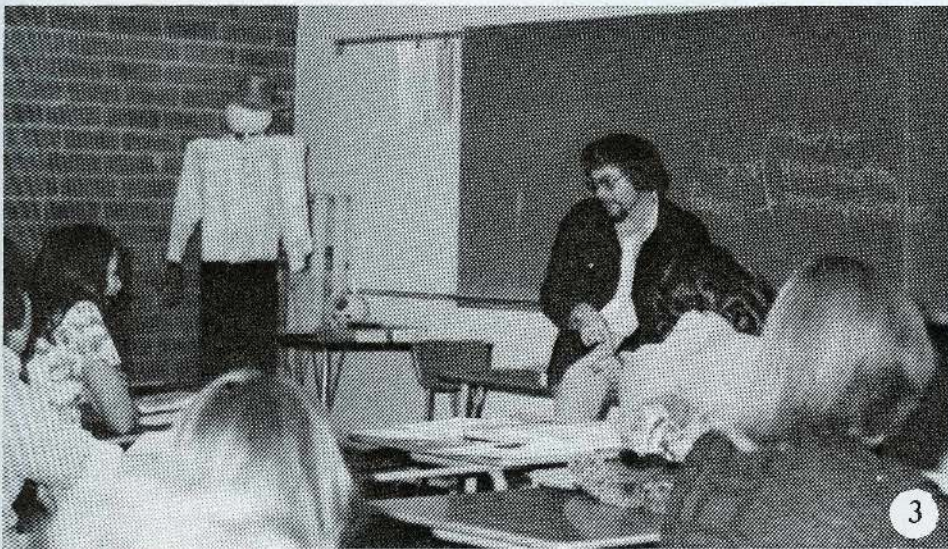


English Gets Down To The Basics

Generally, things ran smoothly, except that many needed books were missing.

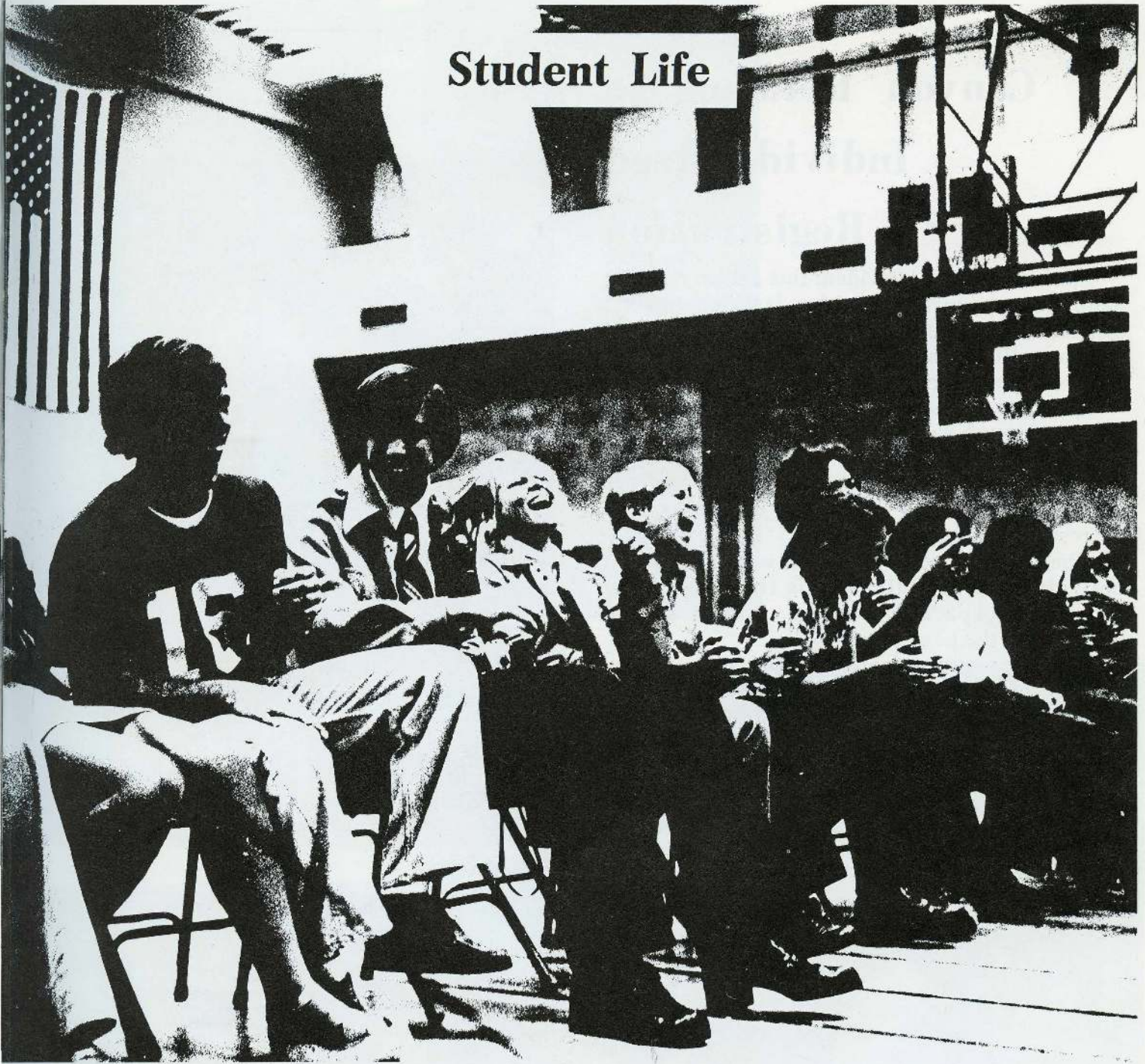

Canyon Returns To Individualized Registration

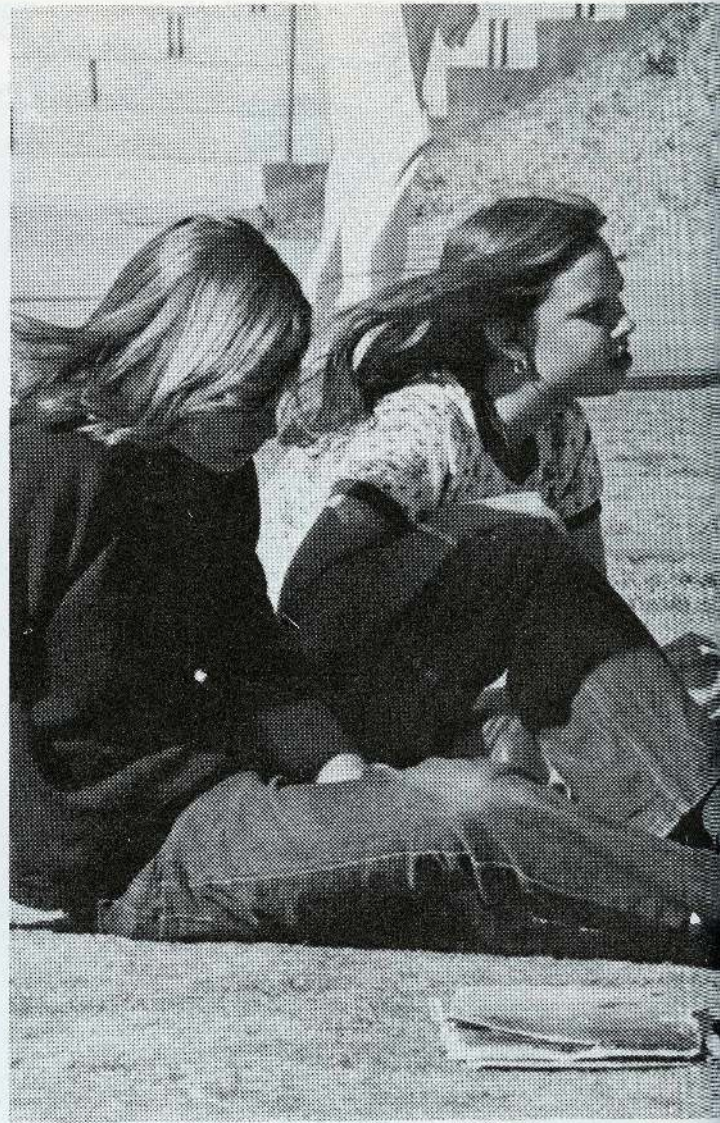

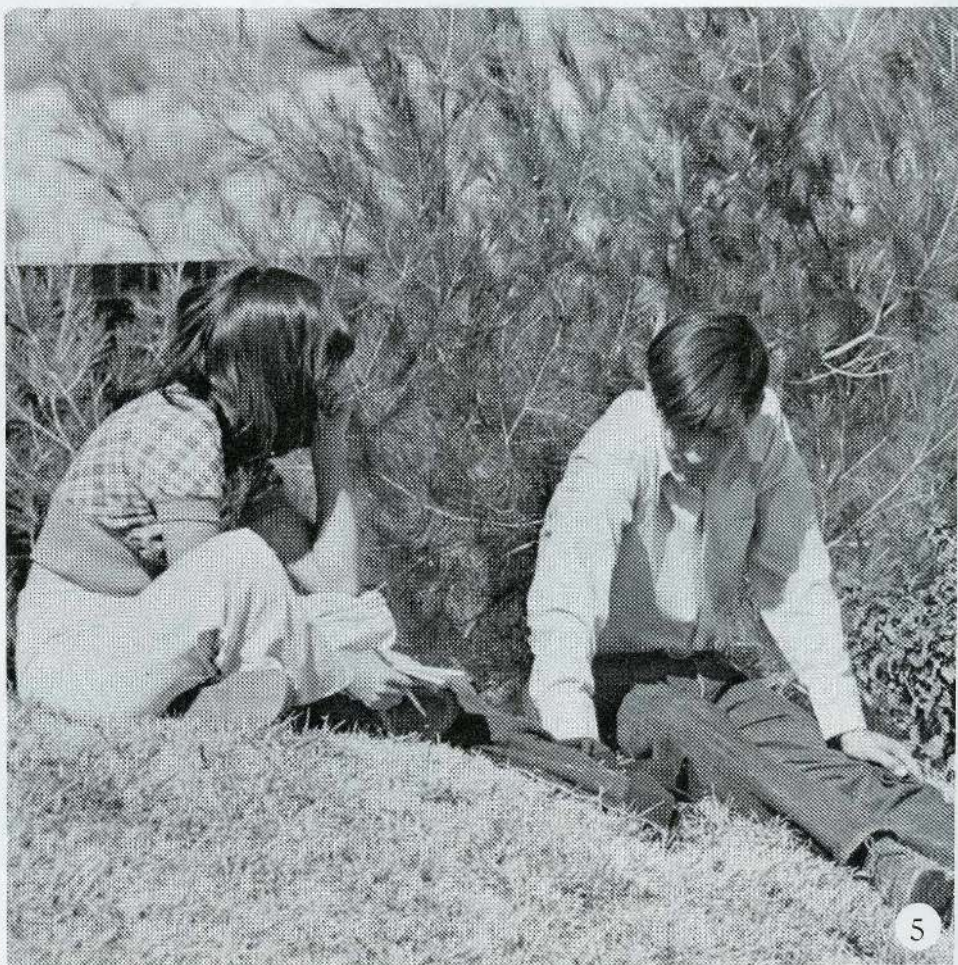

The finals schedule and good weather allowed individuals leisure time. This time was spent surfing, backpacking, biking, and of course studying for the next days finals.

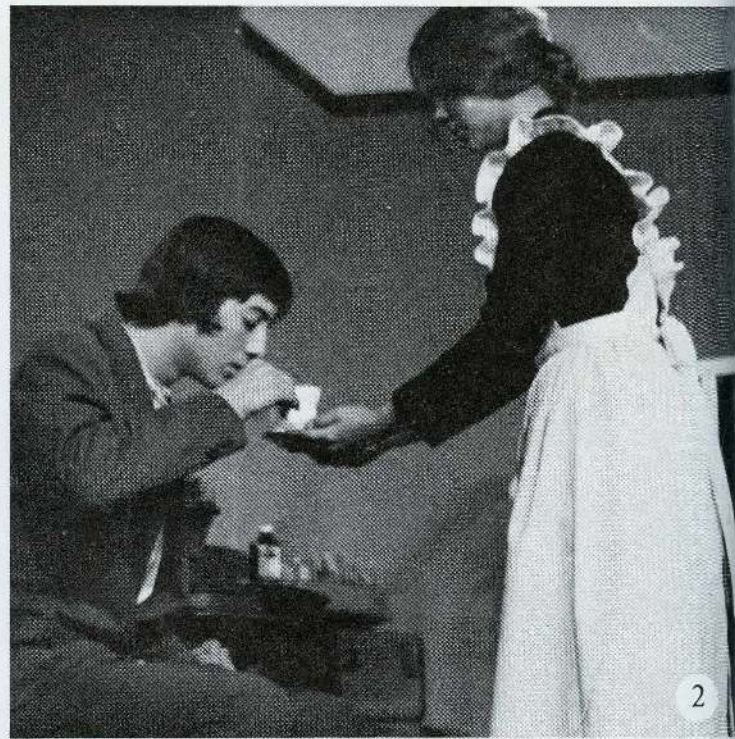
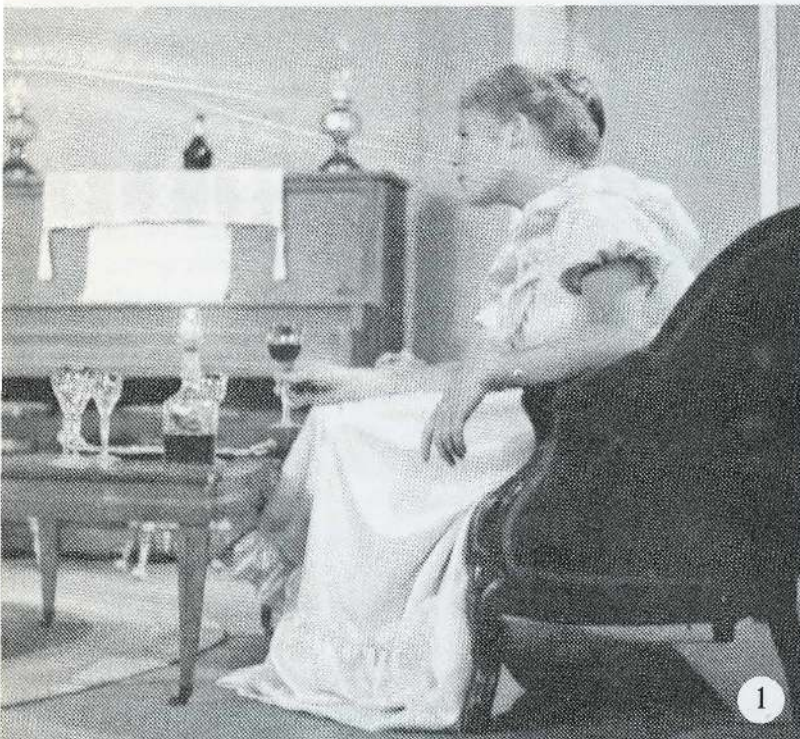
This year organization as well as cooperation on the part of both students and teachers were the main factors for the success of registration.

Introduced To Canyon

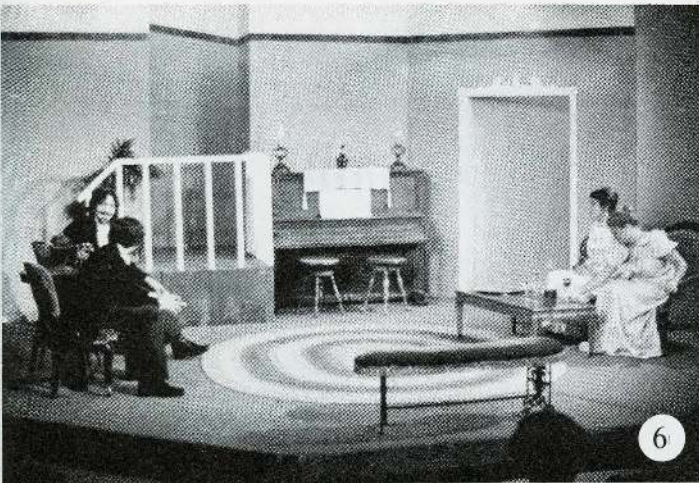

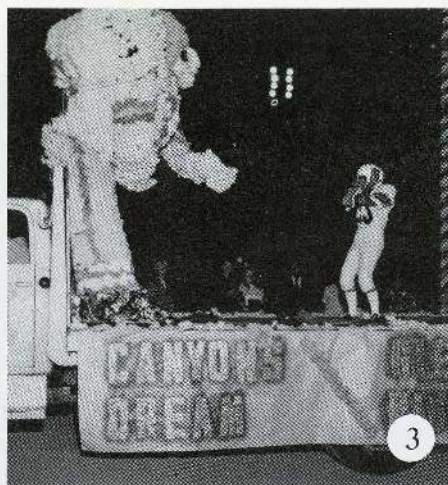

Students Rear Up After Another Defeat

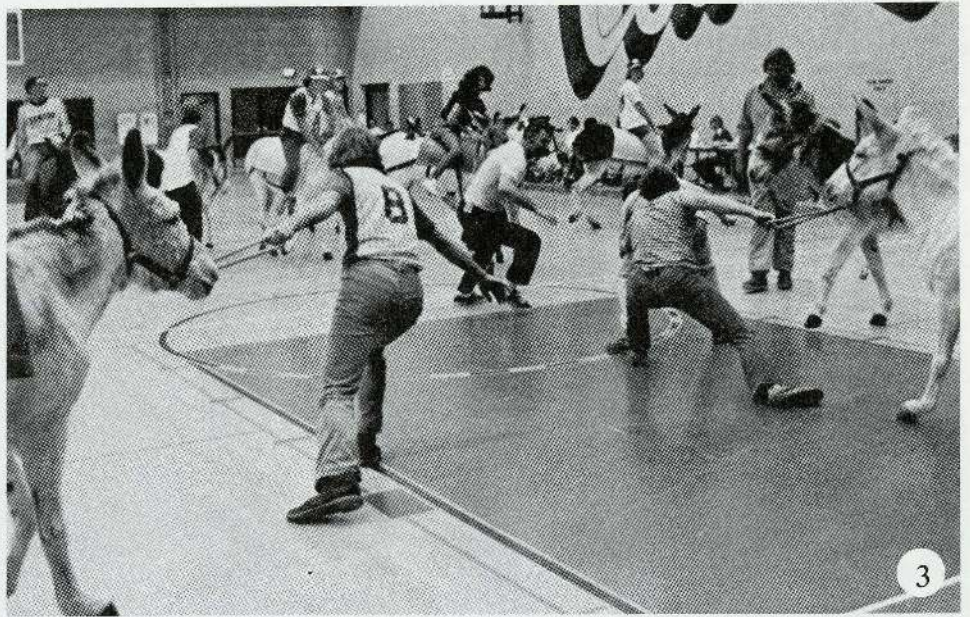

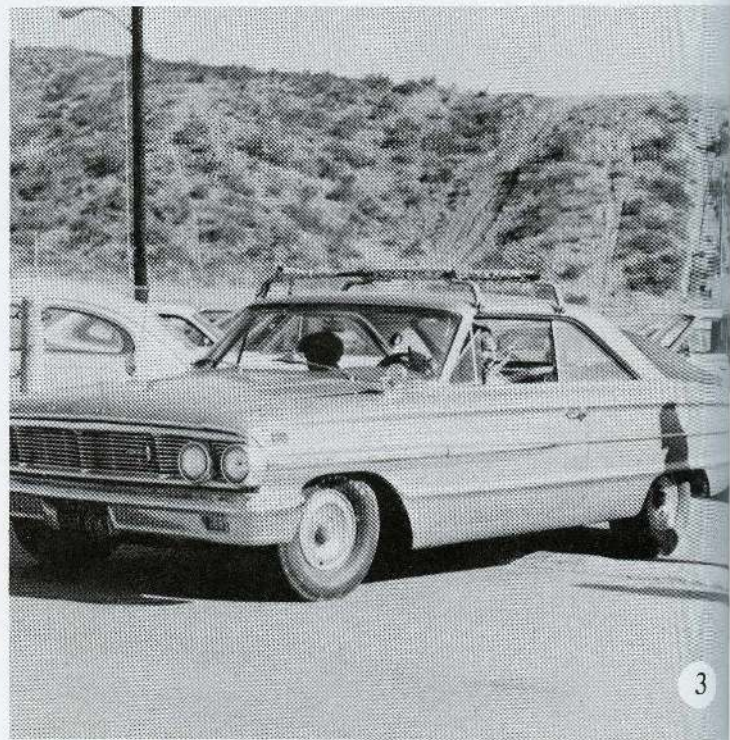

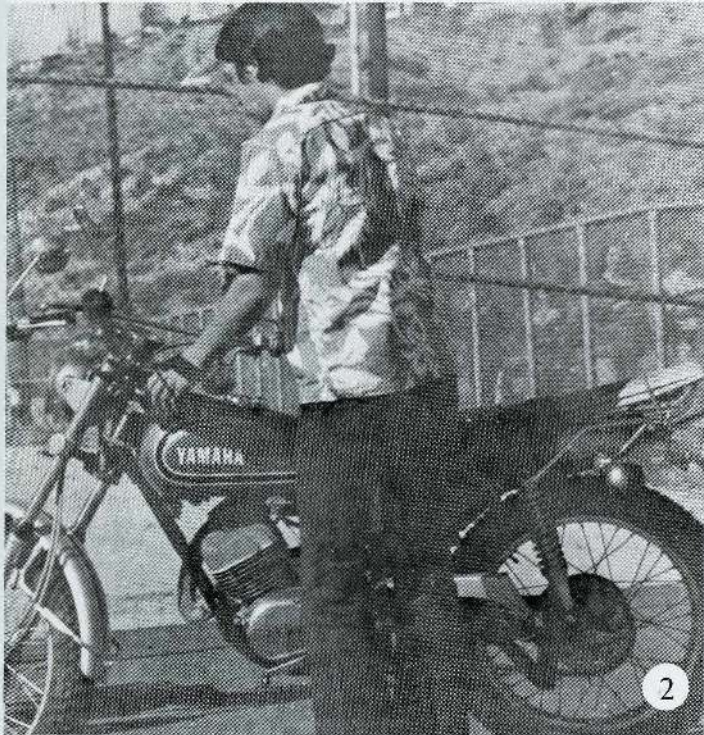

The couples danced to the music of Black Watch, a well established band with a long list of impressive engagements behind them.

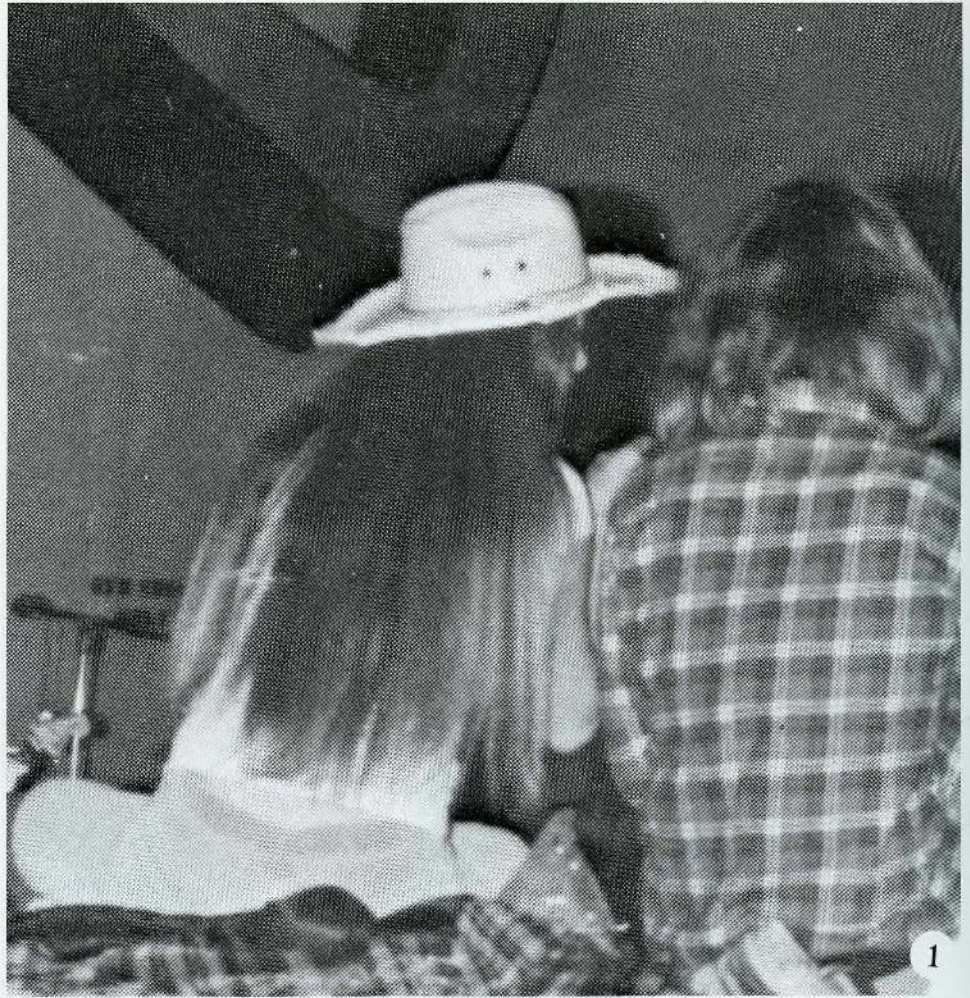
The success of this year's formal was due to enthusiastic members of the formal committee who did all they could to make this one of the liveliest formals for Canyon.



