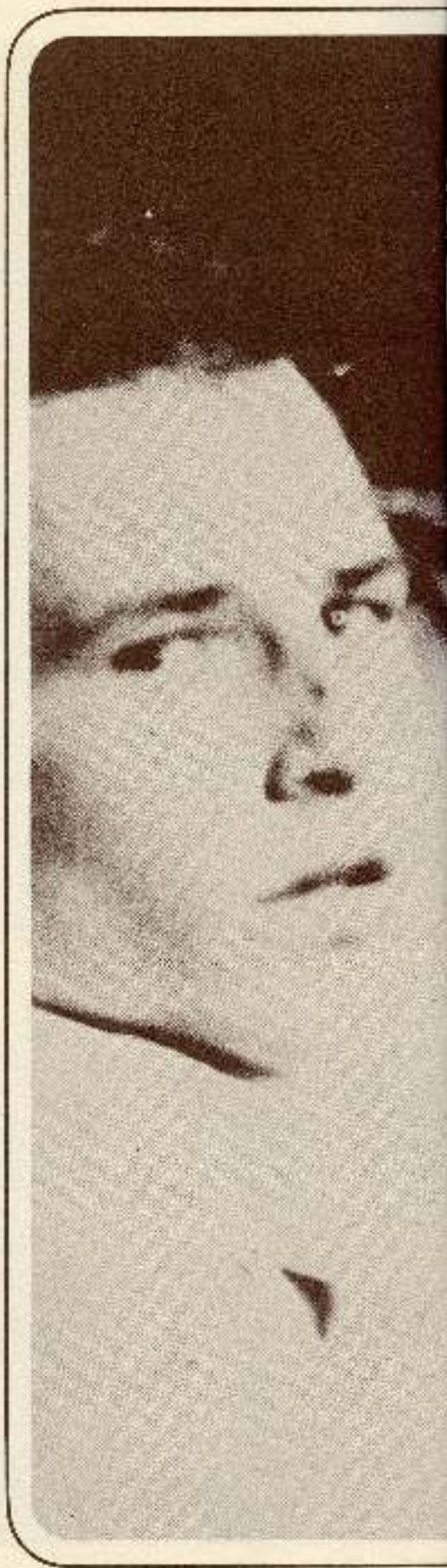
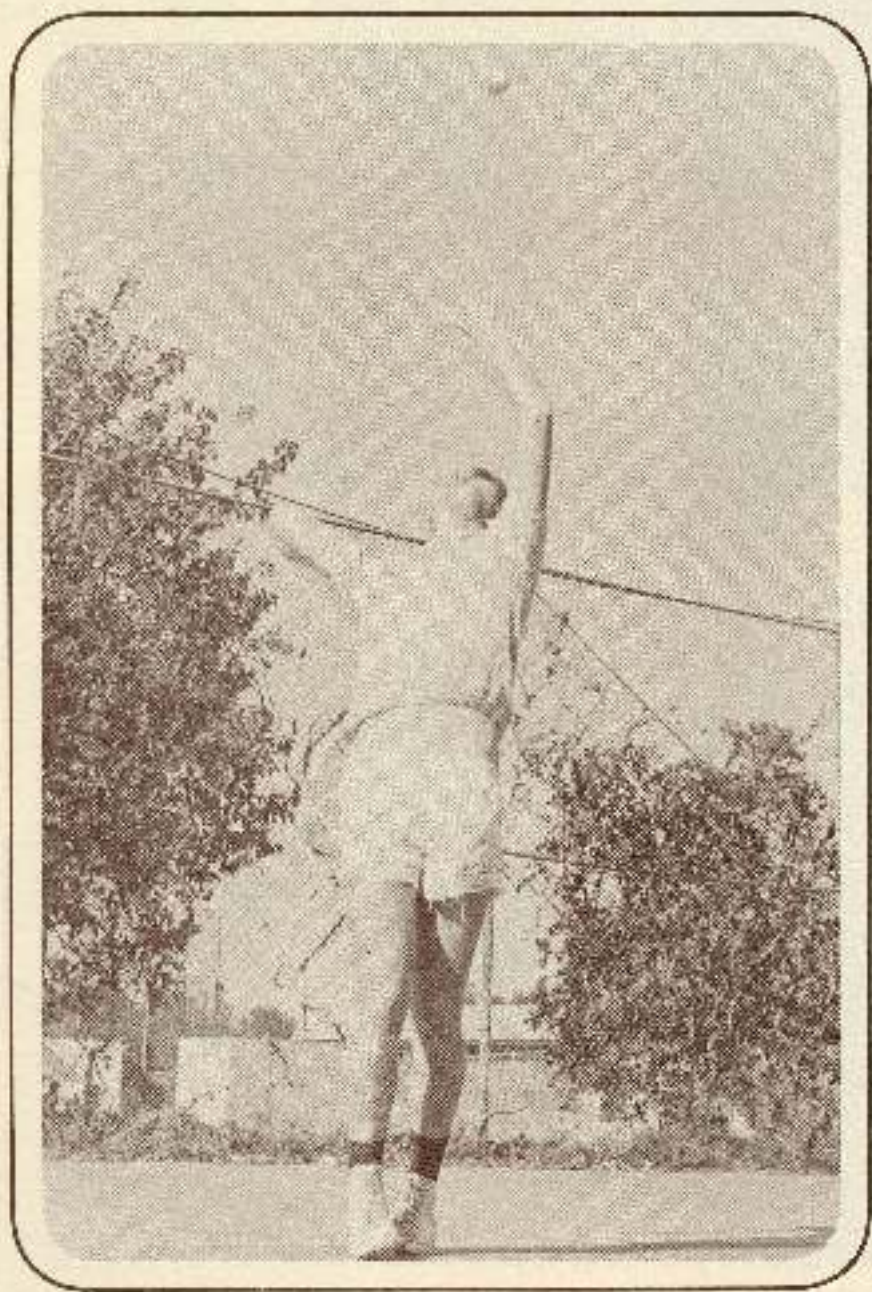
## *A time to weep and a time to laugh*

