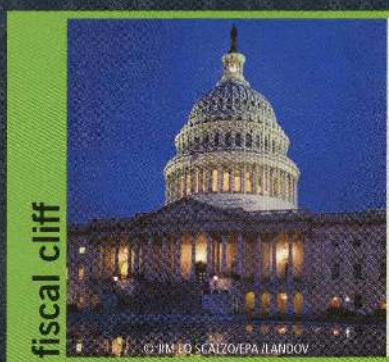
a century of girl scouts

fiscal cliff

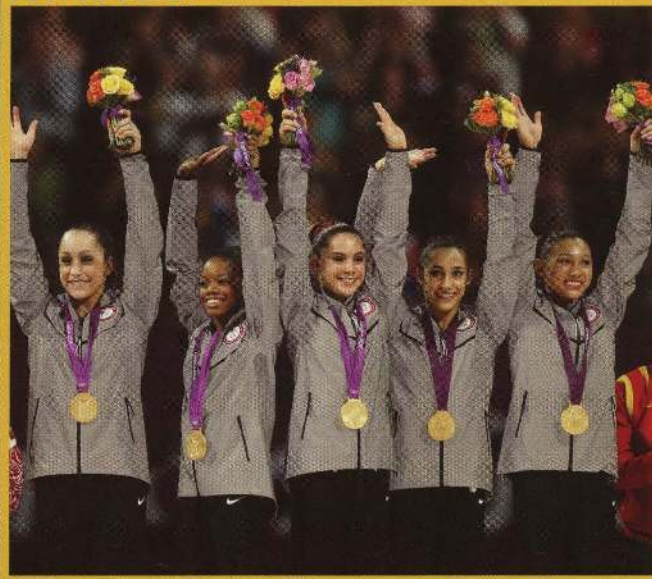

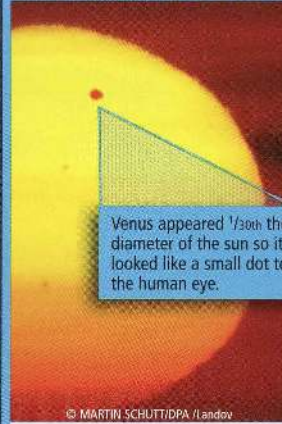
dragon launches to space

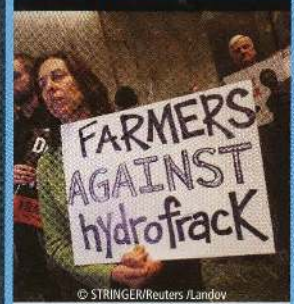


Venus appeared 1/30th the diameter of the sun so it looked like a small dot to the human eye.

A rare astronomical event called the Venus transit made it possible for people to see the planet as it orbited around the sun. This occurrence lasted over 6 hours and won't be seen again for 100 years.

energy solutions

Energy conservation and sustainability were hot topics in Washington D.C. Natural gas was one energy source that was highly debated. Twenty-five percent of U.S. energy comes from natural gas because it is cleaner than other energy sources. However, the process of getting natural gas can cause water and air pollution.

kicking the habit

A study published in *Science Translational Medicine* announced a potential vaccine to help smokers kick the habit. The vaccine pumps antibodies from the kidneys through the bloodstream to halt nicotine's addictive qualities before it reaches the brain. Though it has only been tested on mice, scientists are hopeful it could also work for humans.