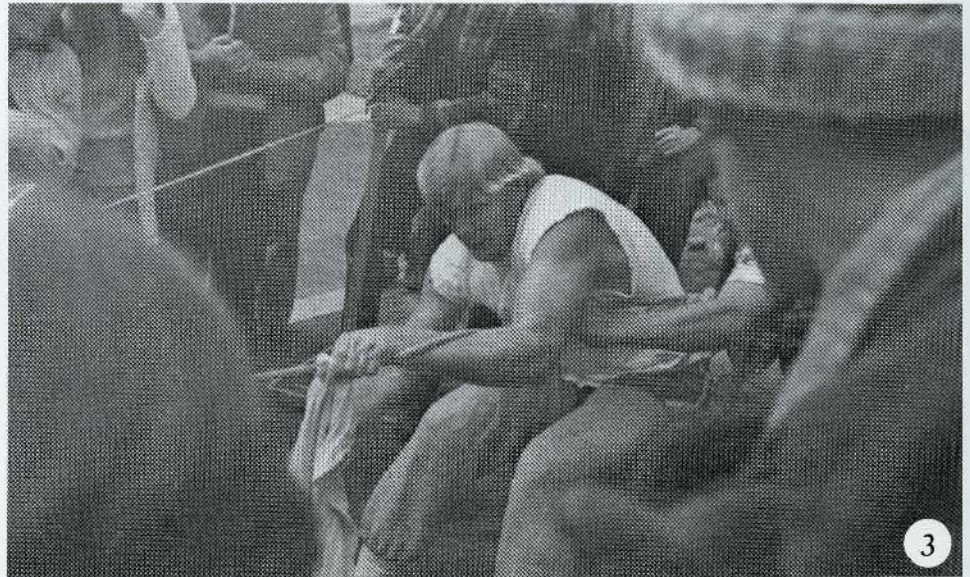

The dance in the gym was once again disguised by hay stacks, marriage booths, and the band completed the evening.

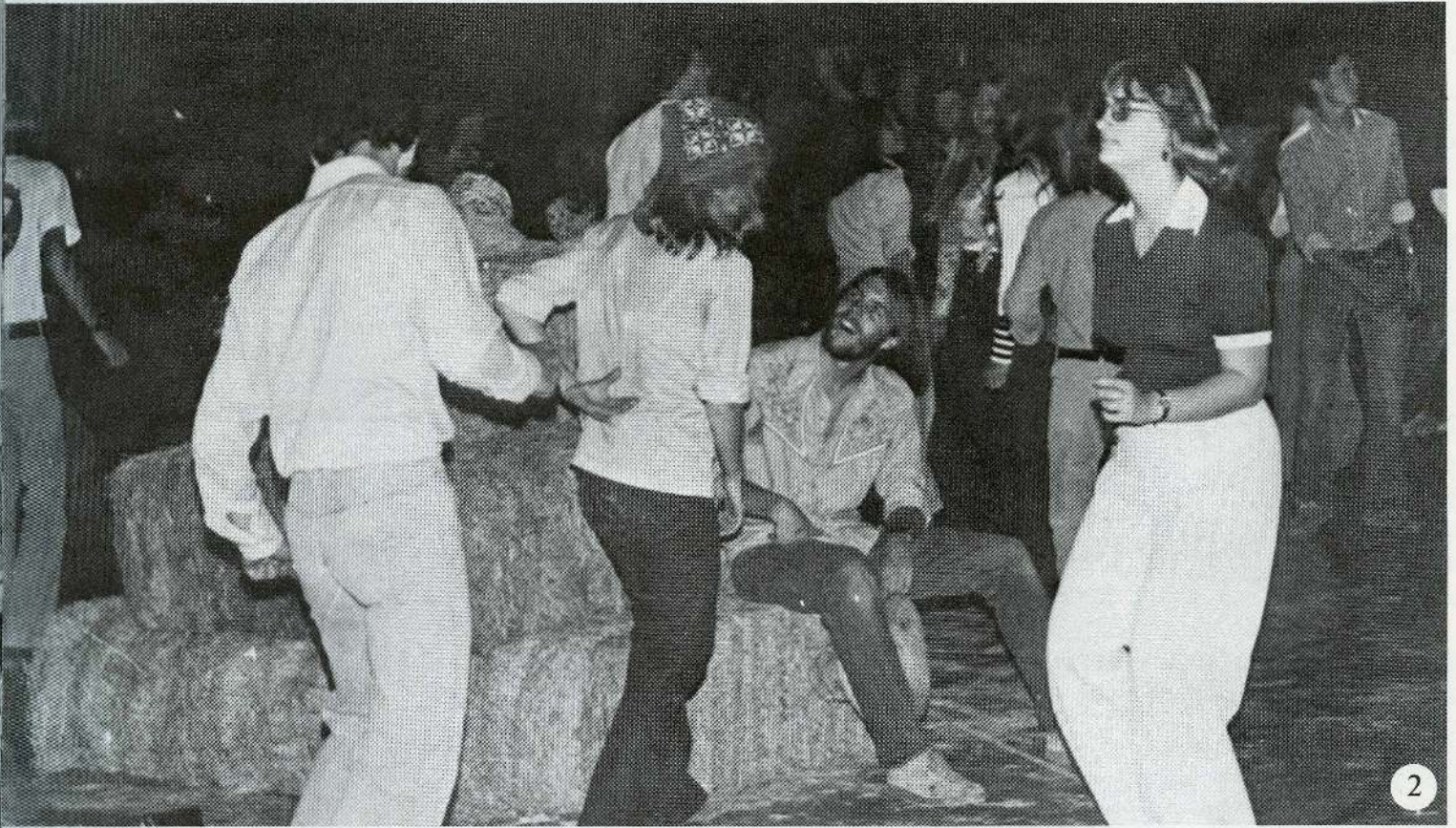

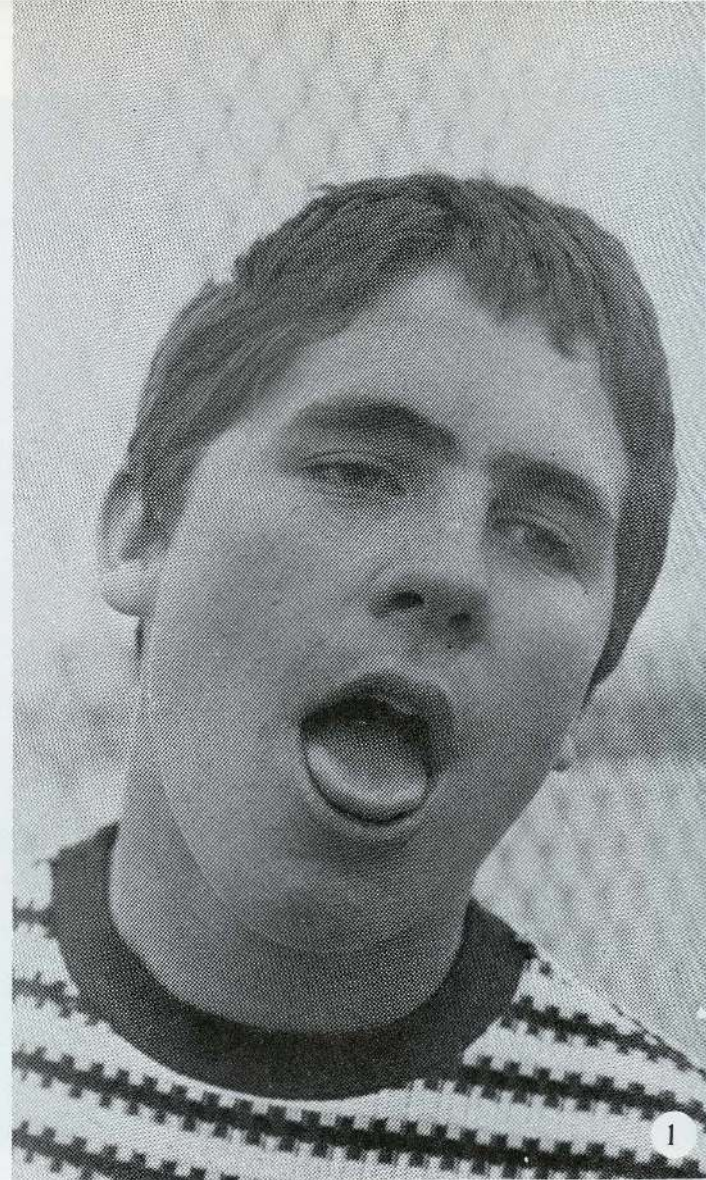
Canyon, The Face Of Many Expressions

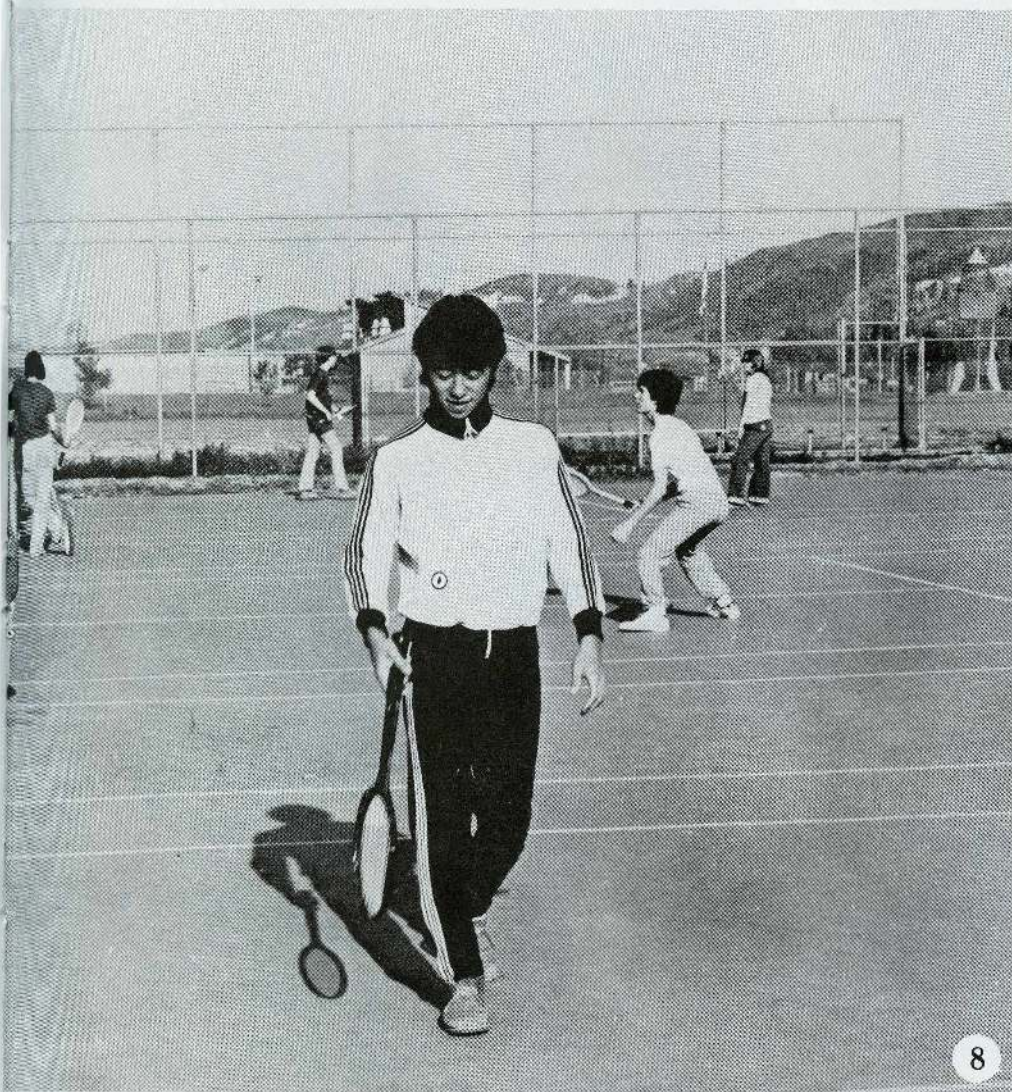
Canyon Continues To Host Exchange Students

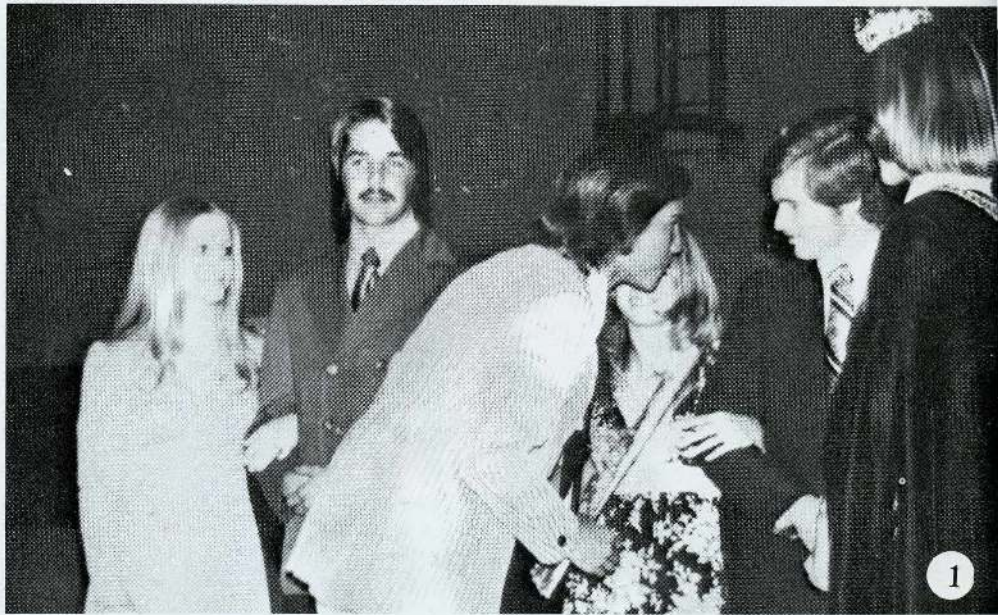

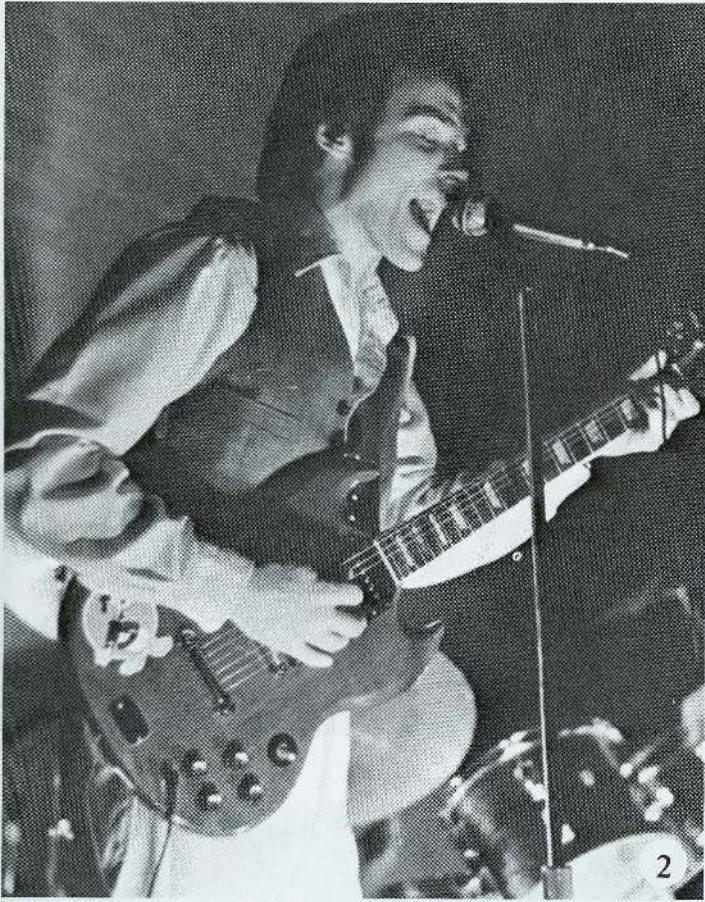
Basketball Homecoming Draws Large Crowd

The one abject comment made about Basketball Homecoming this year was that there was a lack of activities prior to the game. But as a whole, the game was one of Canyon's most successful events.





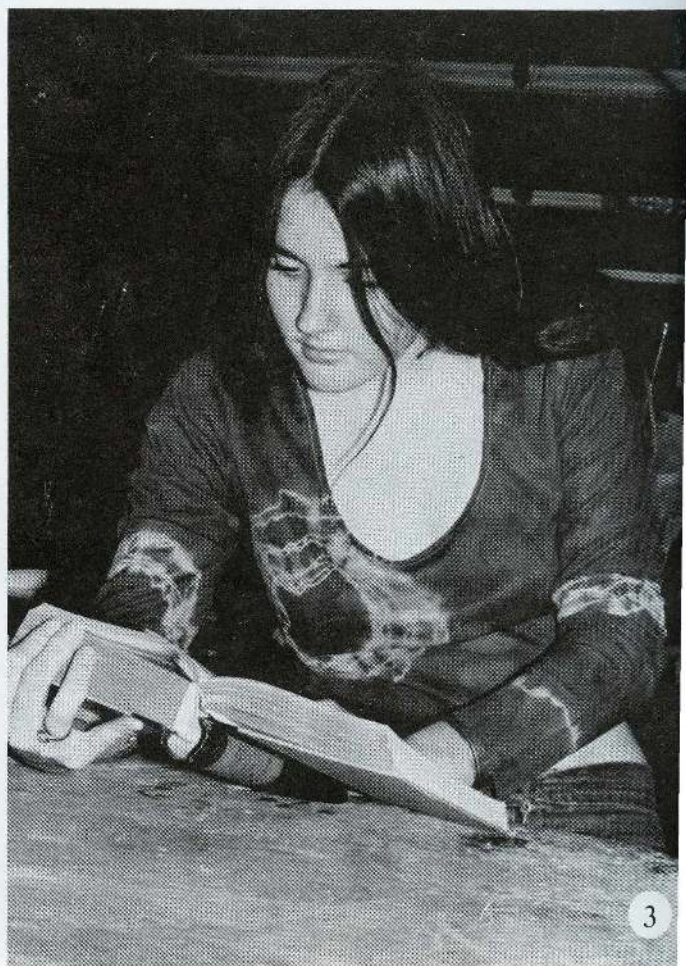

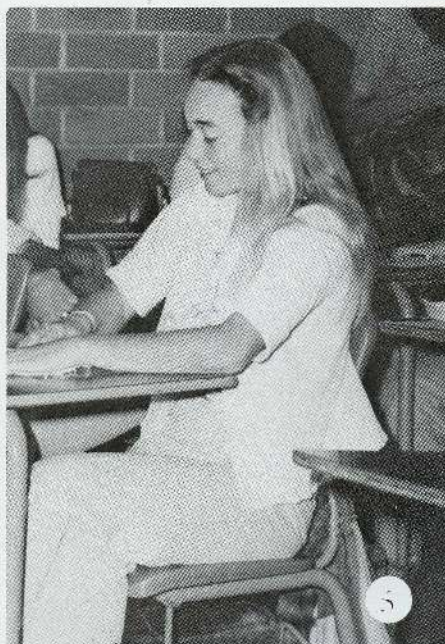


Individuality Stressed At Canyon

There were many areas which individualists were involved in, such as art, athletics, drama and instrumental vocals. It just shows you that individualists were recognized at Canyon.





