October of 1962 Mrs. Lena Huntsinger, assistant administrator of the Santa Clarita Hospital made a plea to the Santa Clarita Methodist Church Womens Society of Christian Service to help in the need for a hospital service group as the outcome of a Greyhound Bus accident which occurred on Oct. 12, 1962.

November 27th a group of interested citizens with a committee of three ladies; Martha Barton, Jerann Bowmann, and Gwen Gillespie proposed a set of by laws. The meetings were held in the Hart High School Room # 27. Meetings to be held once a month.

BY-LAWS of SANTA CLARITA VALLEY WOMEN'S AUXILIARY

ARTICLE I - Name and Location

The name of this organization shall be the Santa Clarita Valley Women's Auxiliary and shall be located in the Santa Clarita Valley of Los Angeles Co., State of California.

ARTICLE II - Objects

The objective of this organization shall be to sponsor and promote interest in person to person service within the community. The purpose shall, also, be to sponsor and create interest in a hospital service group composed of girls from the age of fourteen years through the age of eighteen years.

ARTICLE III - Policies

The organization shall be non-commercial, non-sectarian and non-partisan. No candidate for public office shall be endorsed by it. Neither the name of the association nor the names of the officers in their official capacities shall be used in any connection with any partisan interest nor for any purpose other than the regular work of the Club.

ARTICLE IV - Membership

Membership in this organization shall be of three types:

- a. Regular membership-These are working members of the auxiliary and shall have the right to participate at membership meetings, hold office and to vote.
- b. Patroness membership- These shall be members who do not actively participate in the volunteer work of this organization. This type of membership may include wives of medical and administrative staffs.
- c. Junior membership- Candy Stripers.

ARTICLE V - Dues

Dues will be due on January 1 of each year and will be considered delinquent after February 15. New members will be given a grace period of six weeks to pay dues after joining, with the exception of new members joining after November 15 of any year. Their dues will be payable January 1 for the coming year.

Dues will be five dollars per year for each member including new members joining at any time during the year, excepting new members joining after November 15.

ARTICLE VI - Officers

The elective officers of this organization shall be the President, lst Vice-President, 2nd Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer.

The nominating committee shall consist of five members, three members elected by the general membership and two elected by the Board of Directors during the month of September. The nominations committee shall report at the regular meeting in the month of October. Nominations may be made from the floor. The consent of each candidate must be obtained before his name is placed in nomination.

Elections shall be held at the meeting in the month of November. If there is but one candidate, the ballot may be dispensed with and the election held by voice vote. A majority of those present and voting shall be necessary to elect.

Installation of newly elected officers shall be held at the December meeting.

Vacancies occuring on the Board of Directors by any means shall be filled by Presidential appointment with the approval of the Board of Directors. The person so appointed shall hold office until the next annual election.

ARTICLE VII - Duties of officers

The President shall be Chairman of the Board. She shall preside at all meetings, shall appoint the chairmen of all committees; shall exercise supervision over all of the affairs of the organization, appoint all special committees and shall be exofficio to all committees, except the nominating committee.

The 1st Vice-President shall preside in the absence of the President, assist the President and act as program director.

The 2nd Vice-President shall preside in case of absence of the President, and the 1st Vice-President, at regular meetings. Also shall be chairman of the membership committee, receive all membership dues and issue all membership cards. All monies received are to be promptly delivered to the Treasurer.

The Secretary shall keep a full and accurate record of all meetings and shall keep the by-laws up to date. She will conduct the correspondence of the organization, give notice of all called meetings and mail bulletins. She should be present at all regular meetings, recording the minutes of the meeting and present the minutes of the previous meeting, if requested. She shall keep in the secretaries book a copy of the by-laws and standing rules and committee appointments. She shall also keep on file acommunications received and copies of communications sent.

The Treasurer shall be the chief iscal officer of the Au iliary. She shall be custodian of the funds of the organization and disburse them only on the authorization of the President. She shall give a written report at each meeting, to be filed with the records of the secretary. The accounts of the Auxiliary shall be kept in a bank so approved by the elected officers. The Treasurer's accounts shall be audited each year.

ARTICLE VIII - Board of Directors.

The Board of Directors shall consist of the elected officers and the chairmen of the standing committees.