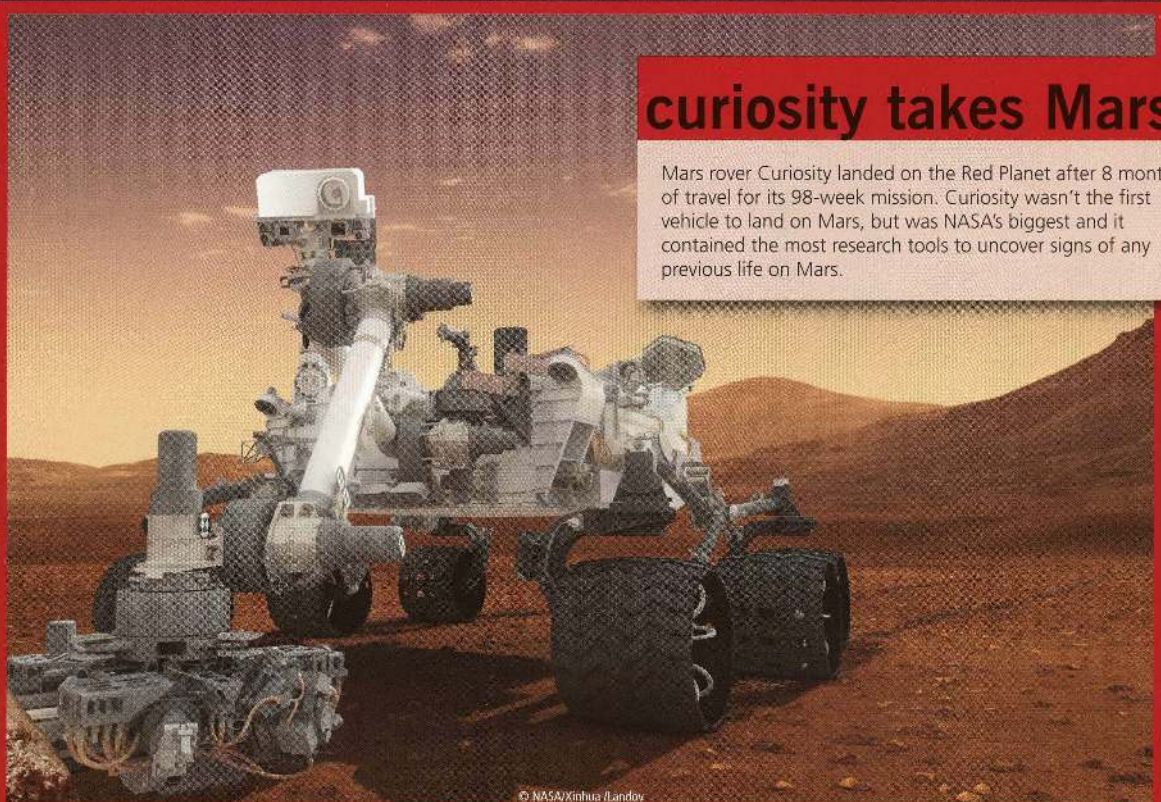

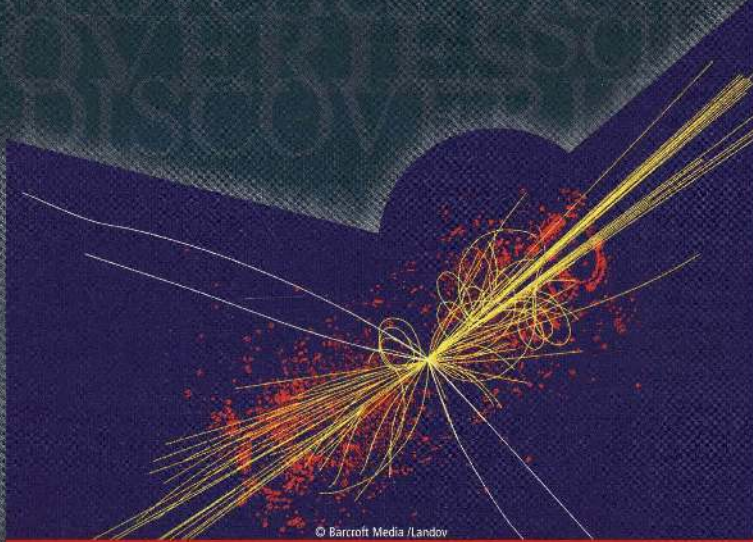
A new spider about the size of a silver dollar was found in the Pacific Northwest. The spider was nicknamed "cave robber" for where it lives and its long claws.

curiosity takes Mars

Mars rover Curiosity landed on the Red Planet after 8 months of travel for its 98-week mission. Curiosity wasn't the first vehicle to land on Mars, but was NASA's biggest and it contained the most research tools to uncover signs of any previous life on Mars.

