#### **BY-LAWS**

#### ARTICLE I - NAME AND PURPOSES

#### Section 1. Name

The name of the corporation, incorporated under the laws of California, December 12, 1975, incorporation file number 759822 shall be:

#### SANTA CLARITA VALLEY HISTORICAL SOCIETY

#### Section 2. Purposes

The purposes of the Society are to stimulate public interest in the history of the Santa Clarita Valley and surrounding areas, to collect and preserve the facts and artifacts pertinent thereto, and to engage in other activities related to that history, or as otherwise set forth in the Articles.

#### ARTICLE II - BOARD OF DIRECTORS

#### Section 1. Authority and Responsibility

- (A) The Board acts to govern the Society on behalf of the general membership. Subject to the provisions of the California Nonprofit Public Benefit Corporation Law and any other applicable laws, and subject to any limitations of the articles of incorporation or these By-Laws regarding actions that require approval of the members, the corporation's activities and affairs shall be managed, and all corporate powers shall be exercised, by or under the direction of the Board. The Board is responsible for establishing policies necessary to achieve the purposes of the Society. Among its specific duties are:
  - 1. Establish policies for the management of the Society.
- 2. Approve the nomination by the President of committee functions and chair.
- 3. Review and act upon the recommendations of the Executive and other committees.
  - 4. Be responsible for the collection, custody and expenditure of funds.
  - 5. Provide prudent cash reserve.
  - 6. Provide for an annual review and/or audit of the Society's books.
  - 7. Elect Directors to fill vacancies on the Board between regular

#### elections.

- 8. Provide all members with an annual report and financial statement.
- 9. Implement these By-Laws with standing orders as appropriate, to be duly recorded as they are approved.
- (B) Without prejudice to the general powers set forth above, but subject to the same limitations, the Directors shall have the power to:
- 1. Appoint and remove, at the pleasure of the Board, all the corporation's officers, agents, and employees; prescribe powers and duties for them that

are consistent with law, with the Articles of Incorporation, and with these By-Laws; and fix their compensation (if any) and require from them security for faithful performance of their duties.

- 2. Change the principal office or the principal business office in California from one location to another; cause the corporation to be qualified to conduct its activities in any other state, territory, dependency, or country and conduct its activities within and outside California; and designate any place within or outside California for holding any meeting of members.
- 3. Adopt and use a corporate seal; prescribe the forms of membership certificates; and alter the forms of the seal and certificates.
- 4. Borrow money and incur indebtedness on behalf of the corporation and cause to be executed and delivered for the corporation's purposes, in the corporate name, promissory notes, bonds, debentures, deeds of trust, mortgages, pledges, hypothecations, and other evidences of debt and securities.

#### Section 2. Number of Directors

The Board of Directors shall consist of 20 elected members, all of whom shall be members of the Society. The immediate past president shall serve ex-officio as a member of the Board. If that person is not otherwise a director, the Board will be increased to 21 members.

#### Section 3. Term of Directors

- A. The term of each Director shall be two years, beginning at the time of the annual general membership meeting, at which time ten will be elected each year.
- B. The immediate past president shall be an ex-officio member of the Board for one year following his/her term.
- C. Each director shall be limited to three consecutive two-year terms. Following such six years of service, a former director will be eligible again for election after a year's leave of absence, except for the immediate past president who may serve a seventh (7th) year as ex-officio member of the Board before taking one year's leave of absence.

#### Section 4. Nomination and Election of Directors

- A. The Nominating Committee shall prepare a slate of names equal to the number of vacancies on the Board, and will present the slate at the November membership meeting. At the November meeting only other nominations may be made from the floor, or received in writing. If the nominee is present at the meeting, he has given his written permission for his name to be submitted into nomination and he has at least one sponsor, his name may be added to the list of nominees to be presented to the general membership at the election the following January. If the proposed nominee is not present at the November meeting, his name may also be added to the list of nominees only if the nomination is in writing, signed by five sponsors, and contains his written permission for his name to be submitted into nomination. The nomination must include a biographical sketch, and the written permission of the nominee.
- B. The members will be notified of the names in nomination not later than 30 days prior to the annual membership meeting.