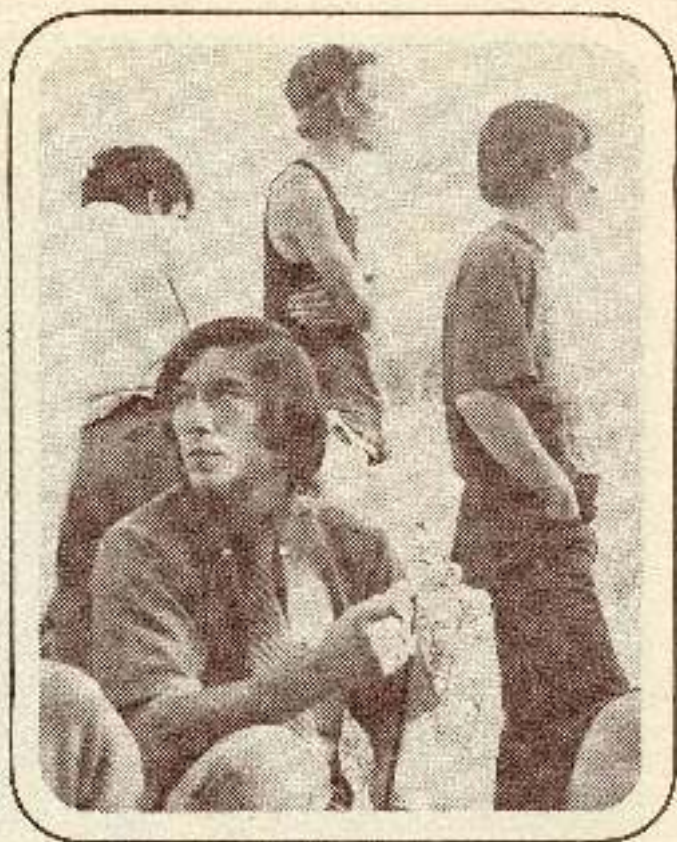


## *A time to get and a time to lose*

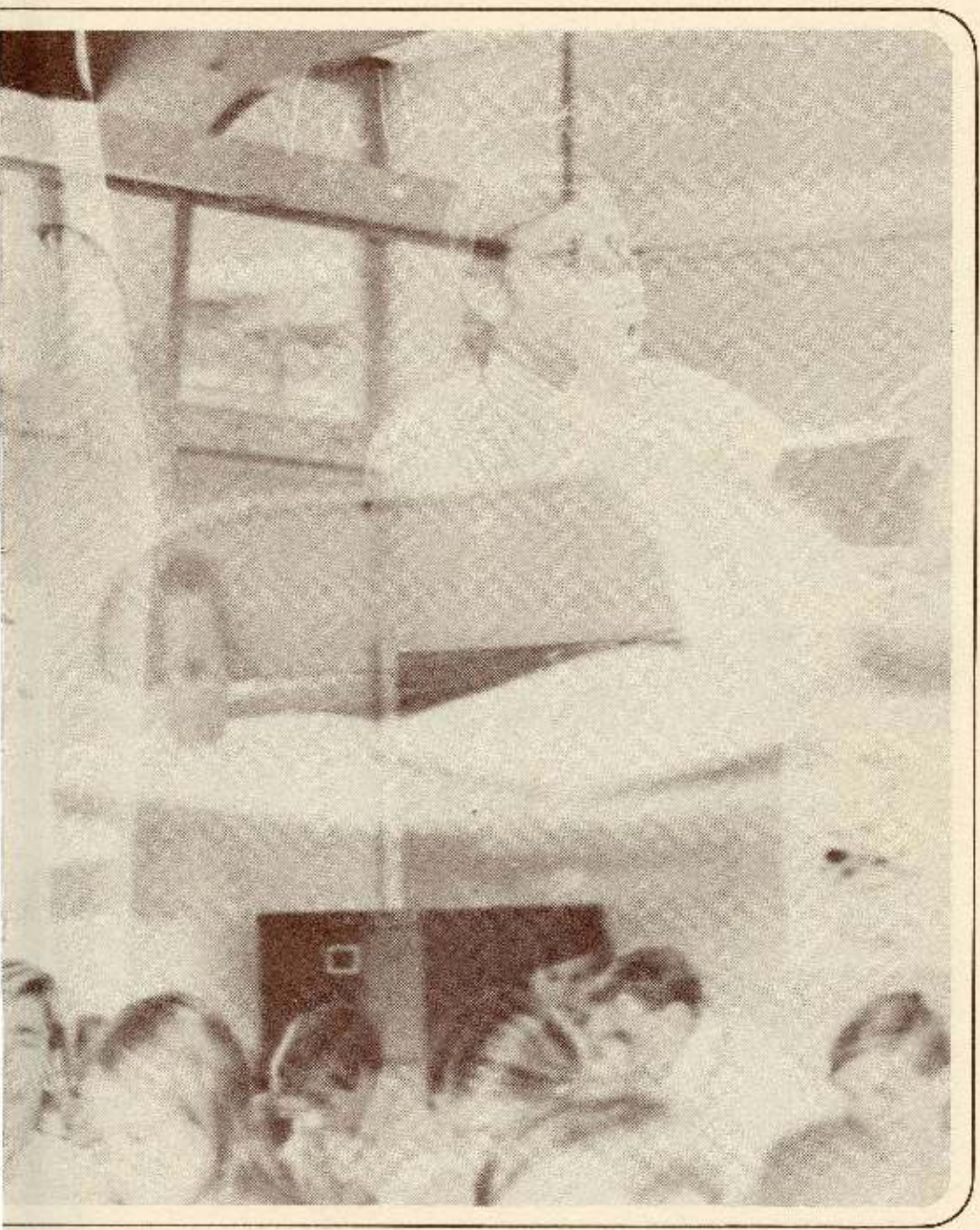


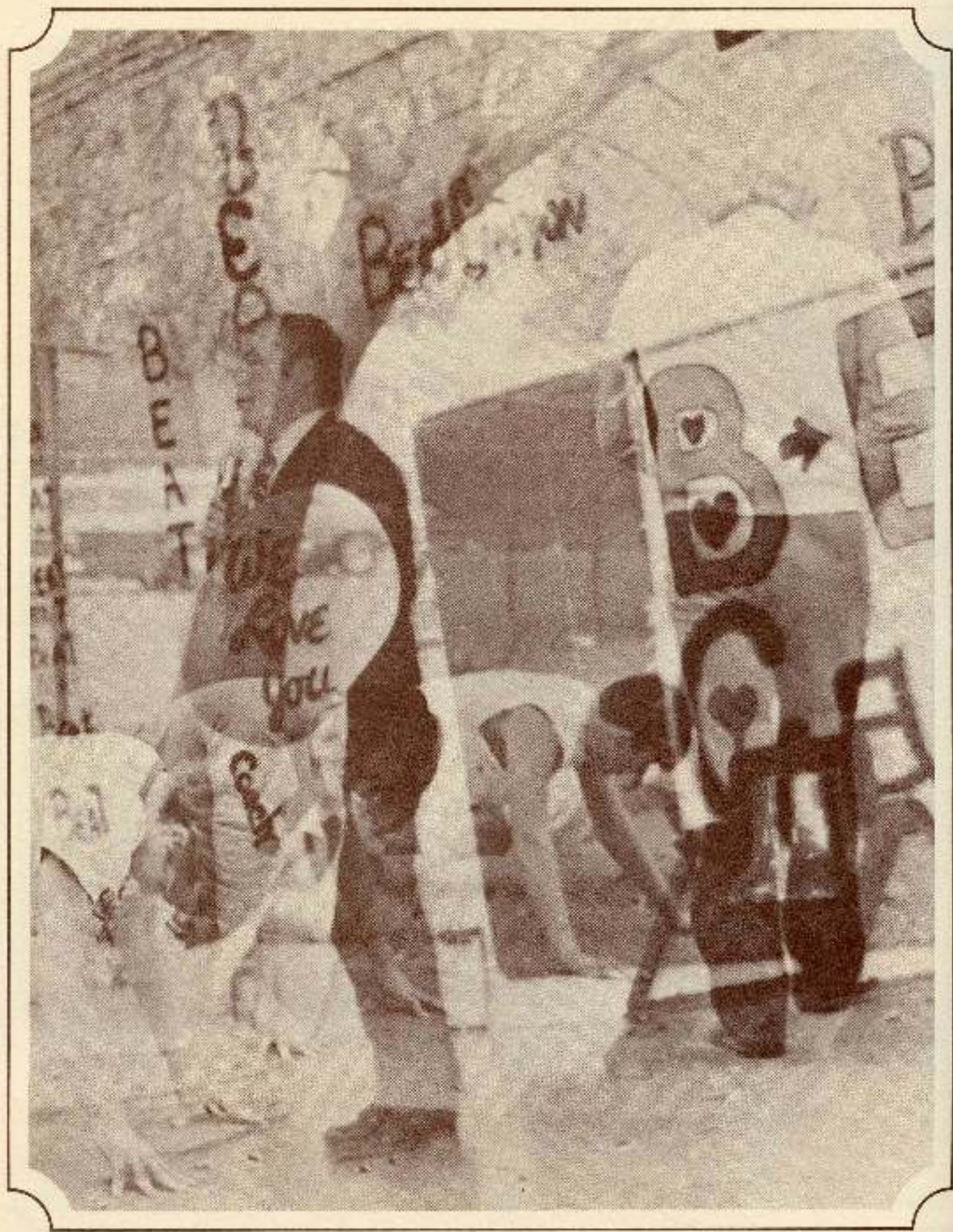



## *A time to keep silence and a time to speak*

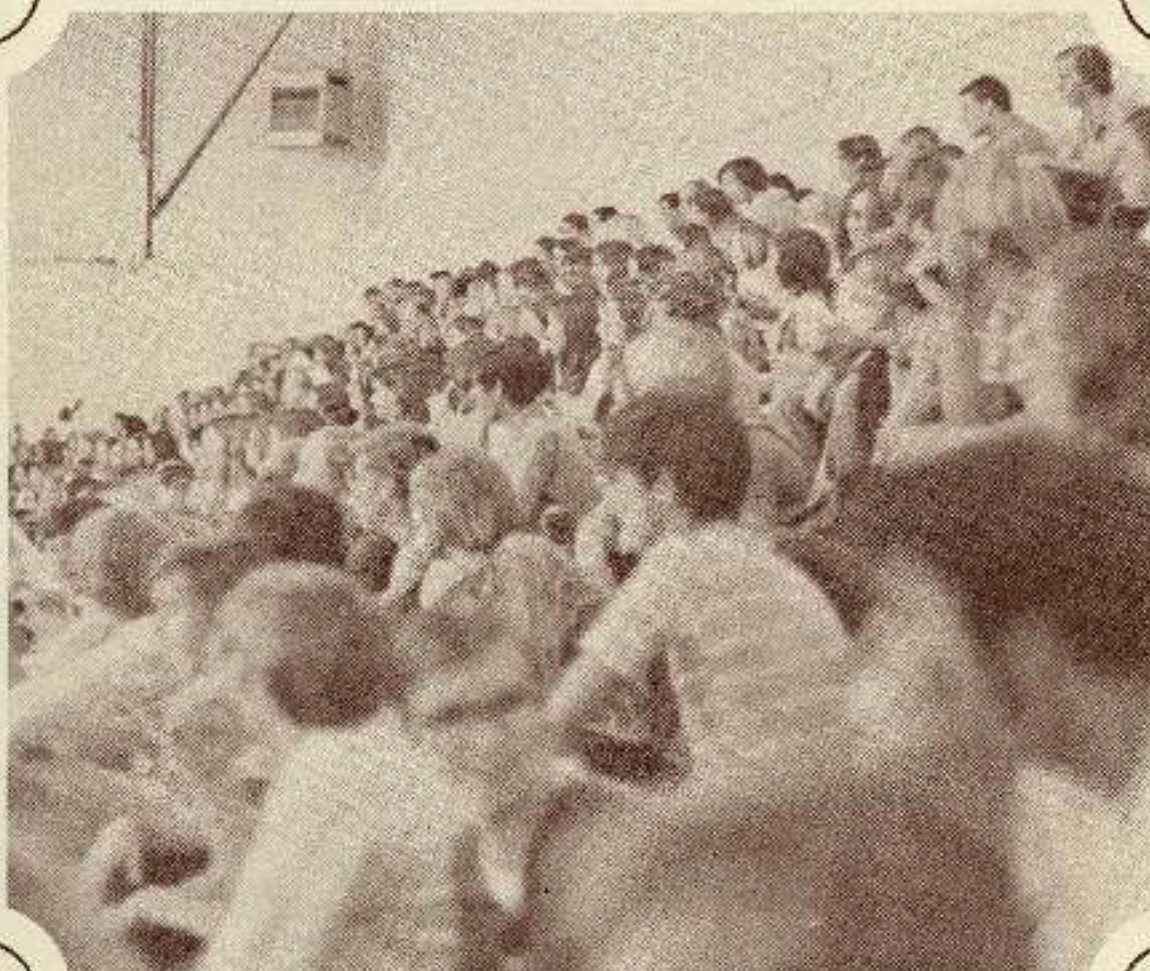






## *A time to love and a time to hate*

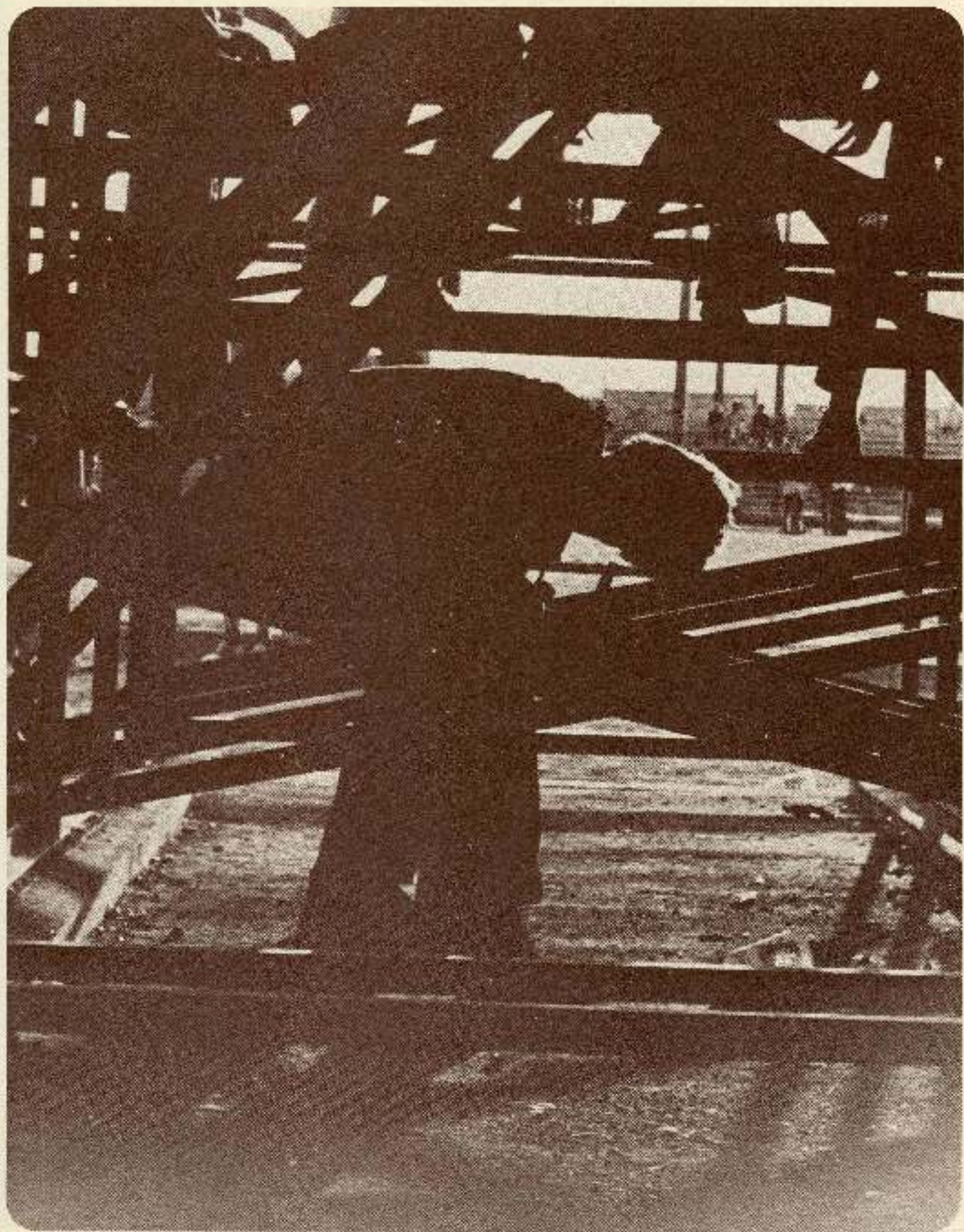

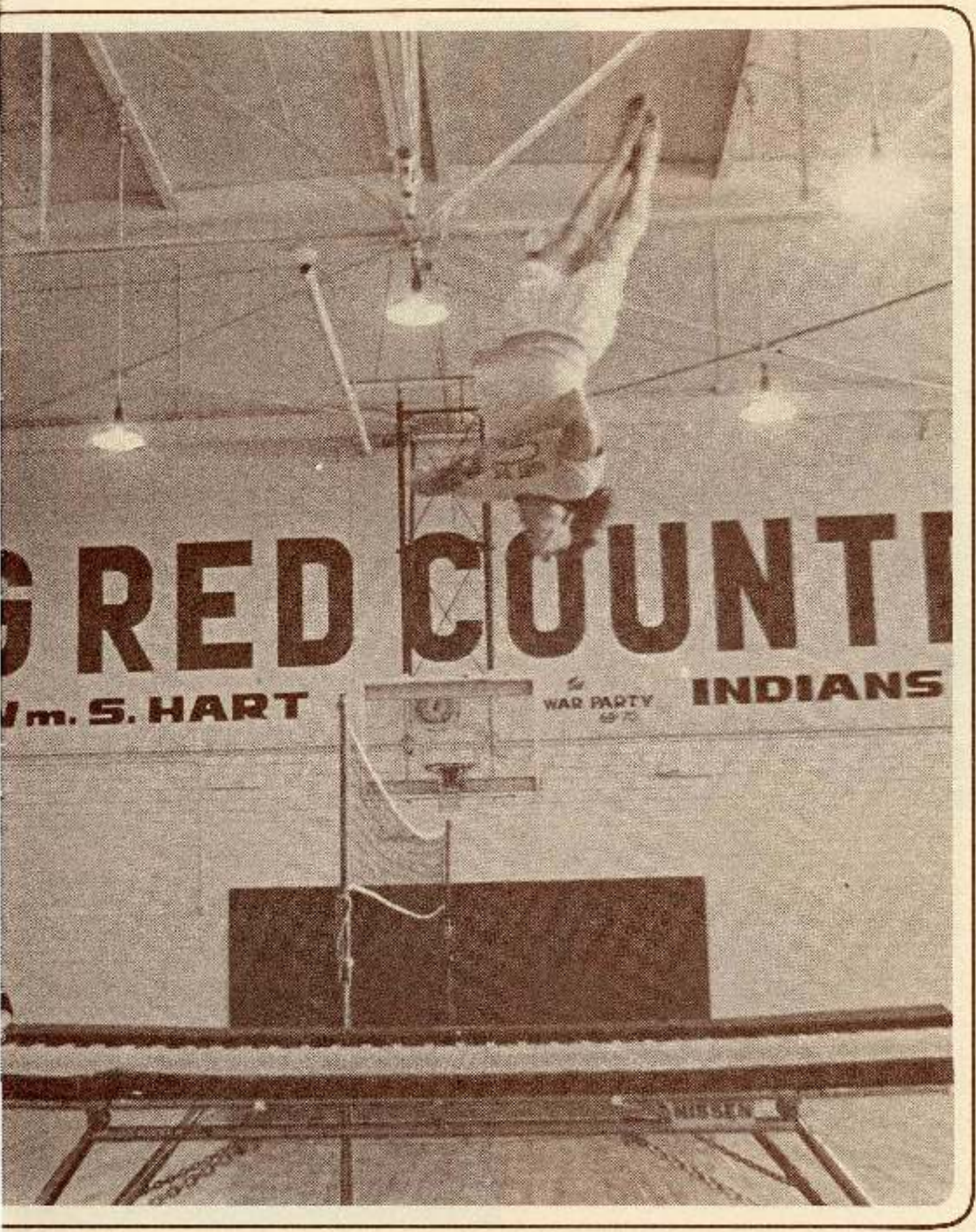

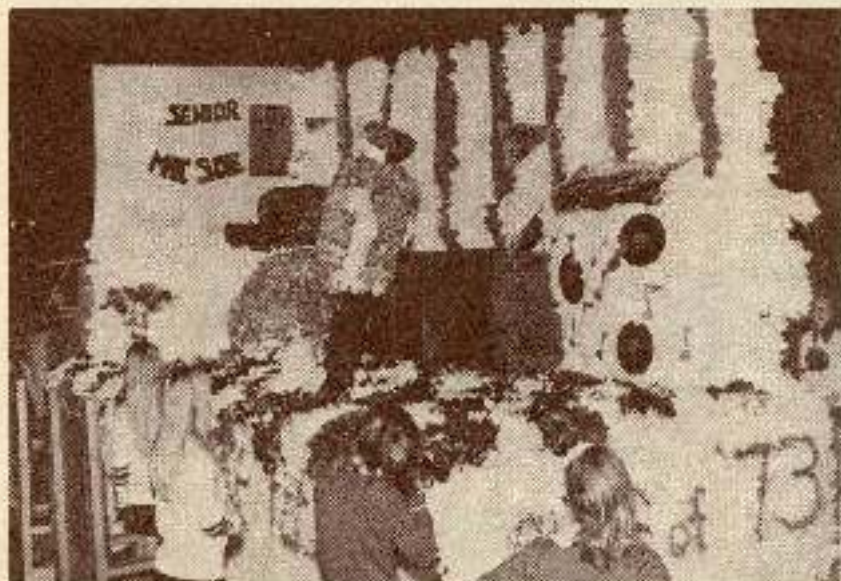
Fair is always fun, especially when it becomes personalized; and Hart students agreed that they certainly spent a full and enjoyable school year.

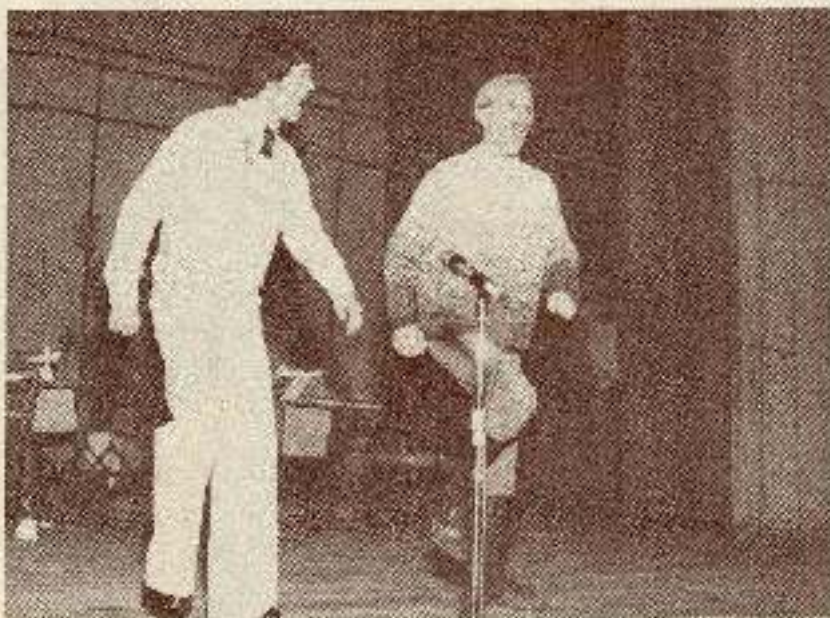

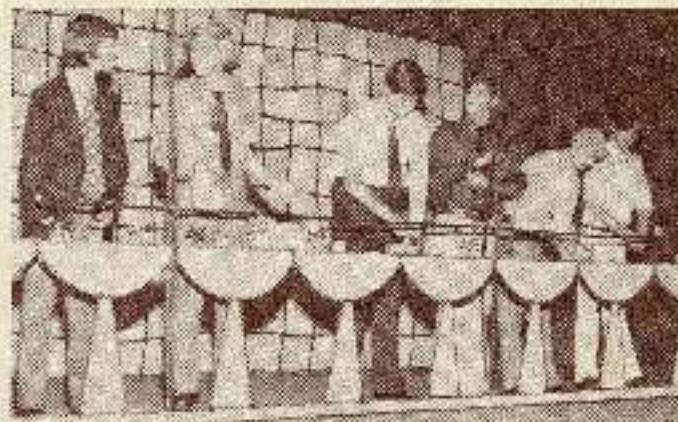
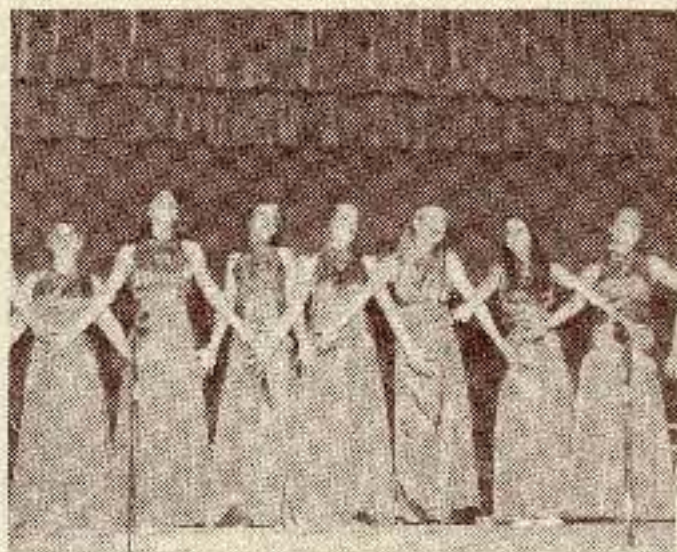
Mr. Larry Thornton and the orchestra provided live music for the many song and dance routines in "Success."