ARTICLE IX - Rules of Order

The rules contained in "Roberts Rules of Order, Revised" Shall govern this organization in all cases in which they are applicable and not inconsistent with these by-laws.

ARTICLE X - Amendments.

These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of the membership present, providing a reading of the proposed amendment has been given at the previous regular meeting, or a copy of the proposed amendment has been mailed to each member at least ten days before the meeting designated for the vote.

NEWHALL-SAUGUS - New-hall-Saugus residents will meet to form a community hospital guild at 8 p.m. Tuesday in the William S. Hart High School staff dining room.

The move was originated by Lena Huntsinger, assistant administrator of the Santa Clarita Hospital, Soledad Canyon, Saugus. She directed her plea to the Santa Clarita Methodist Church Women's Society of Christian Service.

"The Greyhound Bus accident which occurred Oct. 12 pointed up the real need for a hospital service group, not only for Santa Clarita but for all hospitals in the area," Mrs. Huntsinger said.

Within the last months, several families in the area have offered their assistance to persons involved in accidents and their relatives by providing temporary housing, emergency clothing and meals.

"In this isolated area there is no place where people can turn for help when they have become stranded because of an

accident," Mrs. Huntsinger added.

A committee headed by Mmes. David Brown and Leland Bowman was formed to arrange the community meeting. Other members of the committee are Mmes. Ann Cash, Lois LoFiego, Nadine Norman and Gwenn Gillespie.

Mrs. Brown has been on night call and Mrs. Martha Barton on day duty, in case their assistance was needed during the past several months.

Mr. and Mrs. Walter Hoefflin spoke before the guild committee last week. Hoefflin is administrator of the Methodist Hospital in Arcadia. Mrs. William McKenney, member of Caritas, Inc., a service organization of the Los Angeles Orthopedic Hospital, also addressed the group.

The guild is expected to sponsor Candy Stripers, a voluntary organization of high school girls who assist at hospitals. Forty-five Hart High School students have voluntered to join the non-nursing service group.




"There has been an

"Our hospital has, as you can see, kept pace with this expanding community, always attempting to provide adequate number of hospital beds as well as excellent medical care.

"In our everyday life, we are geared for changes; Santa Clarita Hospital has always recognized the necessity of changes, whether it be in the purchase of new equipment, the addition of facilities, or the continual training of dedicated employees within our hospital group.


"Many changes will be made in the future as well as those of the past so that we may be more identified with this expanding area, sometimes known as the Santa Clarita Valley, by others as the Valencia Valley, and yet others by Saugus-Newhall. How to be identified


Everyone from the medical staff to the volunteers enthusiastically joined HEP, representing all segments of the hospital.

The redecoration has already begun. Employees purchased a new flag for the facility, and the Pink Ladies volunteer group is pitching in to perk up the main lobby.



A guitar-playing singalong and a 500-hour award made to a young man highlighted Memorial Hospital's Candystriper Awards Program last week at the hospital.



Ladies In Pink

A group of ladies from the Methodist Church met in 1962 to form a Ladies Auxiliary that could help the community during any crisis or emergency. Invitations were sent to all other churches in the area to join them.

Originally called the Santa Clarita Women's Auxiliary, the group began with twelve women who did volunteer work at Newhall Community, Golden State, and Santa Clarita Valley Hospitals. Gerry Ann Bowman, Martha Barton, and Gwen Gillespie pulled the group together, decided on uniforms, and wrote the by-laws. Chris Bodine initiated the candy striper program.

During the next ten years, the Auxiliary numbered between 12 to 35 members. They continued to work in the Santa Clarita Valley Hospital through changes in name, administration, and location (the Santa Clarita became Inter-Valley, Hillside, and finally Henry Mayo Newhall Memorial Hospital).

The Auxiliary became affiliated with the San Fernando Valley Council of Hospital Volunteers in 1969. In that year, the ladies asked for, and received, a loan from administrator Dr. Dyer in the amount of \$50 so they could open a gift shop.

When construction on the Newhall Memorial Hospital started, the Auxiliary initiated membership teas to gather new volunteers to service the larger complex.

Now numbering over 150, the Pink Ladies work in every area of the hospital, from the gift shop, laboratory, and information desto patient assistance.

The program, which is also open to men, asks volunteers to work only a minimum of four hours a week. During the interview process, volunteers may request any specific area they wish. They are then given several training sessions and start working with an experienced volunteer. Many of the ladies train in several areas and then decide which they prefer.