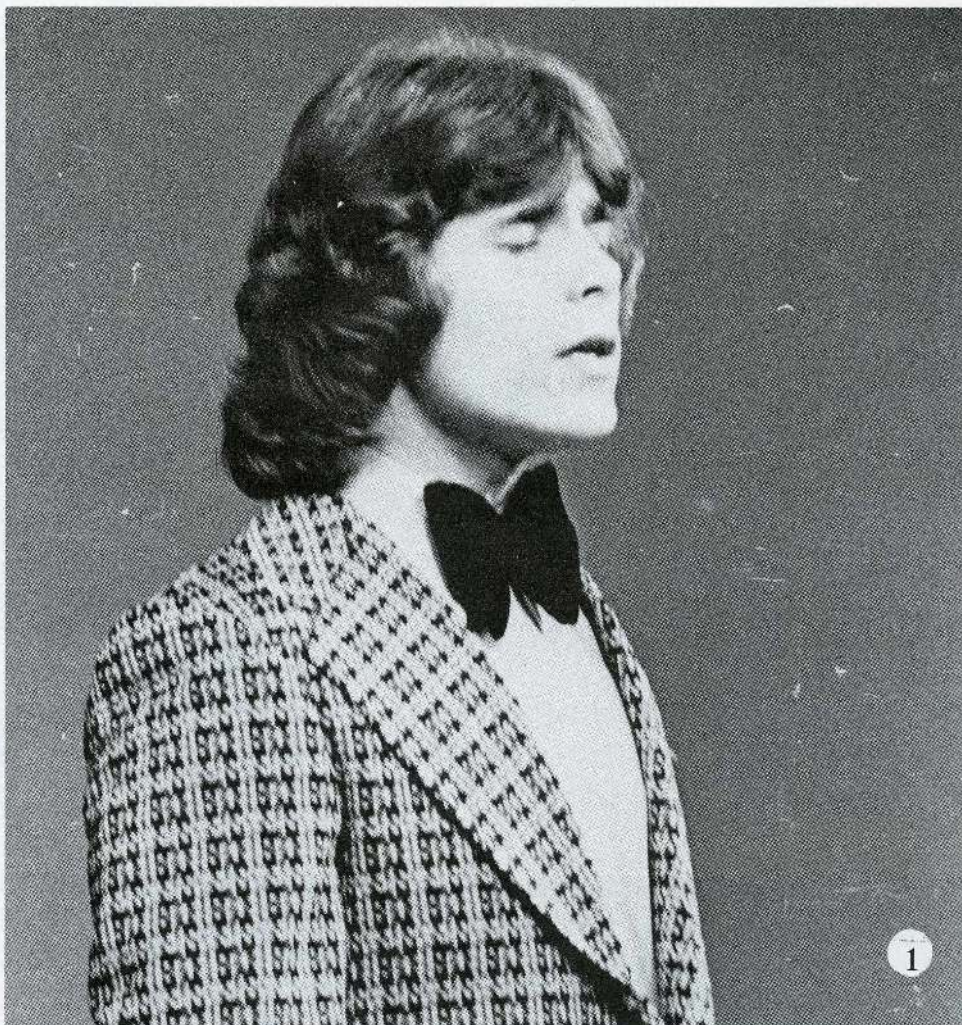

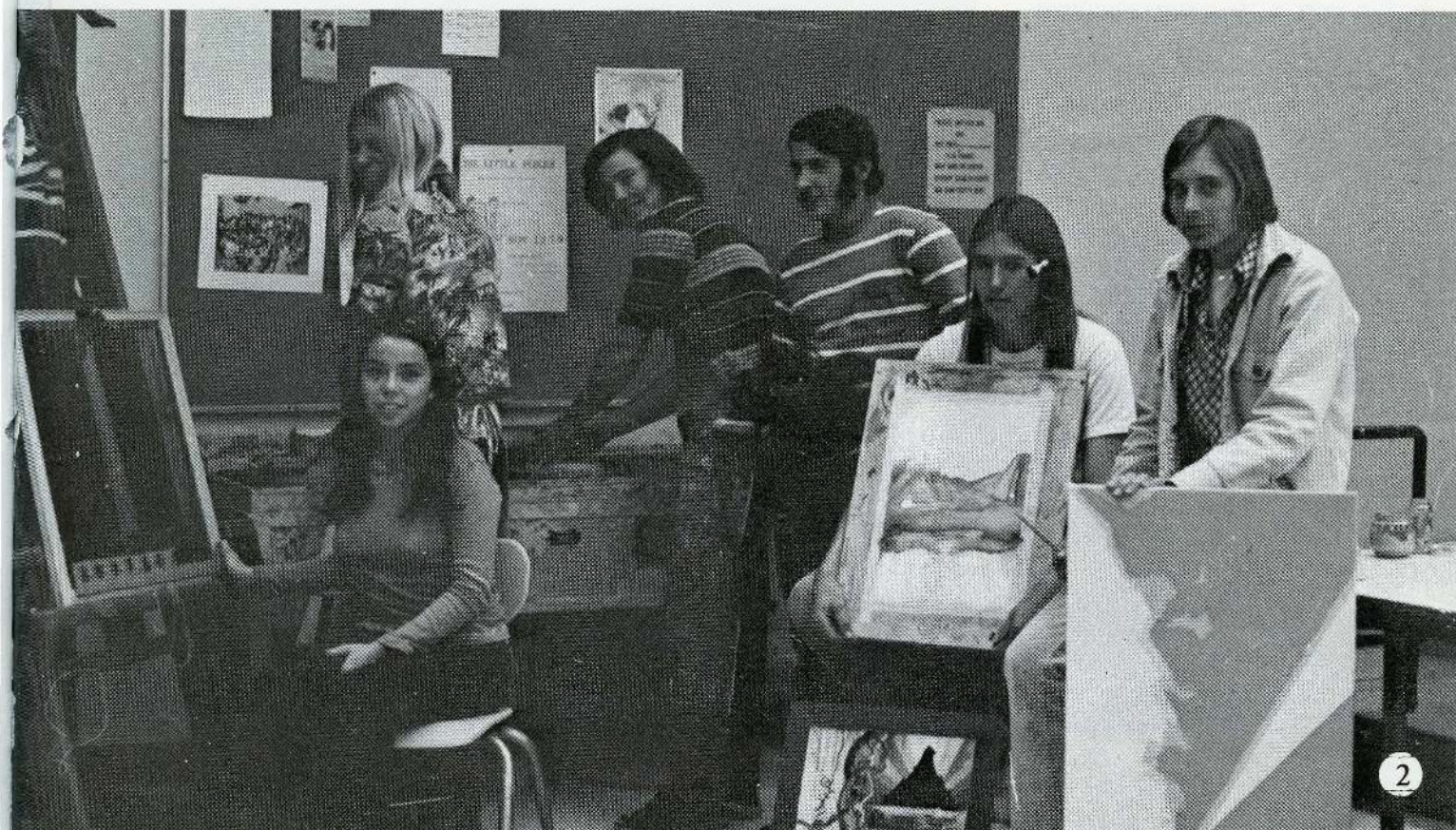
Showcases Provide Talent Outlet

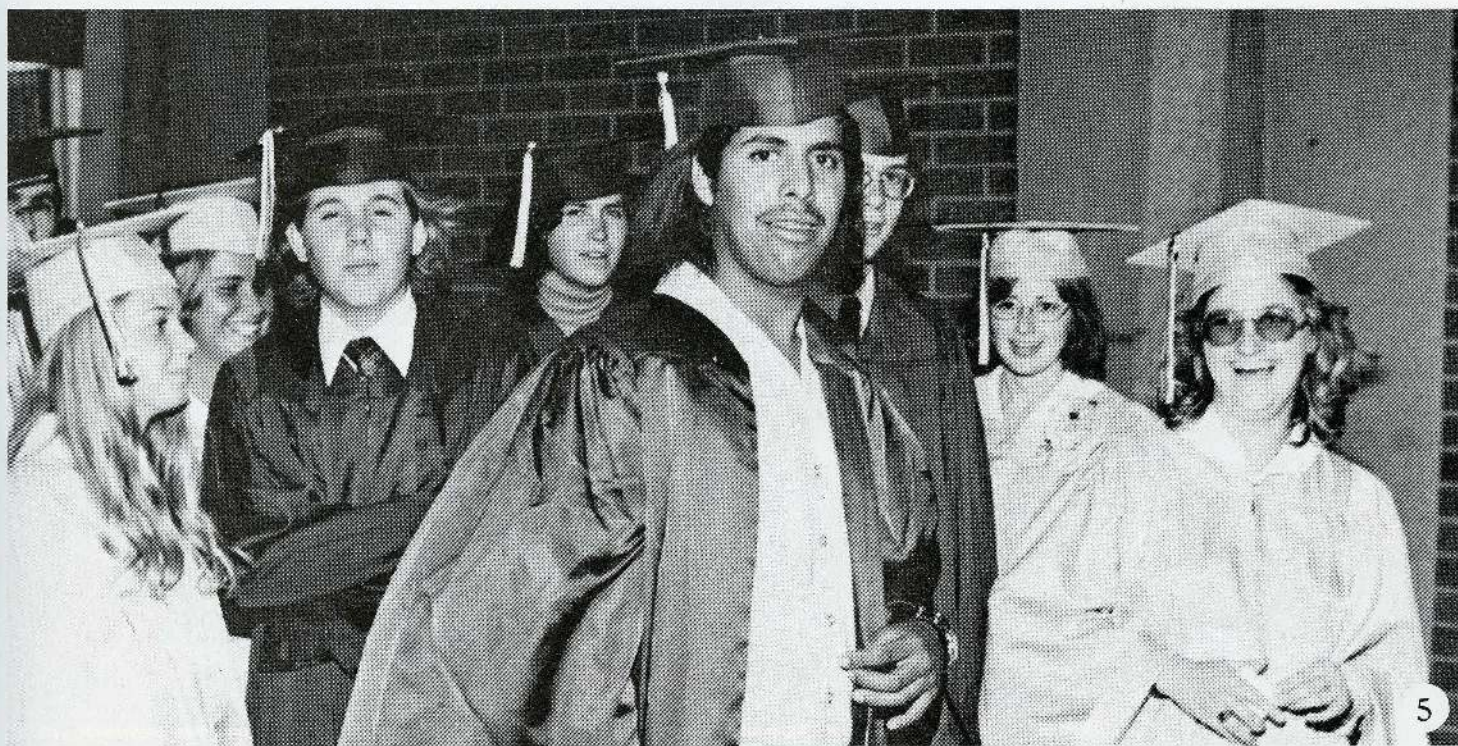
Honor Scholars Dominate Graduating Class



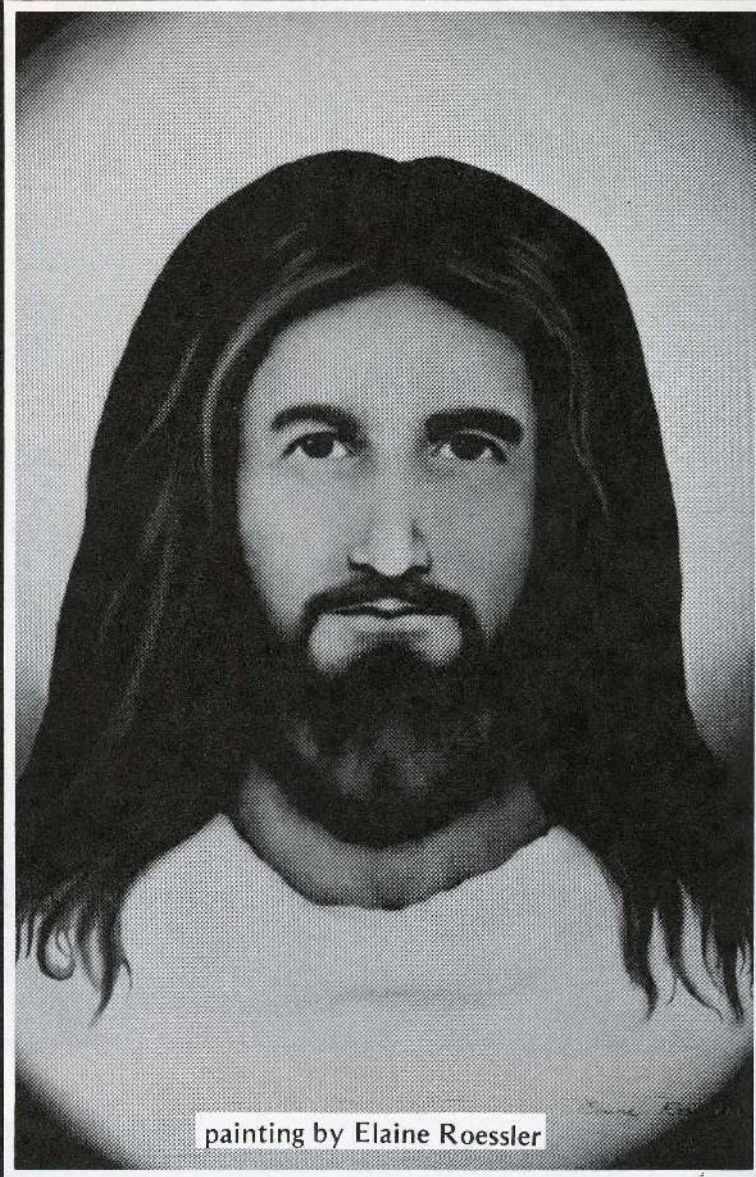

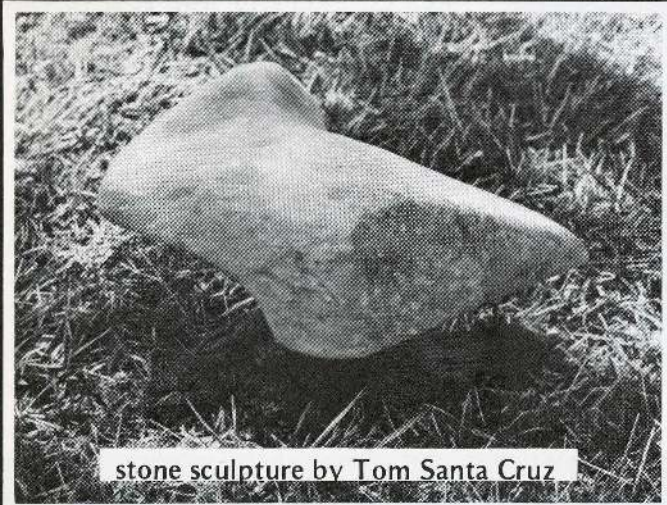

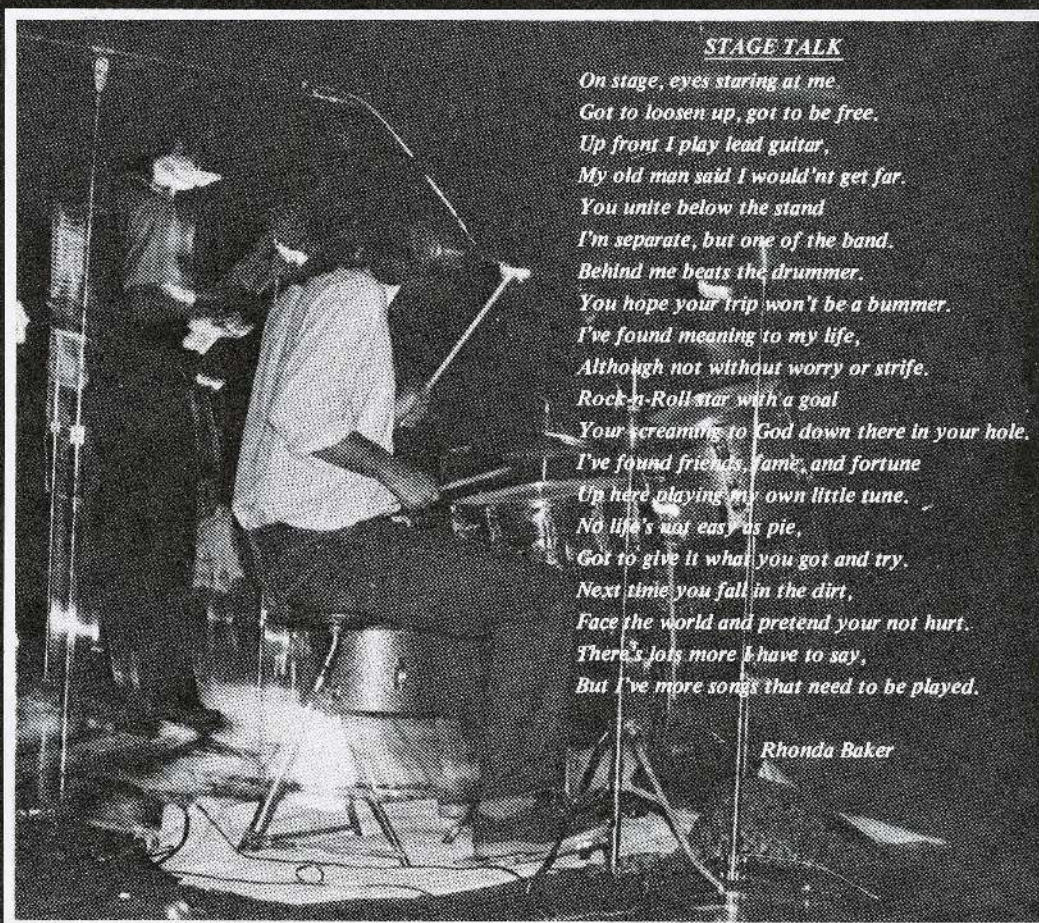
In each aspect of artistic expression, Canyon students were extremely adept. Hopefully the pride we have found in art will surpass the general feeling of apathy towards our school.

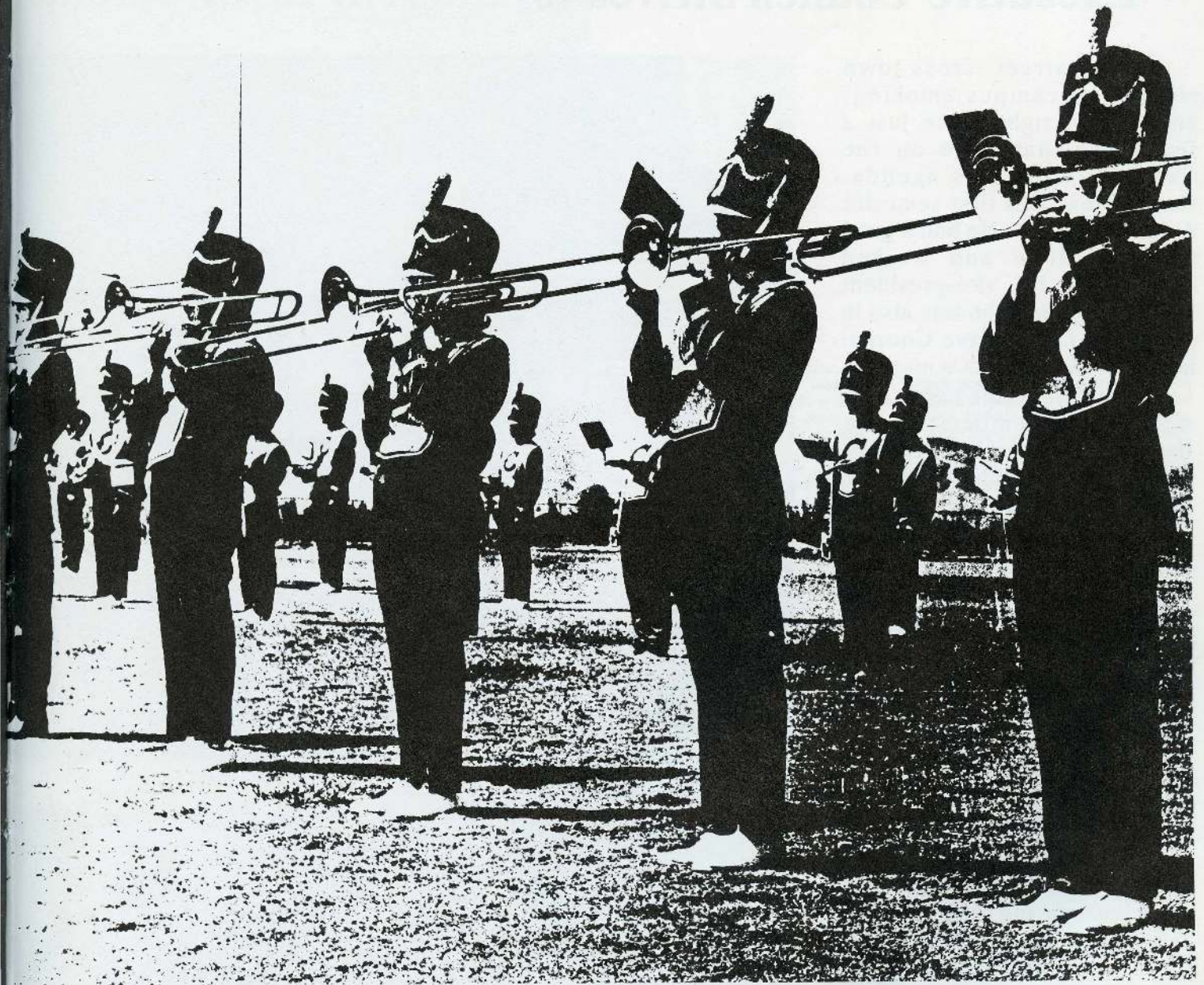

Some of their other activities included; after-game dances, class elections, and the sales of pom-poms and balloons at football games.

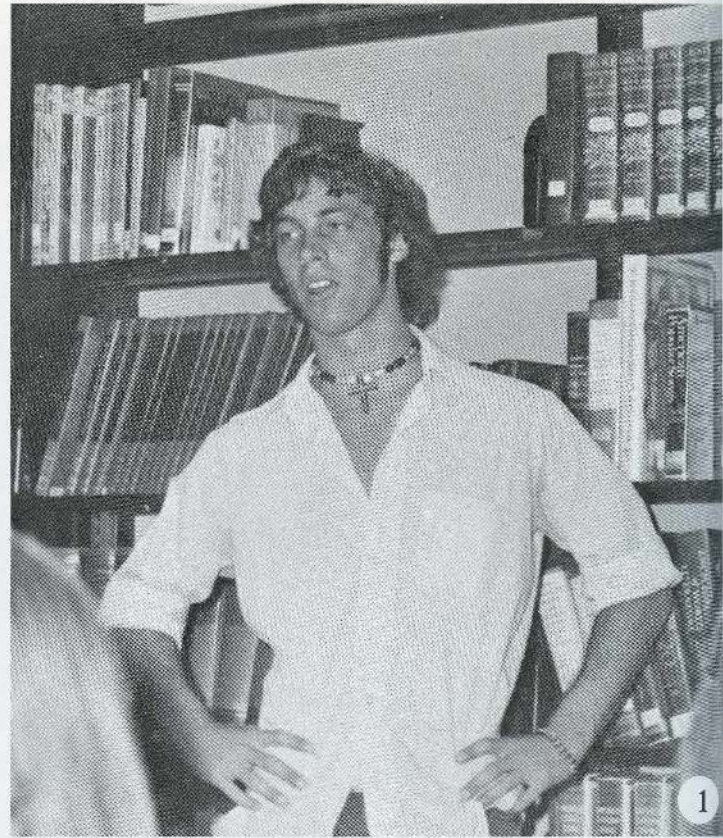


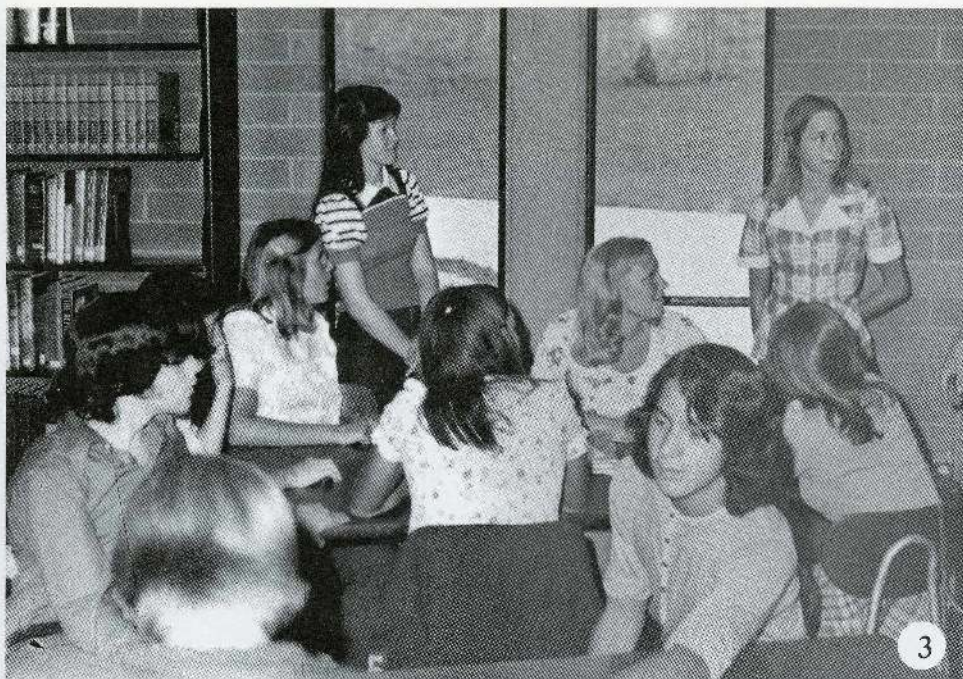

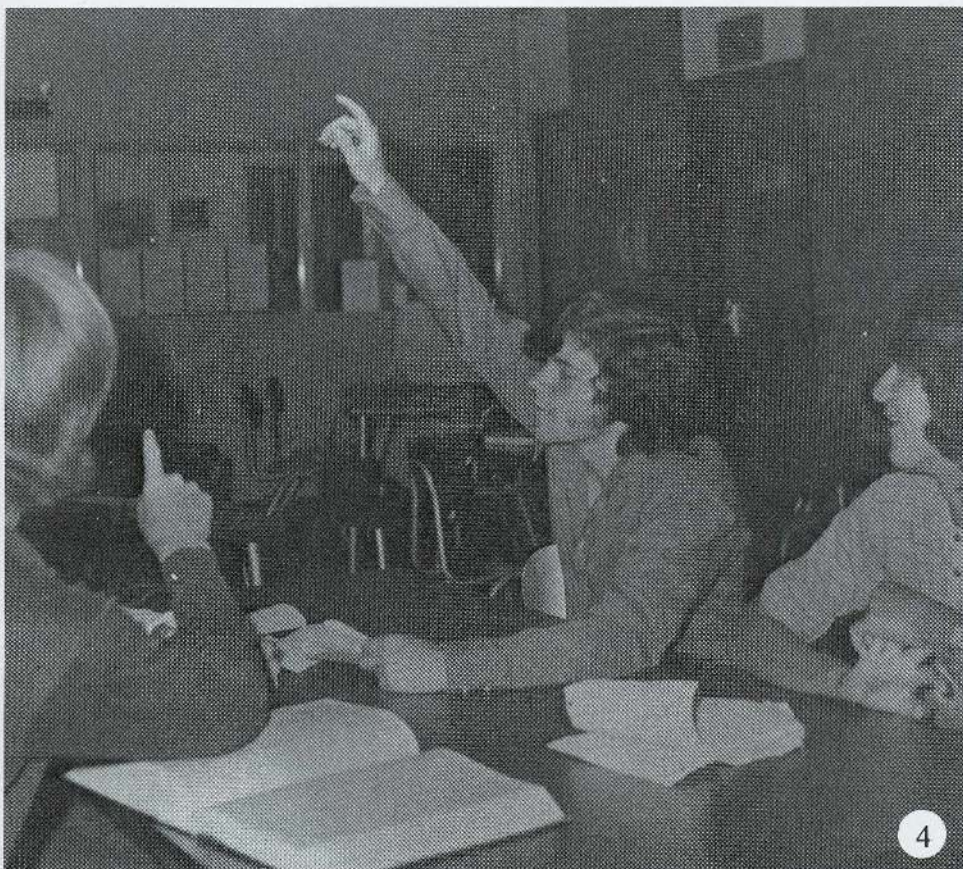
Legislative Council Gets Involved

This year may certainly be summed up as successful and encouraging, due to much involvement and concern of the students.



