

Olympic Spirit Endures

Some things never change.

The roar of a crowd-packed coliseum. The expression of sheer determination on an athlete's face as he reaches his absolute physical limitations, then thrusts himself beyond them. The thrill of victory that a nation experiences when its athletes outperform their competitors. The agony of defeat that only an athlete can feel when he fails to fulfill the expectations of his teammates and countrymen.

In this changing world, few traditions have escaped the truncating hand of modernization. Most have been deemed unnecessary of foolish by the modern world, then have been discarded, no matter how long they have been in service. But the traditions of the Olympic Games, established in Rome and revived at the beginning of this century, have with-

stood the test of time. Of course, many aspects of the Games have been improved upon in recent years. Innovations in communication have widened the viewing audience of the Games considerably (it has been estimated that an audience of two and a half billion people viewed the 1984 Olympics). Sophisticated times pieces have increased the accuracy of all records set in Olympic events. Recent advances in transportation have assumed Olympic athletes and their countrymen safer and faster passages to countries hosting the Games. But the essential Olympic spirit, epitomized in the timeless athlete, thrill of wideworld competition, has been left unchanged and unimproved by the inventions of modern man.

Though this year's Hart students were not alive to witness the 1932 Olympiad when athletes from all over the world gathered in Los Angeles to compete in the Summer Games, many of them grew up among the remnants of that one busy summer. While some students, as children, visited old Olympic facilities such as the Memorial Coliseum in Los Angeles, the Marine Stadium in Long Beach or practice shooting range in Elysian Park, others drove with their parents down the tree-lined Olympiad Drive and Athenian

Way in Baldwin Hills, paved in 1930 to commemorate the Olympic Games.

Of course, few Hart students missed the 1984 Olympiad nearly every student was able to experience the Summer Games in one way or another. Yet few students actually ventured into the traffic-congested city of Los Angeles to see the Games. For most, the 1984 Olympiad was no farther than the living room television set — complete coverage of all Olympic events was offered for a total of 207 and one eighth hours, over an eighteen day period, by a national television station. Those students who did travel to Los Angeles were able to buy souvenirs such as tee shirts and coffee mugs with Sam, the Olympic Eagle, on them.

Others attended the various

citywide cultural events that commemorated the event, such as concerts, art shows and museum exhibits displaying Olympis relics.

As America prepared itself for the twenty-first century in 1984, it underwent many changes. Students graduated, countries threatened each other, much-loved role models died and made way for new role models. Weighed down by the threat of recessions, depressions, world wars and cold wars,











many Americans went through periods of skepticism and pessimism. Despite this fact, spirit, both national and personal, peaked in 1984. It was in the home, as families viewed the Olympic games together. It was in the eyes of the young Olympic runners as they struggled to attain their lifetime goals. And it was in the words and actions of students at Hart High School as they worked together throughout the 1983-84 school year to prepare themselves for the unknown but exciting challenges of the future.



It can be said that Hart Alumnus Joe Kapp, the only man to play in the Rose Bowl, Canada Grey Cup and the Super Bowl in one lifetime, set a hard to follow.

But that didn't discourage Hart's later athletes from making names for themselves.

Steve Mehr, four year varsity starter in basketball, distinguished himself as a member of the All-CIF 3-A second team and All-Foothill League first team for two years, and All-SCV team for one year. Hart's MVP and leading rebounder for four years was voted the MVP of the Foothill League, and SCV. Mehr led the football team equally well, becoming All-CIF and All-Valley, All-League defensive lineman.

Darryl Ingram, two-year varsity basketball letterman and Most Inspirational Player, earned a place in the Hart Football Hall of Fame, becoming All-CIF, All-Valley, and All-Foothill League tight end, Hart's Most Outstanding Receiver, and MVP of the CIF championship team. In track, Ingram was an outstanding sprinter and long jumper, placing second in the league 100 and 220.

Having broken four football passing records, **Tom Bonds** became All-CIF and All-Valley second team quarter-

back, and Hart's MVP in 1984. In baseball, Bonds was the third baseman on the league championship team. He was voted team captain.