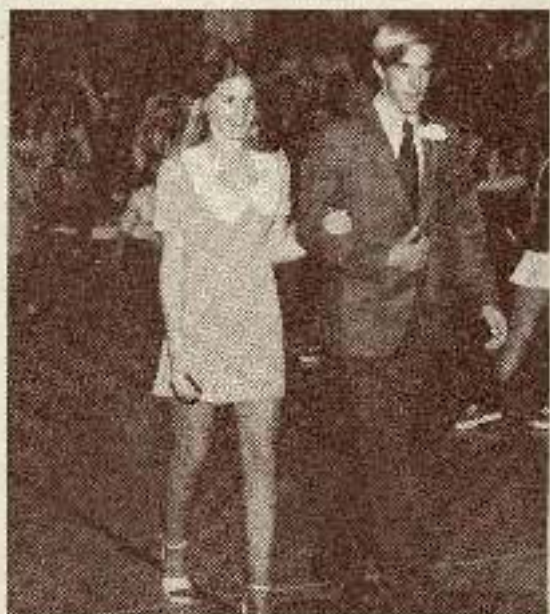

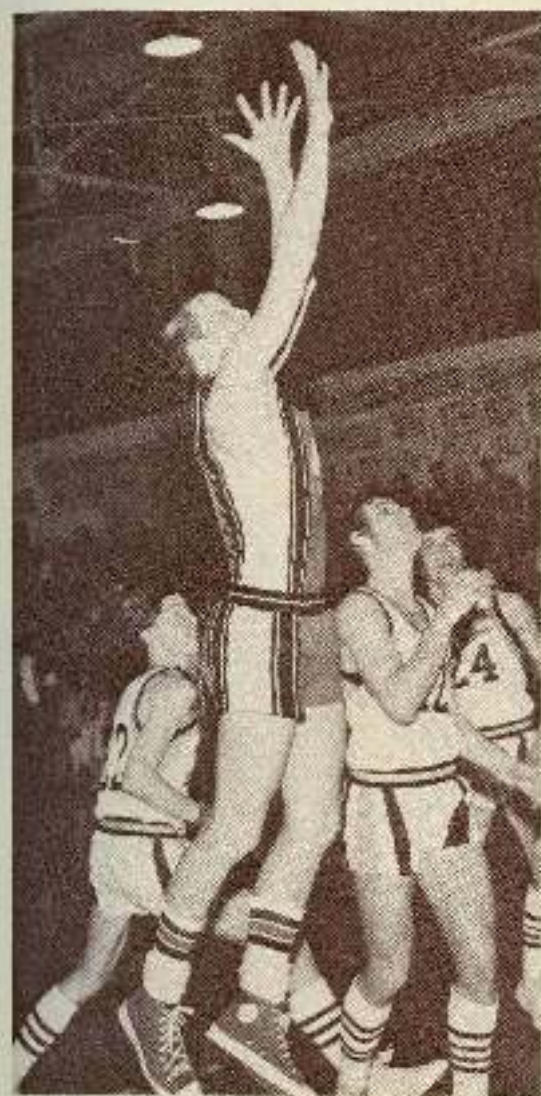

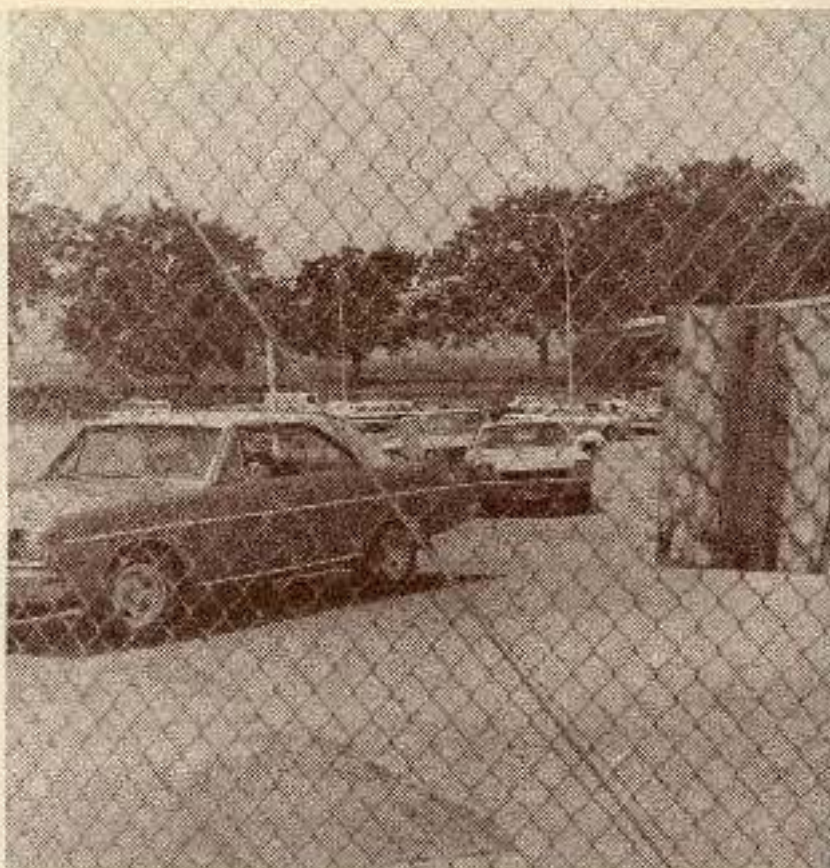

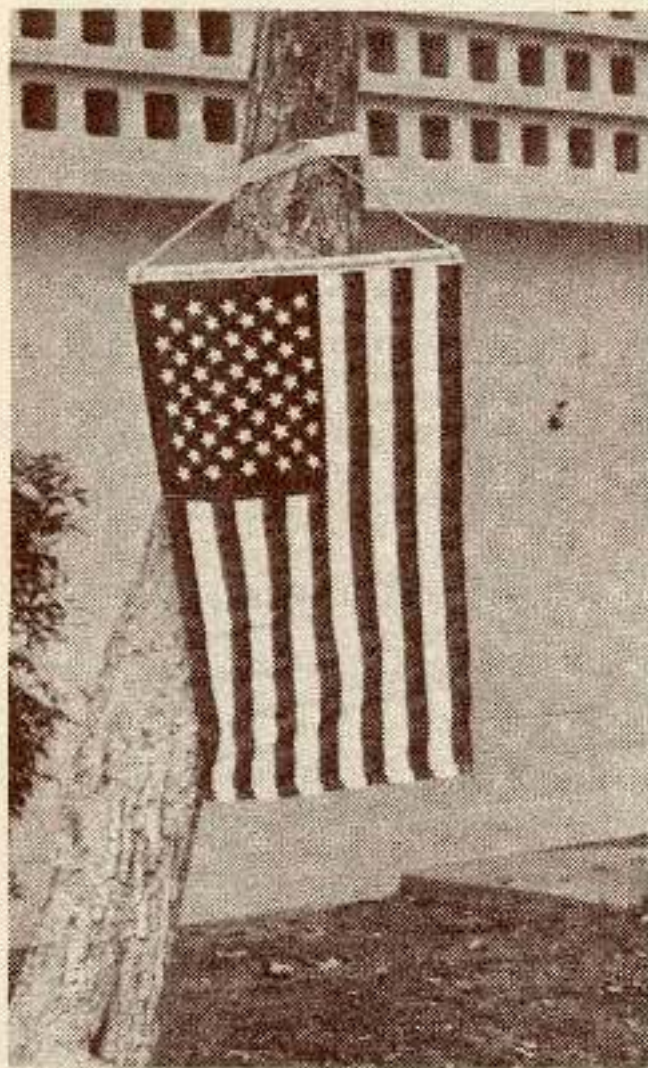

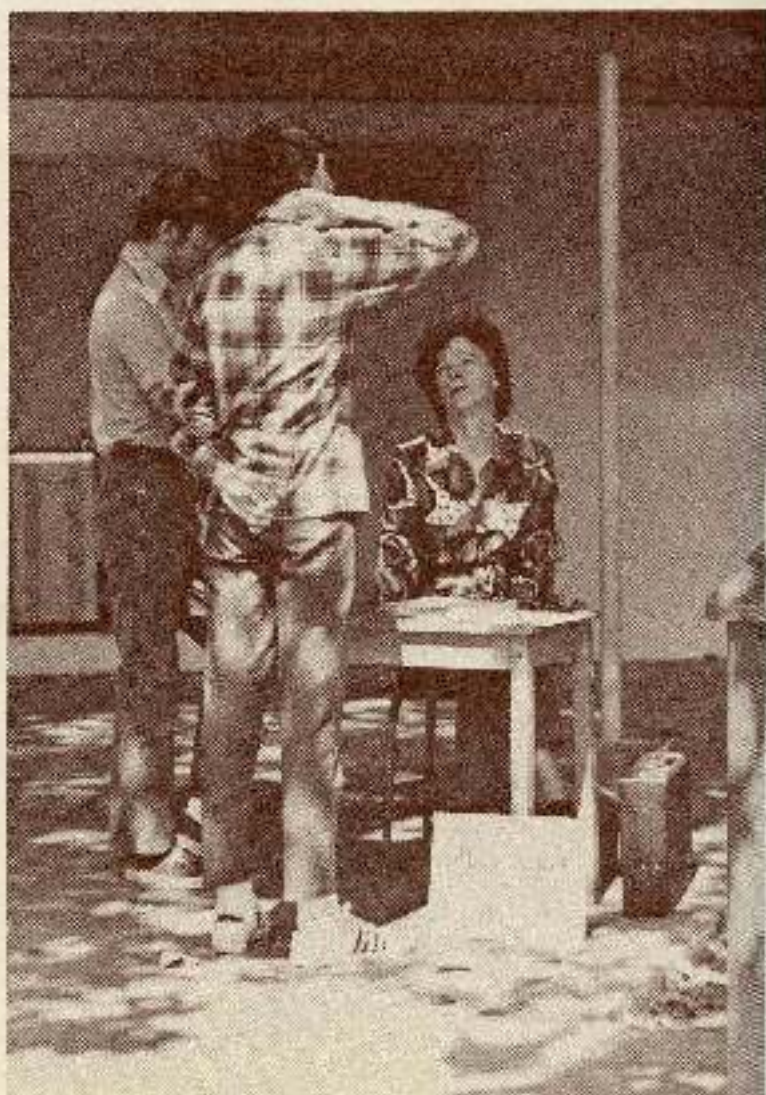

## Spring frolic permeated Sprolic

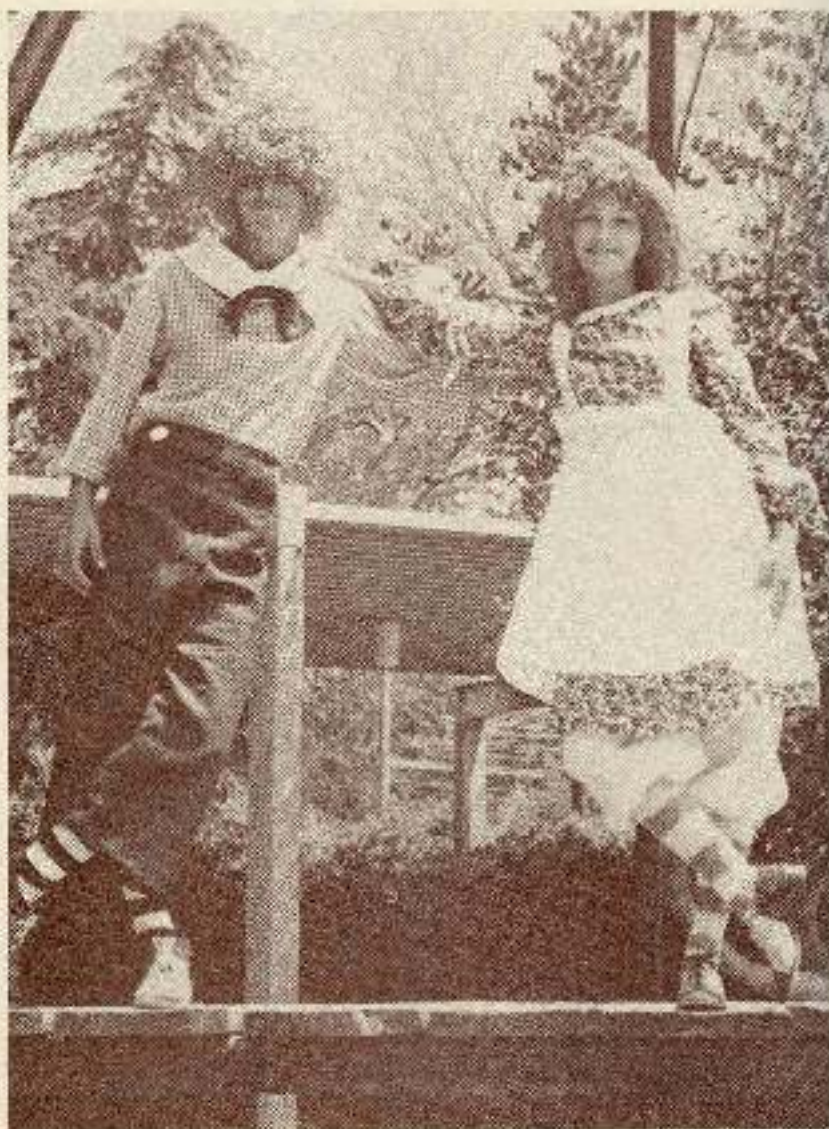
on Monday and Tuesday as students were getting back into the hang of things from their previous Easter vacation. Wednesday at lunch, the senior band played for entertainment.

Thursday was the most exciting day of the week.

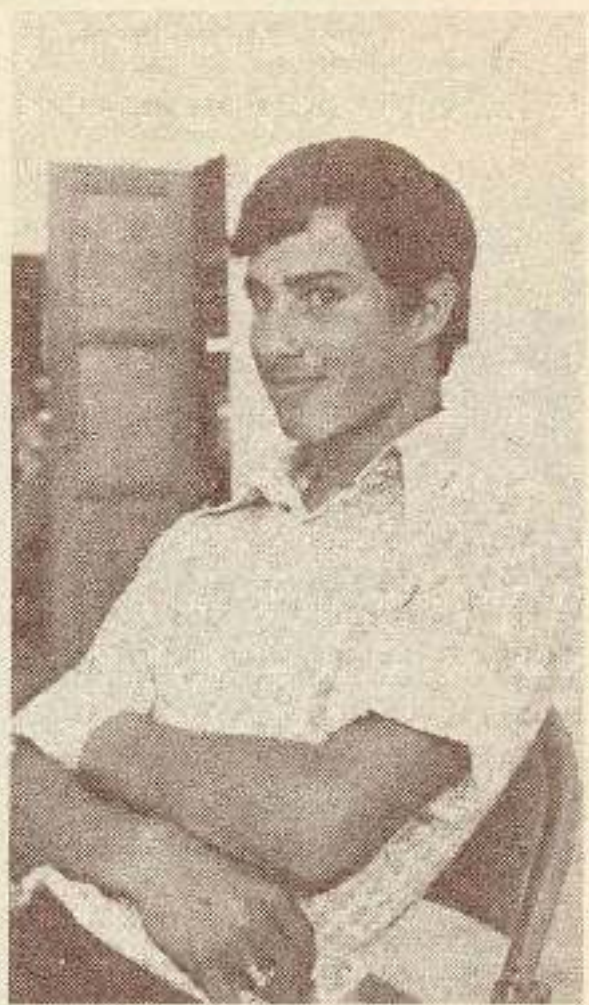
The junior band started the activities off with music at lunch. The whole day was devoted to babies. It was

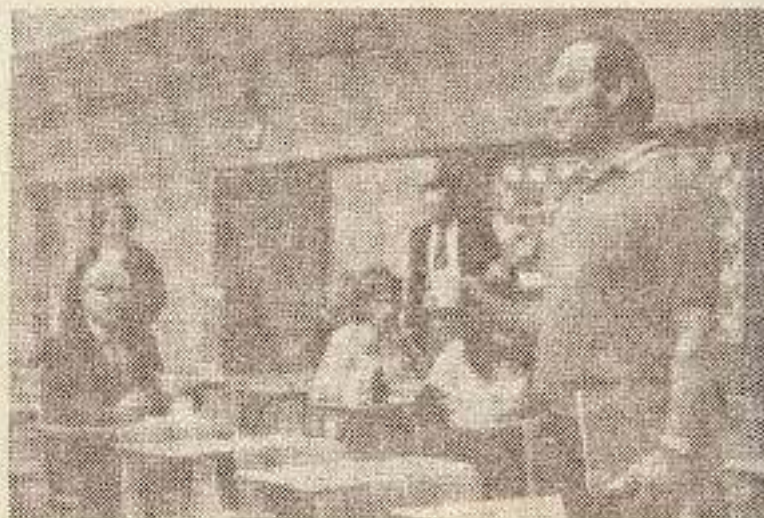

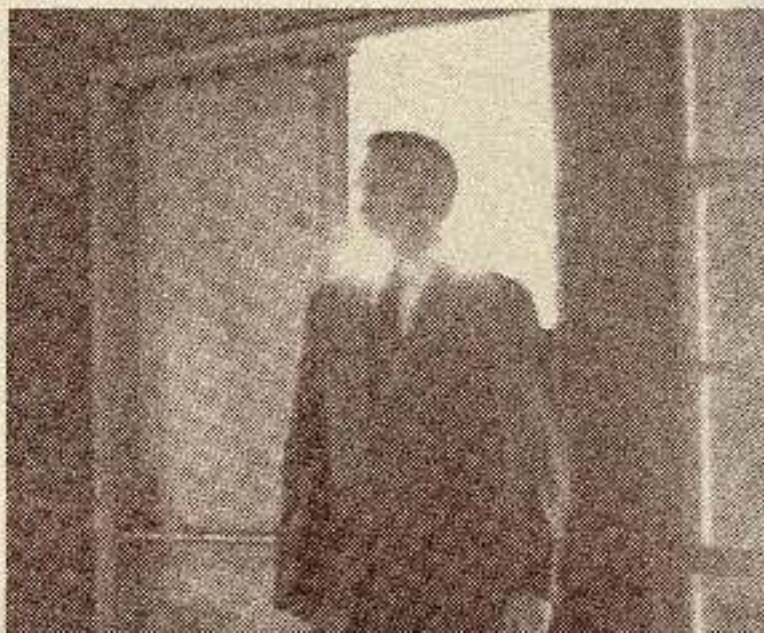

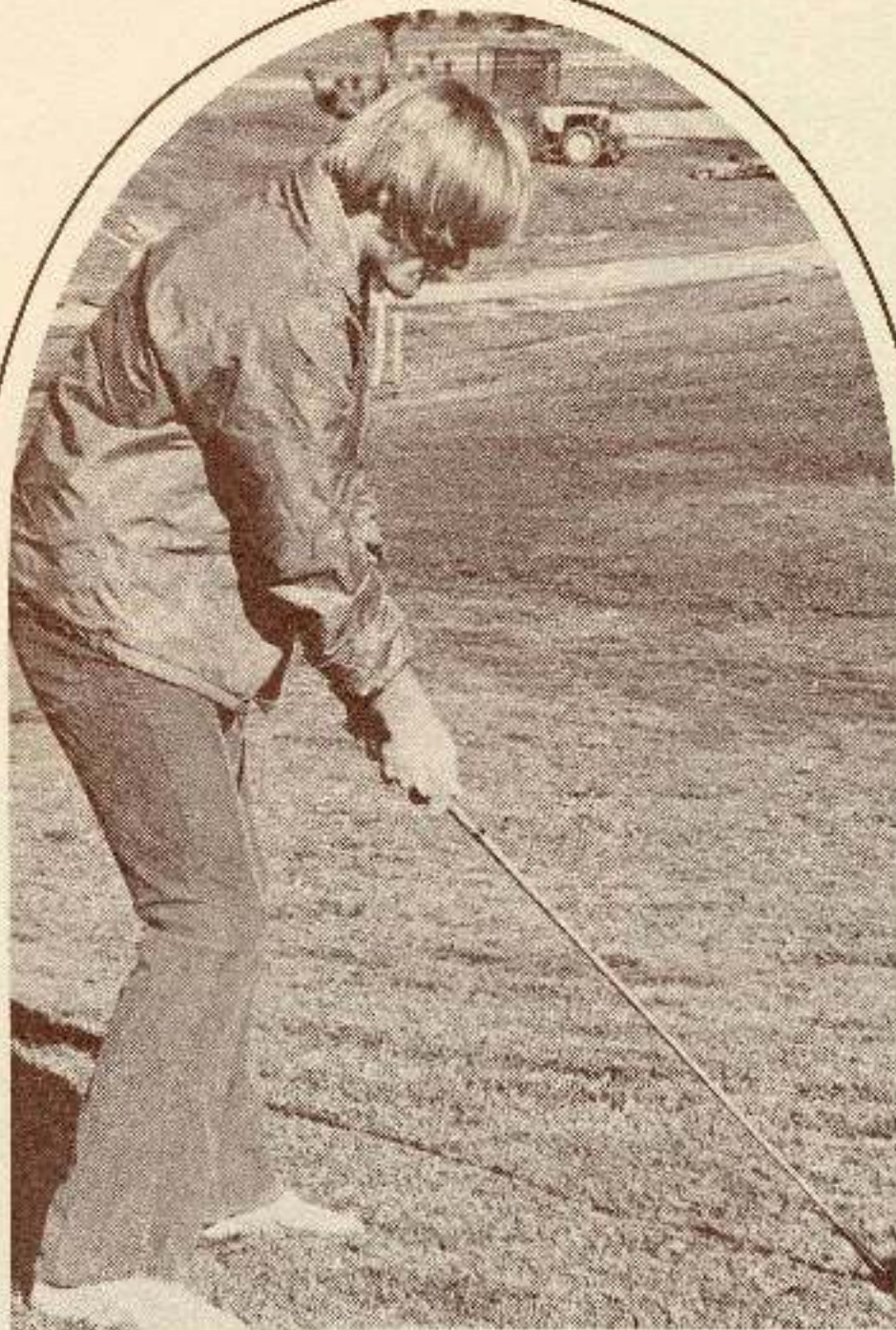
## *The WASC is happy to announce*

the action taken by the Accrediting Commission for Secondary Schools wherein the William S. Hart High School was granted a full term of accreditation, expiring on June 30, 1978, with a progress report to be submitted to the Commission by June 30, 1976." was the opening statement in the Western Association of Schools and Colleges' letter of accreditation. These words were long awaited for by many a perspiring brow in the community.

Accreditation is a rating process by which all high schools, in the western states, are kept up to par, underlining a school's strong points and deficiencies. During the fall of 1972, students and faculty members became aware of the fact that Hart was being evaluated for accreditation by the appearance of the visiting committees and by a barrage of questionnaires. Mr. Lew White was placed in charge of coordinating the accreditation procedure.