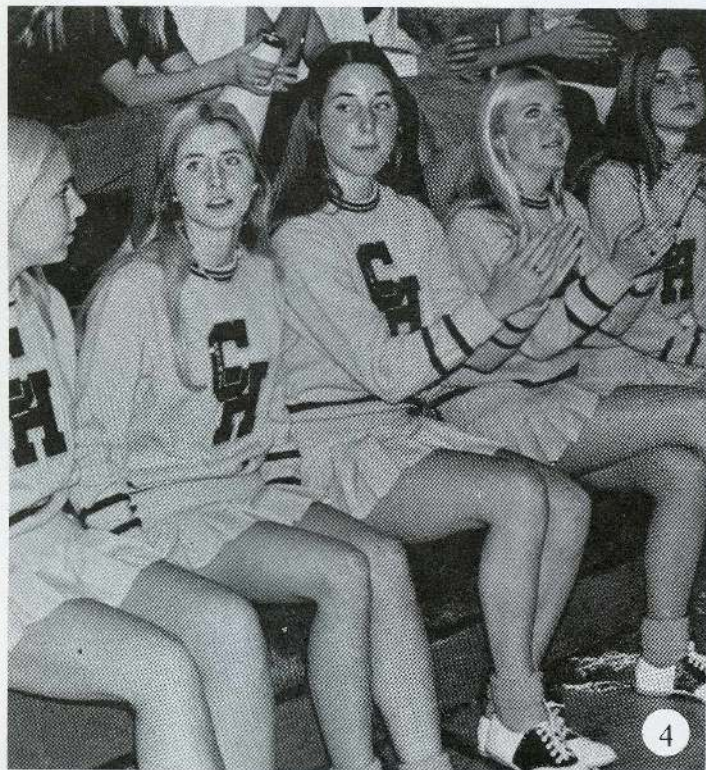

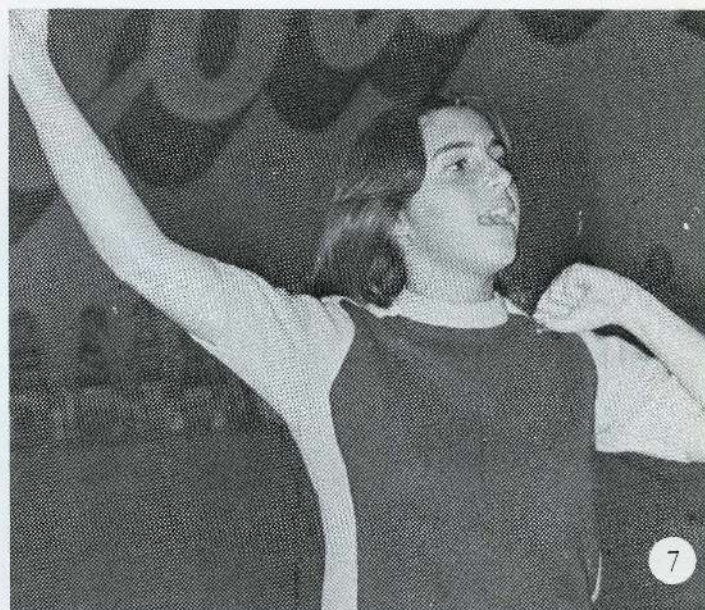
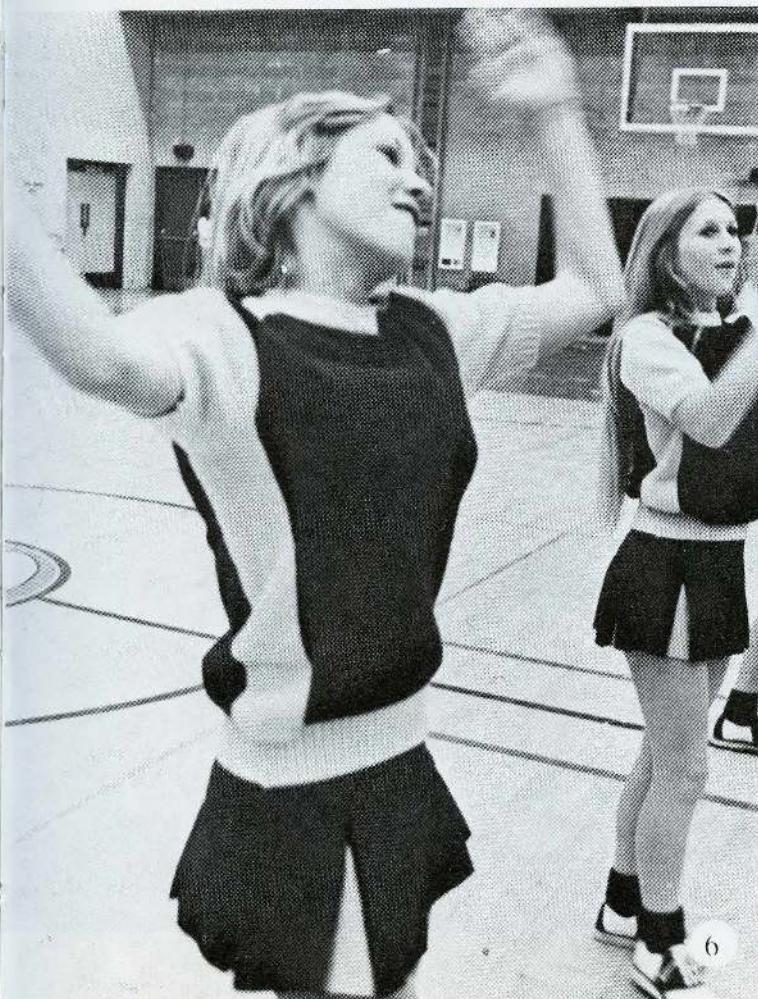


Frosh—Soph Are Prominent At Rallies

Horses Join Drill Team

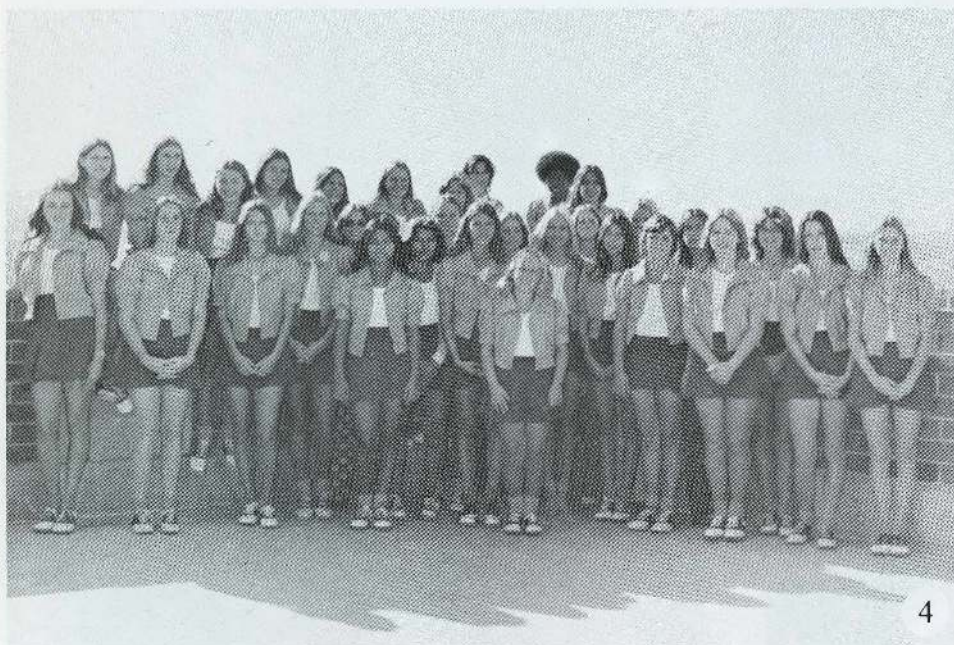

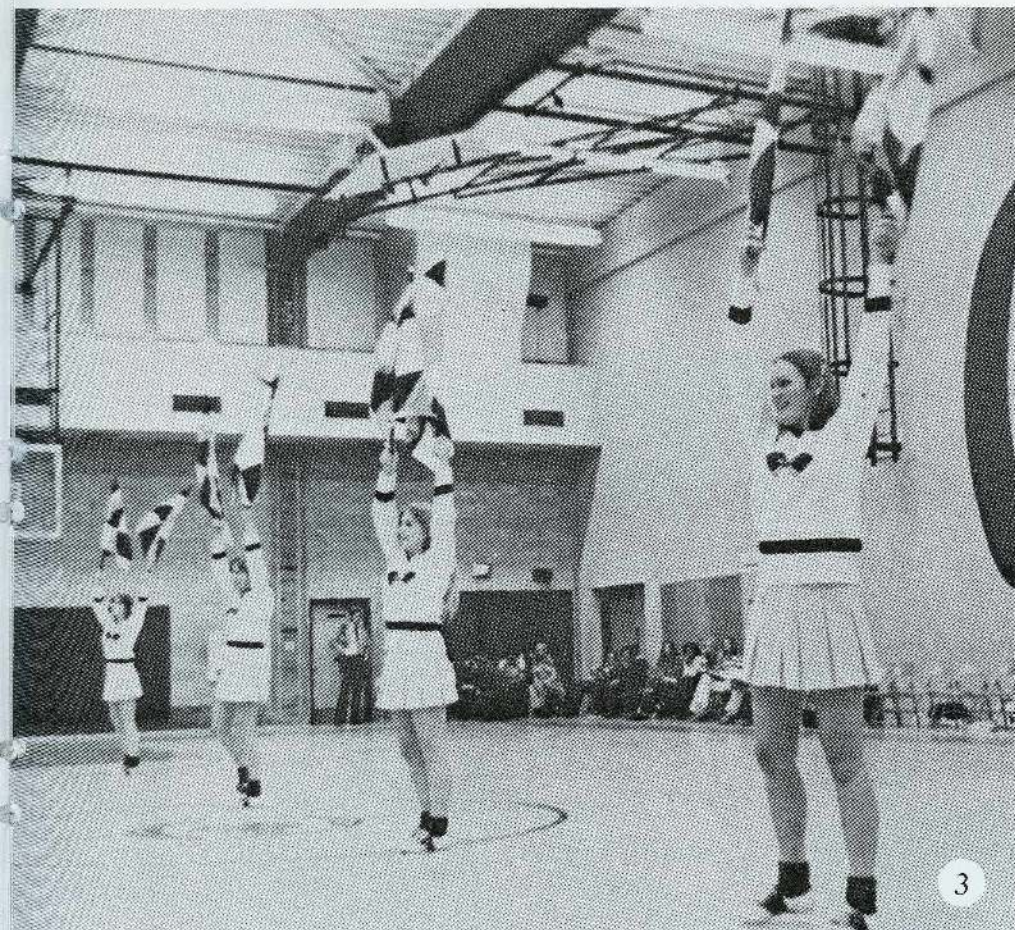

Black Light Becomes Tradition

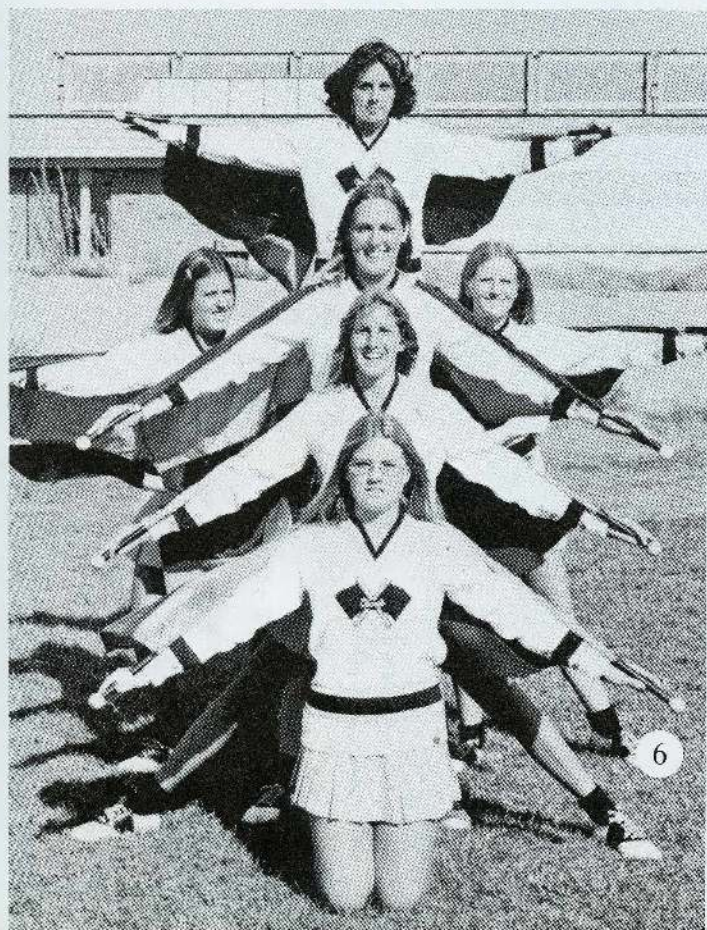

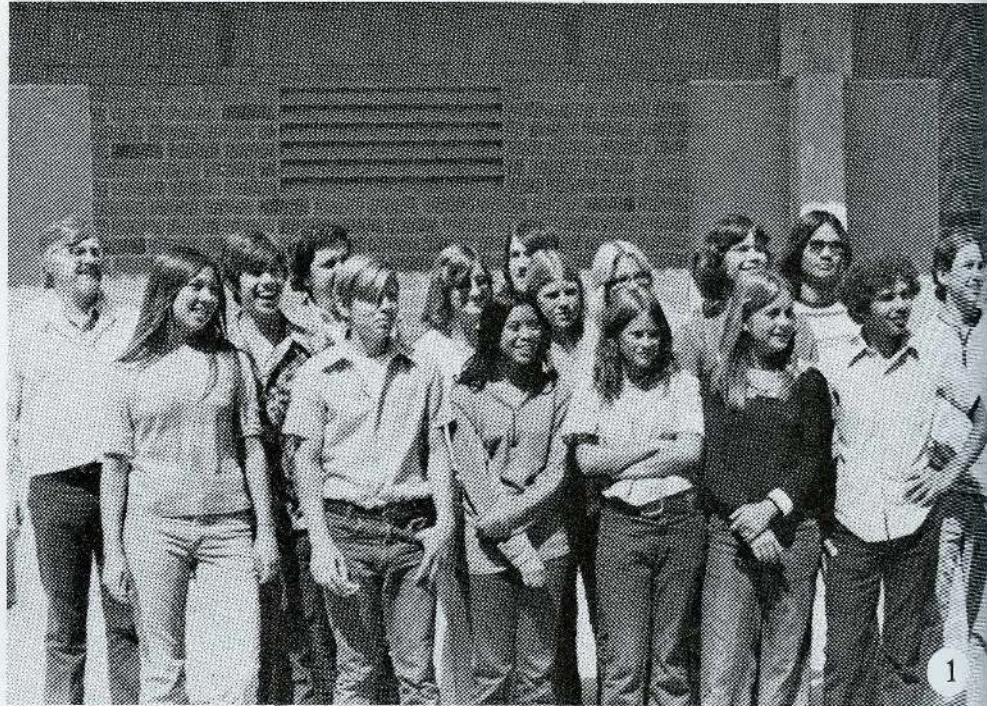
Pony Express Puts Out 2,200

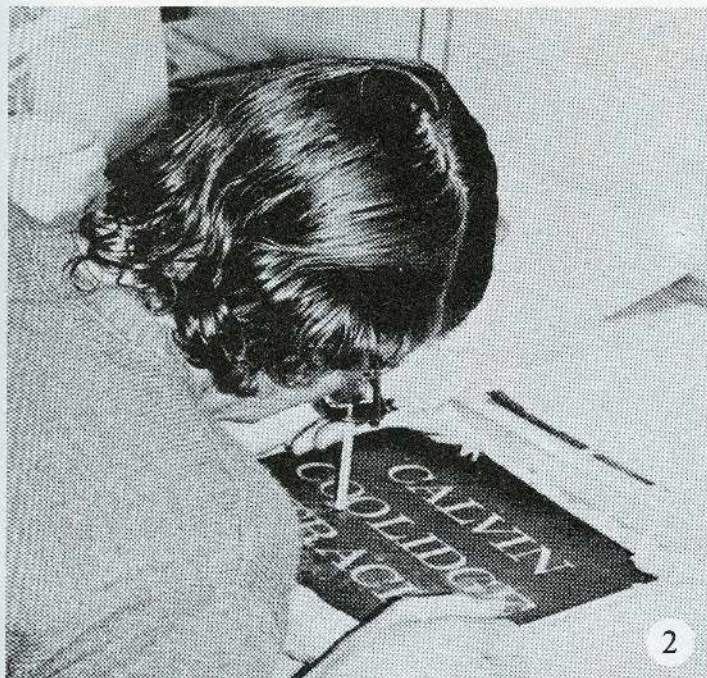

Graphic Arts Shares New Compuwriter

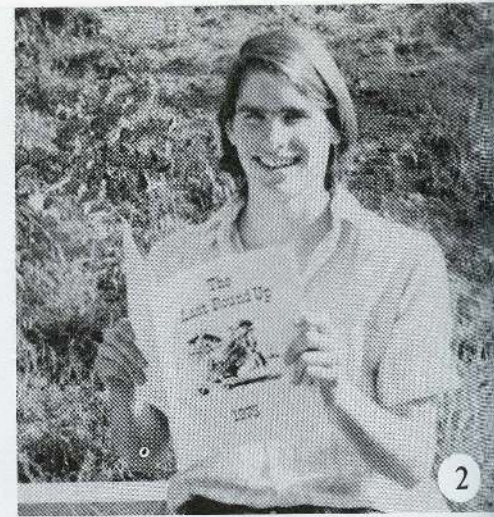


Graphic Arts Club's second year at Canyon proved to be very successful. Students learned skills and theories related to modern publication and production, in addition to printing the Pony Express.

They acquired two new pieces of equipment; a cold type computer which helped compose copy much quicker and a printing machine.