Football Player **Kurt Holden**, winner of Hart's Outstanding Team Player Award, and All-Foothill League first team defensive end, also excelled in track, with a record breaking discus throw of 185'-1" and a dazzling shotput throw of 59'-8", earning statewide recognition, placing second in the CIF 4-A discus and first in the shot-put.

Also of state-wide importance was track team member, **Lisa Rizzo**, who set records in the 1500, 3000, 1600,

and 3200 yard run at Hart, fifth and sixth in the prestigious Mt. Sac and Arcadia Invitational Meets and went on to place fifth in the CIF 4-A girls' track meet.

Ron Masino, pitcher of the baseball team, became the MVP of the Foothill League and SCV and was voted All-CIF pitcher one year as a junior.

Samantha Ford, Hart's hottest softball pitcher, was voted the Foothill League MVP and CIF 4-A co-MVP for obvious reasons. Her record .00 E.R.A., eighteen shutouts and 340 strikeouts in 196 1/3 innings won her countless interviews and an appearance on "That's Incredible."

Teammate Lorie Fausett was selected All-CIF and All-League catcher for two consecutive years.

Outshining his opponents was golf team member Wayne Merich, who went to CIF for three years in a row and became the Jr. Club champion at Vista Valencia and the winner of a Foothill League medal.

Mark Ensing, three year starter on the basketball squad was a leading scorer and rebounder this year. He was joined by David Strauss as a stalwart defender and scorer on the league championship Hart team.

Jeff Stabile, the finest diver to hail from Hart, finished second in the 3A CIF diving competition for four years in a row.

Invincible and mighty Mike Harvey led the Varsity Boys' Soccer team to another Foothill League championship. Harvey was named to the All-League team and voted by the Signal as MVP of the All-Valley Soccer squad.

In the eyes of many Americans, the Right Stuff was something displayed by only the most charismatic men of space and the silver screen. Hart students knew better. They saw the Right Stuff at work in every record set, every hit or goal scored, every touchdown made.












We Worked All Week, And Paid The Price, And Now



:15 a.m. The sun's rays filtered through the fog, dimly lighting the Hart campus. In the students' parking lot were perhaps a dozen cars, huddled together near the campus. 














The Student League Presents its inspirational message to the football. Sophomores Kelli Vollom and Lisa Fadale march with varsity cheerleaders.

The Best In 36 Years


Hart's 1983-84 athletic teams were unquestionably the best in its thirty-six year history. Seventeen League Championships proved it.

Hart started its onslaught of the Foothill League early in the fall with the Boys' and Girls' Varsity Cross Country teams, as well as the Freshmen and Varsity Football teams. Later in the first semester, the winter season athletes made their marks on the League by capturing the Boys' and Girls' Varsity Soccer and the Freshmen and Varsity Basketball Championships. In this semester alone, Hart's athletes picked up eight League Championships.

In the spring season, Hart increased its momentum, capturing nine more championships. Frosh-/Soph Track, Varsity Baseball, and Varsity Softball all had outstanding records, with only four losses among them on the way to League Honors. The most amazing accomplishments however, came from the golf and swimming teams. Both won all of the possible League Championships in their sport; golf with JV and Varsity, and swimming with Boys' and Girls' JV, as well as Boys' and Girls' Varsity. It was a banner year for Hart.

It was also a year of firsts for Hart. The Varsity Football Team won the Coastal Conference Championships. The Varsity Boy's swim team broke into the top ten at 3-A CIF Finals with an outstanding fifth place finish. The Varsity Golf Team sent each one of its players to League Finals. And the list went on, with many more teams succeeding and individuals attaining personal bests.

We're Number 1!







For a long, long time, in a high school very, very near, the Varsity Football team struggled to overcome enemy teams, battled to become the victors and failed miserable. Until 1983. Until Hart went 11 and 2. Until Hart faced North Torrance across a football field, and won.