- C. If, at the annual meeting, the number of candidates equals the number of vacancies to be filled, they shall be elected by resolution of the members present. If there are more candidates than vacancies, election will be by secret ballot.
- D. There will be no cumulative or proxy voting; those candidates receiving the largest number of votes will be declared elected.
- E. If vacancies occur during the year for any reason, the president shall consult with the Nominating Committee for recommendations and such vacancies on the Board will be filled by a majority vote of those Board members present at a Board meeting. A director so elected shall fill the unexpired term of his predecessor.

#### Section 5. Termination of Directors

A Director who fails to attend three consecutive regular meetings of the Board without good and sufficient cause shall be removed from the Board. After three such absences, the Executive Committee shall examine the reason for the absences, and if it can find no good cause, the Board of Directors shall declare the position vacant, and notify the person. Additionally, all Board members shall be required to provide at least five hours a month (excluding attending Board meetings) of volunteer time in support of the goals and activities of the Society. A Director who fails without good and sufficient cause to satisfy the required volunteer time for two months in any six month period shall be subject to removal from the Board by a majority vote of the Board. A Board member may accumulate or bank his hours to satisfy the volunteer time requirement.

#### Section 6. Meetings of the Board

- A. At least nine regular meetings of the Board shall be held each year. The Board will decide on a suitable day and time, and the secretary, or someone designated by the secretary, will notify each Board member of the time and place.
- B. Special meetings may be called by the president, the executive committee, or two members of the Board. Notice of the time, place and purpose of each special meeting shall be given to each Director at least 4 days in advance by first class mail, or three days in advance if delivered personally or by telephone, telegraph or fax. No business shall be transacted at any special meeting except that for which the meeting has been called.
  - C. A quorum for conducting business is eleven members.

#### Section 7. Vacancies on Board

A vacancy or vacancies on the Board shall exist on the occurrence any of the following: (a) the death or resignation of any Director; (b) the declaration by resolution of the Board of a vacancy in the office of a Director who has been declared of unsound mind by an order of the court, convicted of a felony, or found by final order or judgment of any court to have breached a duty under Article 3 of Chapter 2 of the California Nonprofit Public Benefit Corporation Law; (c) the vote of the members to remove any Director; (d) the failure by any Director to adhere to Section 5, Article II of these By-Laws.

#### ARTICLE III. - OFFICERS

#### Section 1. List of Officers

The officers of the Society shall be a president, one or more vice presidents, a secretary, one or more corresponding secretaries, and a treasurer. All officers shall be elected from the elected members of the Board of Directors, will serve as an officer for a term of one (1) year, and may be reelected.

#### Section 2. Election of officers

All officers shall be elected by the members of the Board annually at the first Board meeting following the annual membership meeting. They will he elected by a vote of the majority of Directors present. The newly elected officers will assume the responsibilities of their office at the close of the meeting at which they are elected. All officers, including the president, serve at the pleasure of the Board and may be removed by the Board, with or without cause. Any officer who is no longer a member of the Board for any reason may no longer serve as an officer.

#### Section 3. Filling Vacancies

Vacancies in officer positions may be filled at any meeting of the Board.

#### Section 4. Duties of the Officers

- A. <u>President</u>: The President shall be the chief administrative officer of the Society and shall preside at all meetings of the Society and Board of Directors; shall be responsible for seeing that the lines of direction given by the Society and the actions of the Board are carried into effect and for reporting to the membership and, the Board on the conduct and management of the affairs of the Society; shall be ex-officio a member of all committees established by the Board, except the Nominating Committee; and shall have such powers and perform such other duties as may be assigned by the Board of Directors.
- B. <u>Vice President</u>: A vice president shall assume the duties of the president in the event of absence, incapacity, or resignation of the president. If the Directors select more than one vice president, each shall be designated first, second, etc., and assume the presidency, when required, in that order.
- C. <u>Secretary</u>: The secretary shall be responsible for the records of the Society and shall be custodian of its corporate seal, shall keep the minutes of the Society and of the Board of Directors, shall be responsible for maintaining a list off members, and shall maintain the minutes book, which shall contain a history, as well as, current copies of the By-Laws and standing orders, adding to them as they are enacted or revised by the Board. The secretary may appoint assistants as required.
- D. <u>Corresponding Secretary</u>: A corresponding secretary shall attend to all correspondence and report on communications to the Board; will perform the functions of the secretary in the absence of the secretary unless another person is designated by the Directors, and may appoint assistants as needed.