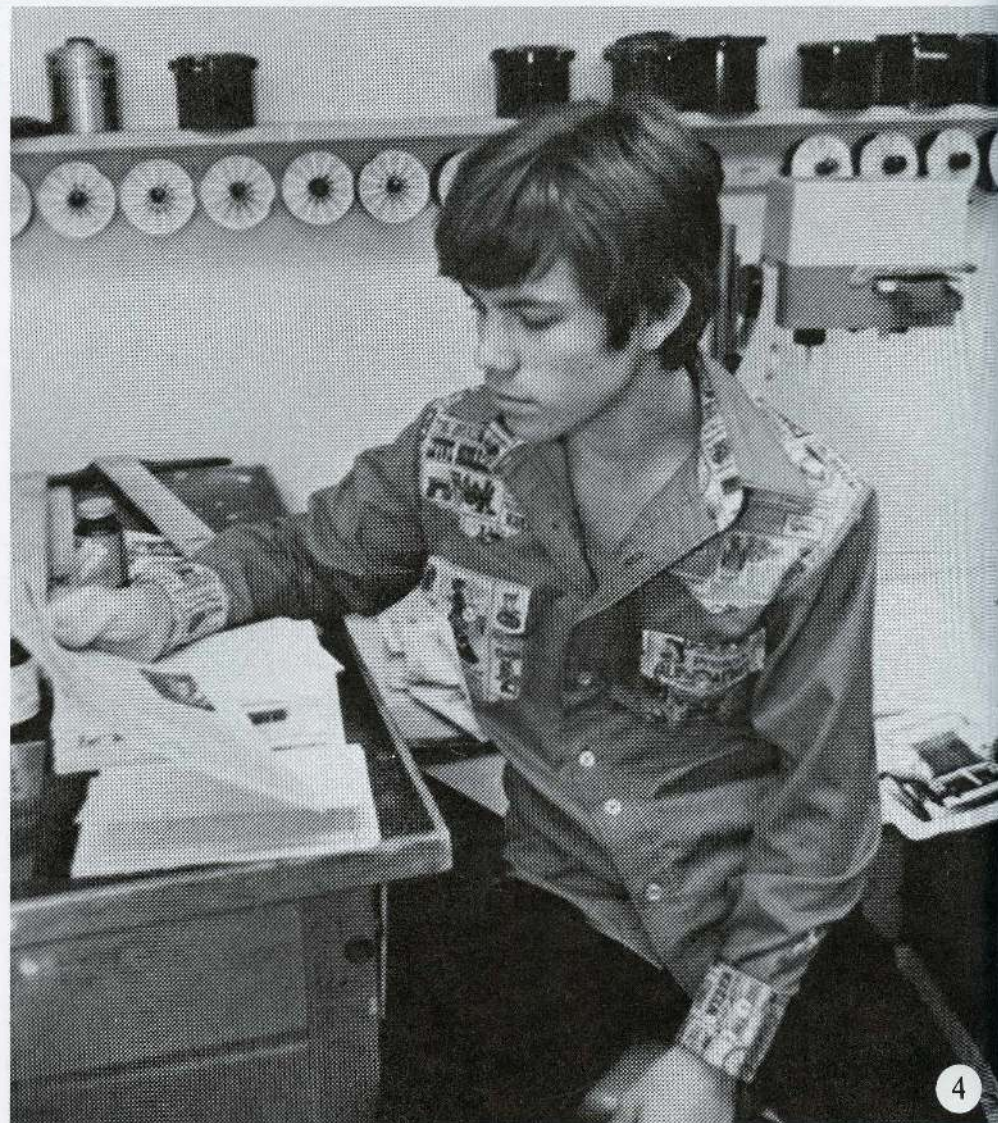


Last Round-Up Acquires Larger Staff

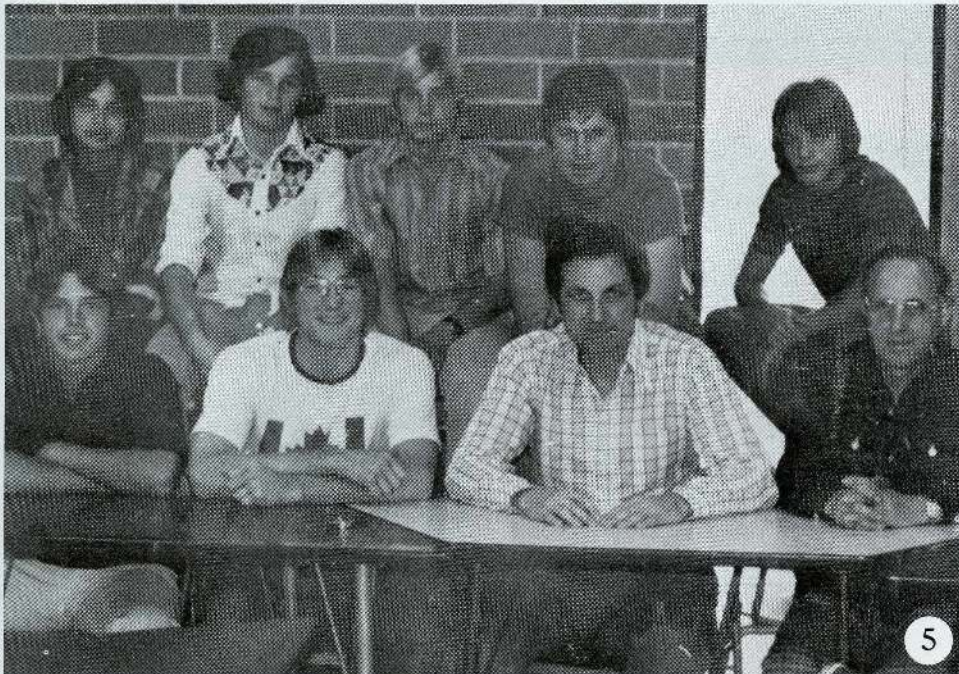


Key Club Holds Concert

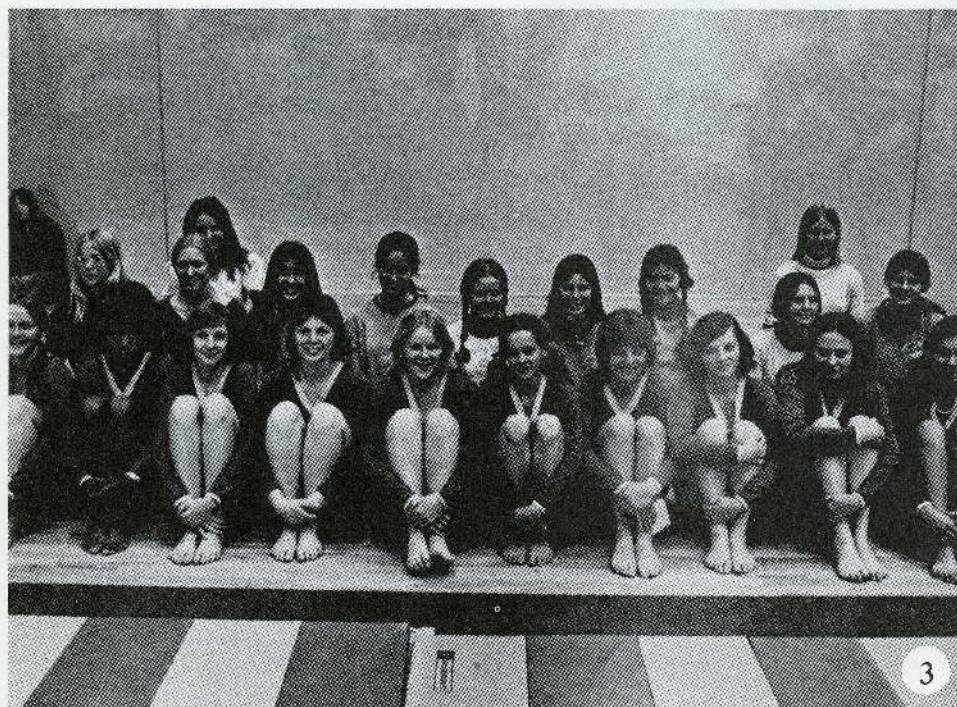
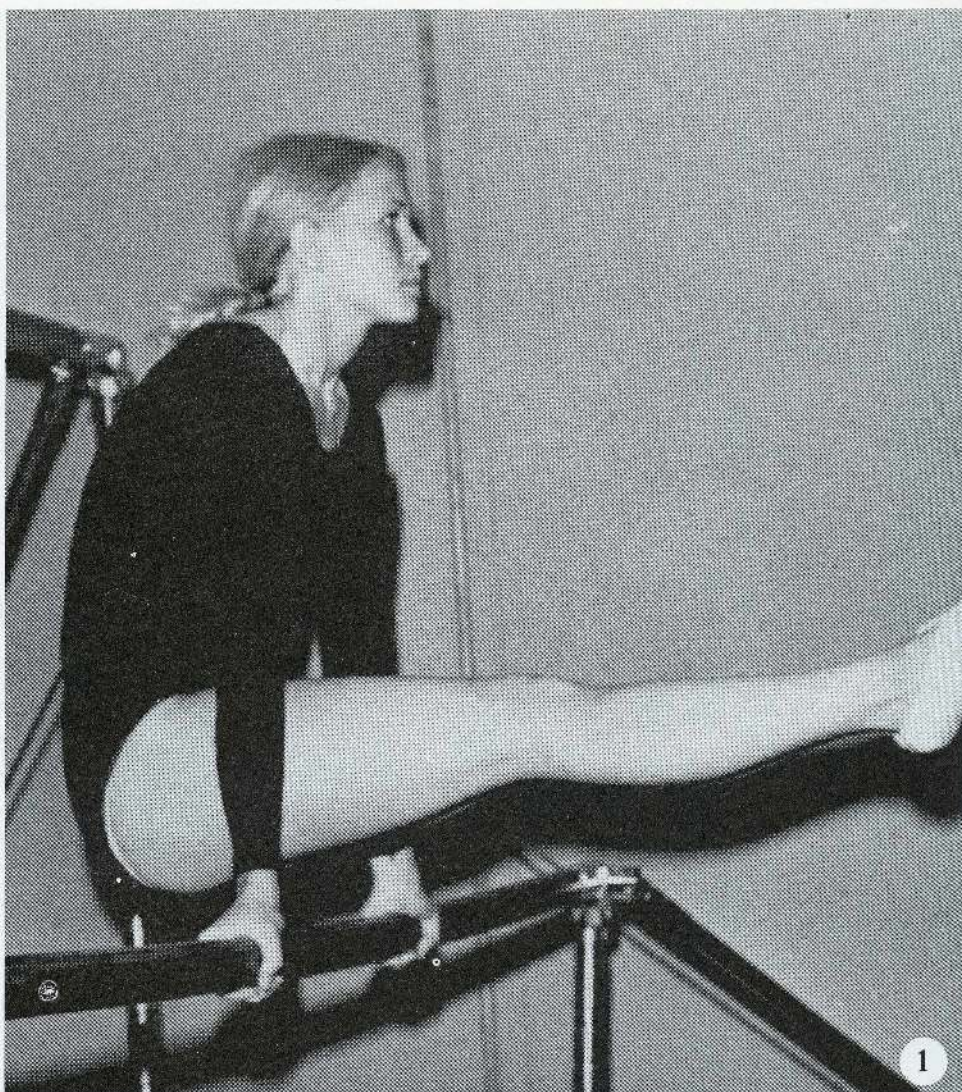
Canyon's Key Club was reinstated this year, with the leadership of Mr. Marincola and Mr. Waite. They met once a week.

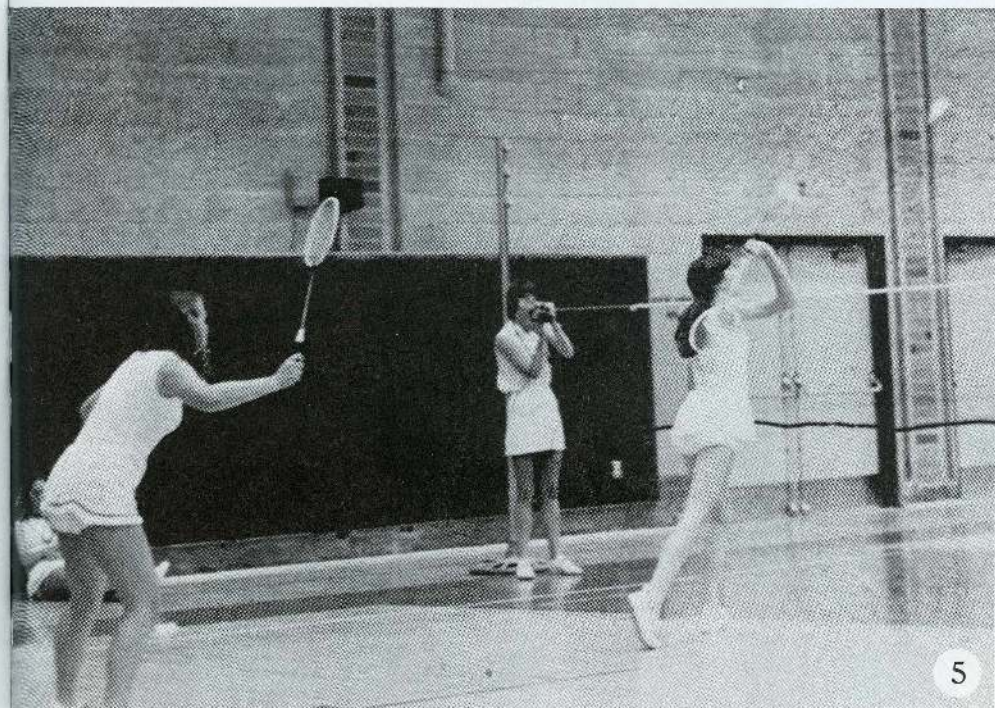
Gymnastics And Badmitton Become Two New Sports

International Weekend is a Success

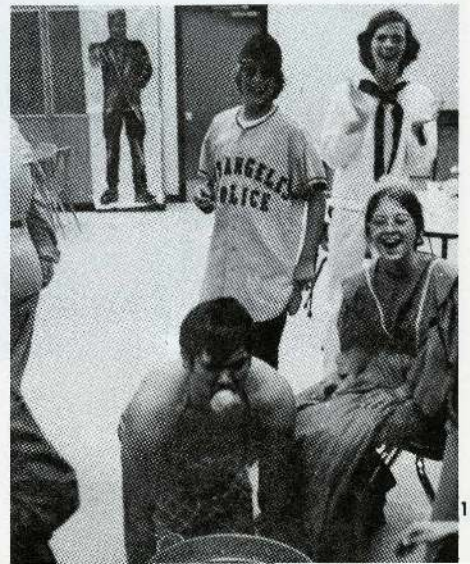


International Club had their most active year since it's existence. The club's activities consisted of a Halloween party, a banquet and a International Weekend.