Higgs particle

Physicists discovered the Higgs boson, a small particle that carries mass between other particles. The find was monumental since scientists were never able to verify its existence.

tastier tomatoes



The tomato has 35,000 genes – 25% more genes than a human.

Scientists determined the entire genome sequence of the tomato, which revealed additional information about the fruit's genetic structure. Researchers can learn how the species adapted over time and how to produce more tasty and nutritious varieties.

spray-on power

A team of mechanical engineers published research on their latest invention: spray-on, rechargeable batteries. They broke down the battery components and transformed them into liquid – a discovery that may eventually lead to spray-on batteries for items such as cars.

nowhere to go but up

Sky Green Farms developed the first vertical, commercial-scale vegetable farm in Singapore. Vertical farms are pyramid-like structures made of metal with many levels containing trays of vegetables. The vertical farms are perfect for areas such as Singapore, where real estate is limited and typical farming practices take up too much space.

solar-powered plane

At 43.5 mph, Solar Impulse made its historic solar-powered intercontinental flight between Switzerland and Morocco, with a stop in Spain. The plane's 12,000 solar cells across its wingspan captured the sun's energy to run its motors and recharge the battery. The mission demonstrated the potential for pollution-free air travel.

diamond detergent

A U.K. team of researchers discovered that very small pieces of carbon called nanodiamonds can help detergents more effectively clean clothing with cold water. These findings were part of the "Cold Water Cleaning Initiative" that aimed to find energy savings by replacing hot water with cold for household chores.

coral finding in tropical reefs

A new coral species was discovered in the western part of the Coral Triangle. The coral lives on cave ceilings and is unique because it lacks the bacteria that other coral need to survive. It can tolerate low light levels in deep waters and has small polyp sizes, which cause it to grow slowly.

trunk speak

A study in *Current Biology* reported that a South Korean elephant named Koshik could speak. The elephant used its trunk and throat to mimic his trainer's speech, and spoke the Korean words for "hello," "no," "good," "sit down" and "lie down."

virtual keyboard

Brookstone stores offered a virtual keyboard (manufactured by CTX Virtual Technologies) to consumers. It is the smallest and most affordable (\$99 each) virtual keyboard of its kind. The keyboard image is projected via laser from a small key chain. Optical sensors track the user's finger movements and Bluetooth technology connects it back to the wireless device.

robot plays rock, paper, scissors

Physicists at the University of Tokyo created a robot that can play rock, paper, scissors and win 100% of the time against humans. The robot was programmed with a high-speed camera that senses human wrist motion in 1 millisecond and determines which move the player will choose before the motion is even made. Someday, similar technology might be used in assembly line work and even in hospitals.

the egg & i

A new egg-shaped car called "Eggasus" joined the eco-friendly vehicle market. The 3-wheel car gives off zero emissions and is ideal for compact, urban spaces. "Eggasus" costs \$5,000 and fits one person inside. It can reach 25 mph and travel a distance of about 50 miles.

digital pills

The first digital pill was approved by the FDA. The digital chip, the size of a grain of sand, is implanted in a pill that is taken at the same time as the patient's medication. The chip sends an electric signal to a patch worn on the person's skin which sends the information to medical professionals for monitoring.

built for speed

French engineer Luc Fusaro developed customized shoes to enhance athletic performance. First, a digital model is made of the athlete's foot. Then, using special powder with a 3-D printing technique, the shoes are built for a perfect fit. The shoes can improve speed performance up to 3.5%.

engineered copter

Students at the University of Maryland Clark School of Engineering set a new (unofficial) record for flight time in the Gamera II, a helicopter powered by foot pedals and a hand crank. The machine weighed nearly 75 lbs. and stayed in the air for about 65 seconds at 9 ft. off the ground.

The average American consumes 23 lbs. of pizza per year.