Hospital Gift Shop Donates Equipment

This number includes 15 teen-agers who serve as Candy Stripers. Volunteers help out in almost every department of the hospital.



Crafts Ease Hospital Boredom

Time hangs heavy on hands idled by a long

hospital stay.

To combat this problem, which often brings with it boredom and depression, the volunteers of Henry Mayo Newhall Memorial Hospital now provide a formal program of craft materials, instructions and follow-up to patients in need of diversion and mental exercise during the hospital stay.

The Craft Cart is staffed by patient assistance volunteers and stocked with donated supplies for seasonal and general project. Many patients are now into Easter activities, including centerpieces and decorated Easter eggs.

Diversional Therapy, as the formal title goes, was developed under the joint supervision of Jeanne Meder, O.T.R., occupational therapist, and Virginia Edwards, director of volunteers.

It is easily and productively provided by volunteers, explained Meder, freeing the occupational therapist and other professionals for more technical evaluation and treatment.

Requests for patient visits are generated by

nurses, doctors or other hospital personnel who spot boredom or depression, or the need for mental or physical stimulation, companionship or diversion. Or, patients themselves may telephone the volunteer office to request a visit.

Following each Craft

Cart session, the volunteer fills out an evaluation so that the next volunteer on duty can follow up.

Volunteers are trained by Ms. Edwards with Ms. Meder available to provide special instruction on bedside activity adaptations and the therapeutic use of activity.












TEL-LIFE AT MEMORIAL HOSPITAL



The gift shop of any hospital is the focal point of interest and that of Henry Mayo Newhall is no exception. The colorful boutique, located in the entrance lobby, not only satisfies the needs of patients and visitors, but finds regular patrons amongst the employees.

The shop has the advantage of being convenient but it is the surprisingly reasonable price tag on merchandise which lures the customers. Under the direction of Pink Lady Jean Perkins, it is staffed by thirty-three volunteers who work in pairs on four-hour shifts. The gift shop is open from nine a.m. to eight p.m. on week days and from ten to four on Saturdays and Sundays.

A local florist supplies fresh flowers daily which are displayed in a glassed-in refrigerator. Salesmen on regular rounds maintain supplies of steady movers such as candy, cigarettes, cards, and sundries. Gift items are selected from catalogues or purchased in person by chairman Perkins from the downtown merchandizing marts.

To cheer the young there is a collection of children's and infants' clothes as well as the Dakin stuffed animals. Along with small novelty items like miniature trolls and decorative paste-ons, there are many greeting cards of the Aunty Asparagus and Suzy Zoo variety.

The rack of ladies lingerie and display of jewelry seem to need replenishing frequently enough to prove that all the buying is not for patients alone. Gift items

bone china are also moving at a fast rate.





She likes talking with visitors and patients, giving hugs, holding a hand or giving a pat on the back. She enjoys working with physicians, obtaining the surgery schedule and census, keeping in touch with the surgery department to see how a patient is doing and then

relaying that information to the awaiting family. A native of Los Angeles, Lea says, "Helping people comes naturally for me. My mother was a very giving person and I guess I learned it from her."

Lea was recently awarded the Volunteer of the Quarter Award for the fourth quarter of 1997. Maria Strmsek, Director of Volunteer Services, shares that "Lea works in a vital area of the hospital where visitors and family members need empathy and care to get them through the stresses of having a loved one in the hospital. She is knowledgeable of hospital policies and makes suggestions to improve the quality and service of the Volunteer Services department and other areas where she is involved. She has received numerous accolades and *Henry's Team Trading Cards* (a hospital recognition program) for her care and compassion toward patients and visitors."

Lea has been involved with the hospital's Tike Hike, the quarterly physicians' dinners, the Home Tour Boutique, the Golf Classic and the 5K "Run For The Health Of It!" "Whatever HMNMH was doing and whenever they needed me, I volunteered," states Lea. Not wanting her husband Albert to become too sedentary in his retirement, Lea encouraged him to volunteer at the hospital 13 years (and 9,124 hours) ago. She also enlisted the couple's good friends, Bill and Doris Fine, who have now logged over 10 years of service at HMNMH. Lea says, "Volunteering makes you feel like you're doing something important and you learn so much in the process."