E. <u>Treasurer</u>: The Treasurer shall furnish, prepare, and keep a full set off books of accounts, showing every detail of the business and the Society's accounts, and all receipts and disbursements of every nature, the amount of cash on hand, and the amount of money owed by the Society or owing to it, oversee preparation of the annual budget, and such other information as may be required by the Directors or by law, and be responsible for filing required Federal, State, and County reports.

#### ARTICLE IV - OTHER ADMINISTRATIVE PERSONNEL

#### Section 1. Curator

The Board of Directors shall appoint a curator, who shall be responsible for the custody, storage, display and cataloging of the Society's historical papers, photographs, and artifacts. A volunteer curator may or may not be an elected member of the Board of Directors, but should be a member of the Society. If, in the judgment of the Board, a paid curator is required, then the selection and salary of such curator shall be the responsibility of the Board of Directors.

#### Section 2. Executive Director

The Board, at its discretion may recruit and hire an executive director at such time as the Board feels it is necessary. The terns and conditions of employment and the assignment of duties shall be determined by the Board. The executive director shall be directly responsible to the Board of Directors.

#### ARTICLE V - COMMITTEES

#### Section 1. Standing Committees

A. Standing committees shall be an executive committee and a nominating committee, and such other standing committees as the Board shall determine. All such committees serve at the pleasure of the Board.

#### 1. Executive Committee

The Executive Committee shall be composed of the elected officers of the Board. This body shall engage in planning for the Society, make recommendations to the Board and have power to act for the Board in an emergency, shall be authorized to spend Society funds in an emergency that threatens life, limb or property, consummate the business transactions planned by the Board, and such other areas as may be delegated by the Board. All actions taken by the Executive Committee must be reported at the next regular meeting of the Board.

#### 2. Nominating Committee

The Nominating Committee shall be composed of a chair nominated by the president and approved by the Board, and four members elected at the April meeting of the general membership. Including the chair, no more than three (3) members of the committee may be current Board members. None of the Nominating Committee members may be Directors eligible for immediate re-election. The Nominating Committee shall prepare a slate of candidates for the Board of Directors as provided In Article II, Section 4. It should also be consulted from time to time by the president for recommendations for

committee chair or other appointments. The committee shall keep a file of members available for such service.

#### Section 2. Other Committees

A. The president in consultation with the Board may designate such other committees as may be needed. The president shall nominate the chair of each committee for approval of the Board. Committee chairs shall in turn appoint committee members.

#### ARTICLE. VI - MEMBERS & DUES

#### Section 1. Membership

- A. Any person interested in the purposes of the Society who applies for membership and tenders the necessary dues shall thereby become a member.
  - B. There is no limitation on the number of members in the Society.
- C. Memberships of various categories, such as regular, sustaining, junior, etc., may be established by the Board of Directors, who will also fix dues for each category.
- D. VOTING MEMBERSHIPS. Regular Members shall be defined as duespaying members eighteen (18) years of age or older (Individual, Senior, Family, Business, Nonprofit, and Life) and other membership classifications, designated by the Board of Directors, except Honorary.

Membership fees and privileges afforded to various memberships shall be determined by the Board of Directors. Individual, Senior, and Nonprofit memberships shall be considered one (1) general member and entitled to one (1) vote. Family memberships shall be entitled to two votes, which must be cast by two individuals. Business memberships shall be entitled to three votes, which must be cast by three individuals. The individuals who will be voting for the Family memberships and the Business memberships must be identified in the membership application.

E. The Board of Directors shall have power to bestow honorary membership in the Society on such persons of prominence or note as may be suitable. Such members shall enjoy privileges and benefits as determined by the Board of Directors, except that they shall not vote or hold office.

#### Section 2. Dues

Annual dues, as fixed by the Board of Directors, are payable in advance for the calendar year. Dues paid on or after October 1 are credited to the following year; those paid before October 1 will expire with the current year. Members whose current dues are not paid at least one week before the annual membership meeting in January will be dropped from the rolls and will not be eligible to vote on the election of the Board of Directors held at that time or to exercise any other of the rights and privileges of membership.

#### Section 3. Meetings

A. Annual Membership Meeting

An annual meeting of the regular members of this Society shall be held in the Santa Clarita Valley, County of Los Angeles, State of California, on the third Wednesday in January of each year.