It all started with Canyon, and an emotional game against a cross town rival, lost in the last few seconds of the game, 21-22. But that loss sent Hart to Crespi with a fierce determination to win. The tough, private school fell 42-0, completely shut-out. Alemany, rated number one in California, lost on T.V., 17-7. Quartz Hill lost 17-7. And Saugus was buried in mud, 20-0.

Hart opened league play with Burbank Burroughs. Deep into overtime, Hart kicked a field goal to win 17-14. Alhambra, a weak team, fell 21-0. The game against San Gabriel was played at Canyon, and despite several called back touchdowns, Hart triumphed 27-7. The Burbank Bulldogs were defeated 14-3, clinching at least a tie for League Champs. And then came Schurr. The low point of the season, Hart was shamed, 15-21.

Entering the playoffs, Hart cleaned-up the homefield with Oxnard, 35-15. On enemy territory, Hart defeated Newbury Park, 19-14. West Torrance, an arrogant team who had already reserved a Jr. College for their next game, was upset 33-7. The last play-off game was played at home. North Torrance scored two touch downs right off to lead 0-13. But Hart battled back to take the Coastal Conference title game, 29-16. It was the first championship ever in Hart's thirty-nine year history. And it happened in 1983.



















Question: In 1984, which two organizations held the most activities and the most prestige?


Answer: ASB and FBLA. Both organizations, with the support of the entire student body, enjoyed a successful and profitable year.











After assembling the seven returning members of the Chieftains, Mr. Thornton searched high and low for eight more talented musicians to round out Hart's own jazz ensemble.








Four years were offered in both Spanish and French, and many special activities took place during the year.

Five exchange students representing "Youth for Understanding," two from Sweden and one each from





Fine Variety Of Fine Arts

In 1984, students were required to enroll in at least one semester-long fine arts course. Hart's Art and Music Departments offered students a wide variety of such courses from which to choose.

The Art Department boasted classes in two areas: two and three dimensional art. Experience in Art, taught by Miss Mary Ann Guho, was geared toward students with no art back-

Left: Dave Lee and Larry Cummings watch Erik Knowles demonstrate the fine art of airbrushing.





In this class, students were given "hands-on" experience with a variety of media — cartooning, calligraphy, water-color, paper maché and pastel. In more advanced classes such as ceramics, instructed by Mr. David Hall, students were given additional experience in 3D art. Airbrushing on paper or on clay became a popular project among students enrolled in these advanced classes.

The Music Department offered classes dealing with both instrumental and choral music. Sound Vibrations, the choral/dance ensemble, and the Concert Choir, both directed by Miss Judy Starr, were immensely popular among students. The instrumental section of the Music Department was headed by Mr. Larry Thornton. This section consisted of the Jazz Ensemble, Marching Band and spring Symphonic Wind Ensemble. The Jazz Ensemble, known as the Chieftains, was open to all students with a keen interest in music who had previously performed with the Marching Band. The Marching Band was composed of students who had been selected from auditions during the summer. These students gathered every morning in the fall months to rehearse for half-time shows and competitions. In the spring, the Marching Band moved indoors to become the Symphonic Wind Ensemble. Students from each instrumental group were encouraged to audition for the district-wide Honor Band. Out of fifty-seven district members in the band, Hart members numbered thirty-three, a credit to Hart's fine Music Department.


The math program saw the addition of geometry, advanced algebra/ trigonometry, and math analysis honors courses, besides gaining an advanced placement calculus course. The department had three levels in which to place students, instead of placing students merely according to years of study. And the sounds of Mr. Mc Elroy explaining tests, Mr. Lund admonishing students to do homework, Mrs. Baker breaking up political debates, and students questioning Mr. Rose were heard often during the year, contributing to the learning atmosphere.

The Science Department offered basic classes and advanced classes, such as IPS, biology, chemistry, and physics. In IPS, Mr. Keil dazzled his students with a display of old-fashioned alchemy, while biology students grew cultures of mold and studied them. Meanwhile, Mr. Leth's physics students used a toy bulldozer to determine instantaneous speed.