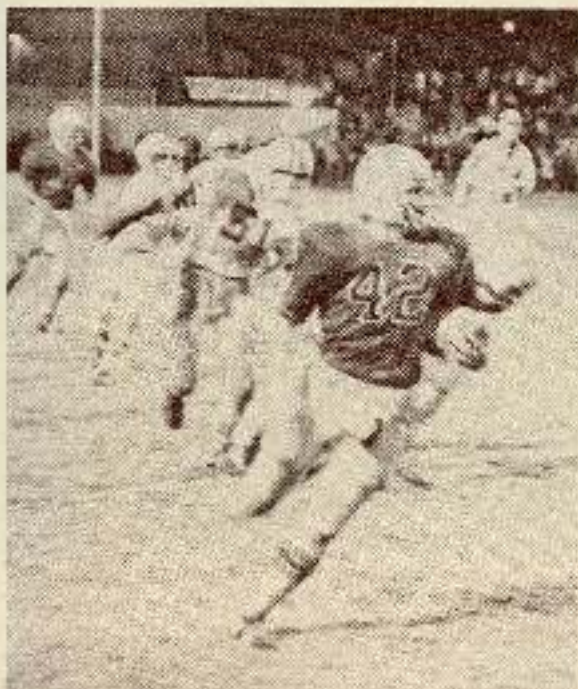

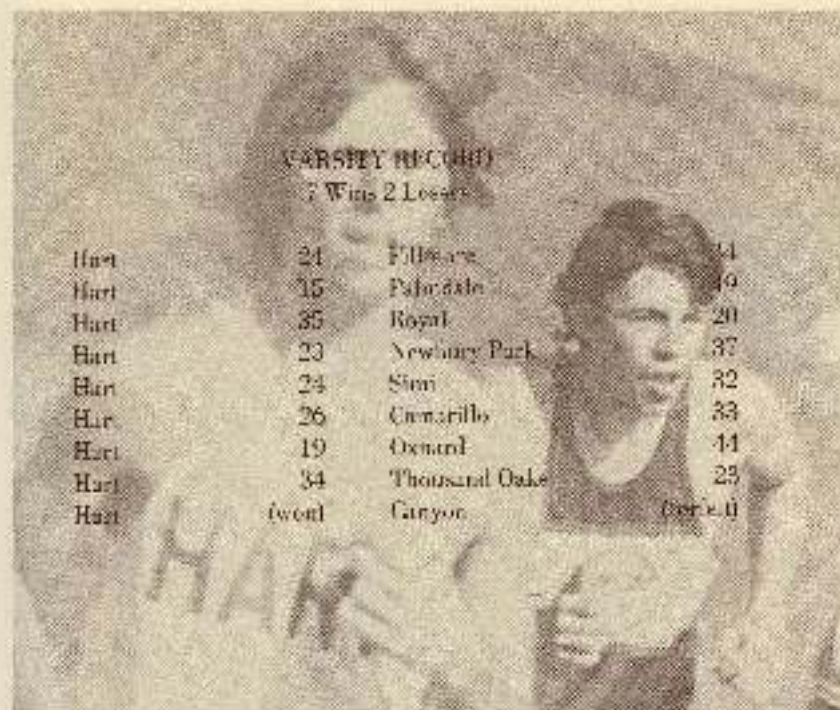
# Running their way

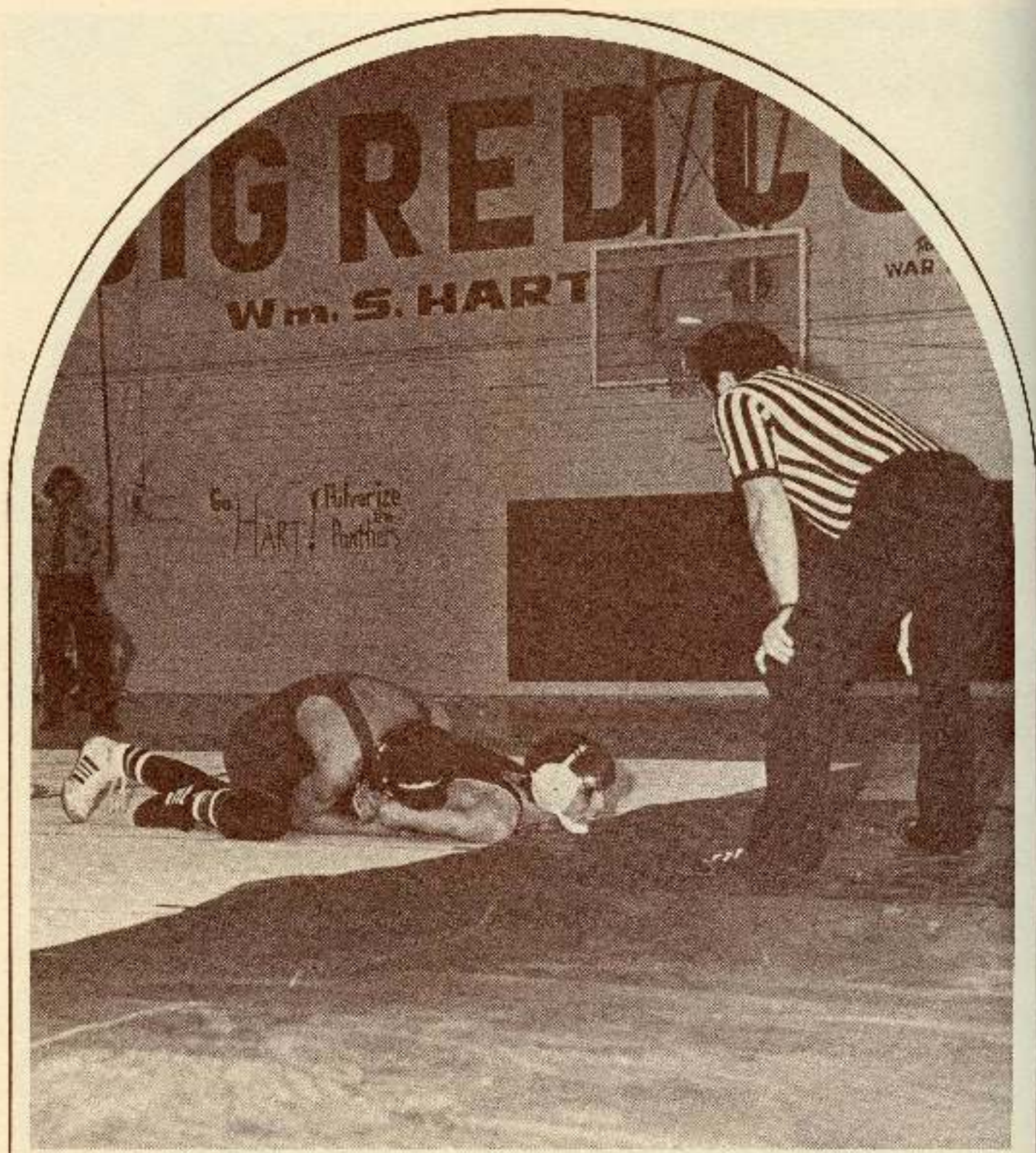

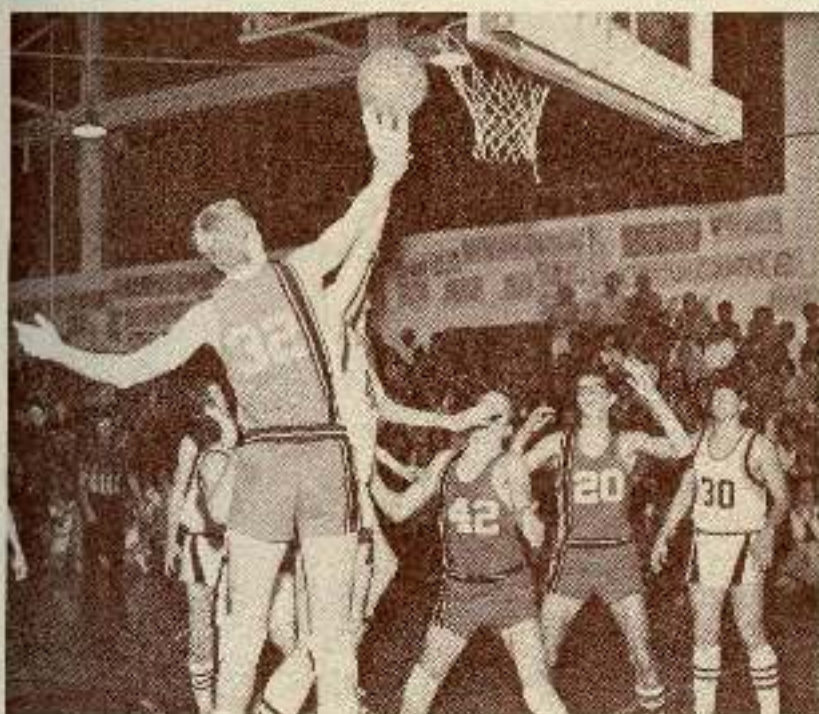

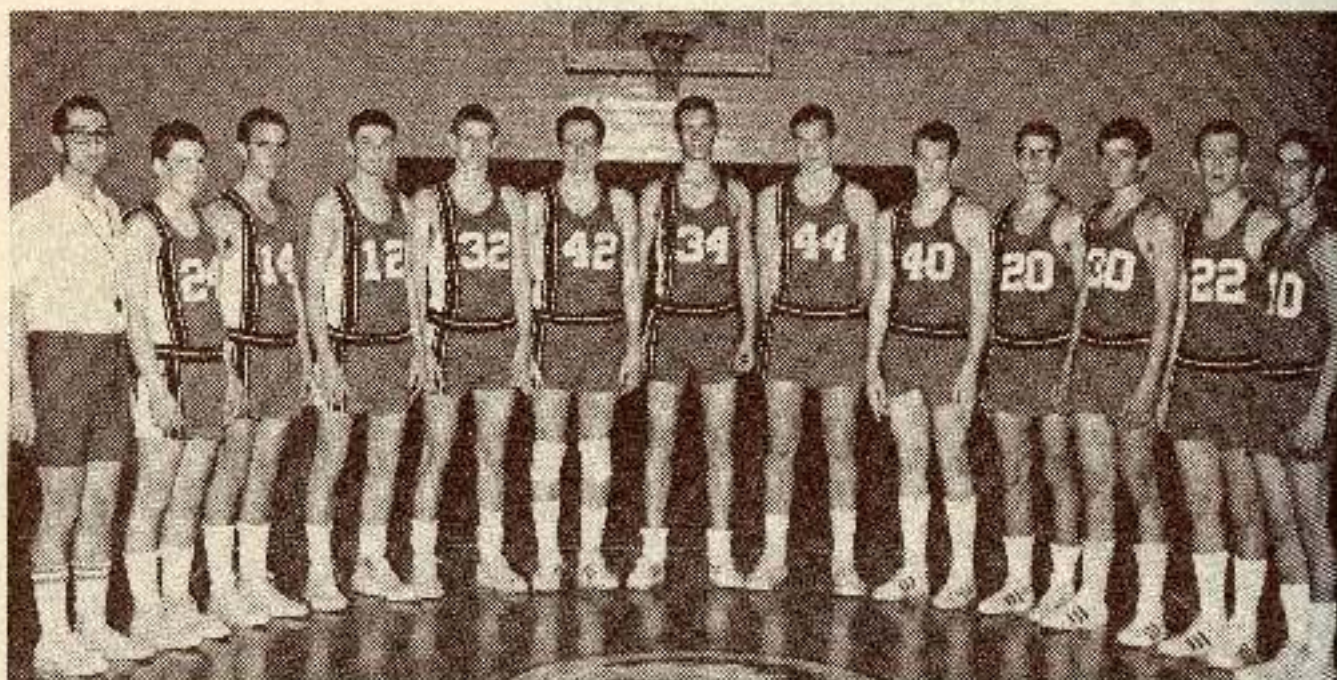
## Valuable varsity experience

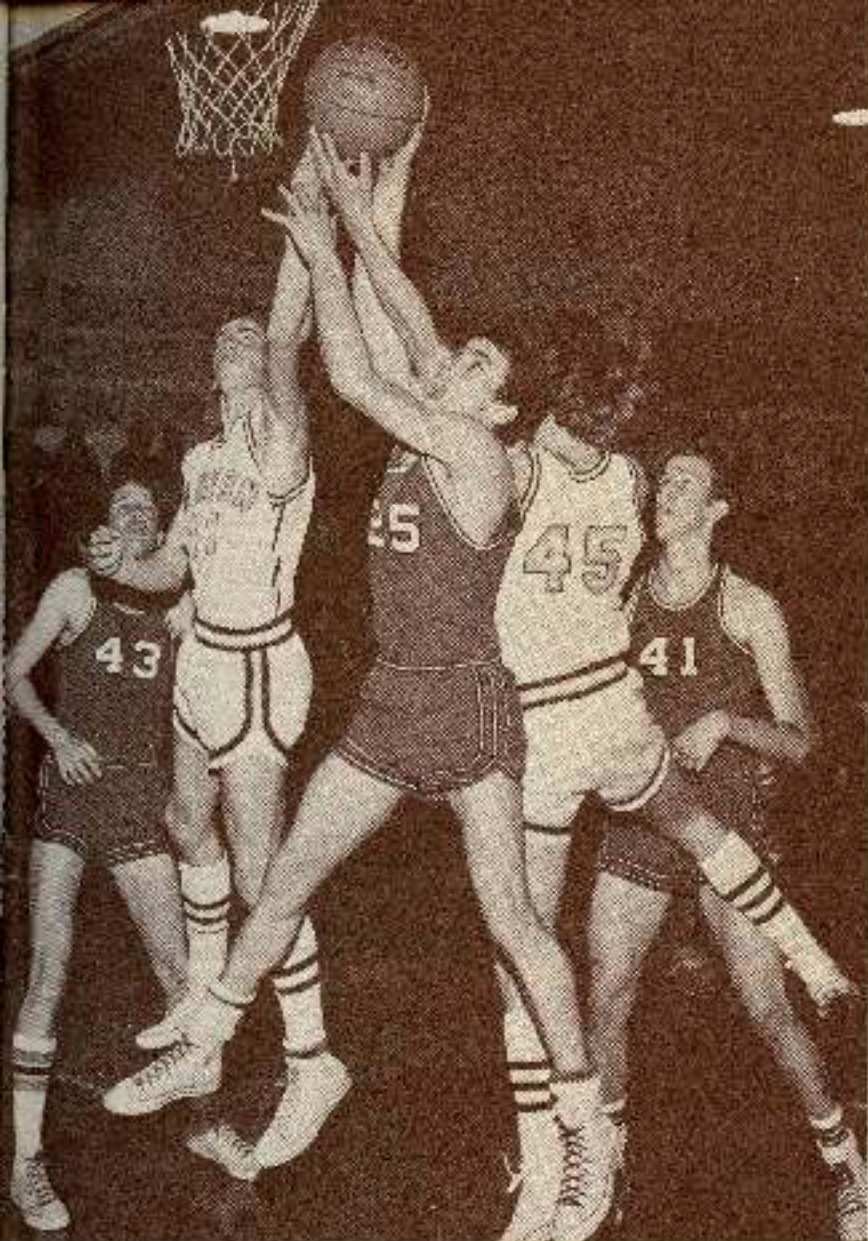
The team, like all those at Hart, is looking forward to new, different and perhaps more difficult competition as they enter the Football League next year.

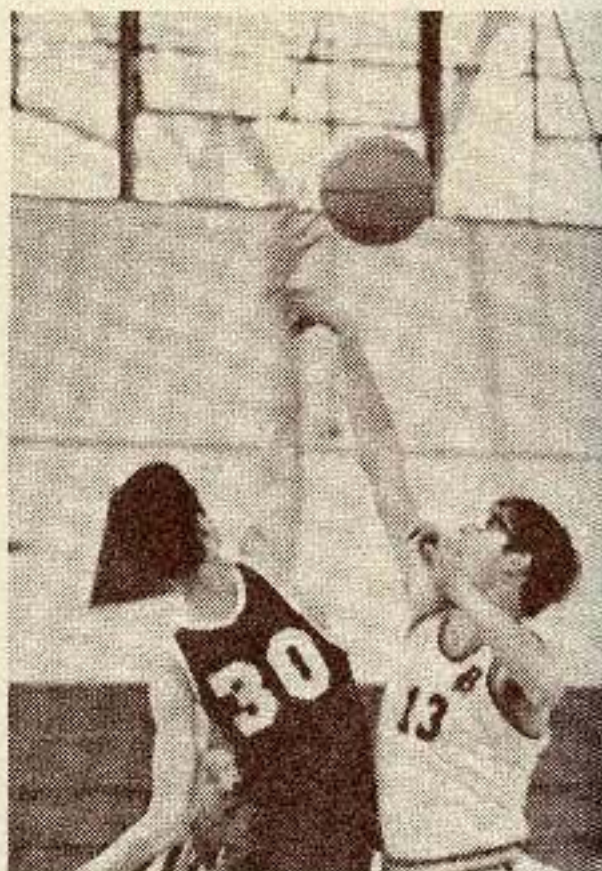

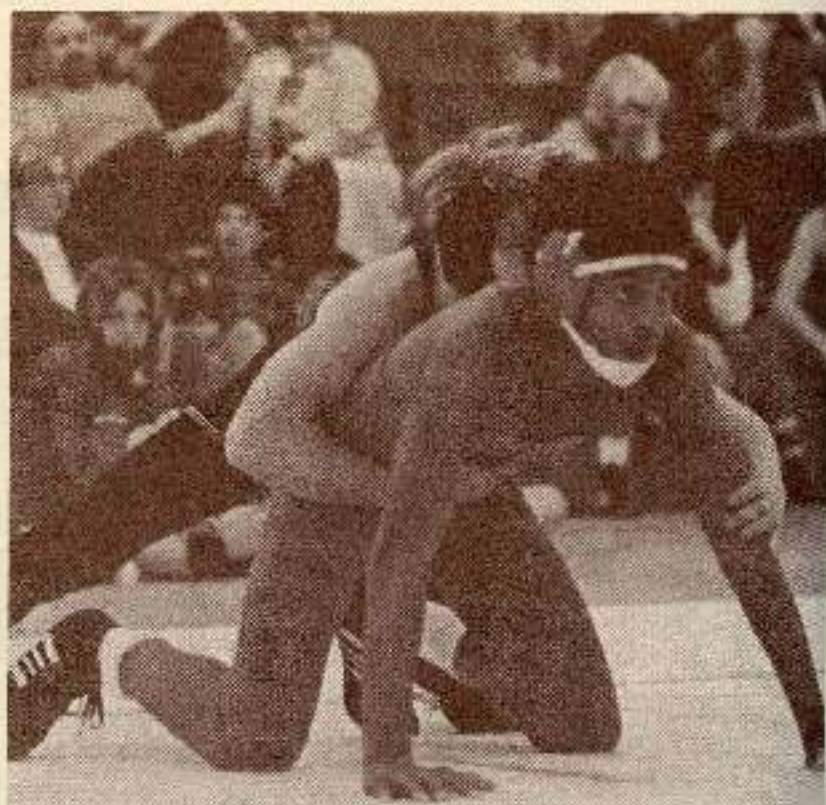

But as the year wore on several wrestlers had trouble making weight, this possibly cost them the league championship.