No change of the time or place for an annual meeting of regular members of this Society shall be made within thirty (30) days prior to the date set for the annual meeting, except in case of emergency or act of God, in which case the meeting shall be held at the time on the nearest convenient Wednesday.

At each annual meeting ten Board members, plus persons to fill such other existing vacancies, shall be elected to the Board of Directors, and such other business shall be transacted as seems desirable.

Providing notice has been duly given, a quorum for the purpose of conducting business at the annual meeting shall consist of those members present and voting.

#### B. Other Regular Meetings

There may be monthly meetings of all members of this Society, regular or otherwise, at which any action may be taken as members or Directors desire, except, however, no election of Directors of this Society shall occur at such meetings. There shall be, at a minimum, a membership meeting every quarter.

#### C. Special Meetings

Special meetings of the voting members of this Society may be called for any lawful purpose by the president, the Board, or 10 regular members, and may be held at such reasonable time and place as the Board of Directors may determine.

#### D. Notice of Meetings

Notice of regular meetings of this Society will be given in the Newsletter or other mailing to all members. Notice of annual or special meetings shall given to each regular member not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of the holding of such meeting, whether annual or special.

#### Section 4. Non-Liability of Members

No member of this Society shall be personally or otherwise liable for any of the debts, liabilities, and/or obligations of this Society.

#### Section 5. Termination and Suspension of Membership

#### A. Causes of Termination

A membership shall terminate on occurrence of any of the following events:

- (1) Resignation of the member, on reasonable notice to the corporation;
- (2) Expiration of the period of membership, unless the membership is renewed on the renewal terms fixed by the Board;
- (3) Occurrence of any event that renders the member ineligible for membership, or failure to satisfy membership qualifications;
- (4) Failure of the member to pay dues, fees, or assessments as set by the Board after they become due and payable;
- (5) Expulsion of the member under Section 5(C) of Article VI of these By-Laws based on the good faith determination by the Board, or a Committee authorized

by the Board to make such a determination, that the member has failed in a material and serious degree to observe the rules of conduct of the corporation, or has engaged in conduct materially and seriously prejudicial to the purposes and interests of the corporation.

#### B. Suspension of Membership

A member may be suspended, under Section 5(C) of Article VI of these By-Laws, based on the good faith determination by the Board, or a committee authorized by the Board to make such a determination, that the member has failed in a material and serious degree to observe the corporation's rules of conduct, or has engaged in conduct materially and seriously prejudicial to the purposes and interests of the corporation. A person whose membership is suspended shall not be a member during the period of suspension.

#### C. Procedure for Expulsion or Suspension

If grounds appear to exist for expulsion or suspension of a member Sections 5(A) and 5(B) of Article VI of these By-Laws, the procedure set forth below shall be followed:

- (1) The member shall be given 15 days' prior notice of the proposed expulsion or suspension and the reasons for the proposed expulsion or suspension. Notice shall be given as provided in these By-Laws.
- (2) The member shall be given an opportunity to be heard, either orally or in writing, at least five days before the effective date of the proposed expulsion or suspension. The hearing shall be held, or the written statement considered, by the Board or by a committee authorized by the Board to determine whether or not the expulsion or suspension should take place.
- (3) The Board or committee shall decide whether or not the member should be suspended, expelled, or sanctioned in some other way. The decision of the Board or committee shall be final.
- (4) Any action challenging an expulsion, suspension, or termination of membership, including a claim under defective notice, must be commenced within one year after the date of the expulsion, suspension, or termination.

#### ARTICLE VII - FINANCE

#### Section 1. Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of this Society shall be July 1 to June 30.

#### Section 2. Checks, Drafts, Notes

The president, the treasurer, and two other officers shall be designated signatories for checks, drafts, or other orders for payment. Any such check or document must bear the signature of two such officers, one of which must be the president or treasurer. If, for any reason neither of the latter is able to sign, then the Board by resolution may designate another officer or officers as signatories.

#### Section 3. Budget

The annual budget of estimated income and expenditures shall be presented to the Board of Directors for approval at the June Board meeting. No expenses shall be incurred in excess of budgetary appropriations without prior approval of the Board of Directors.

#### Section 4. Donations

The Society may accept gifts, legacies, donations and/or contributions, and in any amount and any form, from time to time, upon such terms and conditions as may be decided by the Board of Directors.