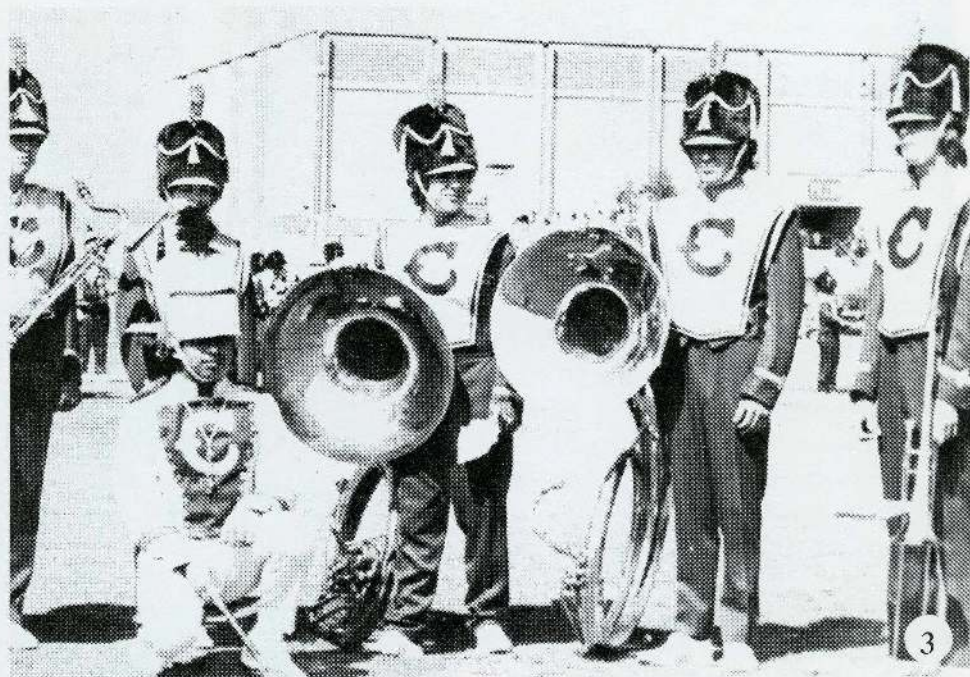
Marching Band Performs At Coliseum

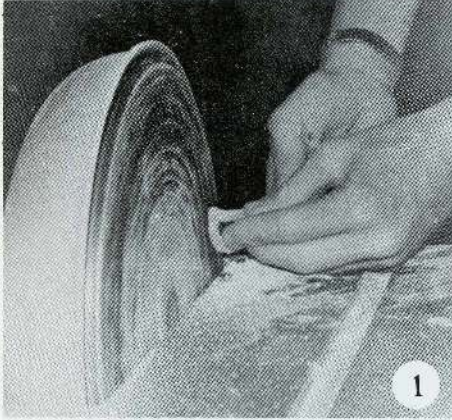

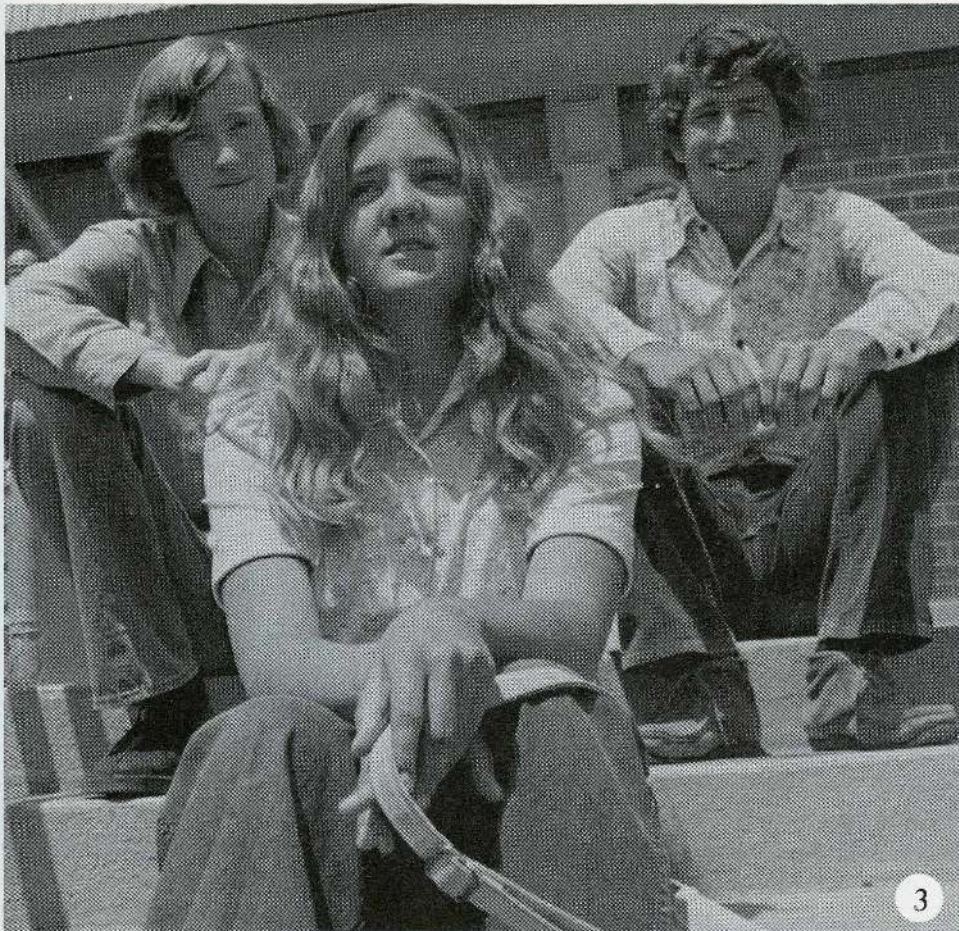
Woodcraft Launches Boat

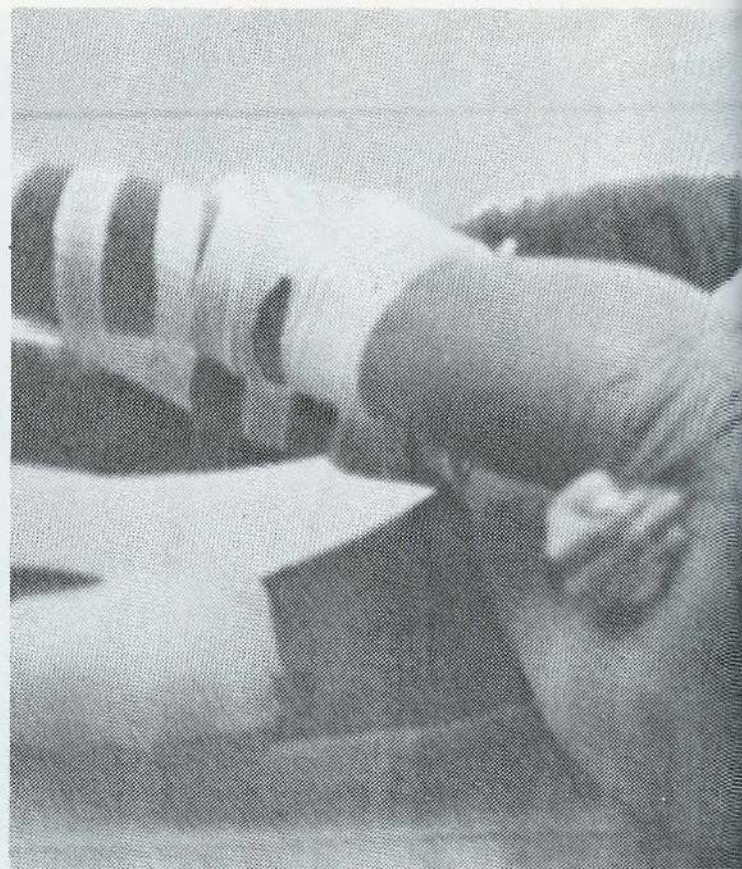
Continental Club Leaves July 1

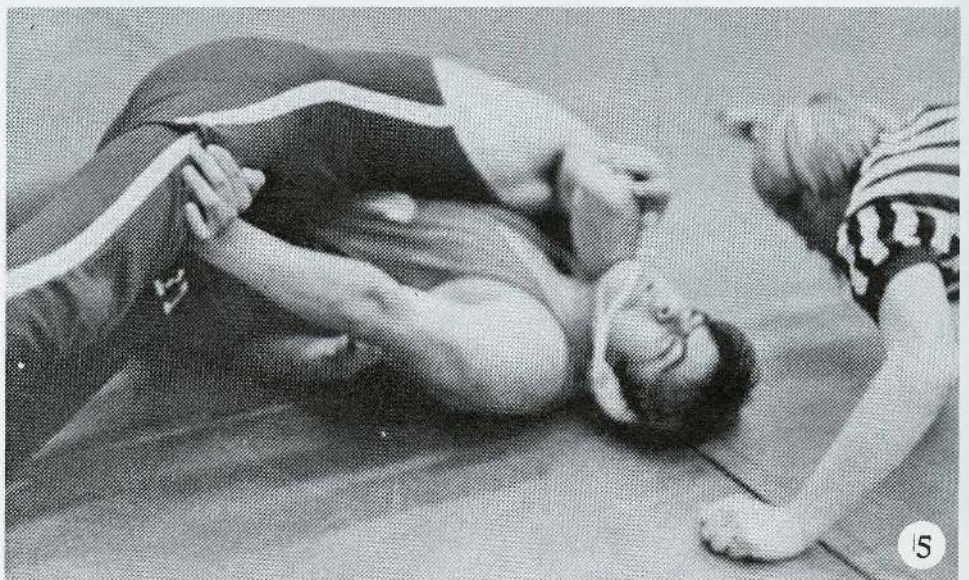

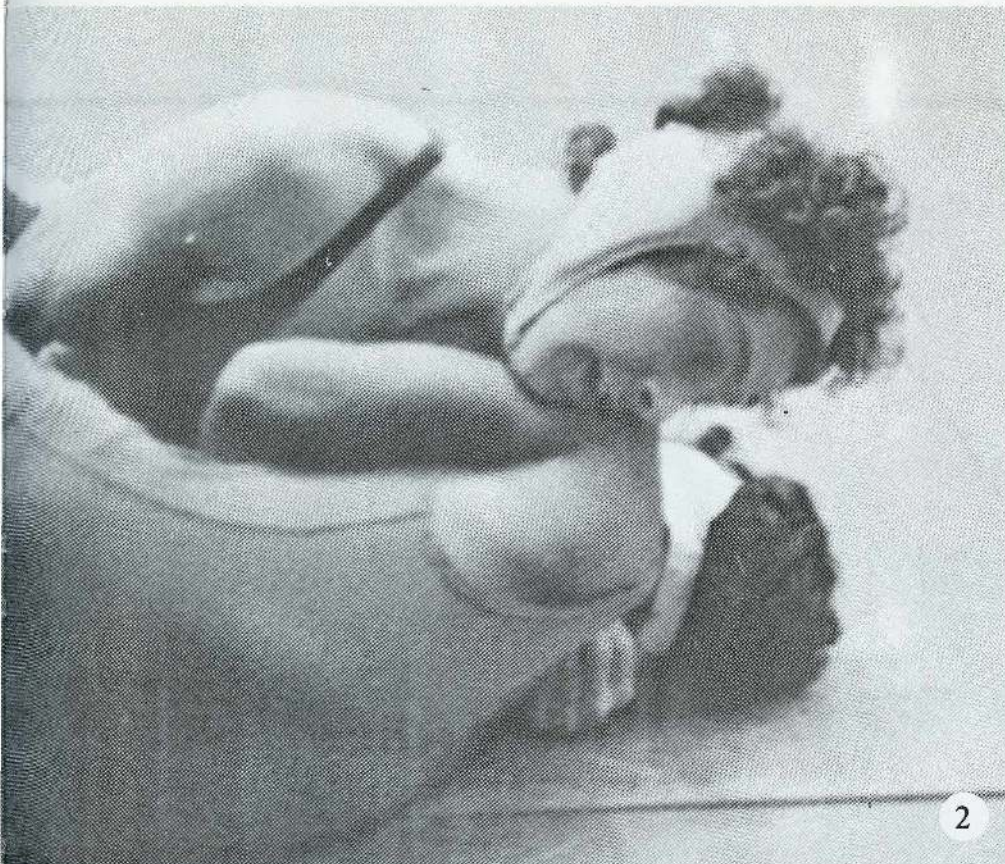

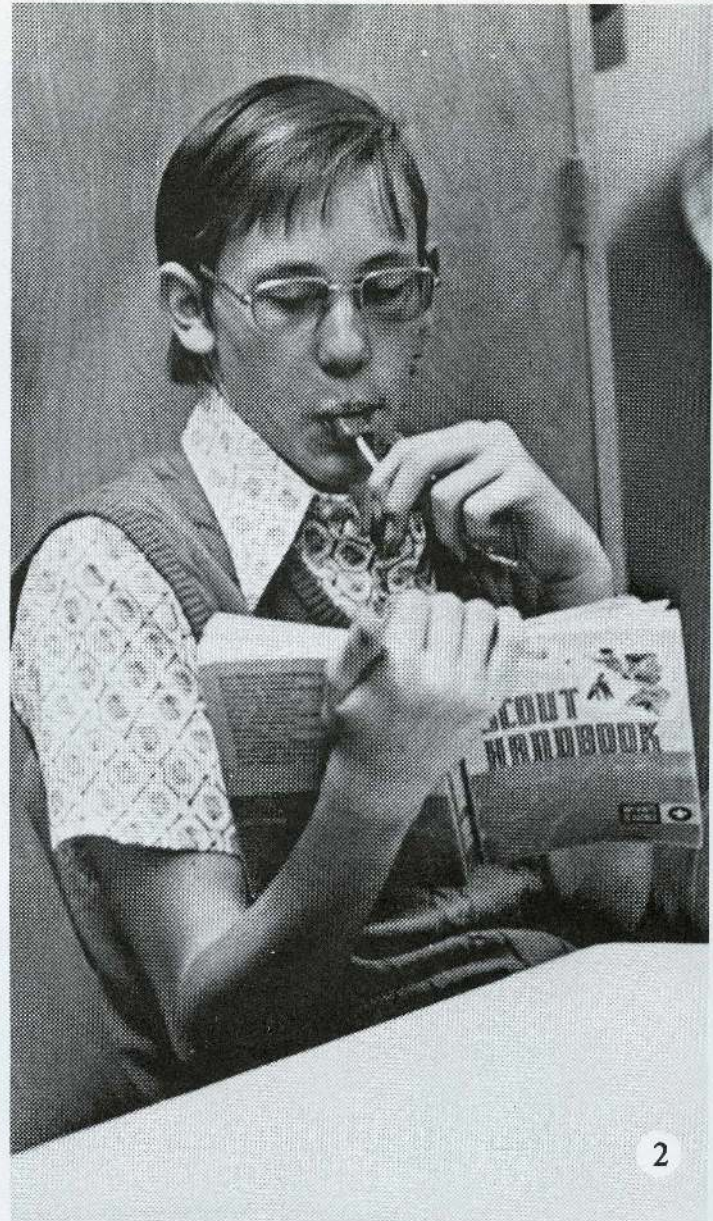
Wrestling Returns

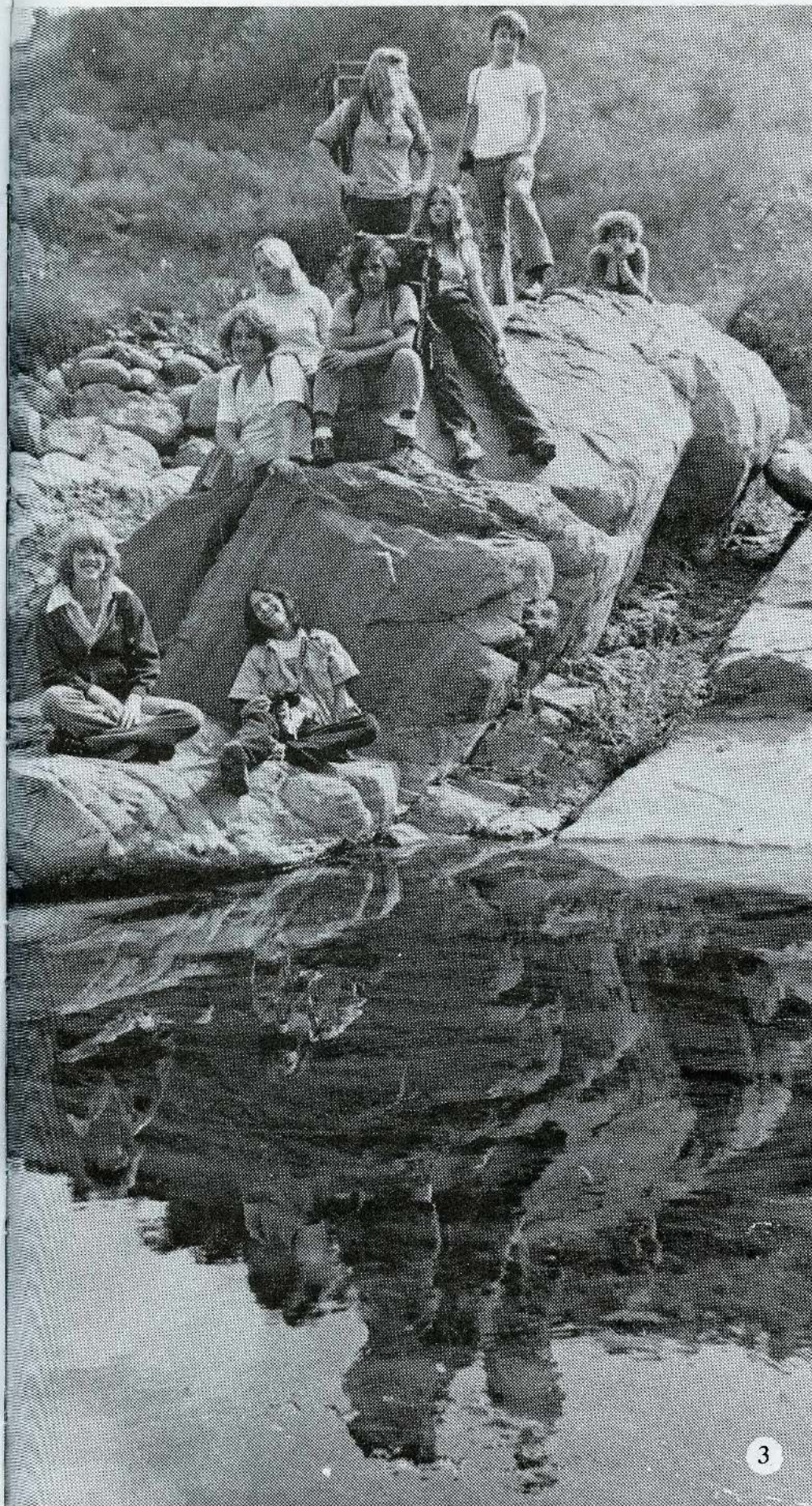

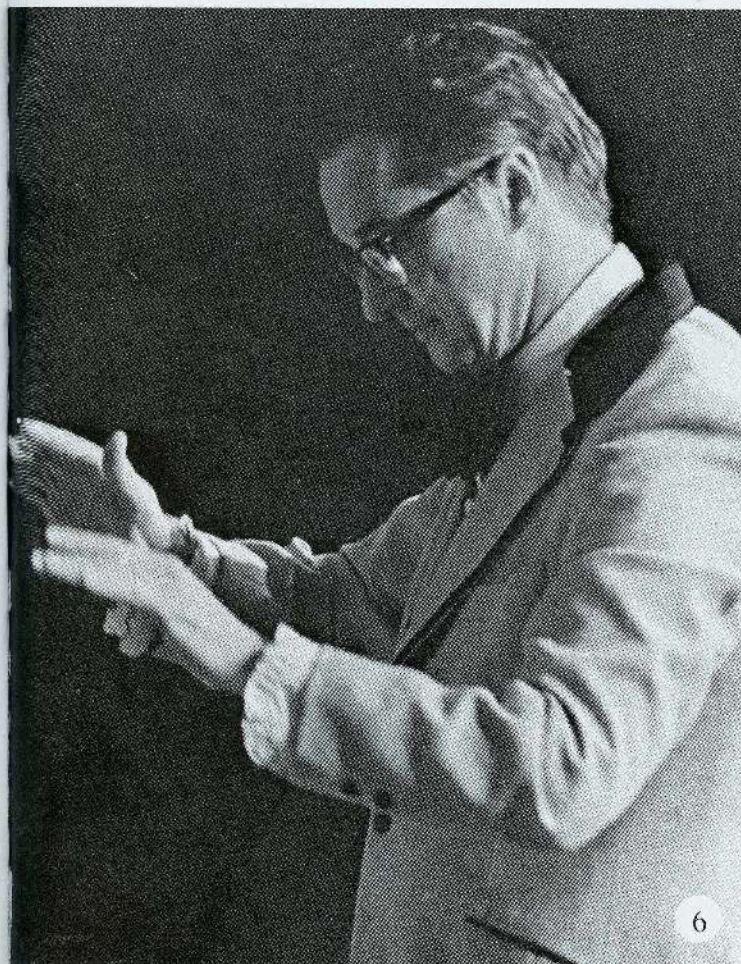
Choir Presents "Golden Years of Song"

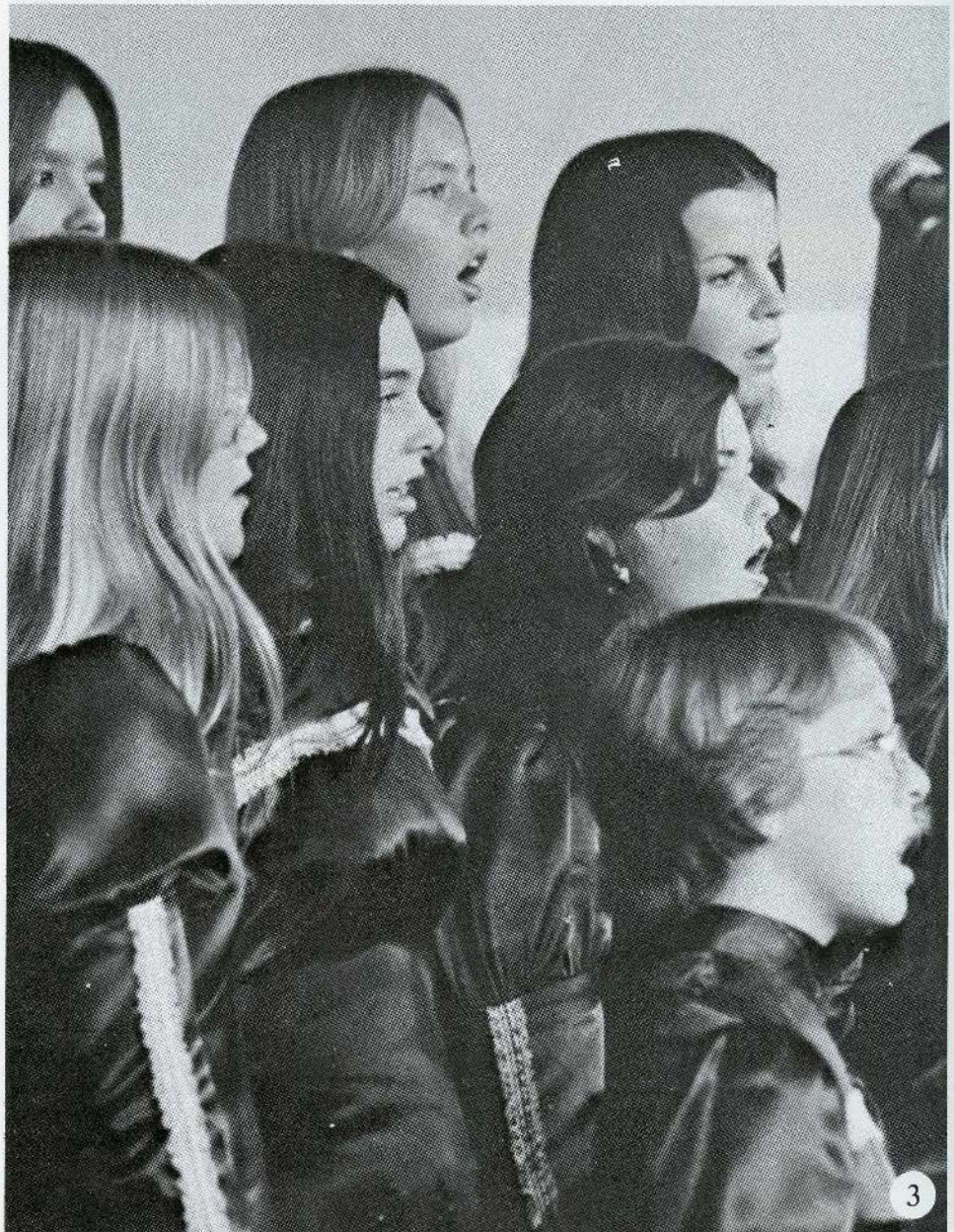
Girls Chorus Sheds Blazers

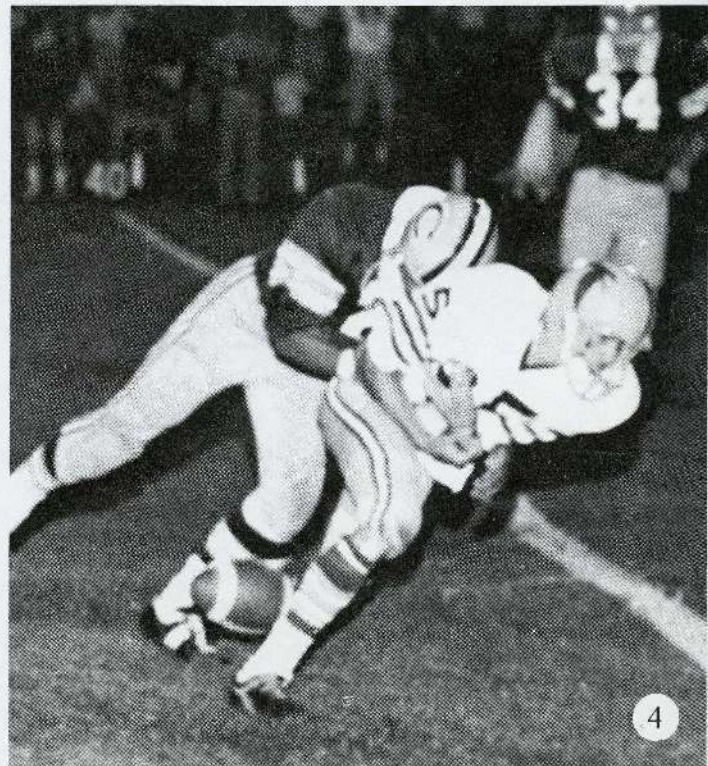
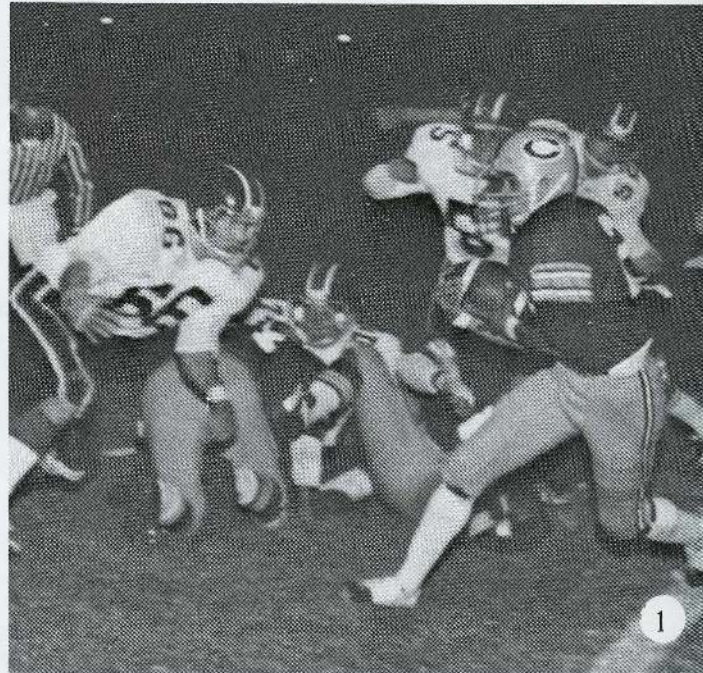
Also, during the summer, just for practice, the team played against non-league schools and never lost a game.

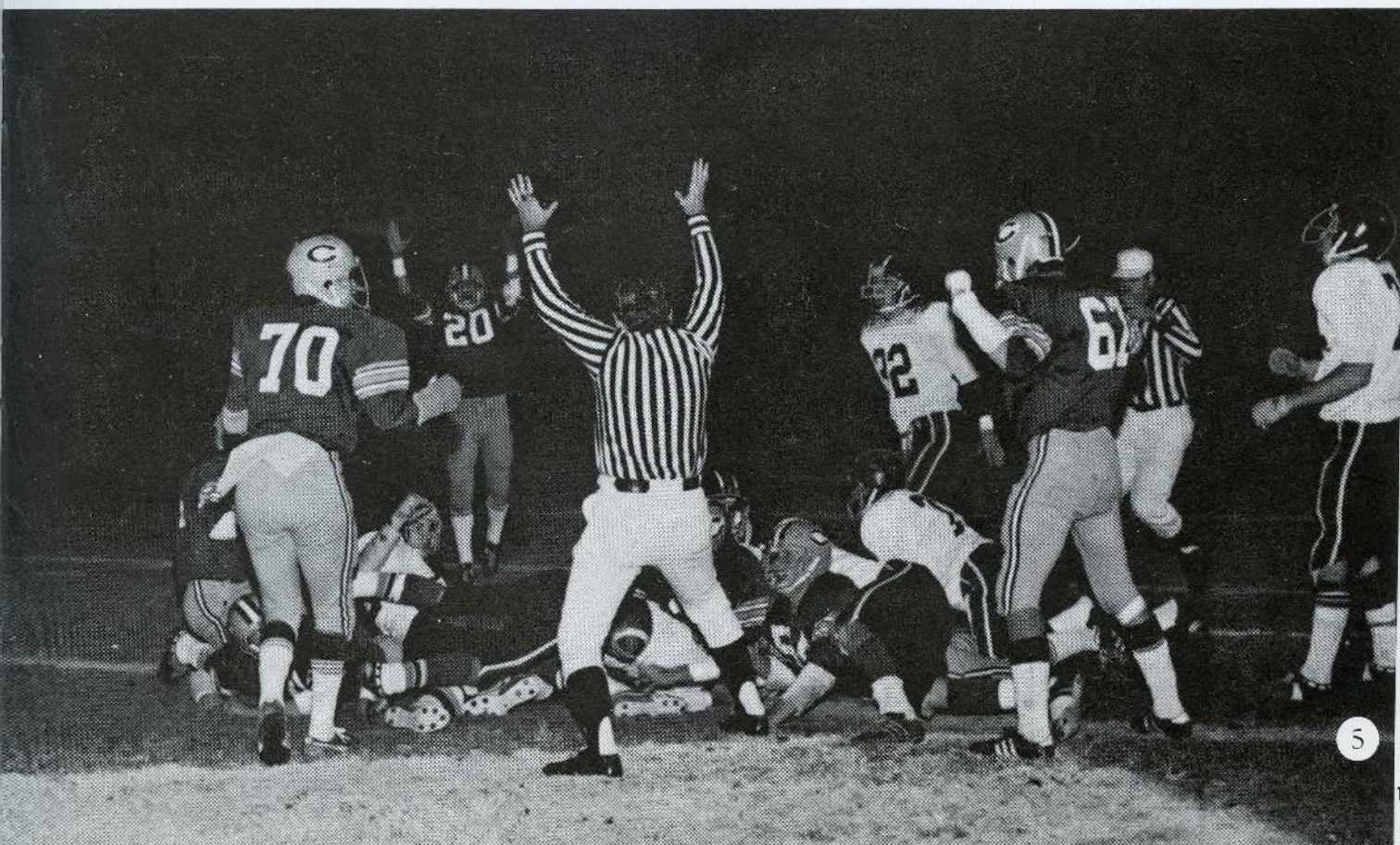

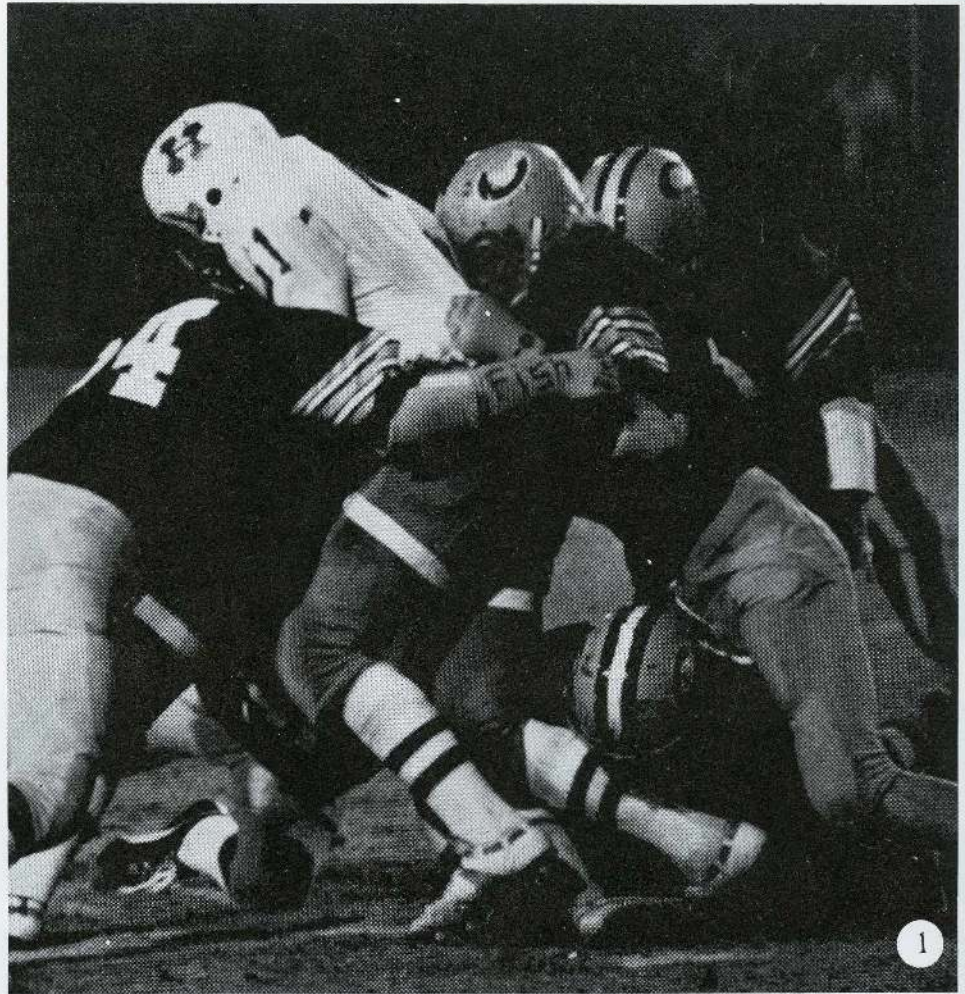


J.V. Pulls Ahead

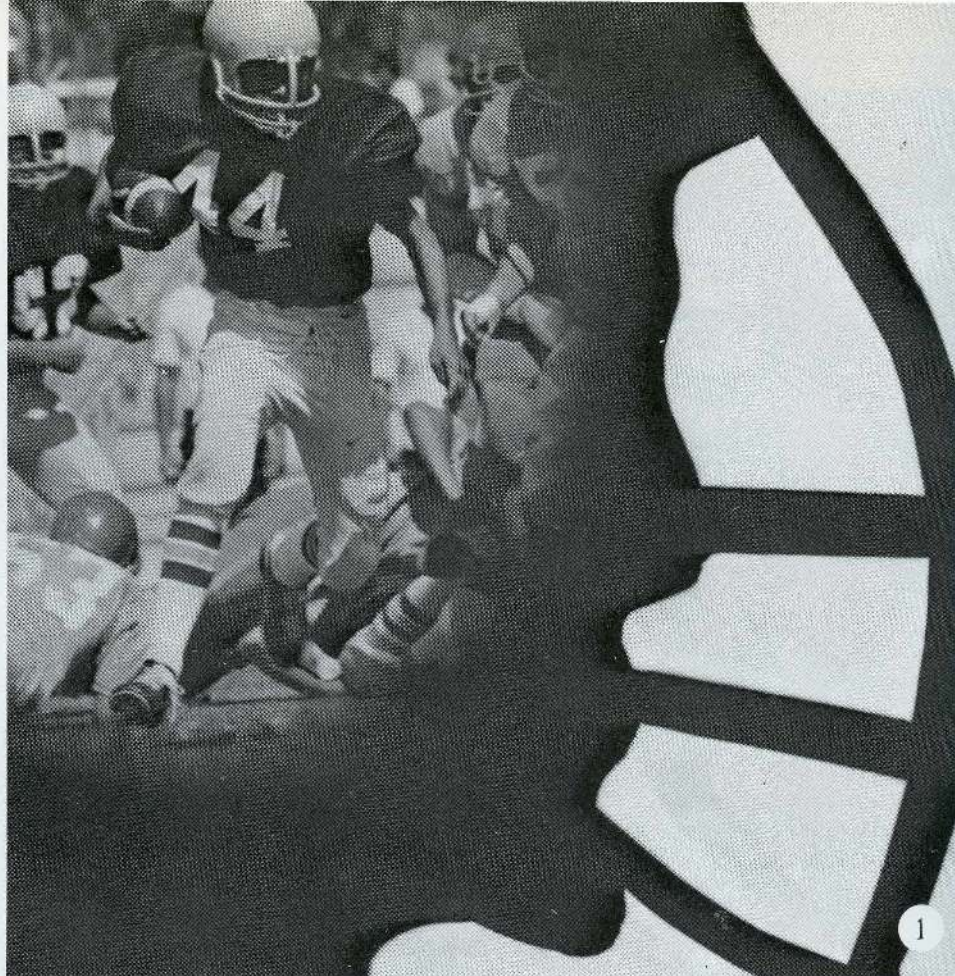

Coach Harvey should be congratulated for turning out a fantastic team. And the team should be congratulated for putting so much hard work and effort into becoming a number one team.