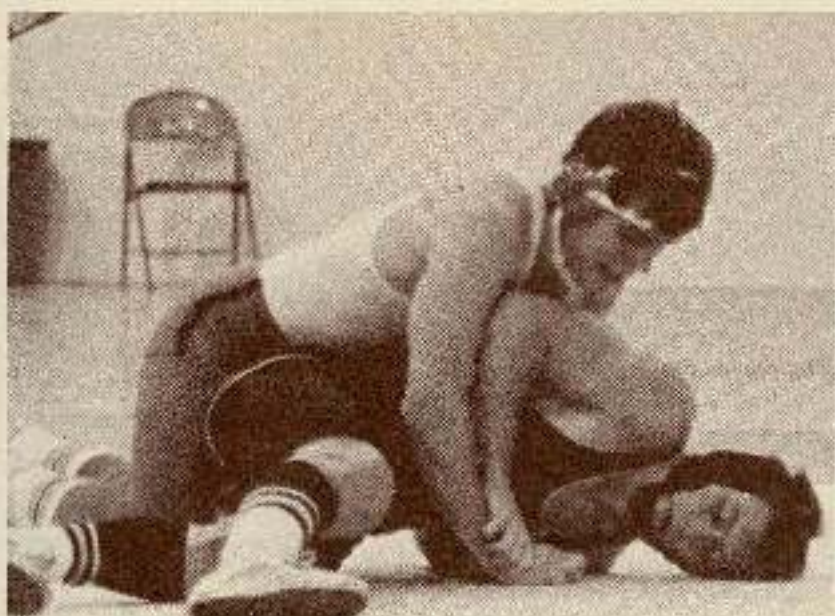

## Putting their efforts together

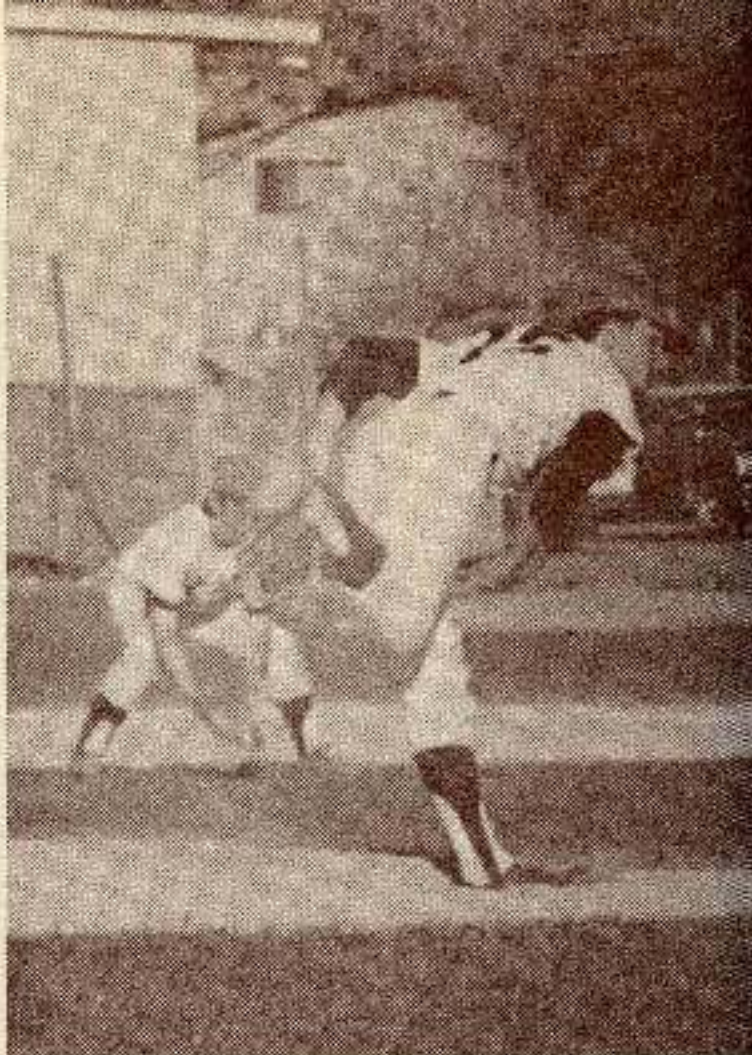

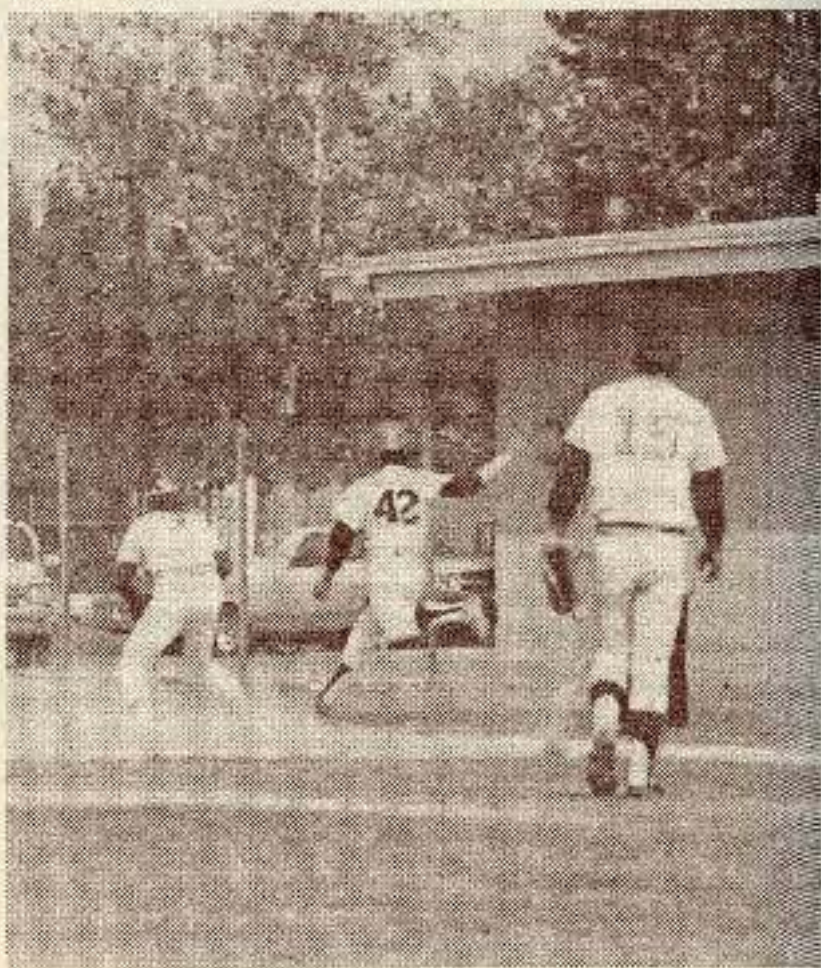

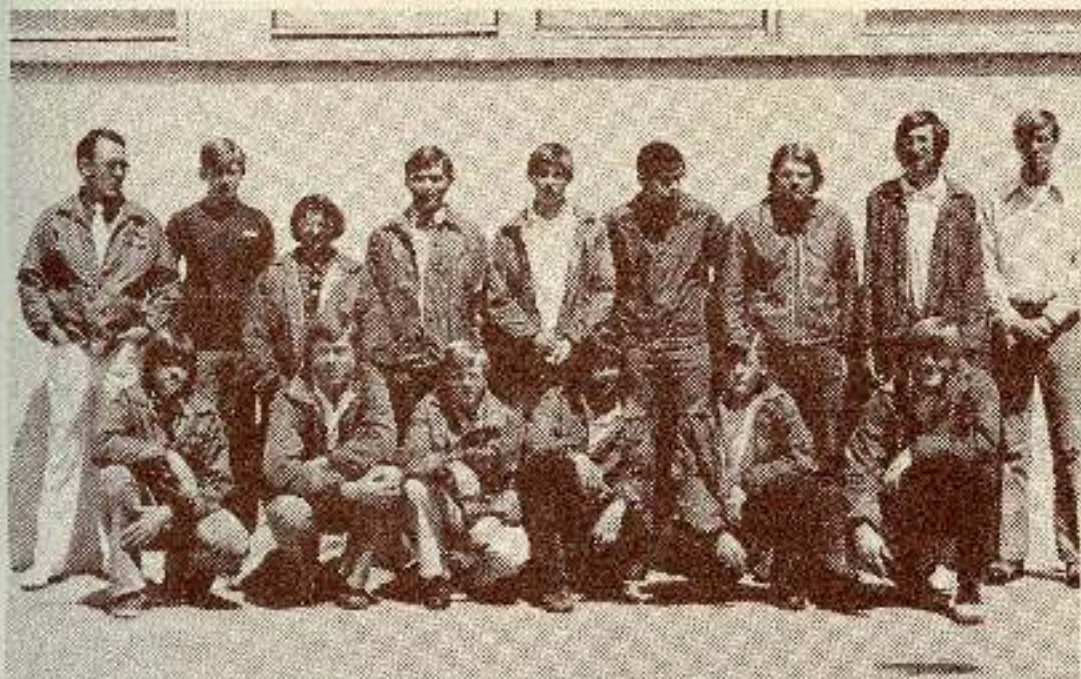


## *Golfer of the Year*

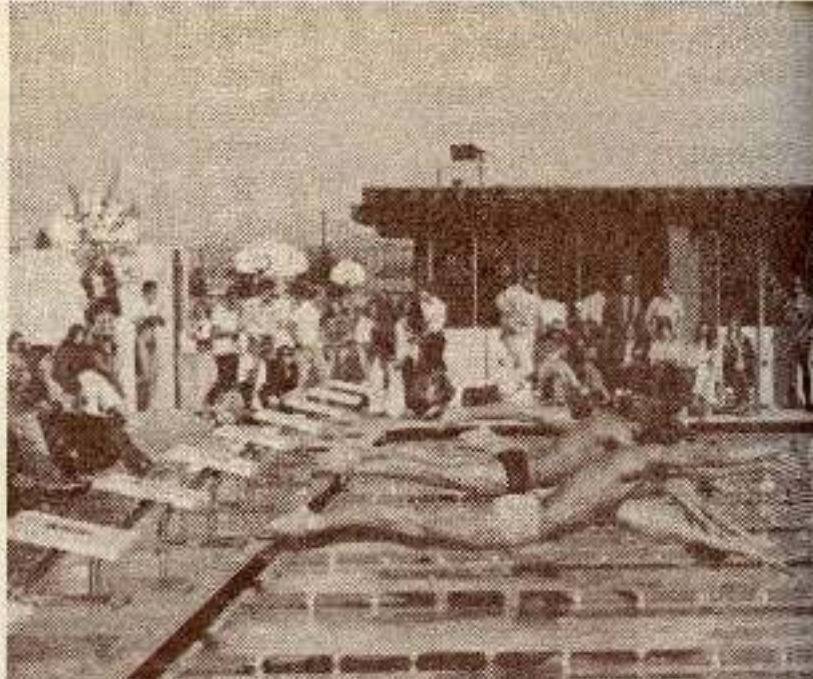

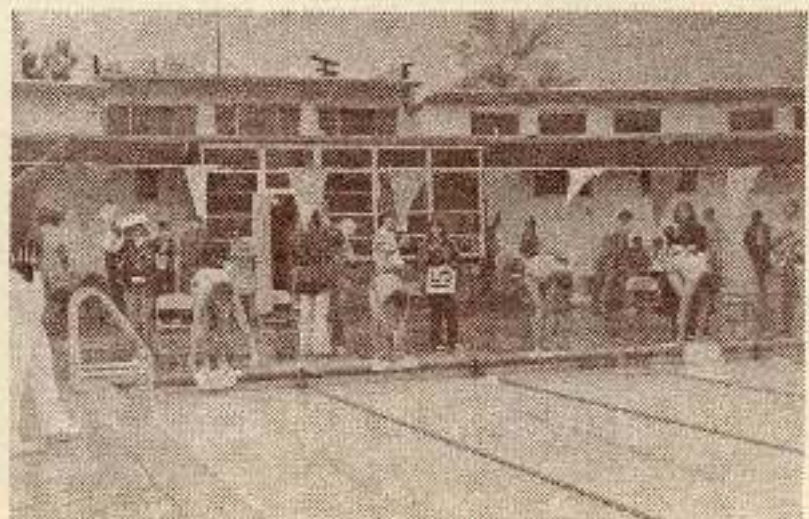
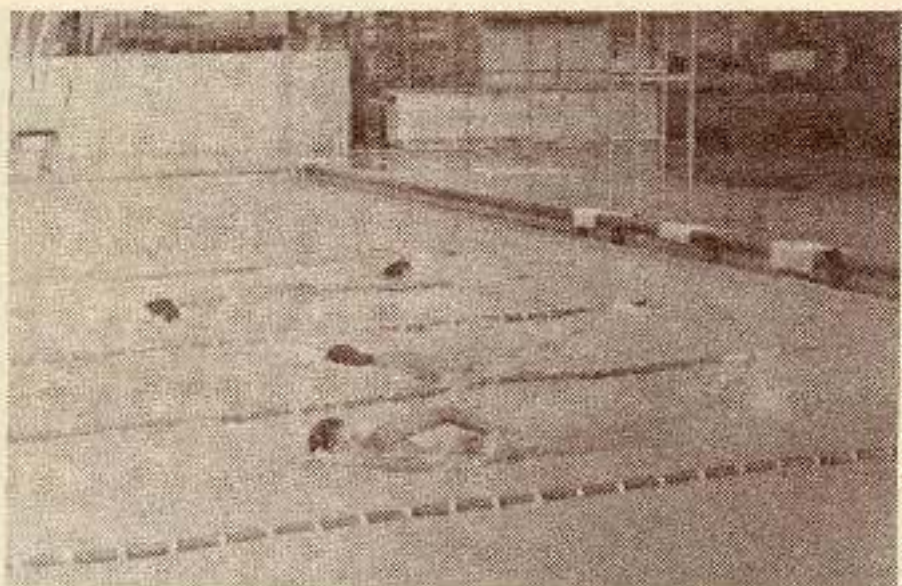
## Good records overshadowed a lack

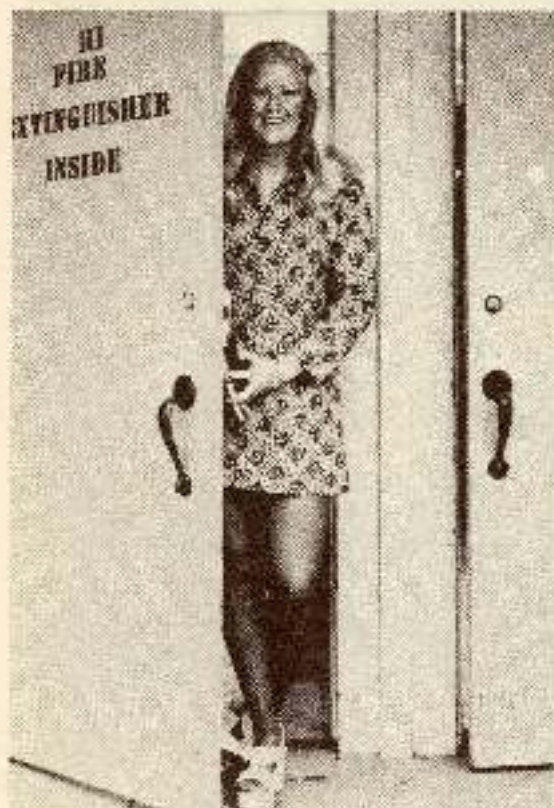

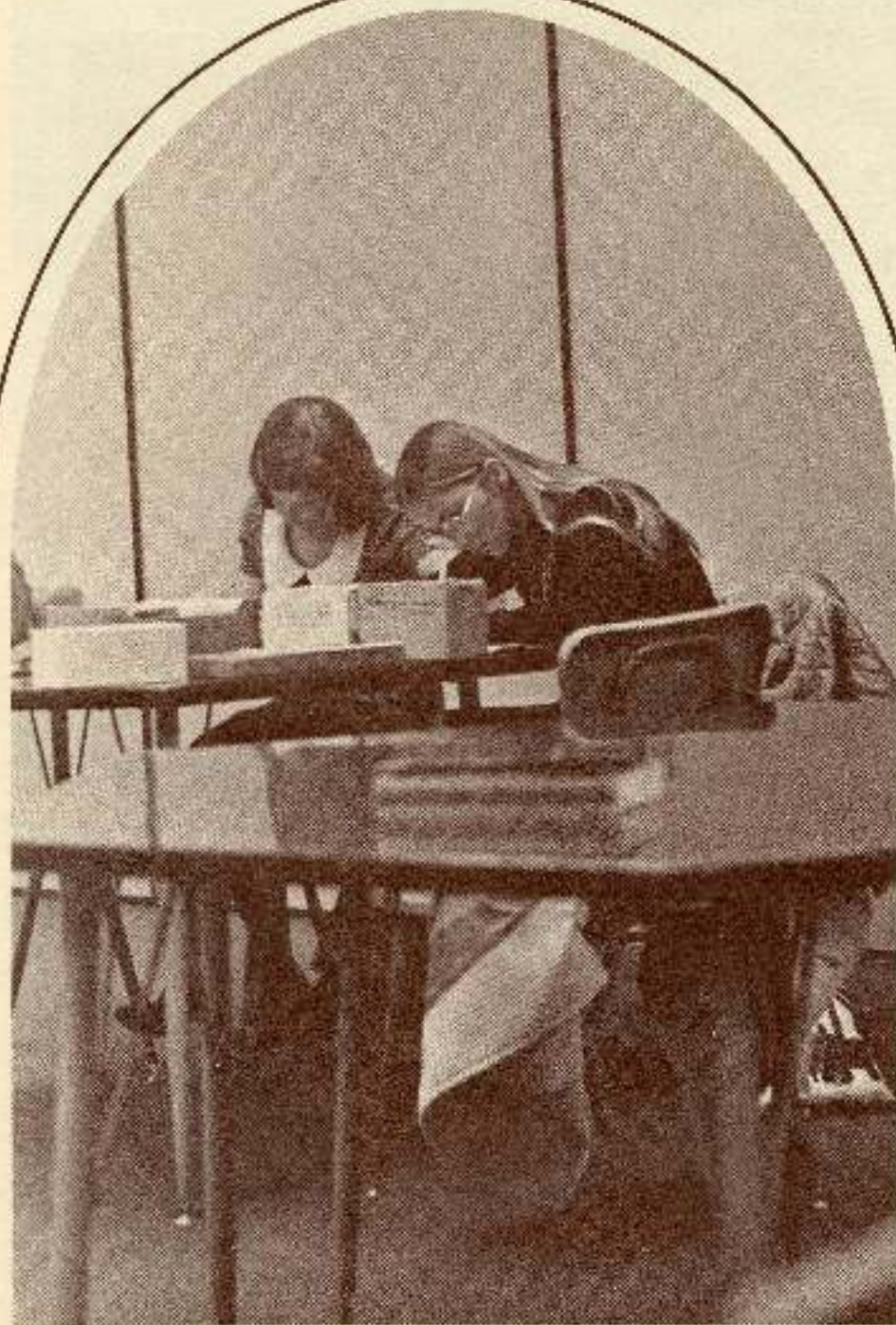

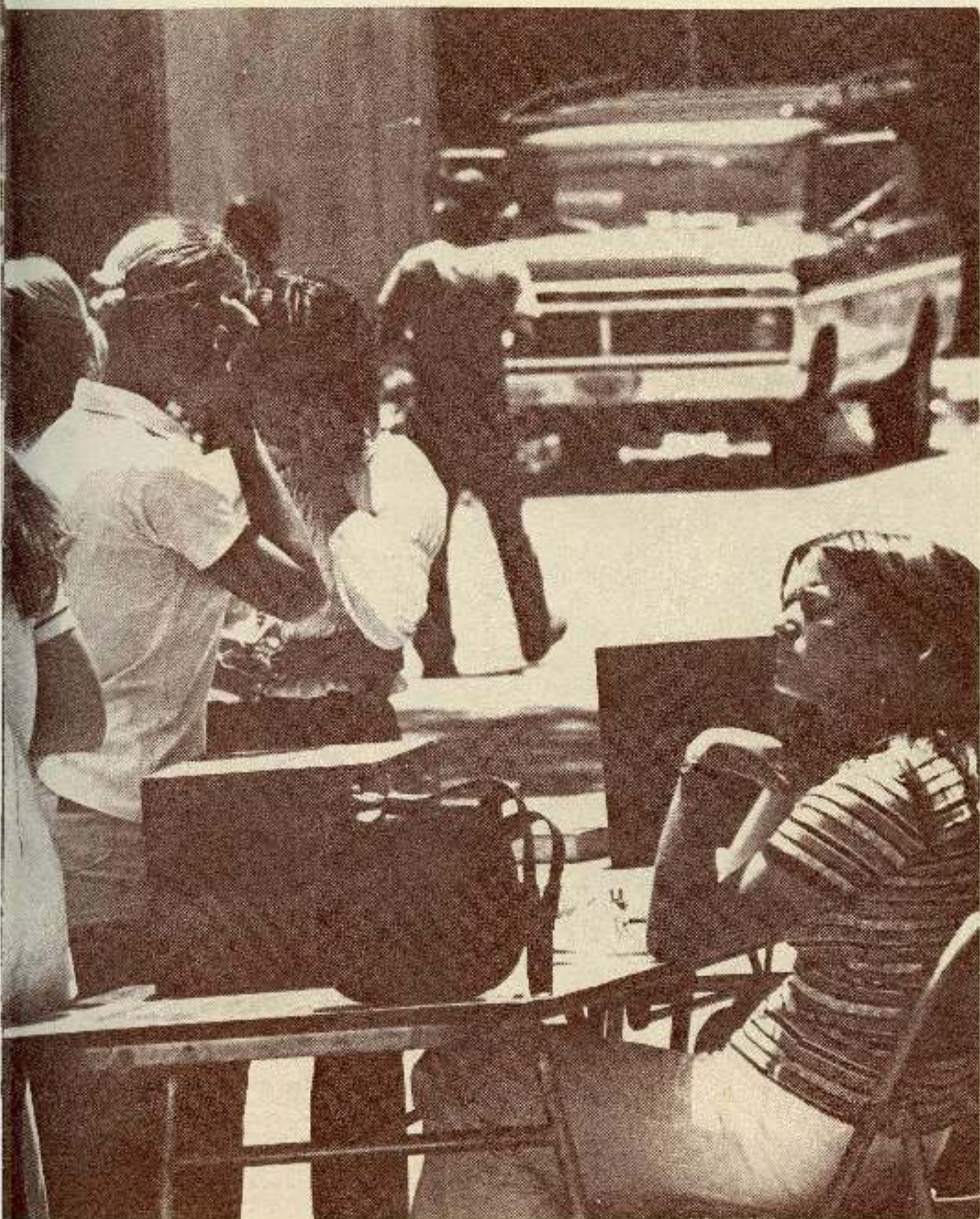

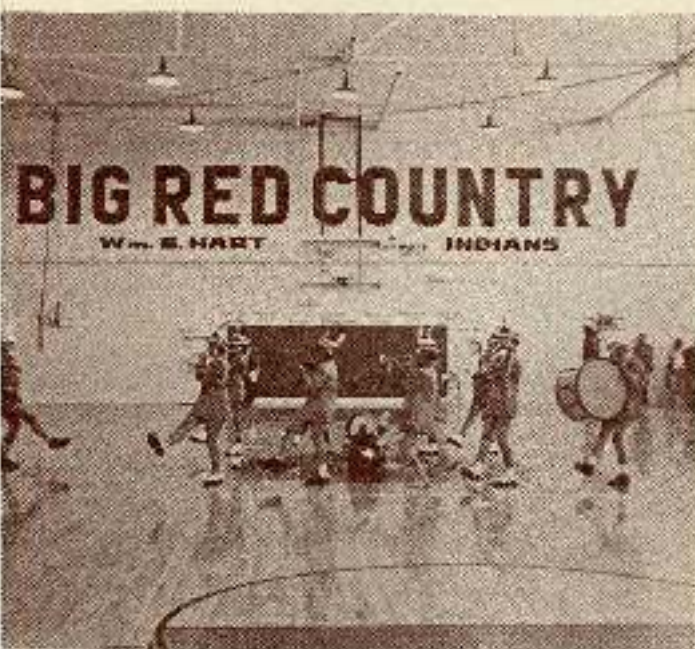
# Spectacular halftime shows,

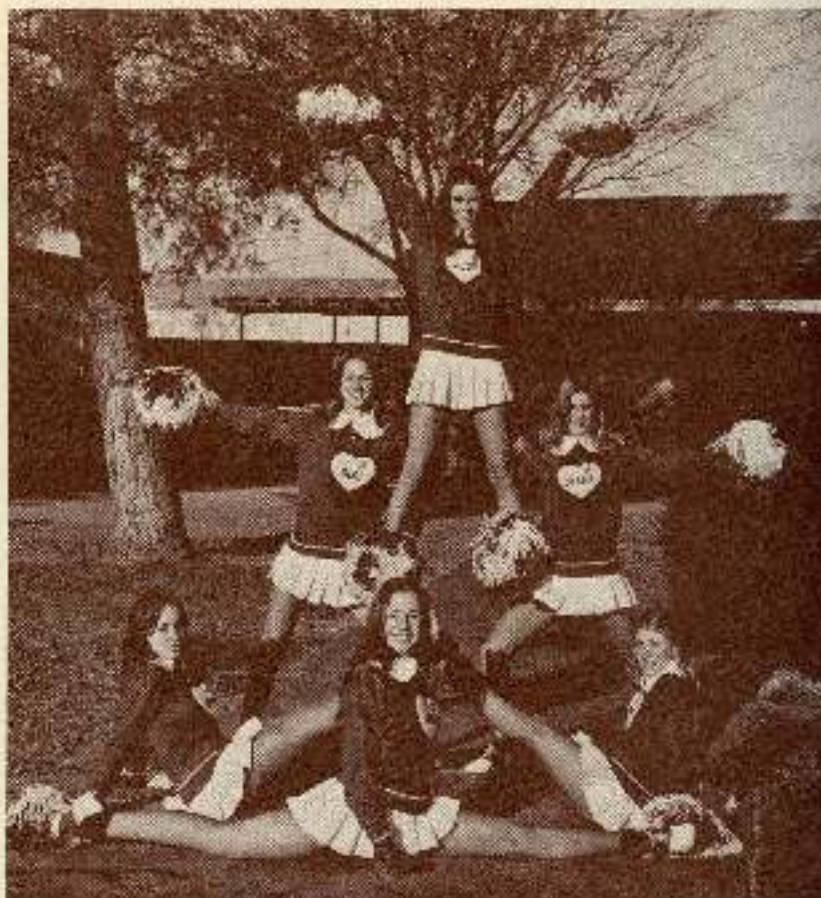

School spirit remained high, and with the aid of pep squad, the hearty enthusiasm of the crowd lacked Indian teams.