A1 Concepts, a Netherlands-based company, plans to bring its pizza vending machine technology called "Let's Pizza" to the U.S. The machine takes 2.5 minutes to make the pizza and another minute to bake it. The 11-inch pizza sells for \$5.95.

smart gloves

A team of university students from the Ukraine won the coveted Software Design category in Microsoft's 2012 Imagine Cup. The group created Enable Talk gloves that sense movement and translate it to audible speech. The inventors' goal was to help users more easily communicate with people who don't know sign language.

ebooks surpass hardcover

American book publishers announced that for the first time they sold more ebooks than hardcover books, mostly due to the increasing number of e-readers. However, paperback books generated more revenue.

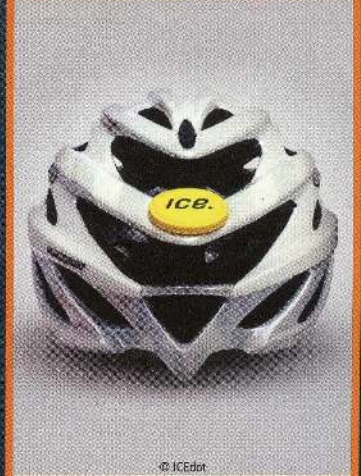

Google Glass was named one of *TIME* magazine's "Best Inventions of the Year." The glasses look ordinary, but when wearers look up and to the right they'll notice the difference. The glasses have a built-in computer that allows users to access Google tools; it also contains an earpiece and speaker. Google plans to release the glasses in 2014 for \$1,500 each.

extreme crash sensor

The ICEdot Crash Sensor was introduced to the market specifically for people who participate in high-risk sports. A GPS sensor is attached to the athlete's helmet. If it detects a high-impact fall, a 30-second countdown begins. The person must stop the countdown, or Bluetooth technology sends a message with GPS coordinates to the user's emergency contacts.

the mini



The starting price of an iPad mini was \$329.

Apple's iPad mini, a smaller version of the iPad, launched to compete with small tablets produced by Google and Amazon. The new device has a 7.9 in. screen, is 7.2 mm. thick and weighs .68 lbs.

dancing shoes

GroundWave Shadow Trainers, a shoe prototype that helps teach people how to dance, was designed by Tom Sykes from Loughborough University. Sensors in the shoes are connected to a smartphone app, which tracks the user's movement and provides feedback. The shoes were created to teach dance and encourage physical activity for kids.

talking cars



A year-long study with "talking cars" was conducted by the Department of Transportation. Nearly 3,000 cars were equipped with wireless transmitters that sent out the car's location, speed and direction. With this data, the car warned the driver of potential dangers to prevent collisions.

tennis grand slams



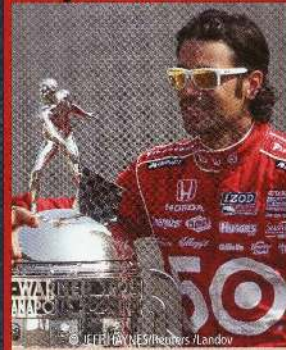
Andy Murray and Serena Williams both won the Singles titles at the US Open. Murray defeated Novak Djokovic in set 5, making it his 1st Grand Slam title. Serena Williams continued to dominate by beating Victoria Azarenka, and earned her 15th Grand Slam title and 4th US Open championship.

golf's giants



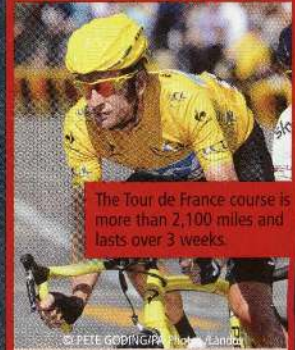
Four different players won each of this year's major golf championships. Bubba Watson finished 10 under and made both holes in a sudden-death play-off to win the Masters Tournament. The U.S. Open Championship went to Webb Simpson, who earned his 1st major title 1 stroke ahead of his closest opponents. Ernie Els' win in the Open Championship made Els the 8th player to win a major in 3 different decades. Rory McIlroy won the PGA Championship by a PGA-record 8 strokes.

indy 500



Dario Franchitti placed first at the Indy 500 to earn his 3rd title. Franchitti drove for his teammate and former race winner Dan Wheldon, who passed away in a crash last year. He wore white glasses afterward in honor of Wheldon.

tour de France



The Tour de France course is more than 2,100 miles and lasts over 3 weeks.