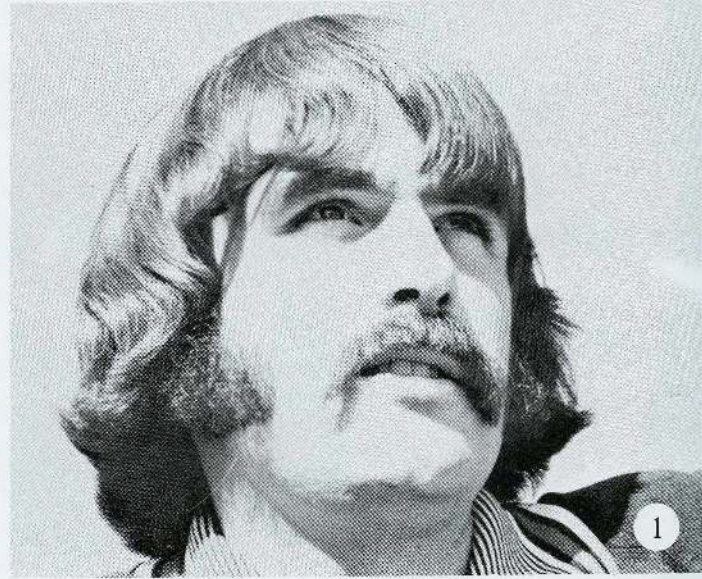
Another thing that helped was the amount of practice the team had. During the Summer they worked out nine times a week and when school started they were out 11 times a week.

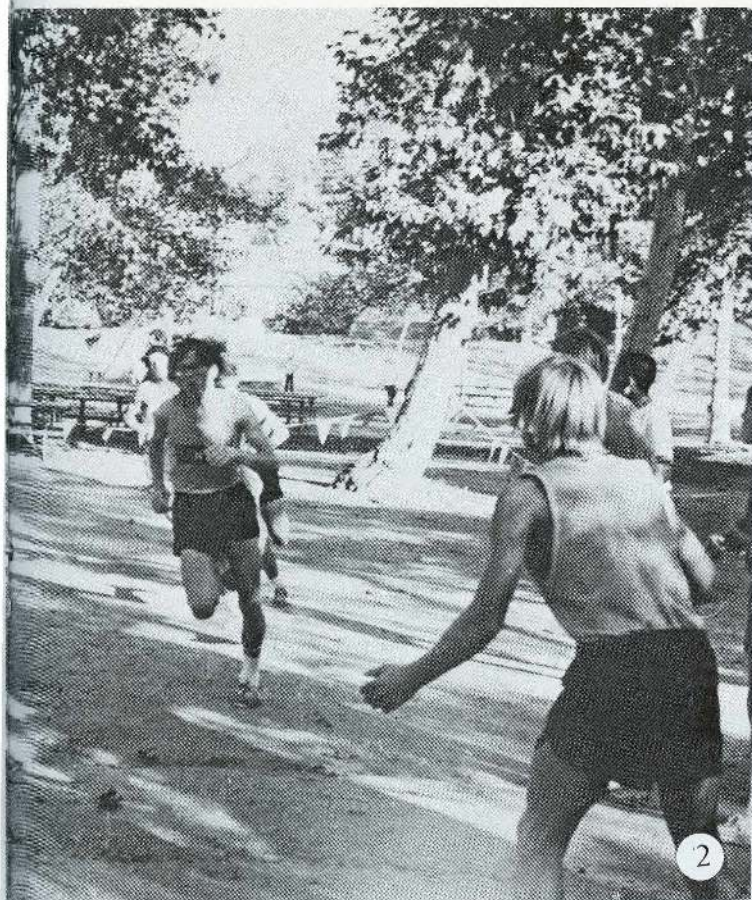

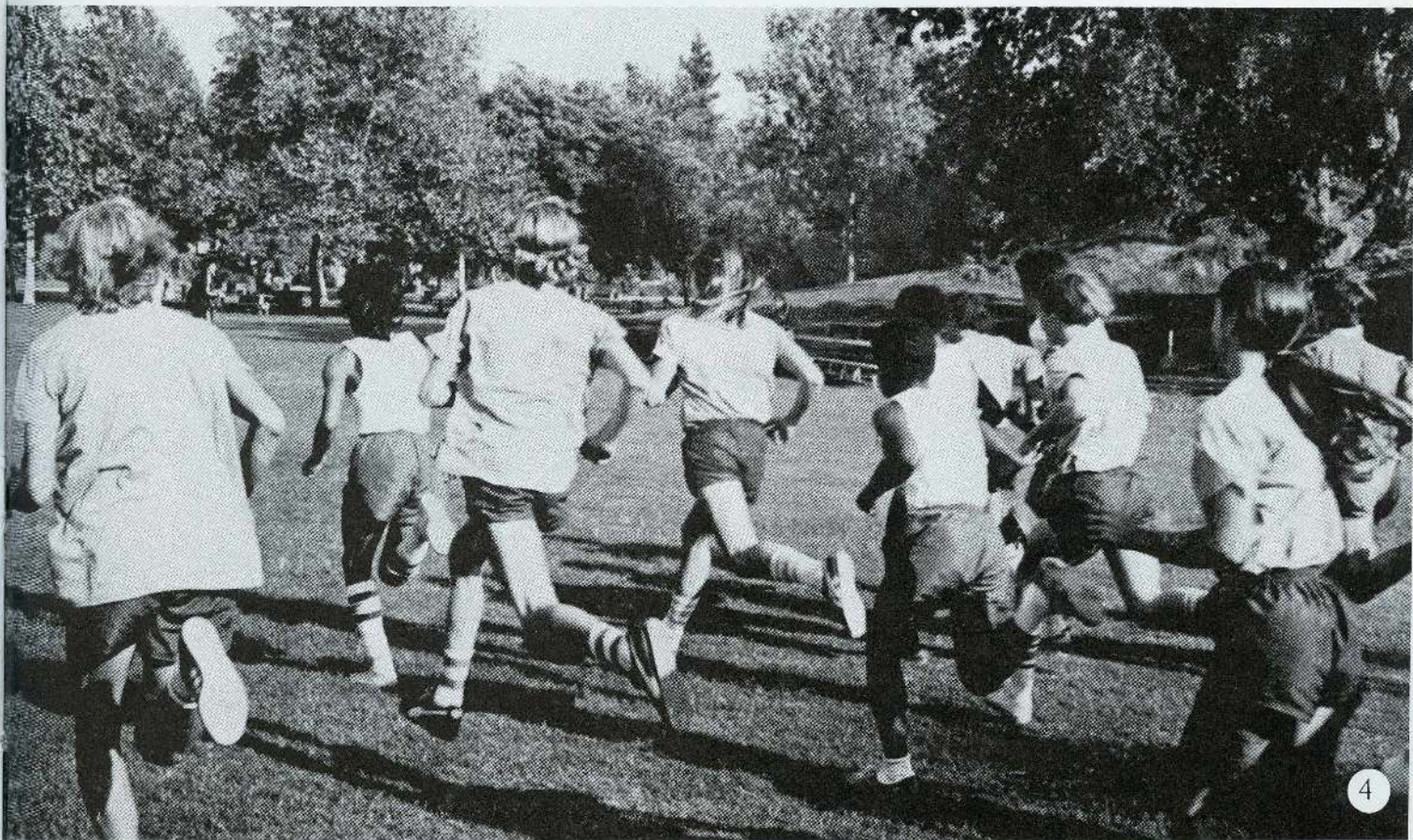

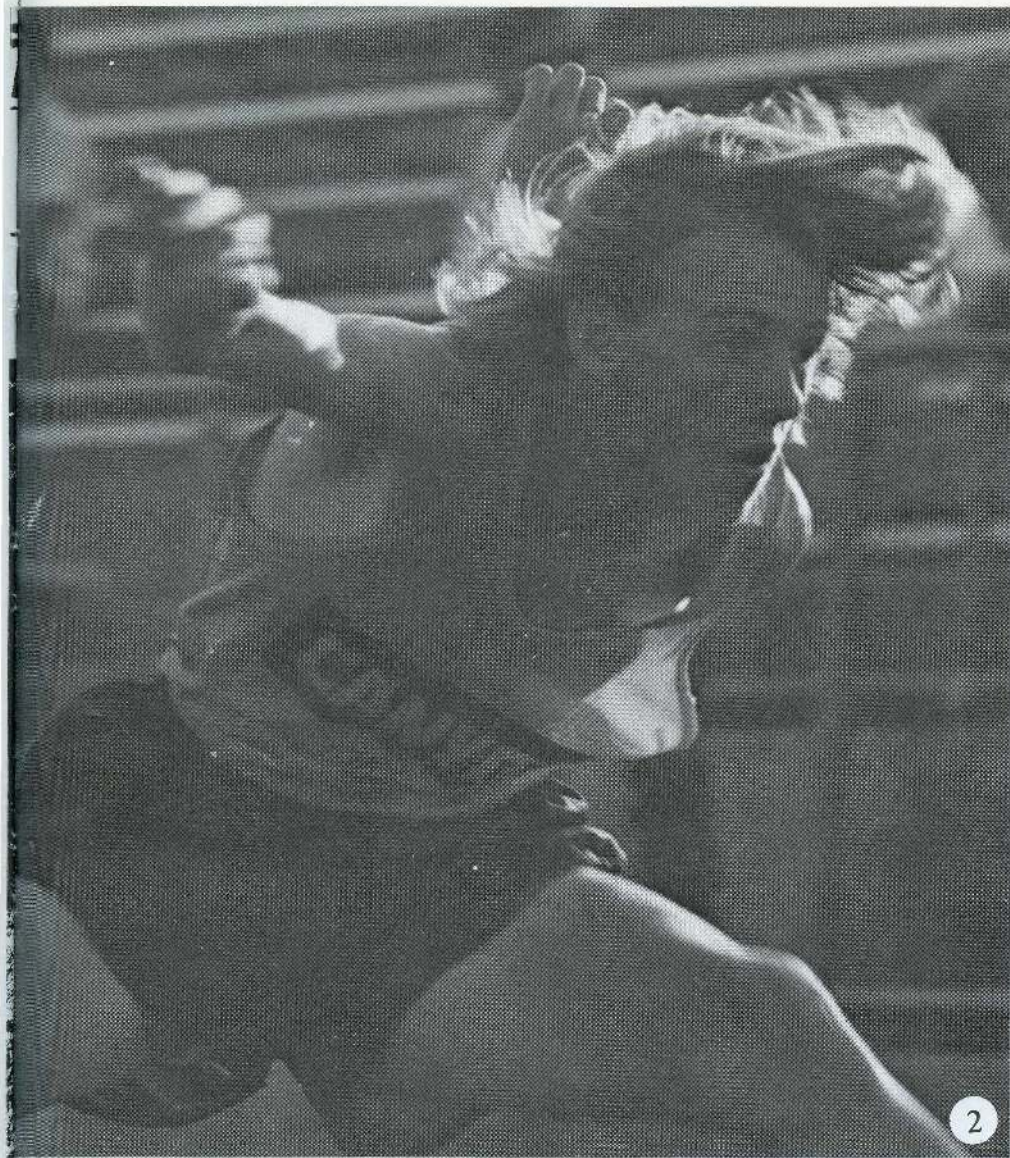


Track Sends Four To C.I.F.

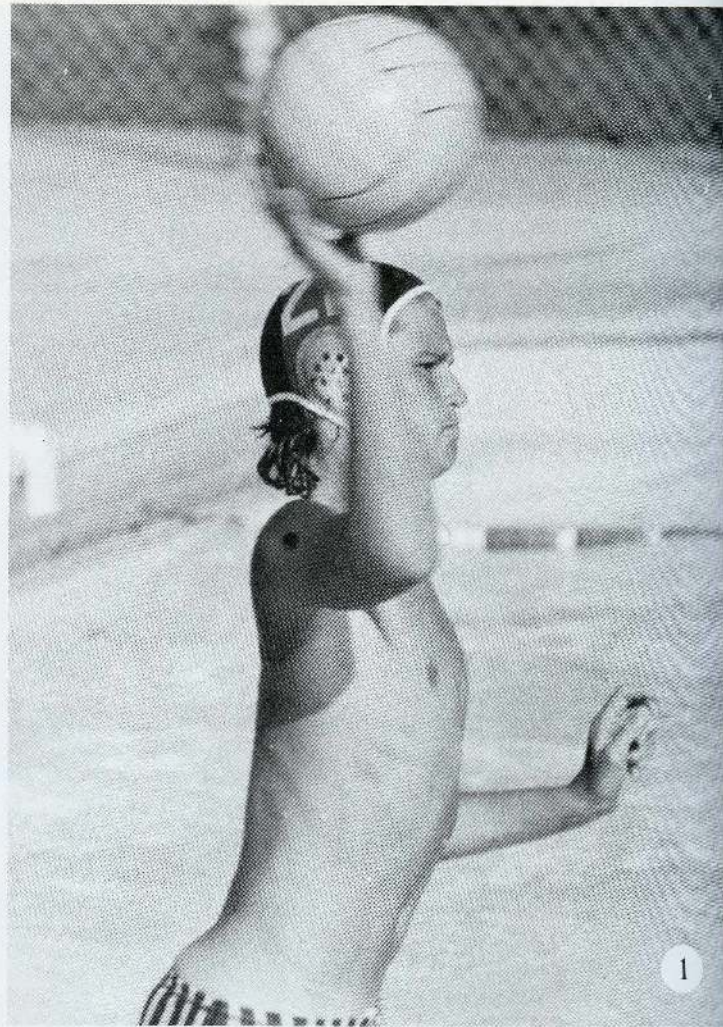

Coach Newman, who was new this year, set up a grueling practice schedule that was designed to perpetuate a strong foundation for future generations of Water Polo.

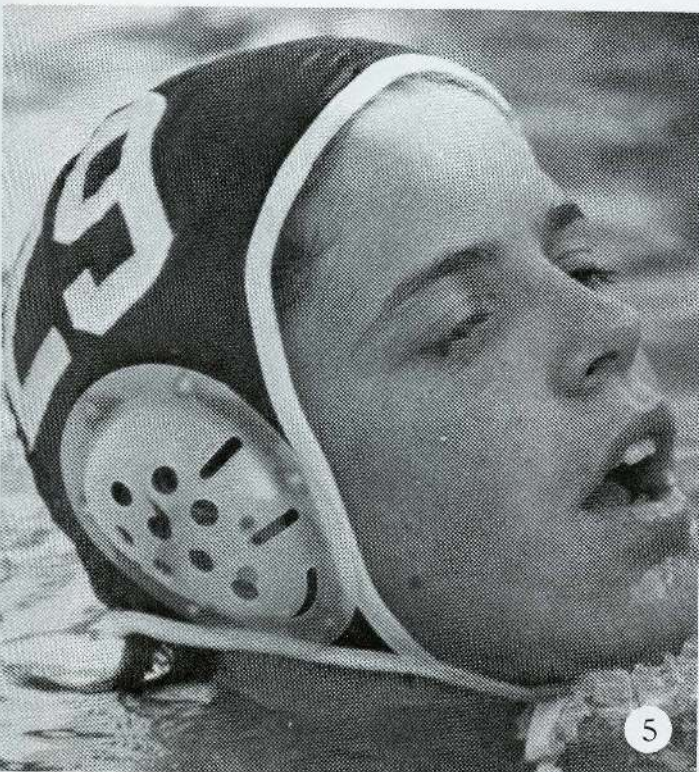

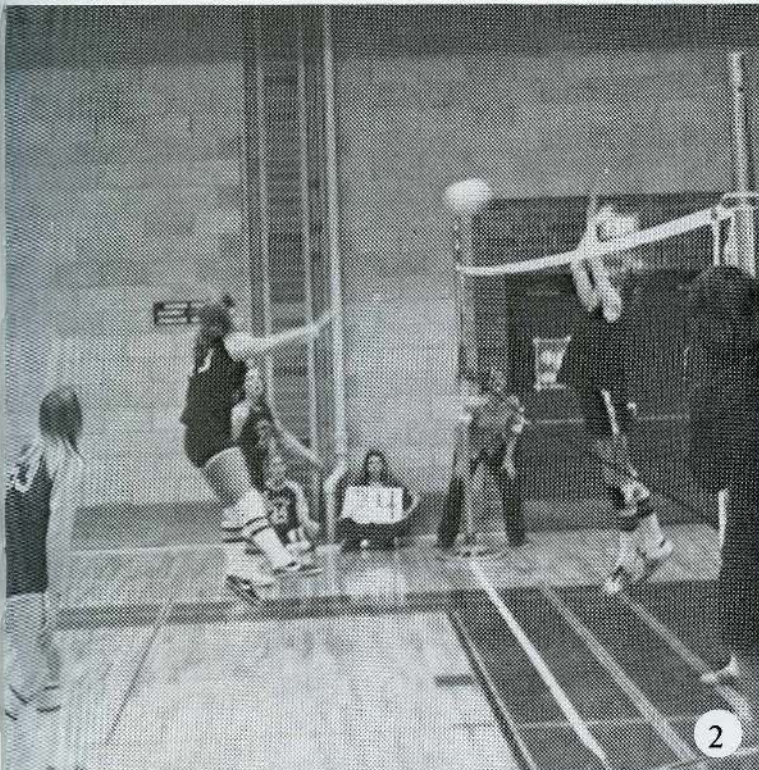
Girls Volleyball Changes Leagues

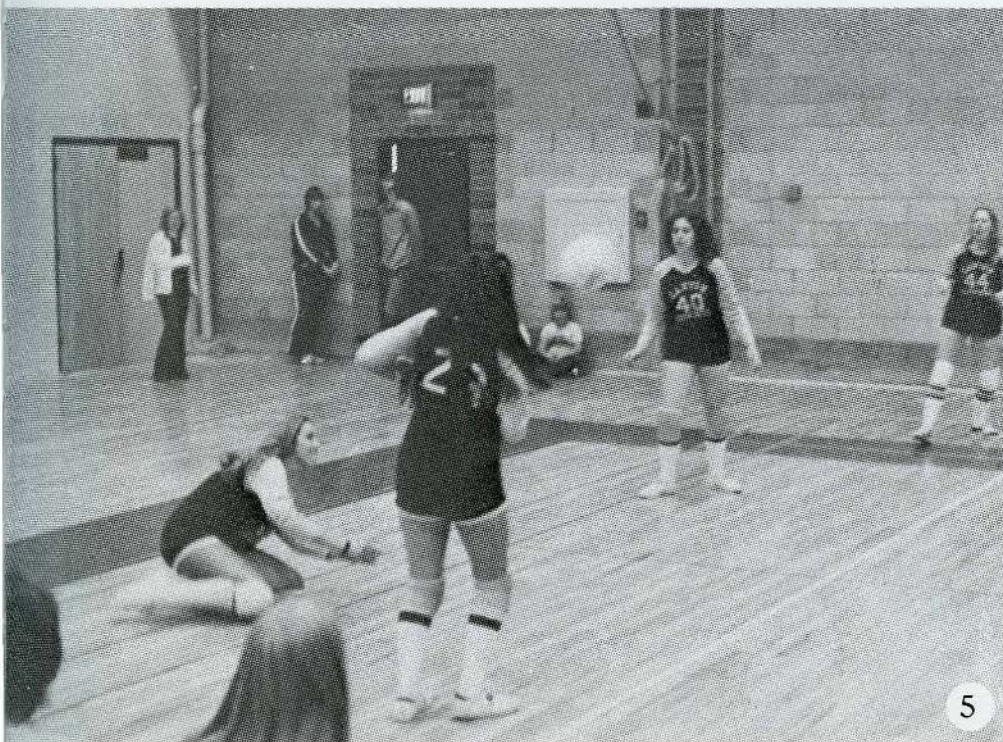
But Canyon's best was not enough. The girls ended the season with a large number of losses. Canyon fought hard, and lost their games by very few points.

Tennis Bounces Back With Winning Season

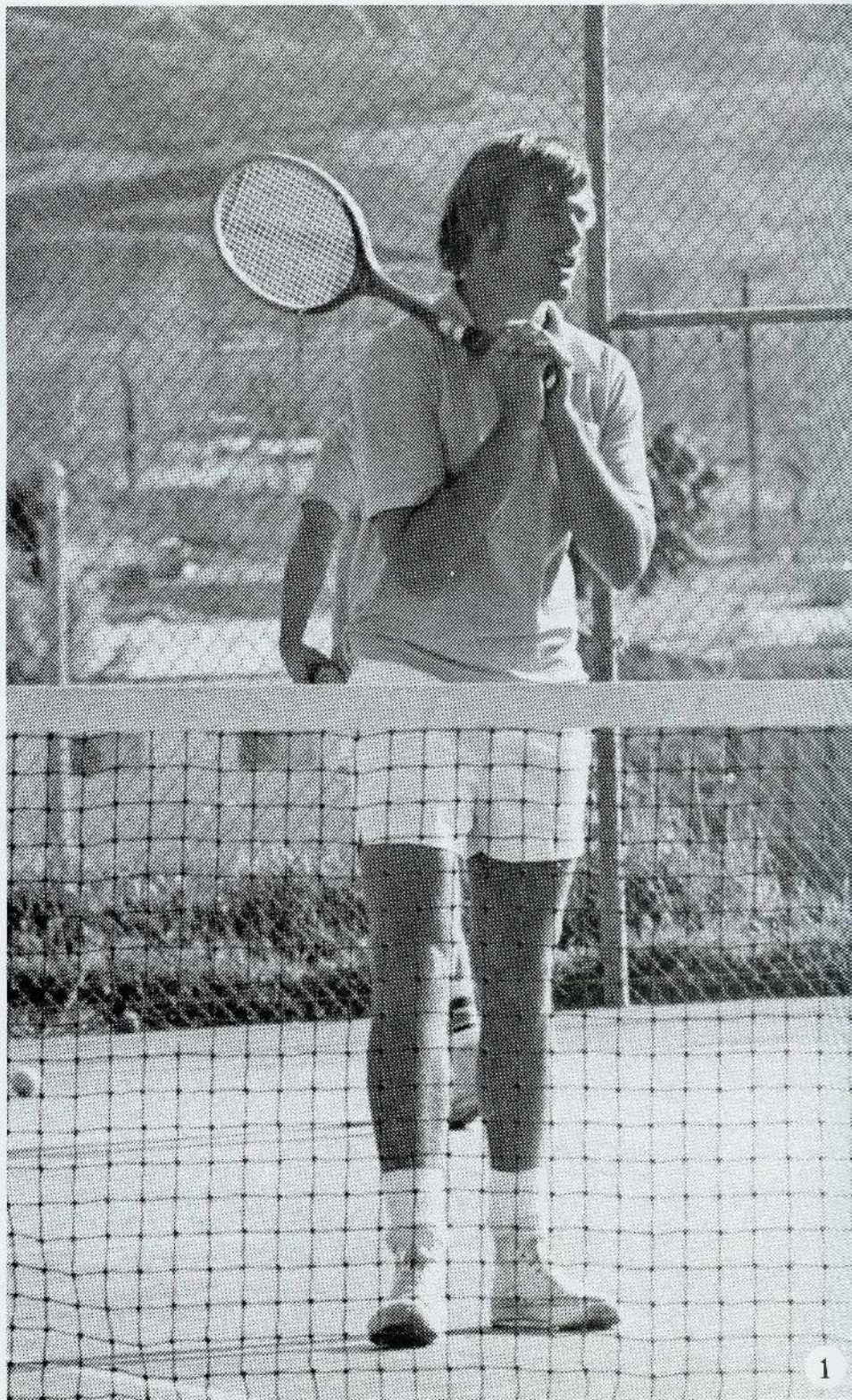

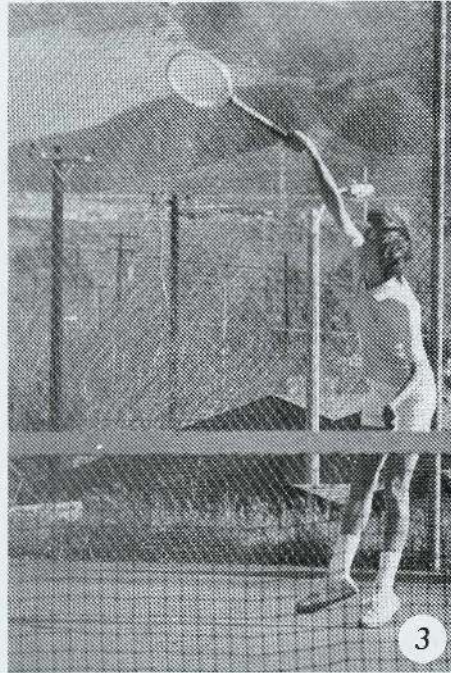
The awards at the annual Tennis banquet went to Tracy Oswell, most valuable, and Jim Merriles, most improved.