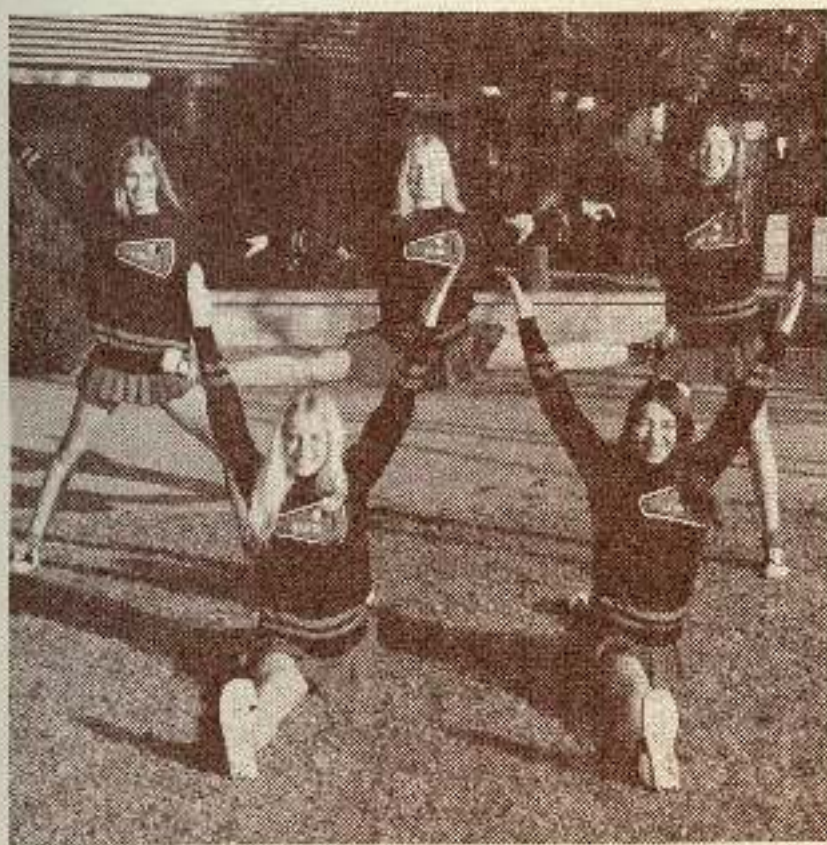

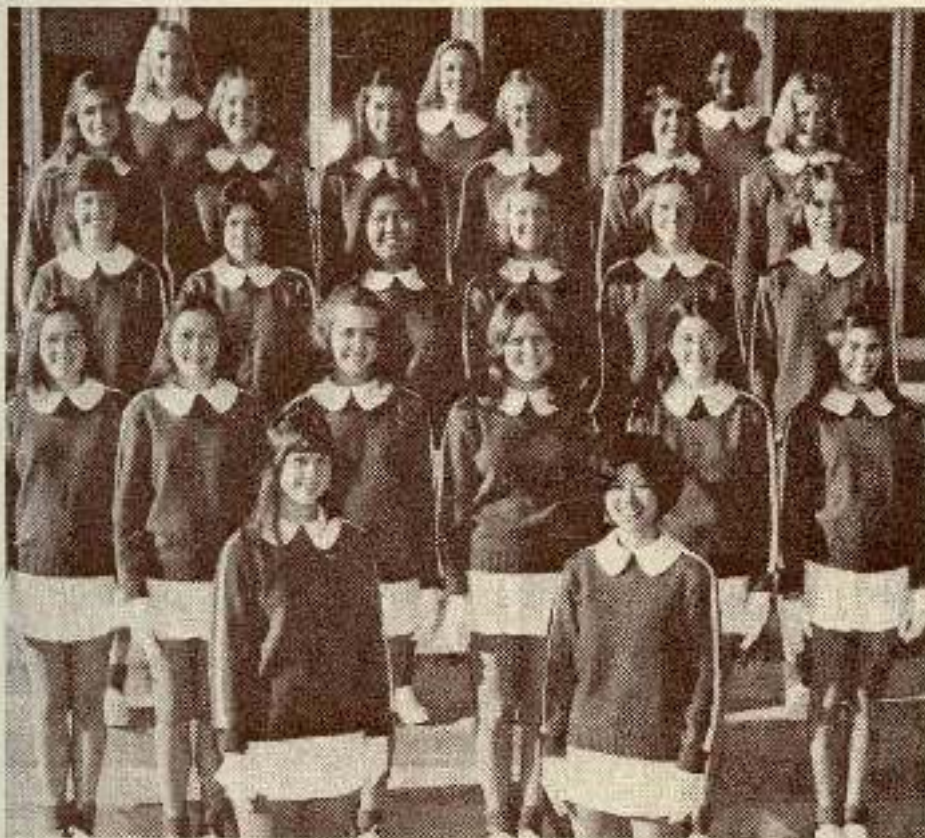

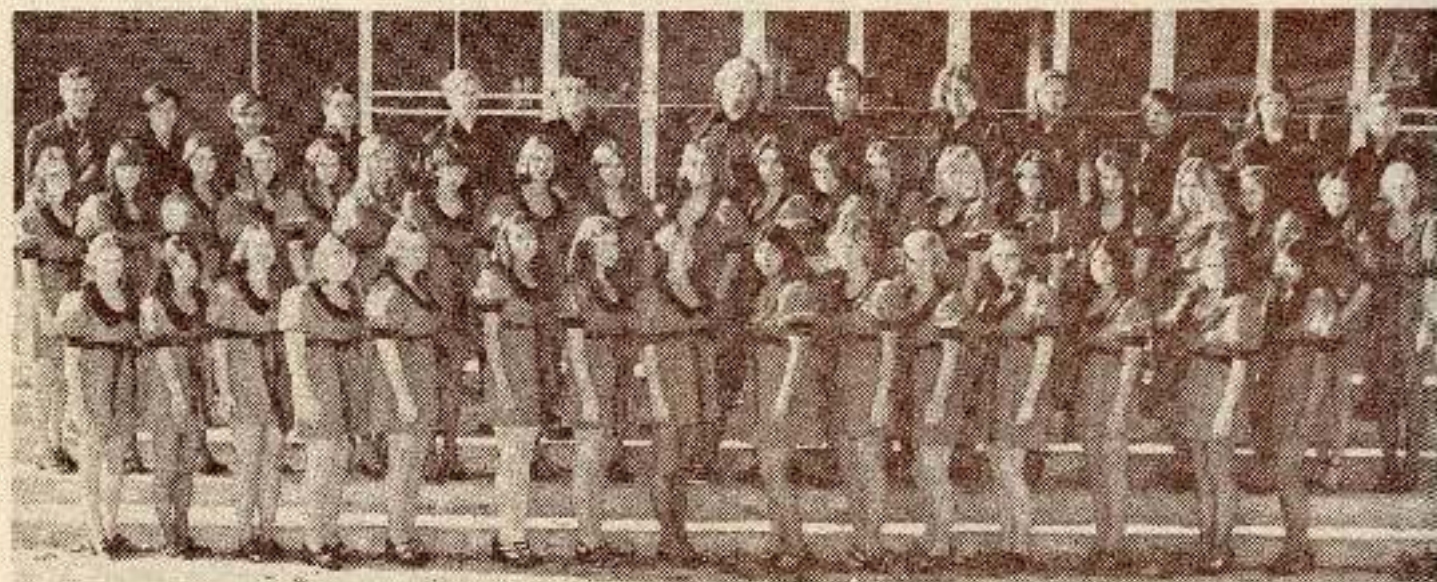
## Modes, scales, cadences and chords

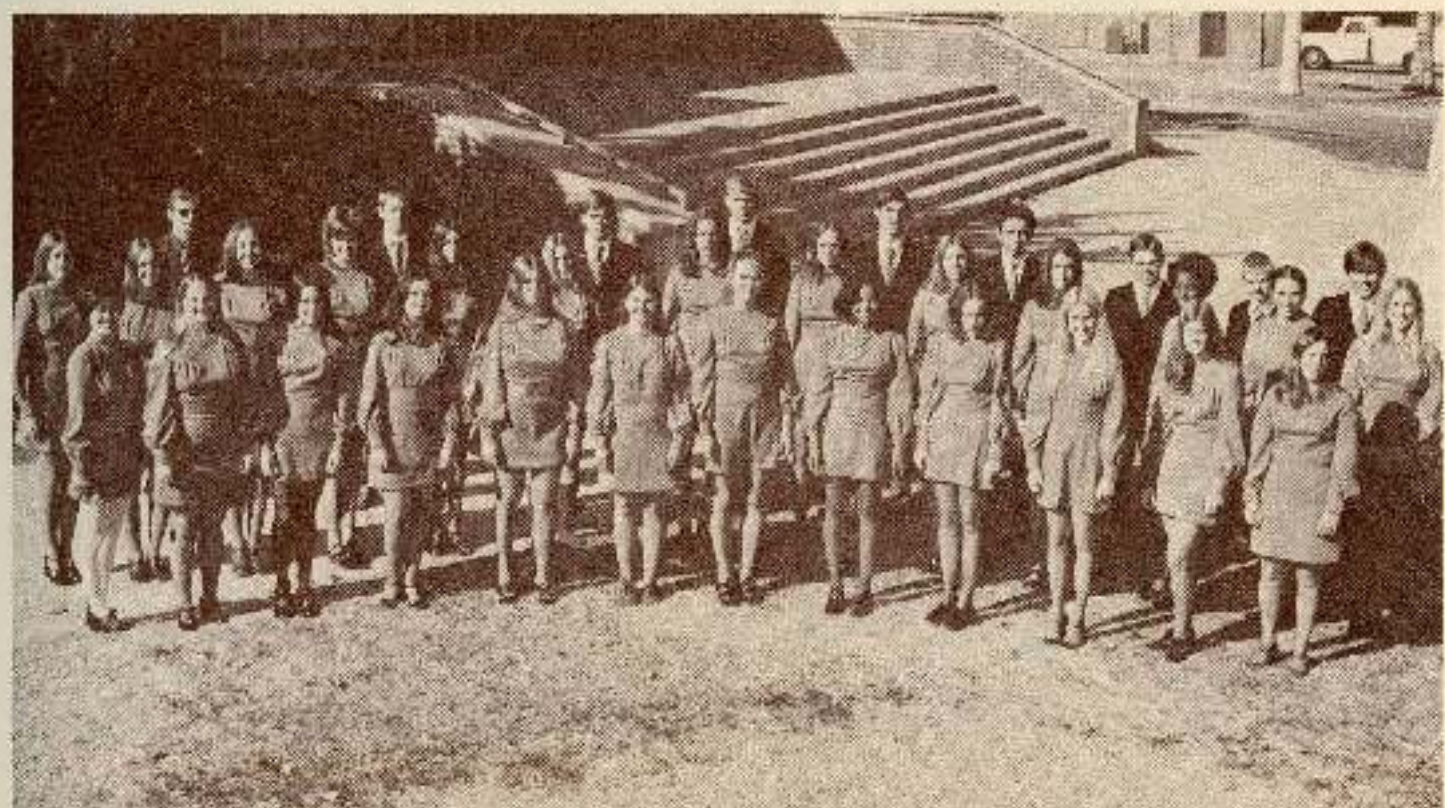

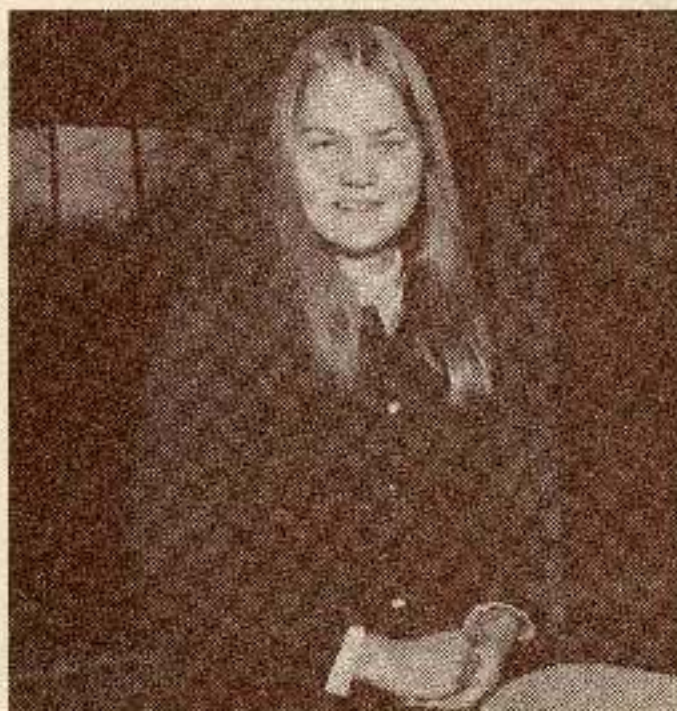
## Reaching superior goals

The Seaside Club bought a rubber raft out of the proceeds from their dance. They also took a diving trip to Catalina Island.

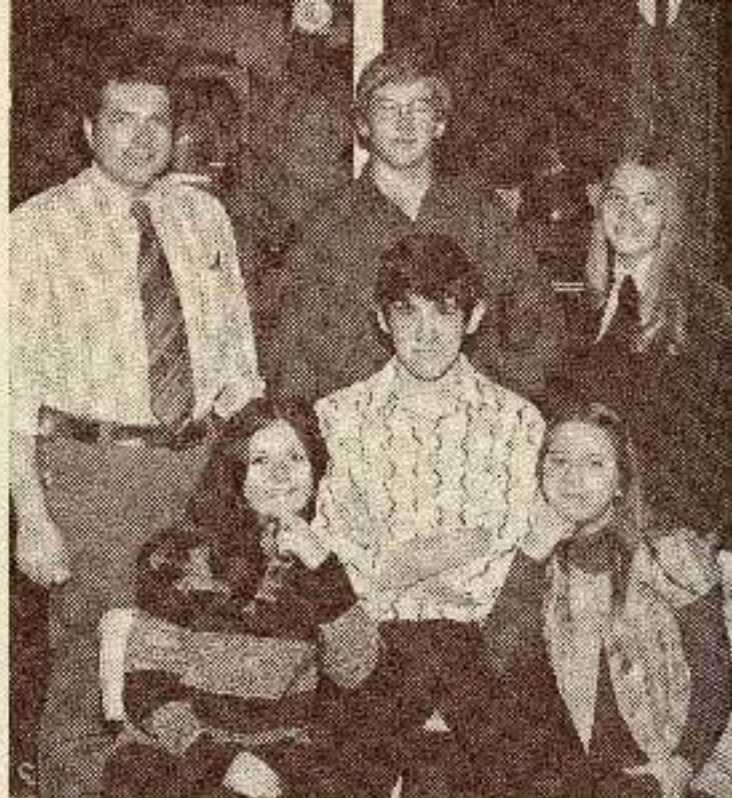
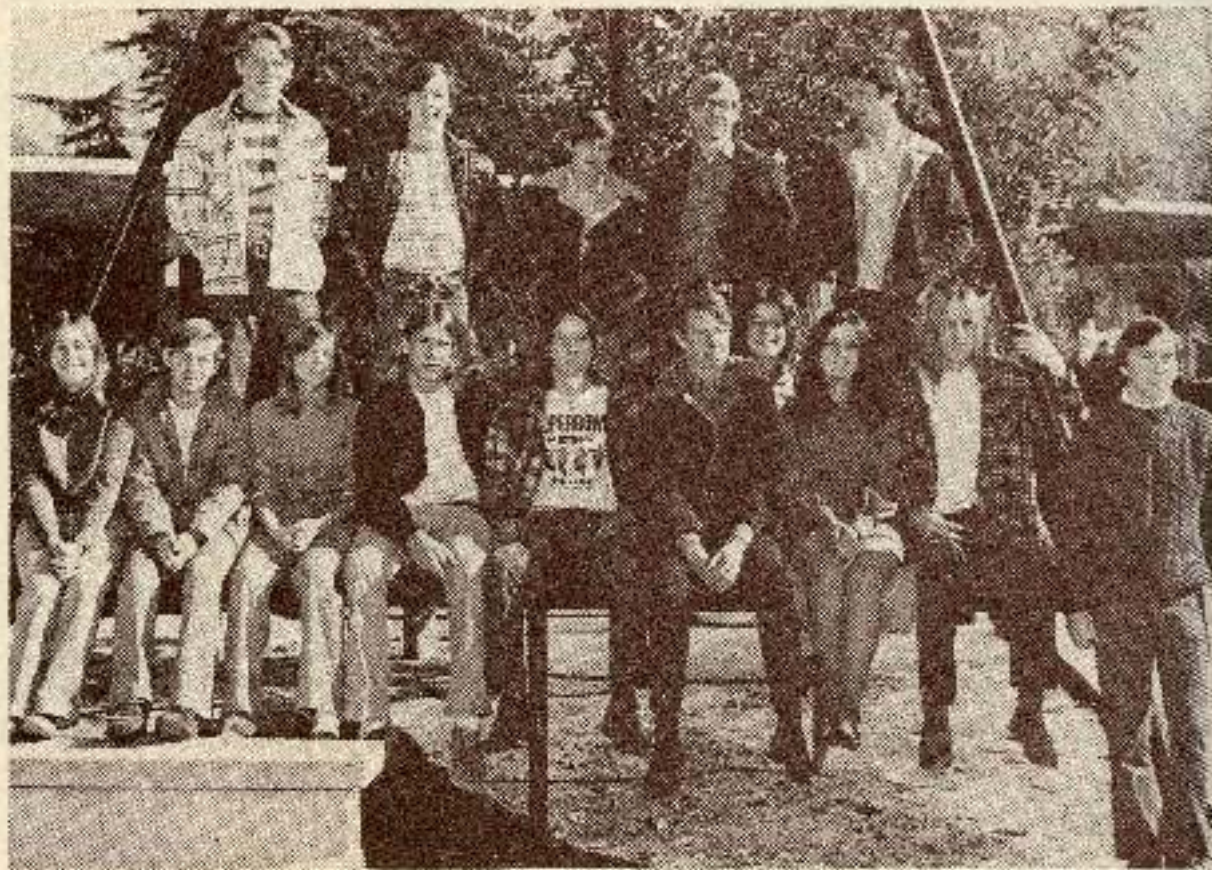

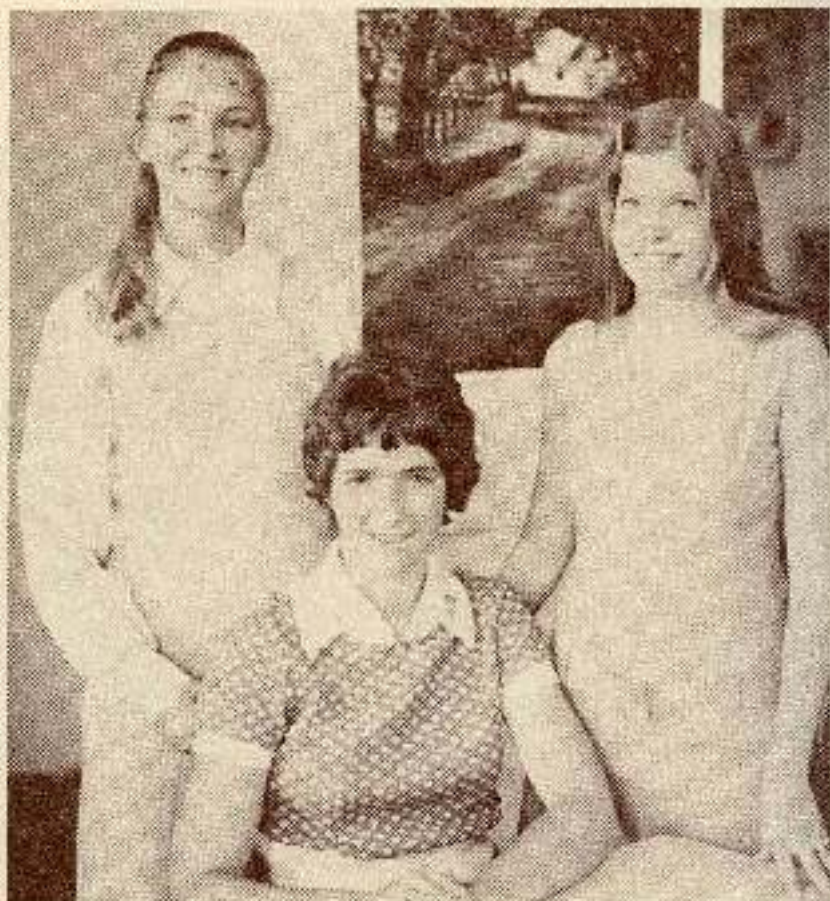
## Eternally spreading

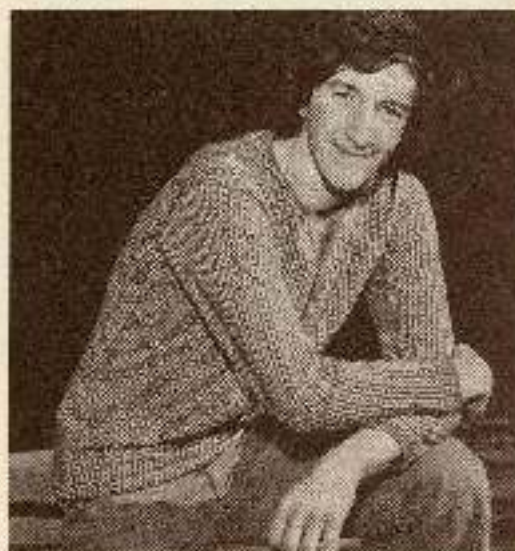

Each participated in a simulated California government procedure, Laura in Squas Valley and Joe in Sacramento.

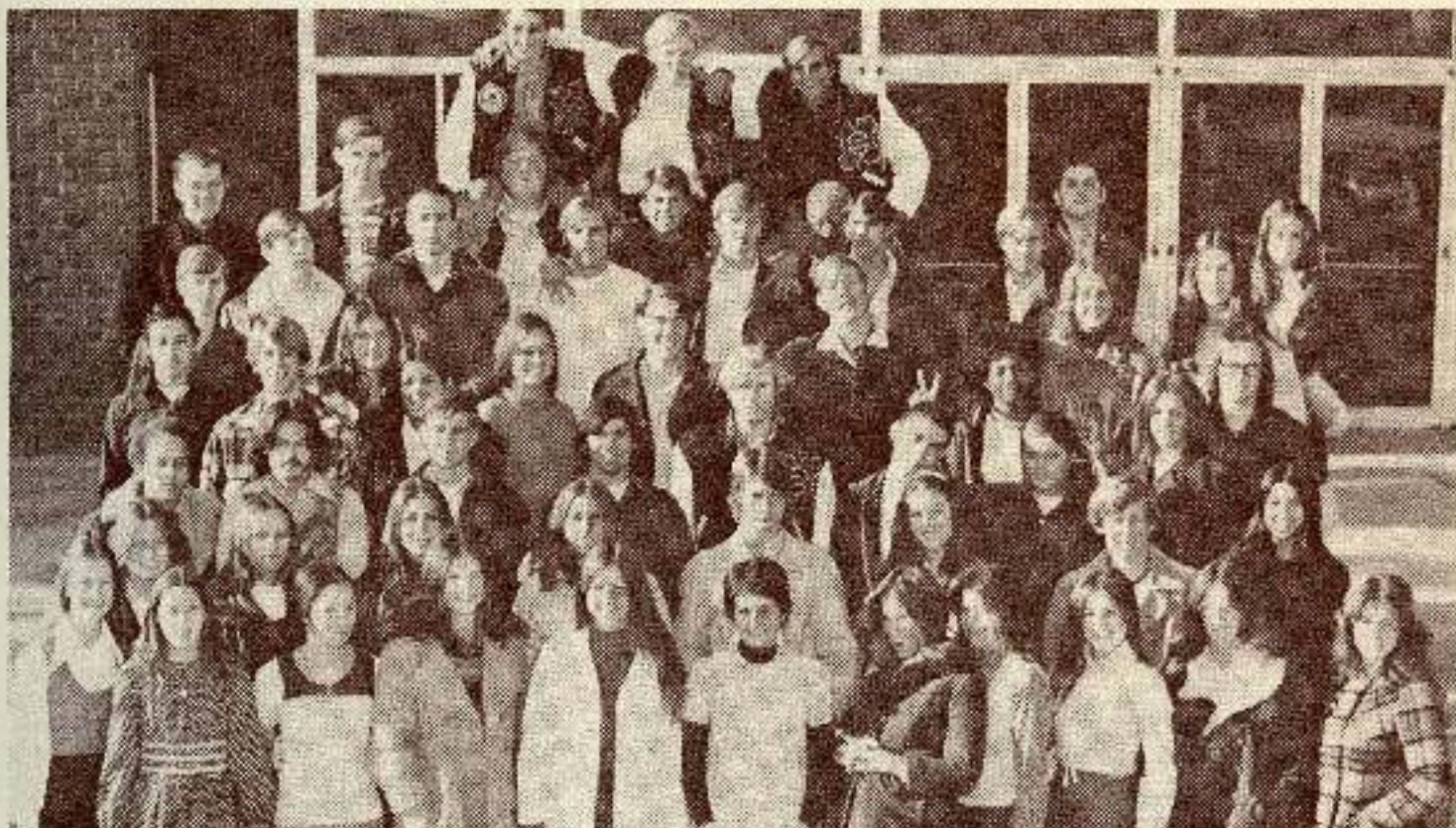

Students were given many opportunities to become involved in a variety of governmental operations providing them with first hand knowledge which will be of value in later years.