#### Section 5. Endowments

This corporation may establish an Endowment Fund for accepting gifts in any amount of cash or check, or any form of property by gift or by bequest. Property may he converted to cash or check, or any form of property by gift or by bequest. Cash gifts in any amount may be made directly to the fund. Cash may be pledged in the amount of \$500 or more, but the pledge must be met within a 24-month period in order to be recognized for the Fund. All monies given to the Fund, including life memberships and memorial gifts shall remain in Trust or the equivalent. Only the earnings from the Fund shall be used for purposes as determined by the Board.

#### Section 6. Depositories & Investments

The Society shall deposit and/or invest the funds of the Society in accordance with the direction of the Board of Directors. All funds invested must be deposited in accounts insured by the U. S. Government.

#### Section 7. Financial Reports

A summary report of the financial operation of the Society shall be made at least annually to the membership.

#### Section 8. Indemnification

The Board of Directors, in its sole discretion, may determine whether or not to indemnify any officer, employee, director, or member of the Society against all or any part of expenses, judgments, decrees, fines, penalties or all or any part of amounts paid in settlement in connection with defense or any pending or threatened action, suit, or proceeding, criminal or civil, to which any of the above named individuals is or may be made party of by reason of being or having been such officer, employee, Director or member. The extent and amount of indemnification shall be in the sole discretion of the Board.

#### Section 9. Dissolution

The properties and assets of the Society are irrevocably dedicated to charitable purposes. In the event of dissolution of the Society, assets remaining after the discharge of all liabilities shall be put in trust for the benefit of a non-profit organization as directed by the Board of Directors.

#### ARTICLE VIII - MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

#### Section 1. Corporate Seal

The corporate seal of the Society shall be in such form as the Board of Directors shall determine and shall contain the name of the Society, the date and state of its creation

and such other matters as the Board of Directors may determine. Said Seal may be used by causing it or a facsimile thereof to be impressed, affixed, reproduced, or otherwise.

#### Section 2. Principal Office

The principal office shall be established and maintained in the Santa Clarita Valley, County of Los Angeles, State of California.

#### Section 3. Other offices

Other offices of the Society may be established at such places as the Board of Directors may, from time to time, designate or the business of the Society may require.

#### Section 4. Notice and Waiver of Notice

Whenever any notice of meeting or otherwise is required by these By-Laws to be given, personal notice is not meant unless expressly so stated; and any notice so required shall be deemed to be sufficient by depositing the same in the U. S. Postal Service, postpaid, addressed to the person entitled thereto at his last known post office address, and such notice shall be deemed to have been given on the day of such mailing. Any notice required to be given under these By-Laws may be waived by the person entitled thereto. Members not entitled to vote shall not be entitled to receive notice on any meetings except as otherwise provided by statute.

#### Section 5. Parliamentary Authority

"Robert's Rules of Order - Newly Revised" shall be used as authority in the conduct of all meetings of the organization, except when in conflict with the specific provisions in these By-Laws or standing orders.

#### Section 6. Creation of Debt

No member may place the corporation in debt without the express, written authorization of the Board of Directors. No officer or Board member may place the corporation in debt in excess of \$100 without the express, written authorization of the Board. No committee of the Board or of the corporation may place the corporation in debt in excess of \$100 without the express, written authorization of the Board.

#### Section 7. Insurance

The corporation shall have the right to purchase and maintain insurance to the full extent permitted by law on behalf of its officers, directors, employees, and other agents, against any liability asserted against or incurred by any officer, director, employee, or agent in such capacity or arising out of the officer's, director's, employee's, or agent's status as such.

#### ARTICLE IX - AMENDMENTS

These By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting of the Society by a majority vote, provided that the amendment has been submitted in writing at the previous regular meeting; or by a majority vote of the Directors at a regularly scheduled Board meeting, provided that the proposed amendment(s) have been mailed to Directors at least 15 days prior to the meeting or read at two (2) previous meetings.

#### **RECORD OF AMENDMENTS**

The By-Laws of the Santa Clarita Valley Historical Society were originally approved in December, 1975, and amended effective January 1, 1981. The dates of any subsequent amendments were lost in the Piru Mansion fire in February 1981.

These By-Laws were revised by the Board of Directors on September 25, 1989. This document reflects recent amendments accepted by the Board of Directors on September 23, 1991.