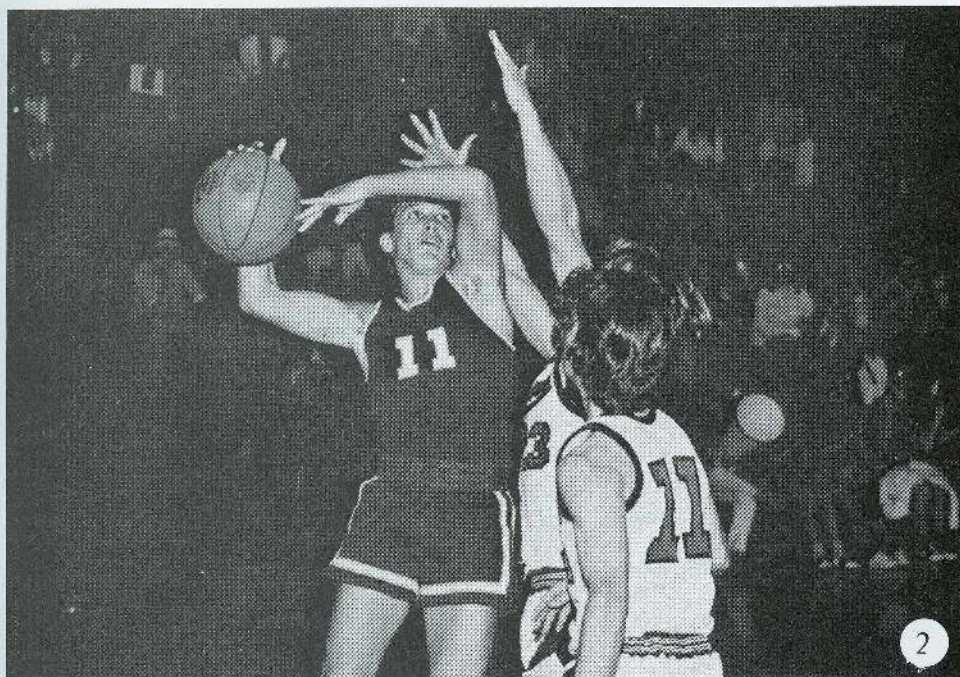

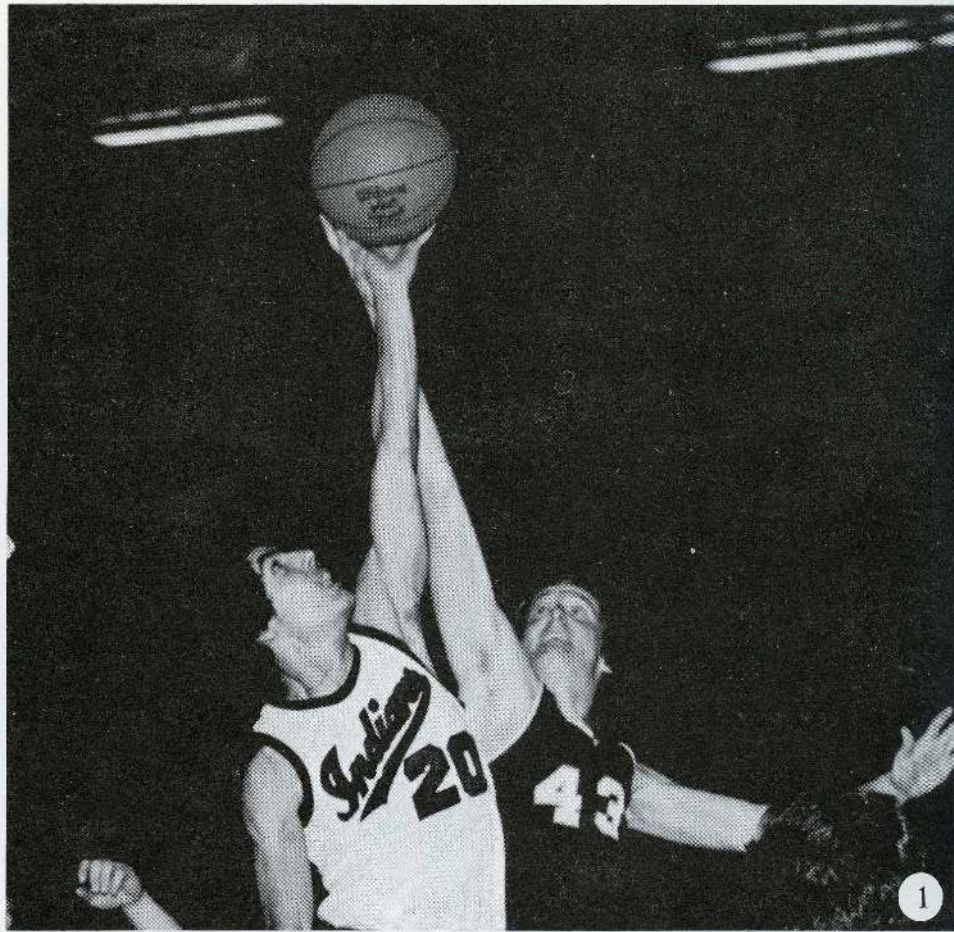
The team which had a membership of 10, was dominated by sophomores and was coached by Mr. Craig Saliburg.

At the end of the season, Terry Sanks was named most valuable player.



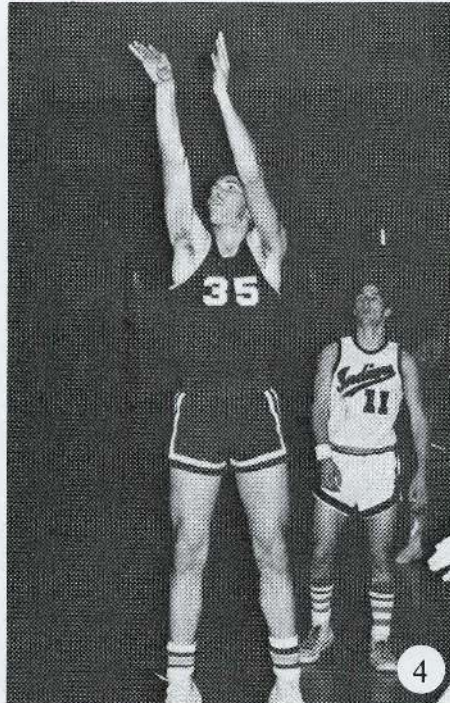

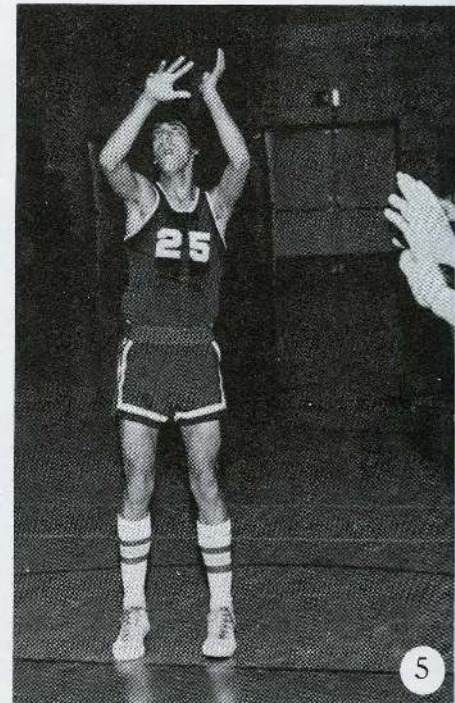

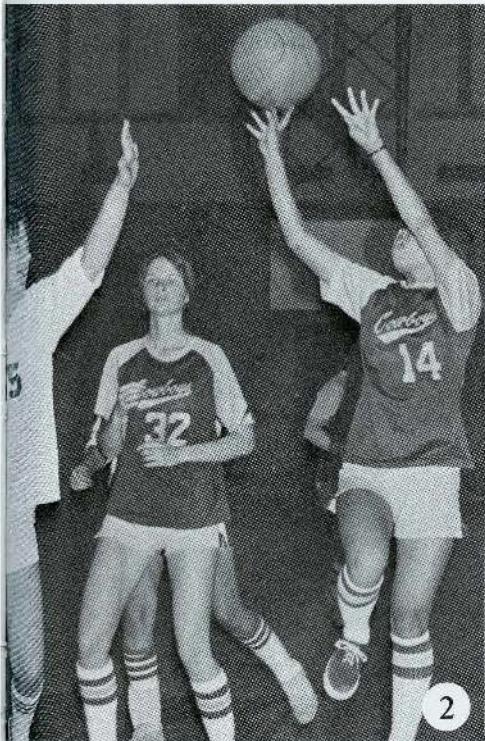

Although spirit and score was low at times throughout the basketball season, the action of the Freshman and Sophomore games were never boring.

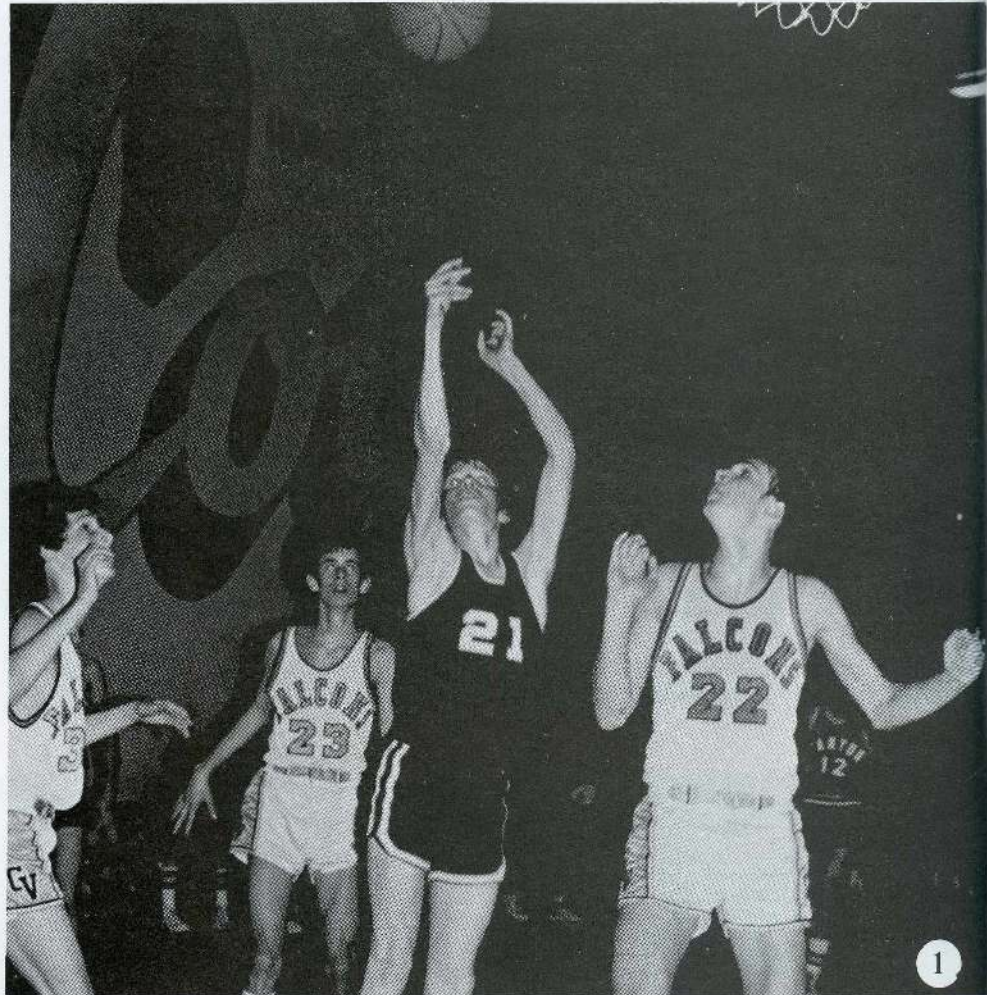

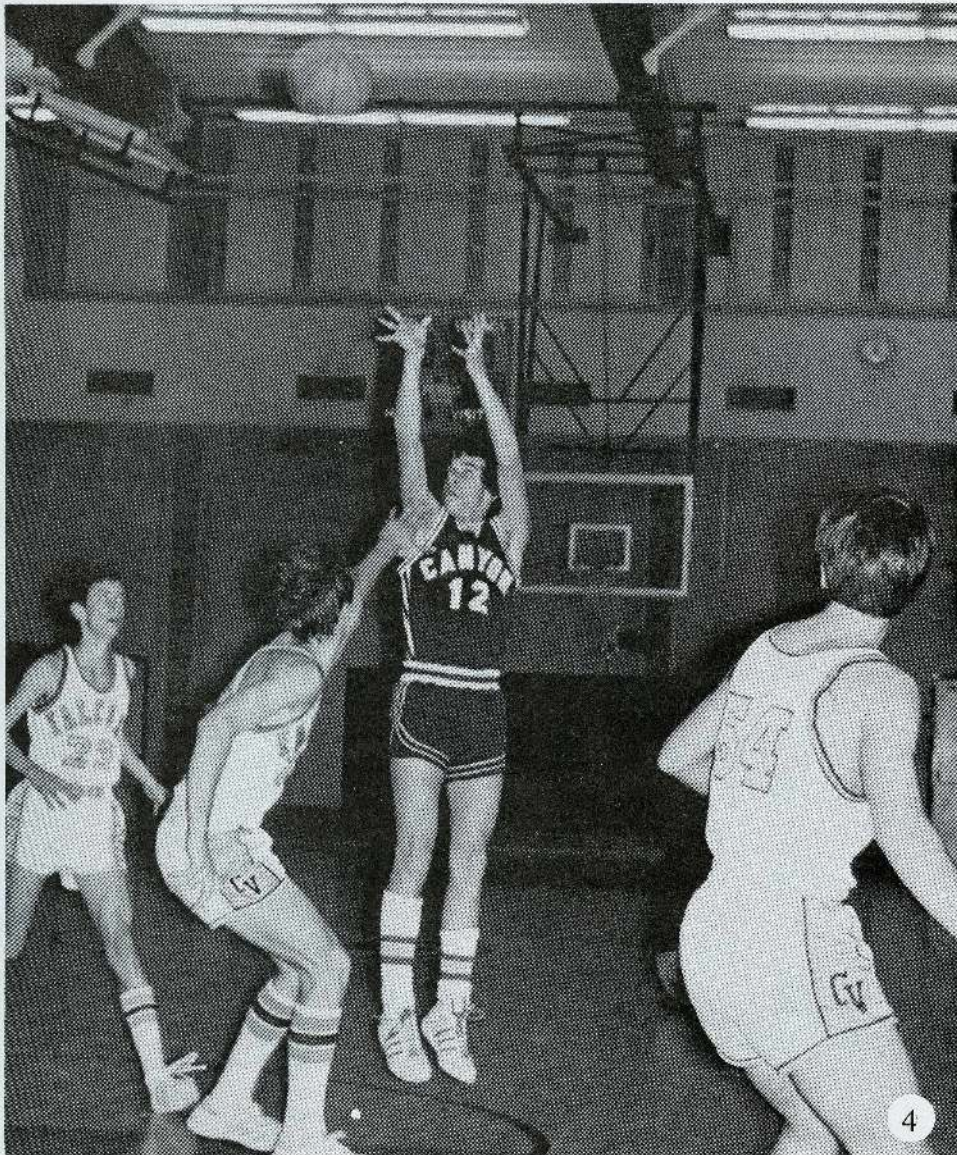
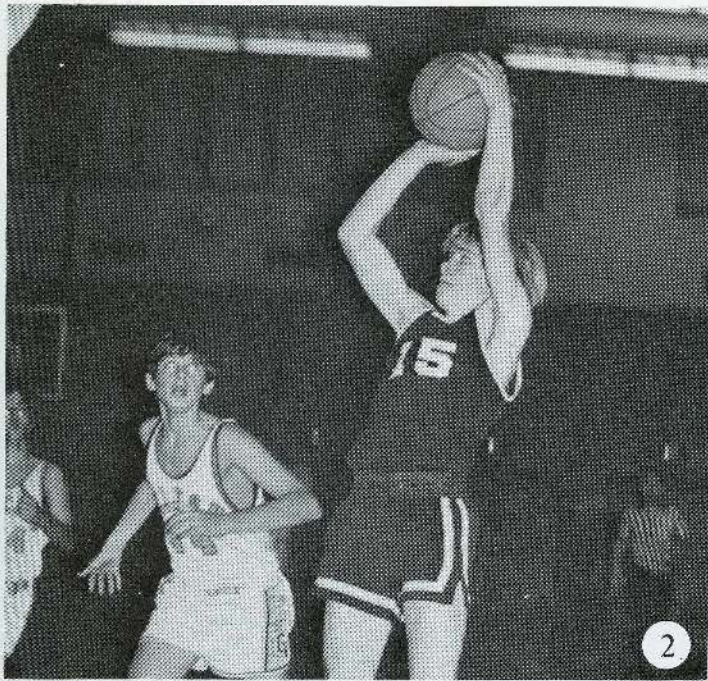
By the end of the season the Freshman managed to claim eight games out of 20. While the Sophomores picked up only three of the 20 games played.

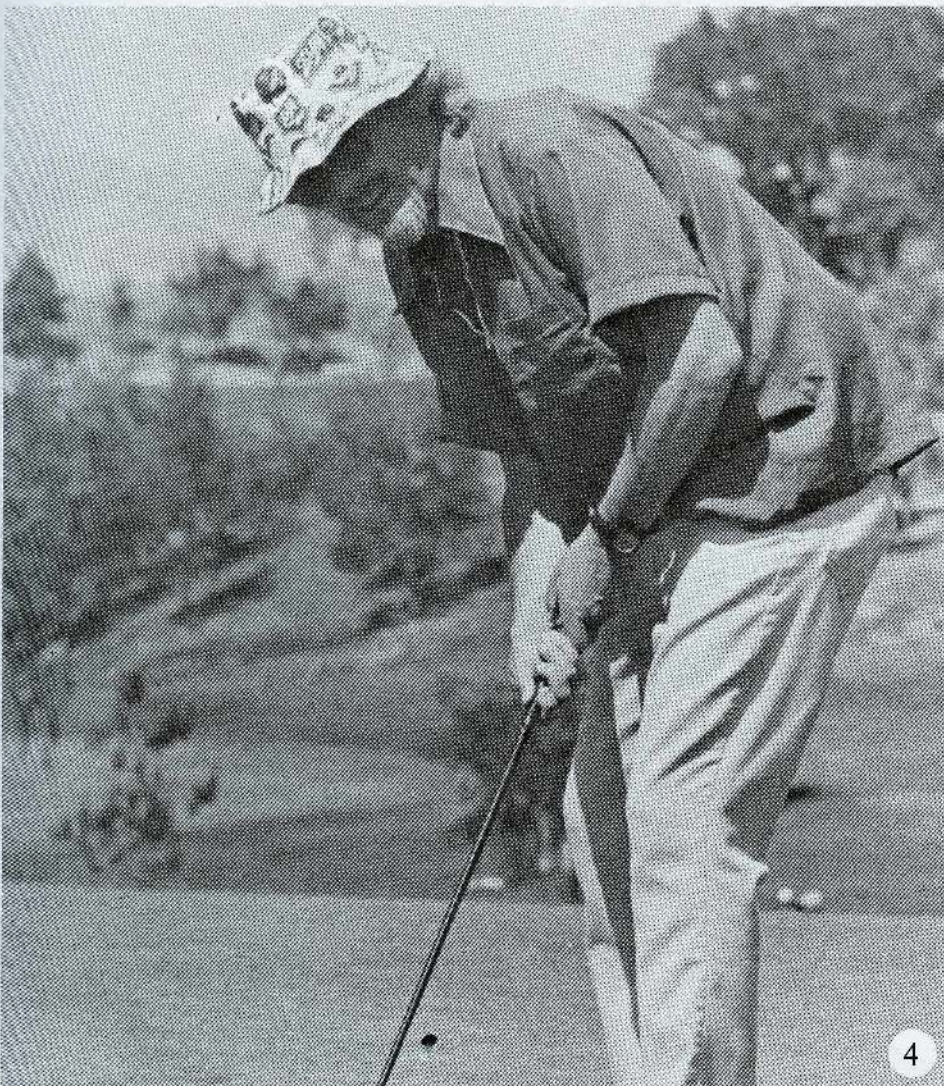




Freshmen Swing With Spirit In Golf

Coach Kilgore ended the season by showing true spirit when he said; "You don't mind losing as long as you're enjoying yourself."



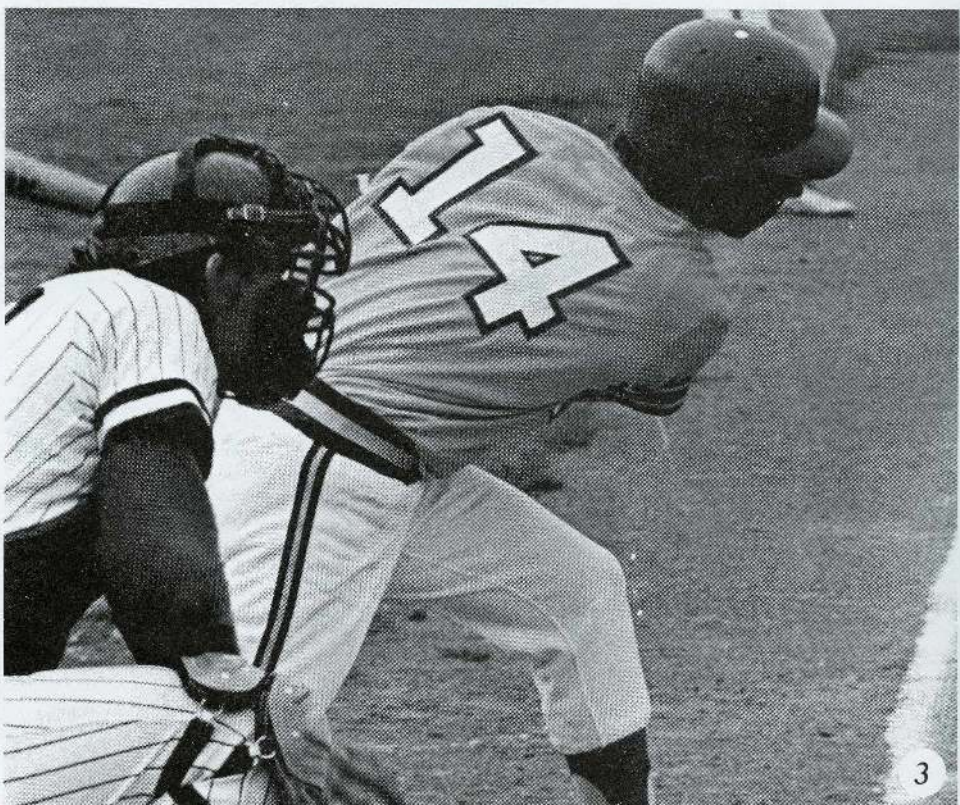