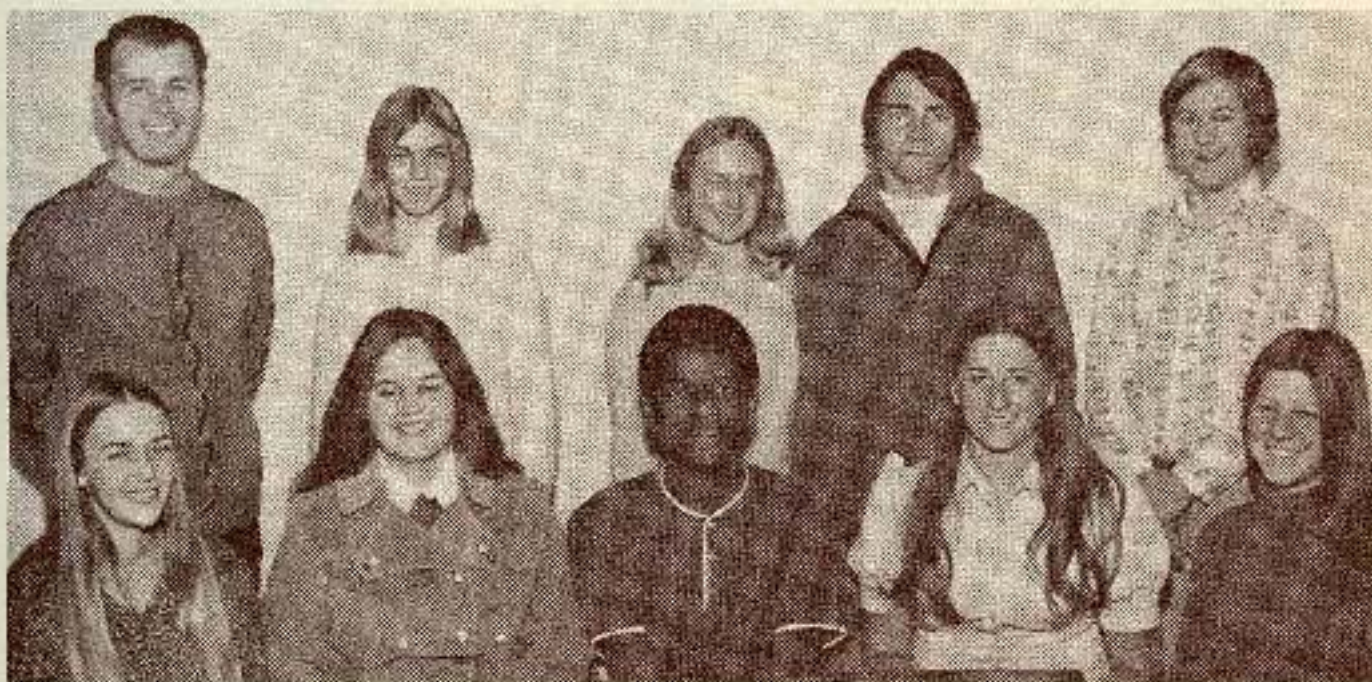

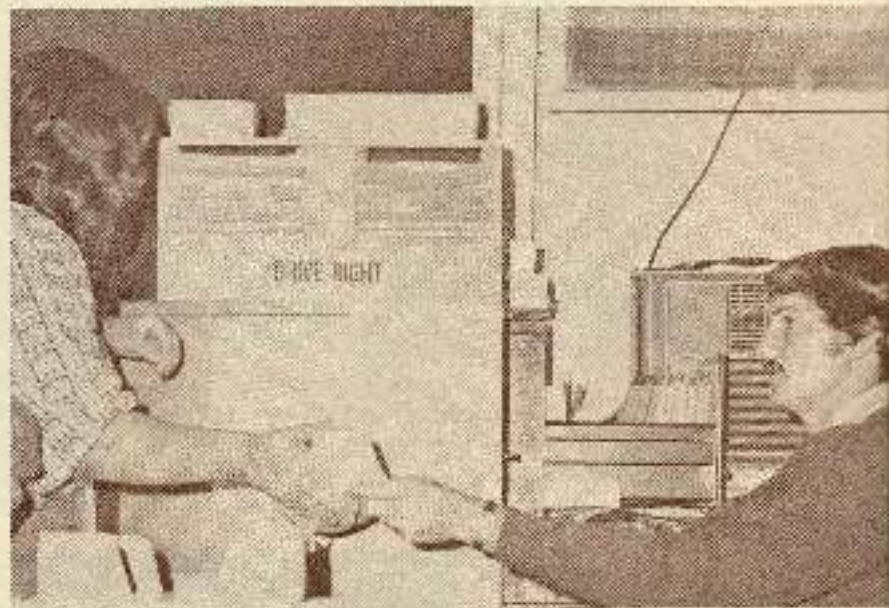

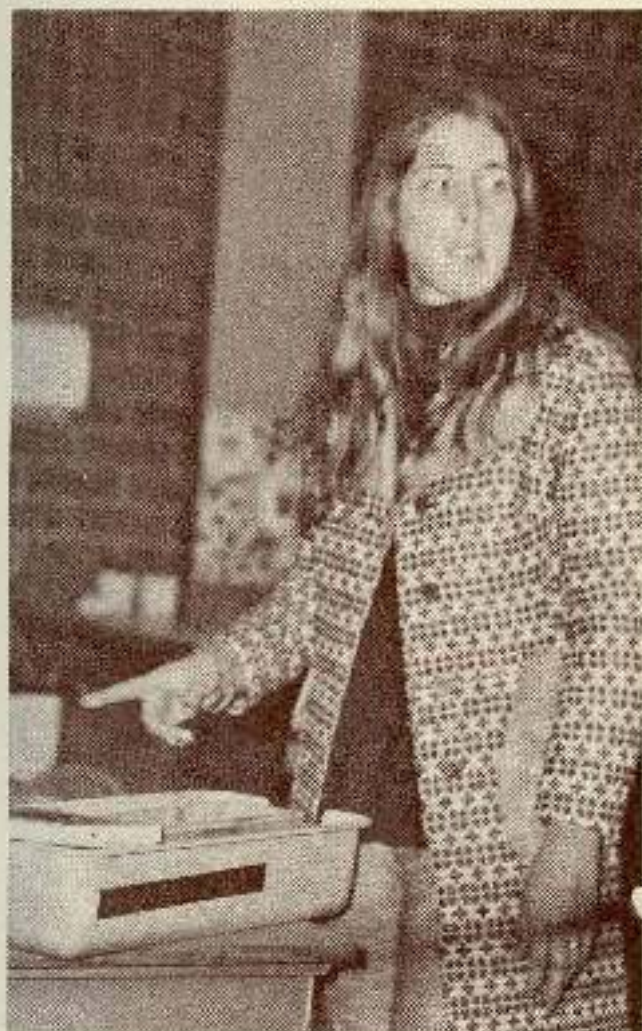

The fine arts department worked hard to help individual students develop and perfect their many and varied talents. In the process, the school and the community enjoyed many hours of pleasant entertainment.





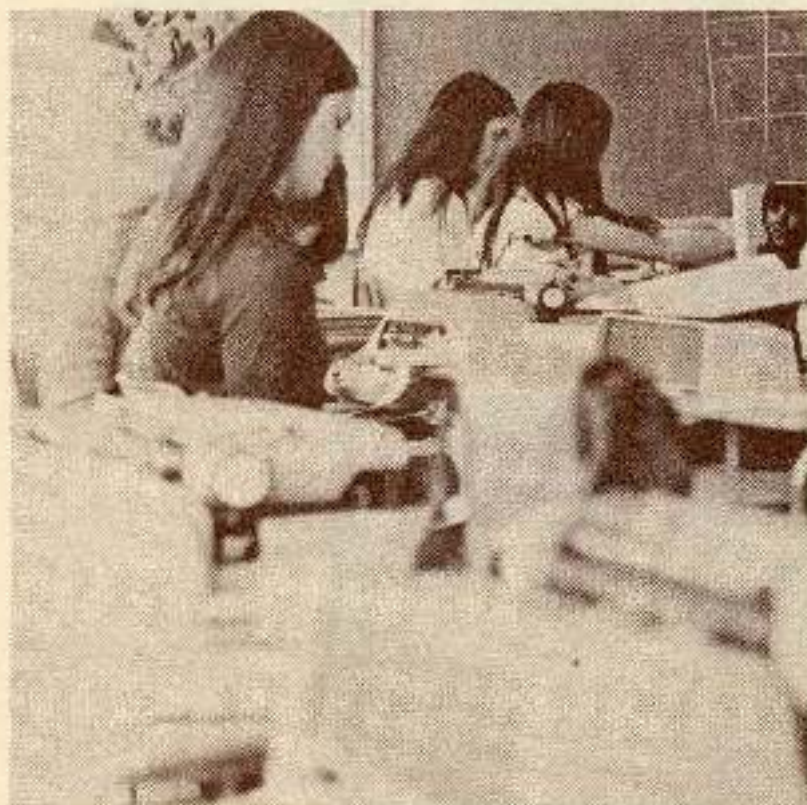

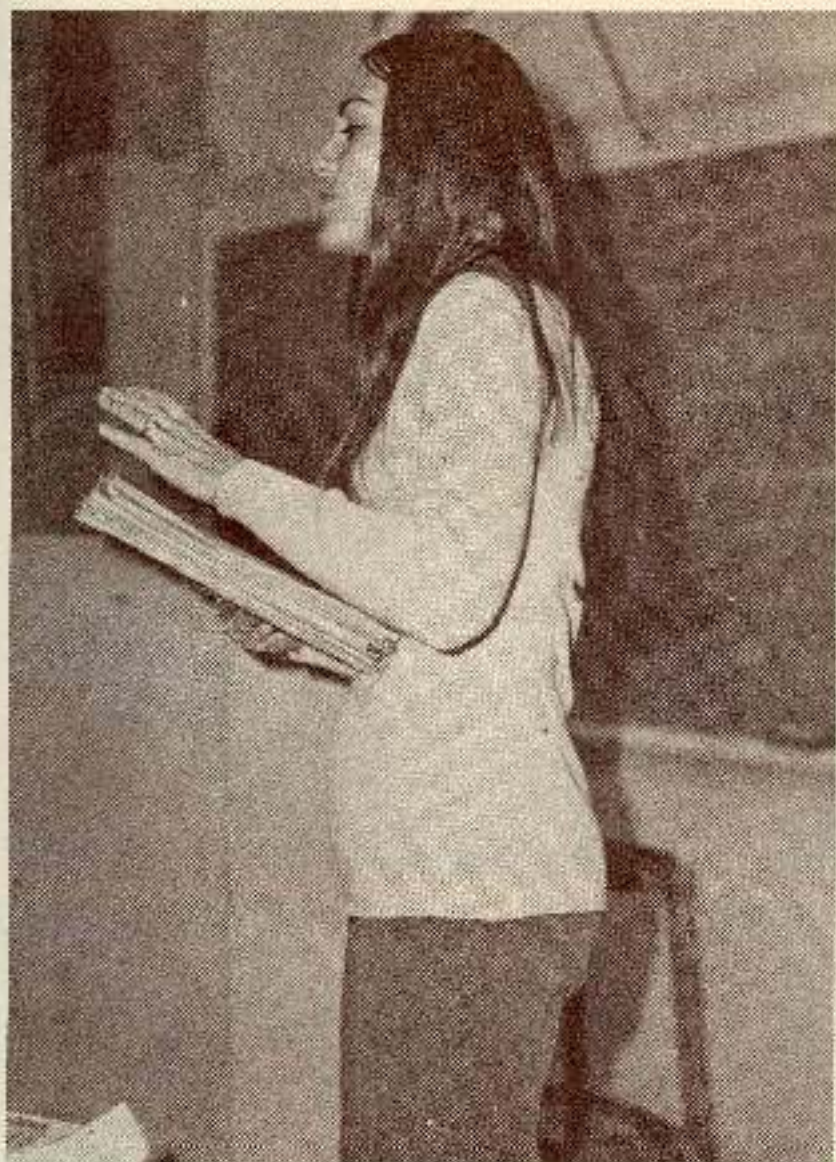

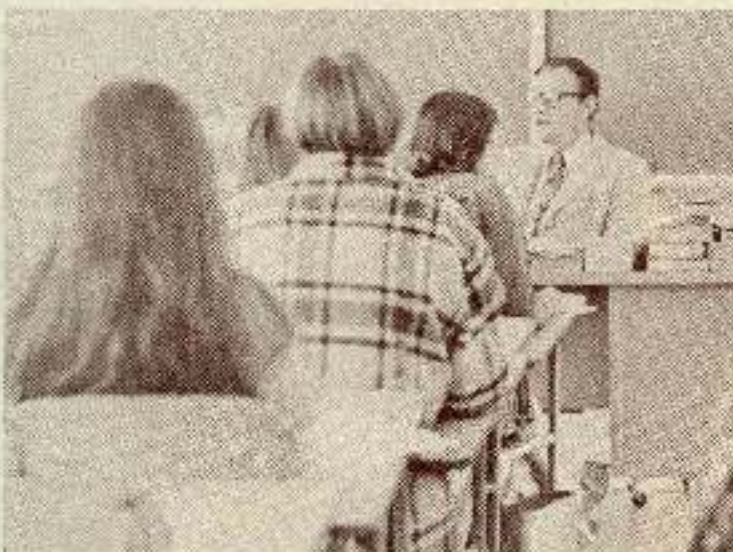


## Dangling participial phrases

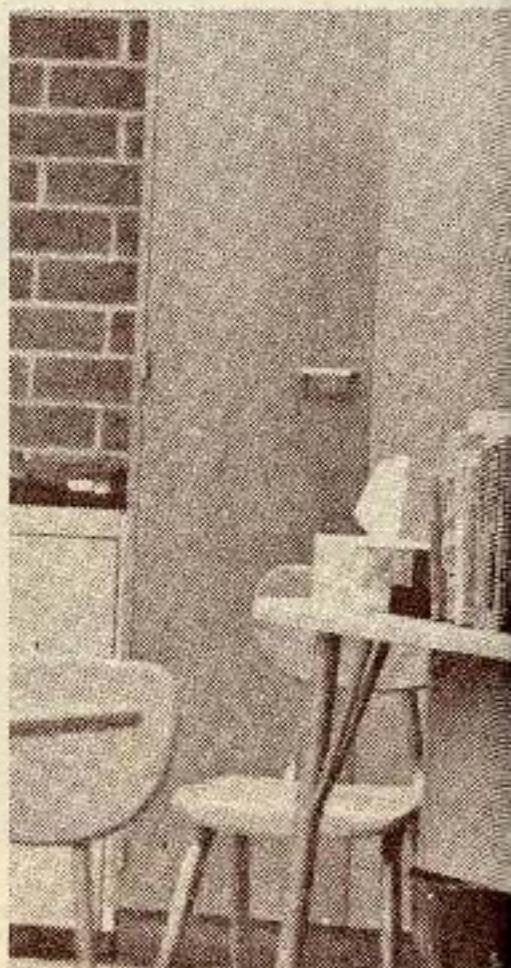

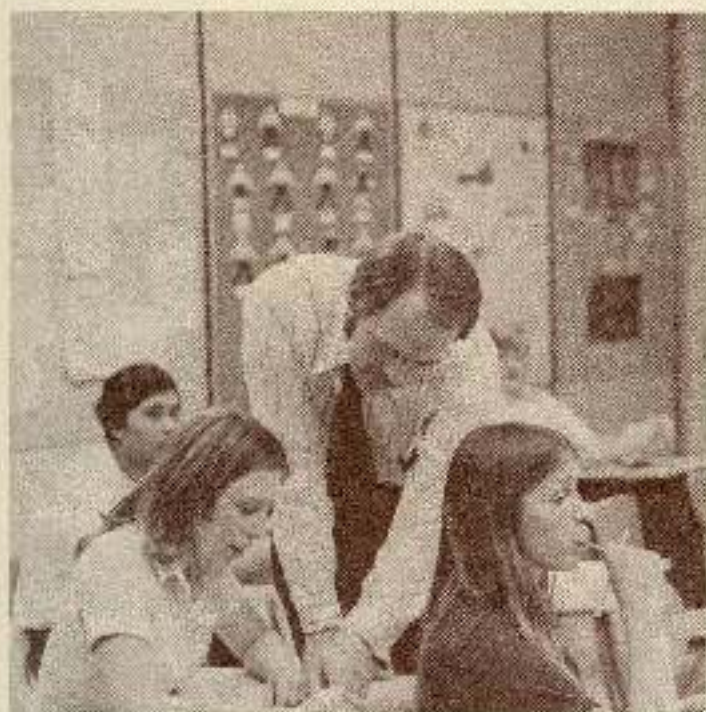

The doors opened by the language department shall not be forgotten by their passers through.