These By-Laws were revised by the entire membership on December 17, 1997.





On June 3, 1980, your Honorable Board approved a 20-year Agreement and Negative Declaration, with the Santa Clarita Valley Historical Society, for the provision of operating a historical museum at William S. Hart Park. Subsequently, the Society has successfully relocated the Saugus Railway Station onto Hart Park, completed the restoration and has operated said facility as a historical museum for the benefit of the Santa Clarita Valley community.

As a result of the Society's success, they are now requesting that this Agreement be amended to redesignate their operated park premises used for the relocation and restoration of additional historical buildings. This request is based on the desire to save as many buildings as possible that played an important and significant role in the creation of the Santa Clarita Valley.

Under a temporary permit, a number of these buildings have already been relocated onto Hart Park. This was necessary to save and preserve the buildings from destruction by vandalism or demolition, pending the completion of a site plan that would identify the placement of historical buildings within the park area. This plan has now been completed and identifies those locations within Hart Park where historical buildings significant to the Santa Clarita Valley and surrounding areas can be relocated. Both the existing and redesignated park premises are located on County purchased property, and are not part of the park property granted pursuant to the will of William S. Hart.

- Provisions covering Non-Discrimination Requirements.

This amendment is exempt in accordance with Class 4, (j) of the County Environmental Document Reporting Procedures and Guidelines adopted by your Board on November 17, 1987, involving minor alterations of County-owned property. In addition, this amendment is also exempt under the following State CEQA Guidelines: Section 15301 (c), operation, maintenance and minor alteration involving negligible expansion of use beyond the previously existing facilities; Section 15303 (e), construction of limited numbers of new small facilities; and Sections 15304 (a) & (b), grading on land of less than 10% and newly landscaped. The attached amendment has been executed by the Society and approved as to form by County Counsel.

#### IT IS THEREFORE RECOMMENDED THAT YOUR BOARD:

- 1. Find that this amendment is exempt from CEQA.
- 2. Approve and instruct the Chairman to sign the attached Amendment No. 1 to Agreement No. 36711 with the Santa Clarita Valley Historical Society.

#### AMENDMENT NO. 1 TO OPERATING AGREEMENT NO. 36711 FOR SANTA CLARITA VALLEY HISTORICAL MUSEUM WILLIAM S. HART PARK

THIS AMENDMENT TO OPERATING AGREEMENT made this 23rd day of

June, 1992,

BY AND BETWEEN

COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES, body corporate and politic, hereinafter referred to as "County"

AND

SANTA CLARITA VALLEY HISTORICAL SOCIETY a California nonprofit corporation, hereinafter referred to as "Society"

#### WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the parties hereto have entered into County Operating Agreement No. 36711 on June 3, 1980, for the purpose of developing, operating and maintaining a museum facility for displaying historical artifacts that have significance to the Santa Clarita Valley and surrounding areas; and

WHEREAS, the Society desires to redesignate operated park premises to include the placement of additional historical facilities significant to Santa Clarita Valley and surrounding areas;

WHEREAS, the Department has reviewed Society's request and approved the redesignation of their park premises, as shown in the revised Exhibit A dated March 1, 1992; and

WHEREAS, the parties desire to update the terms of the Agreement to include standard contract language in the following sections: Premises, Operating Responsibilities; General Indemnification and Insurance Requirements; and Non-Discrimination Requirements.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises, covenants and conditions set forth herein, the parties hereto and each of them, do agree as follows:

#### 1. PREMISES

1.01 Paragraph 2.01 is amended to reflect the substitution of the revised Exhibit A as follows:

"The displaying of historical exhibits shall be conducted on the land described in Exhibit A, dated 3/1/92. As set forth in said Exhibit, County reserves a park access road for the purposes of ingress and egress through said property, as shown on said Exhibit."

#### 2. OPERATING RESPONSIBILITIES

2.01 Paragraphs 8.07.01 and 8.07.02 are added to paragraph 8.07:

"8.07.01 The Director may at any time give Society written notice to the effect that the conduct or action of a designated employee of Society is, in the reasonable belief of the Director, detrimental to the interest of the public patronizing the historical facilities. Society shall meet with representatives of the Director to consider the appropriate

course of action with respect to such matter and Society shall take reasonable measures under the circumstances to assure the Director that the conduct and activities of Society's employees will not be detrimental to the interest of the public patronizing the premises.

