



In addition to answering visitor questions between 11:00 and 4:00 on Saturdays and Sundays, museum volunteers also have an opportunity to learn from our visitors. For example, the students always think the atlatl on display in the Great Basin Room is a fishing rod, and they are really surprised and interested when she tells them that it is actually a spear thrower.

Volunteer Raven Magpie-Rivera also provides Thursday school programs. Raven is from the Cheyenne and Sioux Nations, and she enjoys sharing her culture and values with the kids. She also likes volunteering because she always learns something new.

Raven is an artist, so her favorite program is the 5<sup>th</sup> grade clay activity, where students create a small clay bowl.

In addition to interacting with visitors, volunteers have a monthly potluck brunch to meet up with each other. The meeting includes communication tips and a short program on the museum or its collections.

Volunteers who dedicate 96 hours a year earn a day use pass good in the Tehachapi District parks (including the Poppy Reserve, Red Rock Canyon, and Silverwood Lake). Volunteers who dedicate over 200 hours a year earn a day use pass good at most of the 263 California State Parks.




Save the Date - Annual Museum Celebration