Bradley Wiggins of Britain celebrated a win in the Tour de France and was the first Brit to ever win the race. Wiggins beat out 2nd place finisher, and Team Sky teammate Chris Froome, by more than a 3-minute margin.

basketball fever



The Indiana Fever won their first WNBA championship against the Minnesota Lynx in Game 4 with a final score of 87-78. Tamika Catchings of the Fever scored 25 points in the final game and earned the MVP award.

Missy Franklin won the hearts of many with her big smile and strong strokes at the games. She won gold in the 100-meter and 200-meter backstroke, as well as a record-setting gold and bronze in the women's relays.

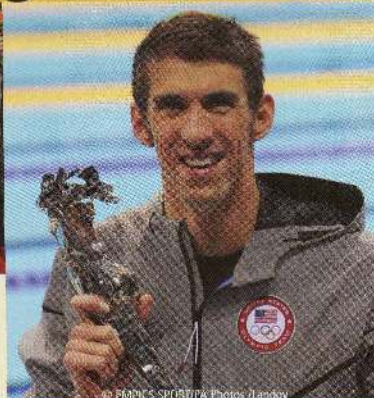
Usain Bolt made history by winning the 100, 200 and 4x100m relay events in back-to-back Olympic games, holding onto his World's Fastest Man title.

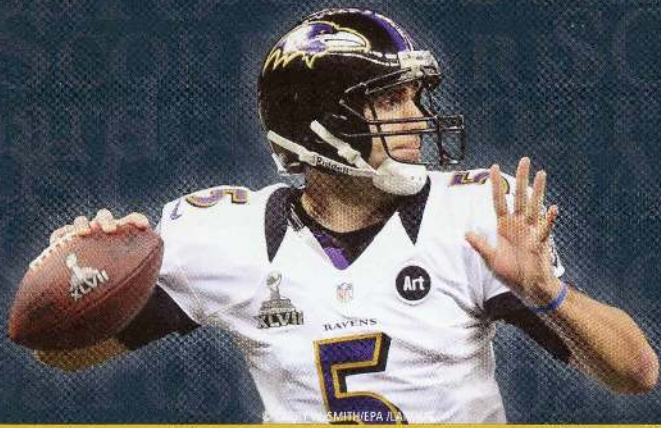
Fab Five

The Baltimore Ravens and San Francisco 49ers faced off in Super Bowl XLVII, which was held in New Orleans. The Ravens took a 22 point lead when the stadium's power went out for nearly half an hour. Once the power returned, the 49ers tried to close the gap in a second-half surge but the Ravens held on for a 34-31 victory. The Ravens quarterback, Joe Flacco, earned the MVP award.

derby dazzler



I'll Have Another ran for the roses and won the Kentucky Derby by beating out Bodemeister in the final stretch. Only a few weeks later, I'll Have Another won again at the Preakness, and was on the path for the first Triple Crown title in 34 years. However, shortly following the Preakness, the champion developed tendonitis and was withdrawn from the Belmont Stakes.

heat trumps thunder



The Miami Heat won the NBA title over the Oklahoma City Thunder in Game 5 with a final score of 121-106. Team leader LeBron James earned the MVP award.

to the extreme



Los Angeles hosted the Summer X Games with 18 events held over a 4-day period for BMX, Motocross, Rally Car Racing and Skateboard. Bob Burnquist won his 22nd career medal at the Games and defended his title in the Skateboard Big Air. Vicki Golden won gold in the Motocross for the second year in a row, following an injury earlier in the year.

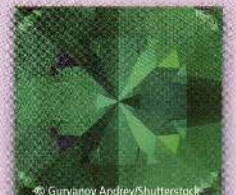