8.07.02 Society warrants that it fully complies with all laws regarding employment of aliens and others, and that all employees performing services hereunder citizenship or alien status requirements contained in federal and state statutes and regulations including, but not limited to, the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986 (P.L. Society shall obtain, from all covered employees performing services hereunder, all verification and other documentation of employment eligibility status required by federal statutes and regulations as they currently exist and as they may be hereafter Society shall retain such documentation for all covered employees for the period prescribed by law. Society shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless, the County, its officers and employees from employer sanctions and any other liability which may be assessed against Society or County or both connection with any alleged violation of federal statutes regulation pertaining to the eligibility for employment of persons performing services under this Agreement."

#### 2.02 Paragraph 8.19 is added as follows:

#### "8.19 Advertising and Promotional Materials

Society shall not promulgate nor cause to be distributed any advertising, or promotional materials unless prior approval thereof is obtained from Director. Said

approval shall not be unreasonably withheld or delayed and shall be deemed to be given if no objection is made within fifteen (15) days following the request for approval. Such materials include, but are not limited to; advertising in newspapers, magazines and trade journals, and radio and/or television commercials."

2.03 Paragraph 8.20 is added as follows:

#### "8.20 <u>Credit in Promotional Materials</u>

Society agrees that any advertising or promotional materials promulgated by Society which contain the words "William S. Hart Regional Park" or any derivative thereof, shall also include the phrase "a unit of the County of Los Angeles Department of Parks and Recreation Park System" unless specifically approved otherwise by the Director."

#### 3. GENERAL INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

3.01 Paragraph 10.2b changed to read:

"Workers' Compensation: A program of Workers' Compensation insurance in an amount and form to meet all applicable requirements of the Labor Code of the State of California, including Employer's Liability with a \$150,000 limit covering all persons providing services by or on behalf of Society and all risks to such persons under this Agreement."

#### 4. <u>NON-DISCRIMINATION</u>

4.01 Paragraphs 13.01, 13.02 and 13.03 are deleted and substituted with the following:

"13.01 Society hereby certifies and agrees that it will comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964,

Rehabilitation Act Section 504 of the 1973. of the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, where applicable, and Title 43, part 17 of the Code of Federal Regulations Subparts A and B, to the end that no persons shall, on the grounds of race, creed, color, national origin, political affiliation, marital status, sex, age or handicap, be subject to discrimination under the privileges and use granted by Agreement or under any project, program supported by this Agreement.

persons employed thereby, are and shall be treated equally without regard to or because of race, creed, color, national origin, sex, age, marital status, or handicap and in compliance with all Federal and State laws prohibiting discrimination in employment, including, but not limited to, the Federal Civil Rights Act of 1964; the Unruh Civil Rights Act; the Cartwright Act; and the State Fair Employment Practices Act."

13.03 Society certifies and agrees that subcontractors, bidders and vendors thereof are and shall be selected without regard to or because of race, creed, color, national origin, sex, age, marital status or handicap."

4.02 Paragraphs 13.04, 13.05 and 13.06 are added as follows:

"13.04 All employment records shall be open for inspection and reinspection at any reasonable time during the term of this Agreement for the purpose of verifying the practice of non-discrimination by Society in the areas heretofore described.

provisions have been violated, the same shall constitute a material breach of contract upon which County may determine to cancel, terminate, or suspend this Agreement. County reserves the right to determine independently that the non-discrimination provisions of this Agreement have been violated. In addition, a determination by the California Fair Employment and Housing Department or the Federal Equal Employment Opportunity Commission that the Society has violated State or Federal non-discrimination laws or regulations shall constitute a finding by County that Society has violated the non-discrimination provisions of this Agreement.

is hereby agreed upon as the amount of damages that will be sustained by County for breach of the promises on non-discrimination herein contained. Said amount has been set by the parties hereto in recognition of the difficulty in fixing actual damages arising from a breach thereof."

#### 5. RATIFICATION

5.01 All other terms, conditions, covenants and promises of the Operating Agreement not affected by the provisions of this Amendment Agreement shall remain in full force and effect and are hereby reaffirmed.

#### 6. EFFECTIVE DATE

6.01 The effective date of this Amendment Agreement shall be the date of approval hereof by the County's Board of Supervisors.