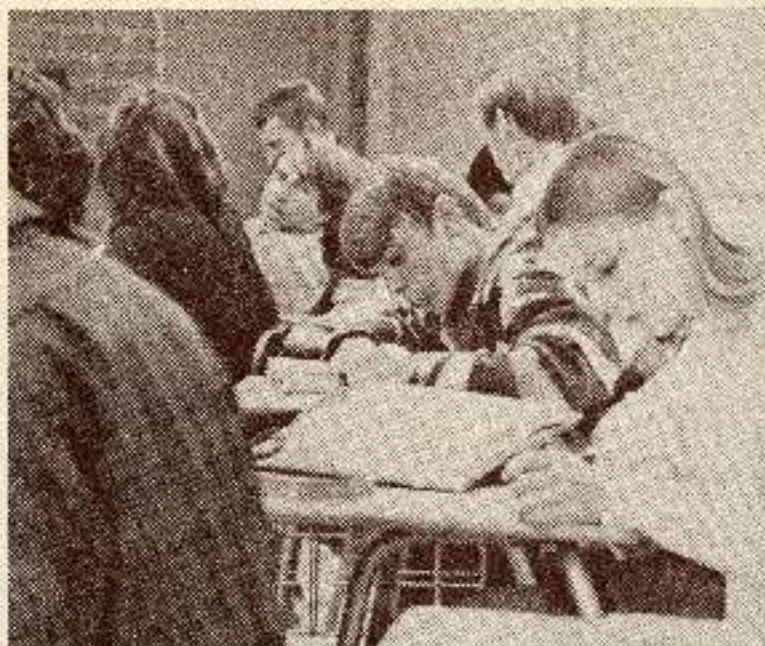

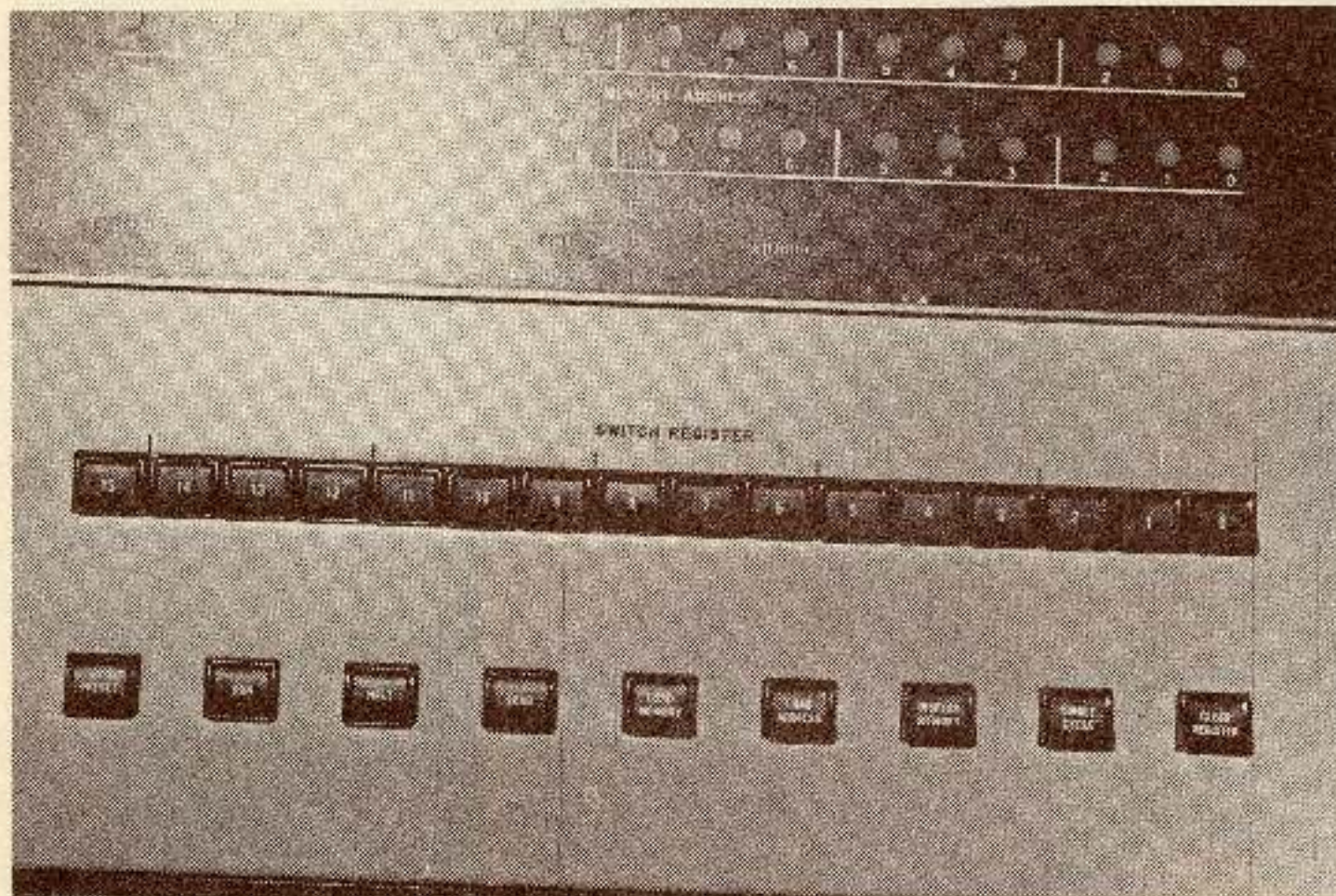


## Playing Black-jack with computers

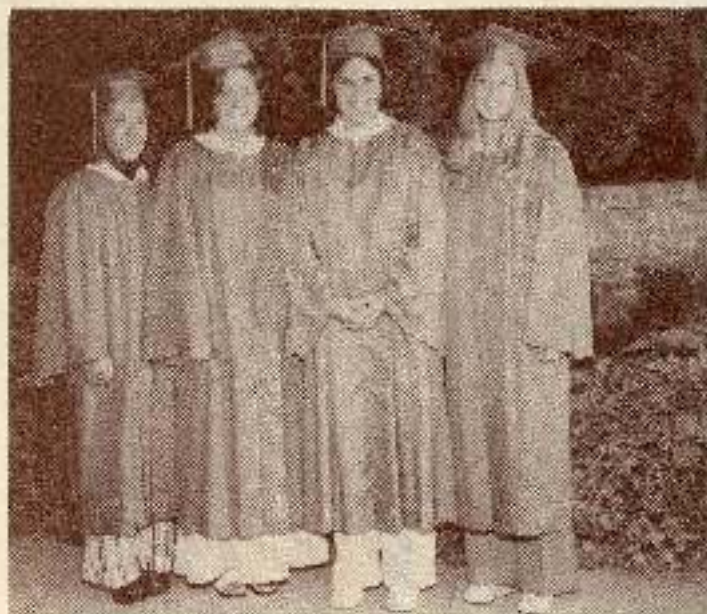
## Starting the year off with the

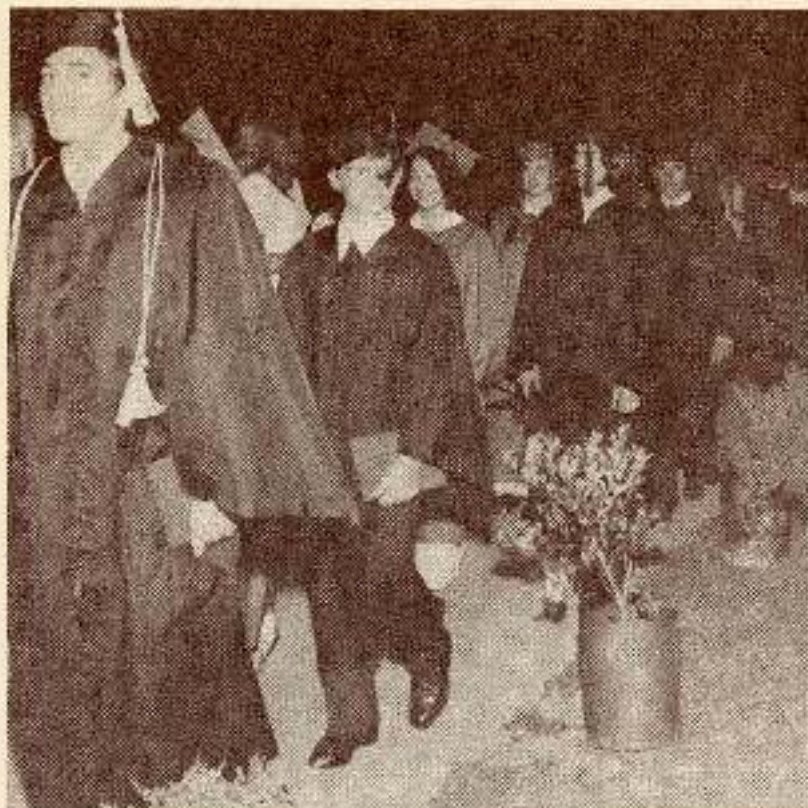

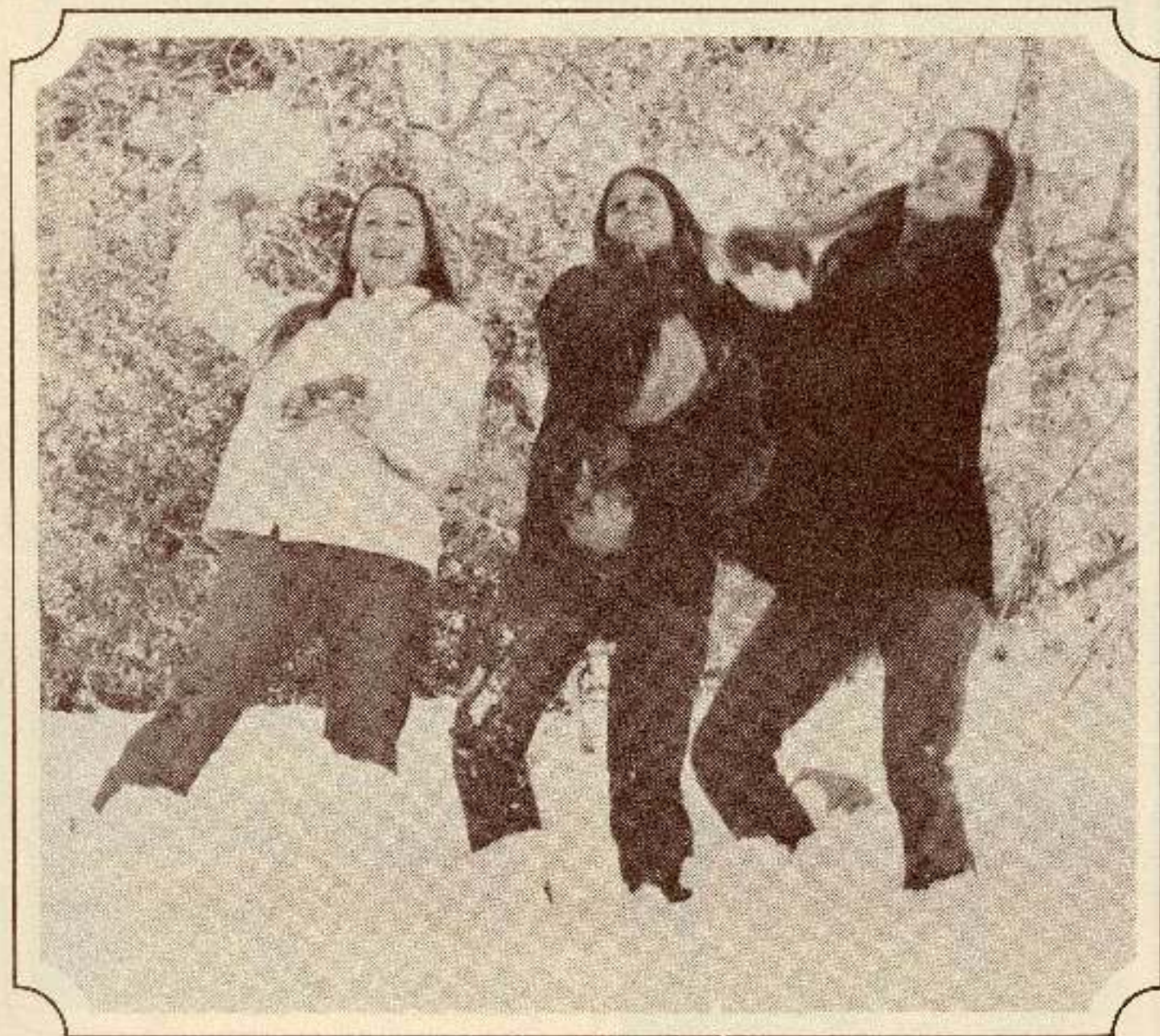


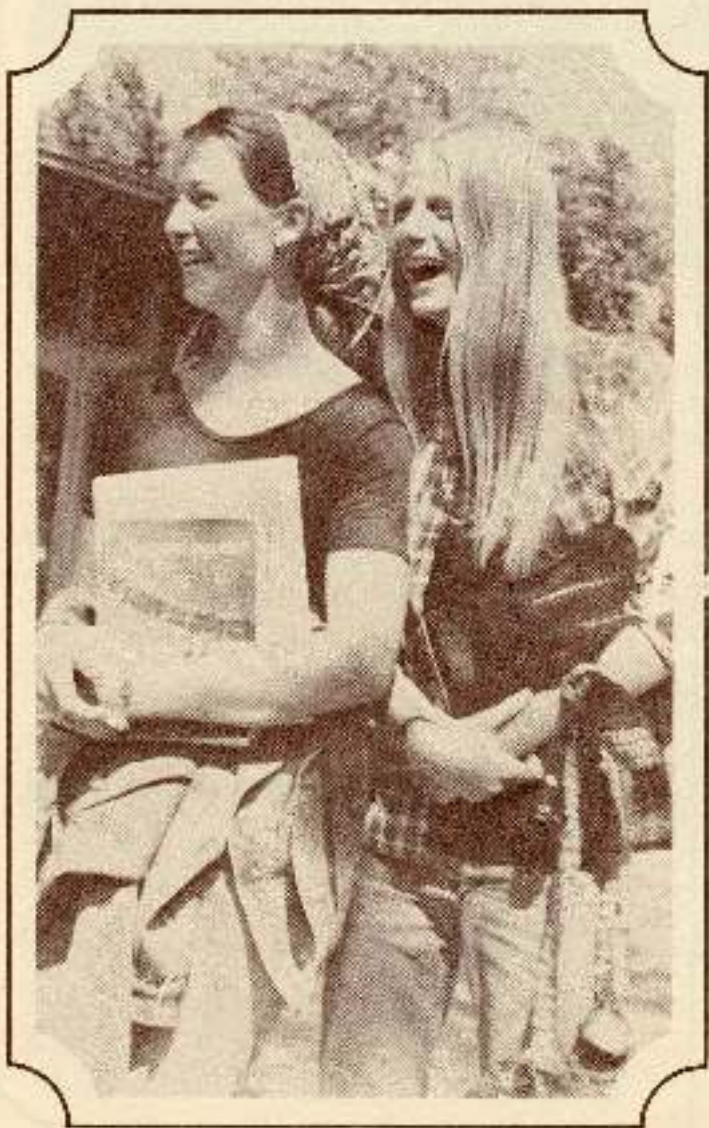
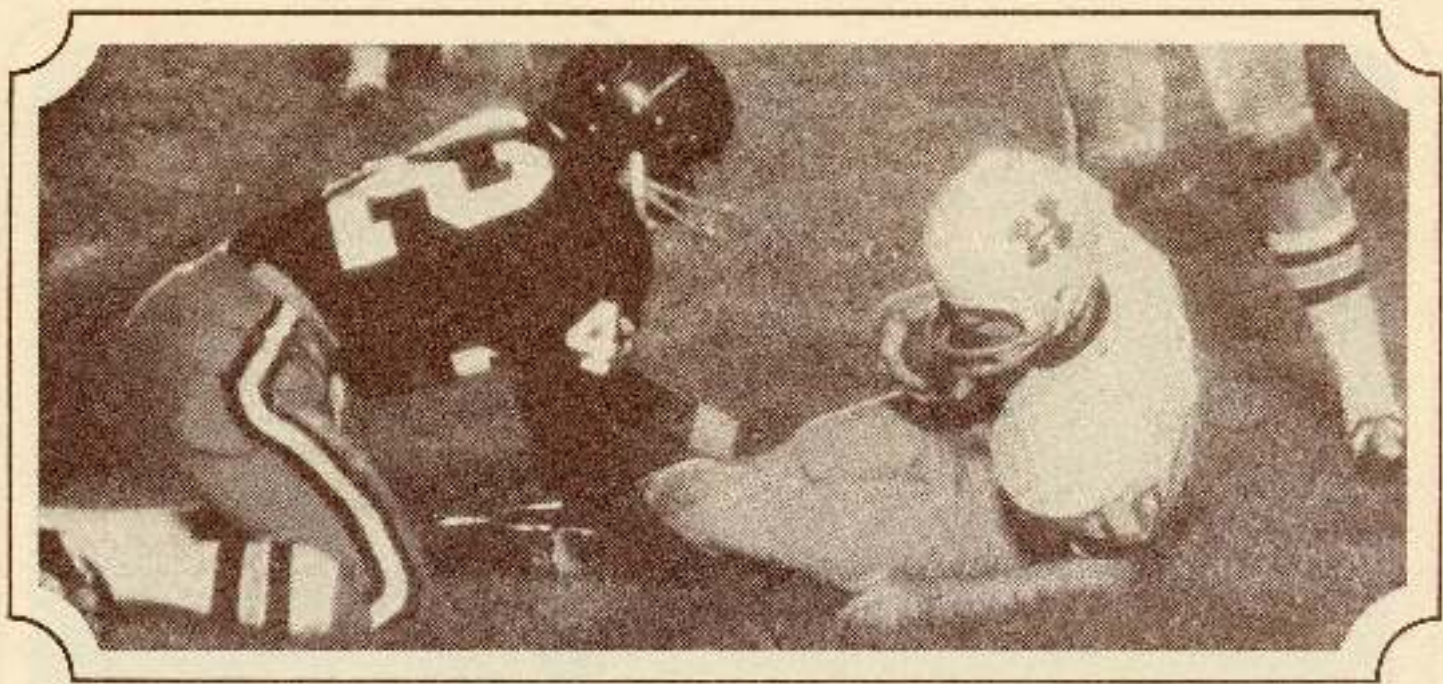


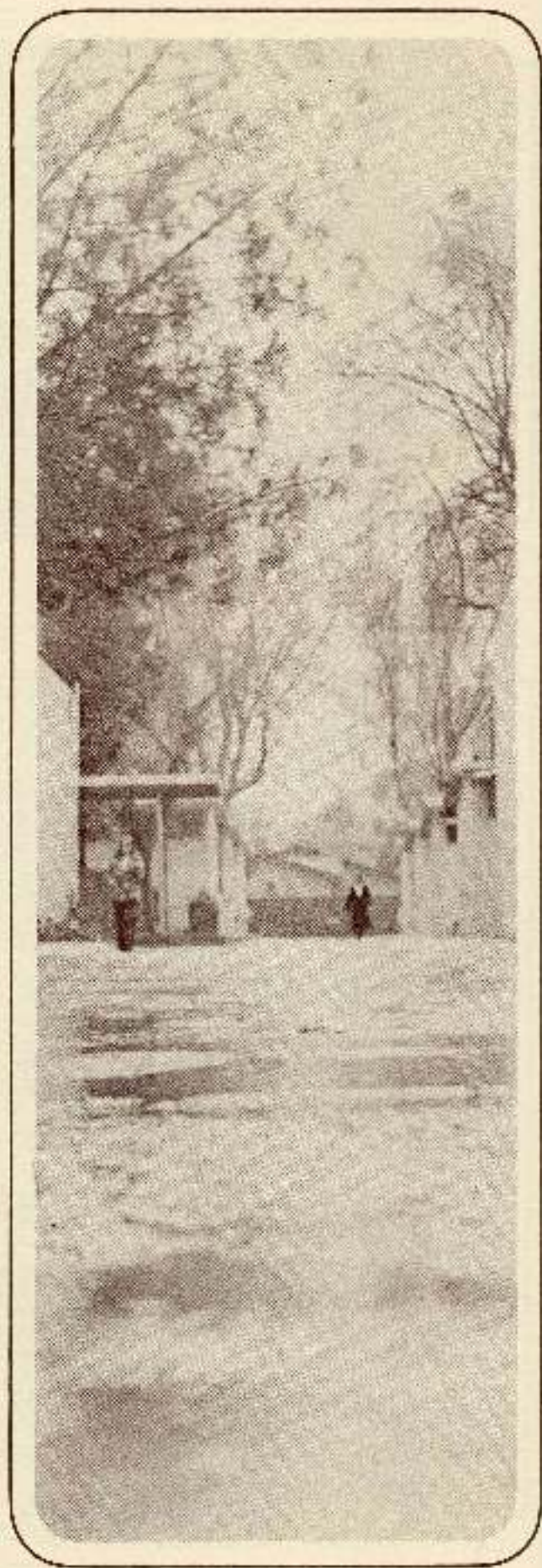


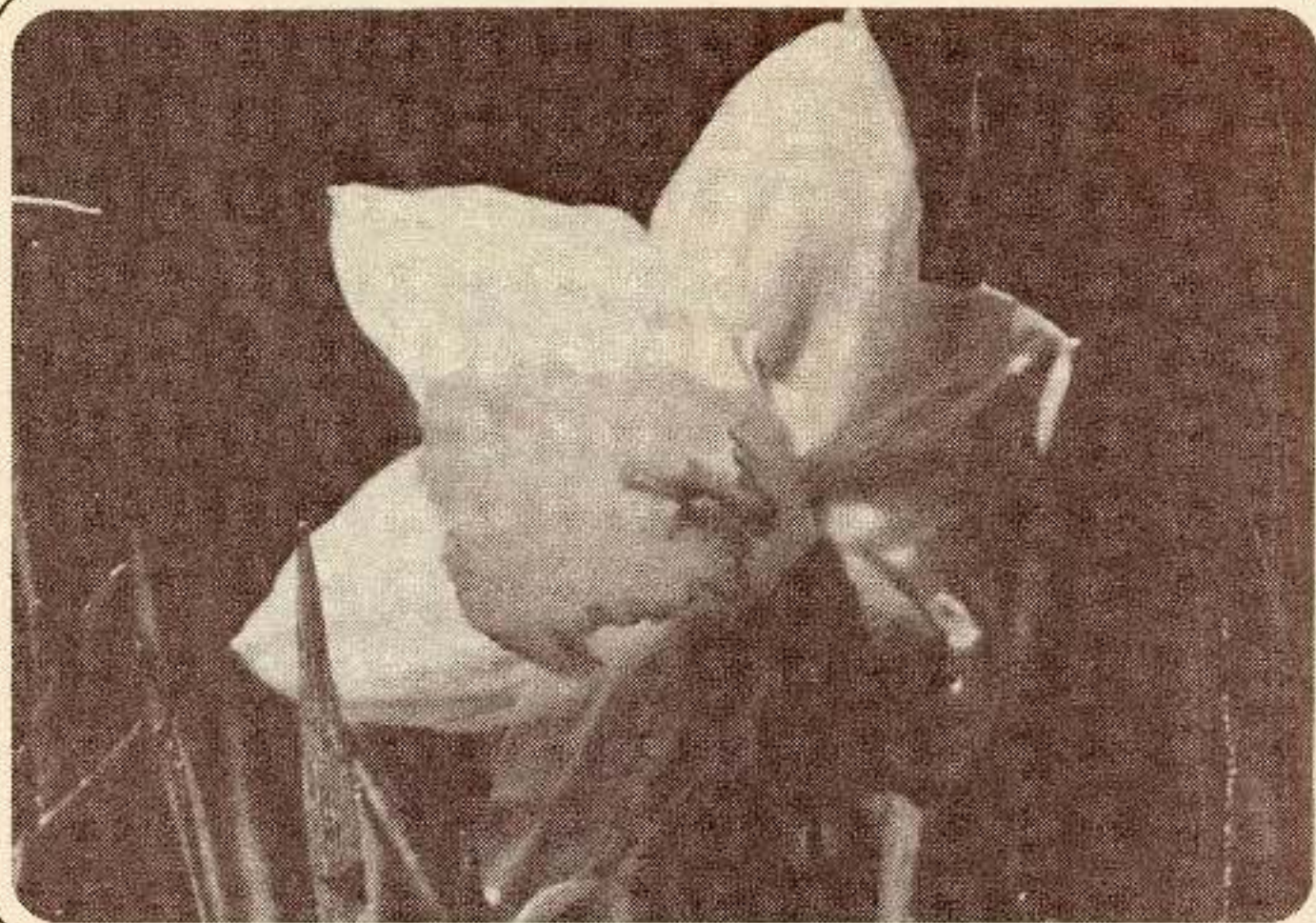
## *Tromping through snow or listening*