A minimum of one semester of Practical Arts was required for graduation, but Hart's wide variety made the choice of only a single class hard. Students had to choose from classes in typing, recordkeeping, shorthand and California survival, not to mention the new word processing class offered on Computers. Drafting, woodshop and metal shop were some other choices offered.

Hart also expanded its Regional Occupational Program (ROP), enabling students to learn the entry-level skills needed to obtain a job. Over one hundred students were enrolled in the classes, in which they earned credits toward graduation while learning a trade. In addition to formal classroom instruction, local businesses provided students with **"real"** and current on-the-job training through the community classroom concept. Students learned hotel operations at The Ranch House Inn, banking occupations at Security Pacific Bank, Newhall, and child care in several local nursery schools and day care centers. After completion of a course, students received a certificate that listed all achievements.


The varied courses offered made fulfilling the Practical Arts requirement a rewarding and enjoyable experience for the students of Hart.




Preparation Pays Off For Rookies

The ceremony, held during the basket-



Shortly after the King and Queen, Mike Harvey and Cloud Mysko, were








TBA proved to be as fabulous as ever, studded with some new stars and some old songs. Performances by the Sound Vibrations and the Chieftains made the evening a memorable one.


Hart's Other Parking Lot






Fun In The Sun






Sigrid Ebert was not an average freshman. Born in Stuttgart, Germany, she visited relatives in the United States every year until moving here in 1979.


Earning The Bronze With Spirit



Erik Knowles Challenges Fate

With deceptive ease, Erik Knowles maneuvered his father's Ultralight glide at a dizzying two thousand feet above the ground. Despite a heavy haze in the air, he could see the ground beneath his feet and the peaceful, open sky ahead of him.

Suddenly, Erik was jolted into action by the unwelcome sight of a rapidly approaching Cesna 150. Without a moment of hesitation, he cut his glider's engine to idle, went into dive, and lifted one of the glider's colorful wings to catch the attention of the Cesna. As he was losing altitude rapidly, he was forced to make a landing. But due to his quick thinking and extensive training, he emerged from a potentially fatal situation safe and sound.

Erik was no newcomer to flying gliders when, in 1980, he received preliminary Ultralight training from his father, Chris. He had been flying conventional hang gliders (those without engines) since he was five. In fact, as a boy, he was featured in a magazine specifically for glider fans. With such a backround, it is not hard to see why Erik chose to pursue a career as an aeronautic pilot, or a trick pilot. A short term goal that Erik had was to begin a precision flyteam with his father. But what about the danger? Erik's attitude towards the risk of flying was probably best summarized in his account of his brush with the Cesna plane.

"It made my heart beat fast," he remarked with a smile, "but at least I knew how to react."




Success? Yes!






Making Horse Sense


Marc Vasquez Pays Close Attention To Detail

"that I had to hire another guy to help me out."




Diving For Aussie Honors



Coach Sanchez played for Hart in his Sophomore year of high school, then transferred to Canyon for eleventh and twelfth grade, where he earned all-league honors and was rated the Most Inspirational Player by his teammates. He played ball for COC from 1971 to 1972 and earned second team league honors.

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
As captain of the team, he again was voted the Most Inspirational Player.

Coach Doug Michelson, like Coach Sanchez, had a formidable record of success. He first coached at Polytechnic High, where he was voted Coach of the Year by the L.A. Times. Later, he moved to Pierce College, where he was promised a teaching position. Cutbacks came and the position didn't. Since Coach Michelson didn't want to becoma a "rent-a-coach" just coming in every afternoon to coach - he came to Hart, where he helped the varsity team to compile a 36-14 record, earn one league Championship and produce seven allleague team members and three CIF players. He was instrumental in helping the 1983 team complete its first undefeated season since 1958. He attributed his success in part to the cooperation of the Administration. "Hart is a great place to teach and coach," he beamed.

"If I had the chance to do it again, I'd definitely do it."
























The Year Of Back

1984. The book by George Orwell. The year by us. The year of nineteen hundred and eighty-four.