The Santa Clarita Valley Historical Society has planned two events commemorating the 70th anniversary of the St. Francis Dam disaster. The St. Francis Dam, built in 1926 by William Mulholland, failed at 11:58 p.m. March 12, 1928, causing destruction from Saugus to Ventura and the death of at least 450 people.

On March 14, a tour of the disaster site, with a hike to the overlook and over the dam ruins is scheduled. The tour will include a continental breakfast at the Saugus Train Station in Heritage Junction Historic Park, bus transportation to Powerhouse 2 and the dam site. It will be conducted by Frank Rock, a noted lecturer on the dam disaster.

A. COMMITTEE MEETING: The Restoration Committee of the SCVHS meet on Sunday March 15, 1998. The Chair reported on: 1) Board of Directors Meeting [Feb. 98]: Contingent funding approved for purchase of matching antique door hardware for Newhall Ranch House; 2) "Walk of Frame" Project list of historic points of interest within walking distance from Heritage Junction -1 response received; 3) Clean up of railroad yard metal rail and wooden ties completed; and 4) Donation of interior furnishings in Kingsburry Residence pending Questers formal letter.

#### B. COMMITTEE PLANNING: The following plans were discussed:



# SANTA CLARITA VALLEY HISTORICAL SOCIETY MASTER PLAN COMMITTEE

The Master Plan Committee (the "Committee") is an ad-hoc body which provides a forum for Board Members and other interested Members to debate and deal with complex issues that cannot be tackled within the confines of a once-a-month Board meeting. Decisions of the Committee are not binding on the Society. Instead, the Committee reports directly to the President, who in turn presents the Committee's recommendations to the Board of Directors for action.

The primary function of the Master Plan Committee is to determine the use of existing and future structures and all resources within Heritage Junction. The Committee works from the Long Range Plan to determine how best to implement the points of the Long Range Plan that pertain to Heritage Junction. The Master Plan Committee also deals with issues related to Heritage Junction that may not be covered under the Long Range Plan (e.g., future use of the Narrow-Gauge Train, placement of Historical Markers, etc.). Recommendations of the Master Plan Committee that are approved by the Board of Directors at a Board meeting are then turned over to the appropriate committee(s) for further action. For instance, a decision to restore a structure to historic status would be turned over to the Restoration Committee, which would determine how to complete the restoration.

# SANTA CLARITA VALLEY HISTORICAL SOCIETY RESTORATION COMMITTEE

After a proposal involving the restoration of a structure or structures within Heritage Junction has been reviewed by the Master Plan Committee and presented to and endorsed in concept by a vote of the Board of Directors, the President and/or Board may direct it to the Restoration Committee (the "Committee"). The Committee draws on the expertise of its Chair (appointed by the President with approval from the Board) and its members (appointed by the Chair) to develop a Specific Plan for the restoration of said project. Subcommittee chairs shall be appointed by the Committee Chair, subject to approval by the Board of Directors.

Recommendations of the Committee are advisory only and are not binding on the Society. Committee recommendations are presented to the Board for approval. The Board, by vote, may approve them, reject them, modify them or refer them back to the Restoration Committee and/or other Committees for modification.

The Committee shall also monitor the implementation of Board-approved Specific Plans and shall keep the Board informed of their progress. This function does not prohibit the Board from taking a more active role, whether directly or indirectly, in the monitoring of said Plans.

# SANTA CLARITA VALLEY HISTORICAL SOCIETY MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

The Membership Committee (the "Committee") shall be comprised of a Chair (appointed by the President with approval from the Board of Directors) and members (appointed by the Chair). Subcommittee chairs shall be appointed by the Committee Chair, subject to approval by the Board of Directors. The Committee shall meet regularly and keep an accurate count of the Society's membership, which numbers are to be presented at each Board meeting.

Membership Retention: It is the responsibility of the Committee (or its subcommittee(s)) to notify current members, in accordance with the By-laws, when their membership comes up for renewal. The Committee maintains a current Volunteer List, drawn from New Member applications. The Committee maintains a current mailing list of members and others who receive the Heritage Junction Dispatch, which the Committee sends by mail on a regular basis.

Membership Development: It is the responsibility of the Committee (or its subcommittee(s)) to develop plans to broaden the base and increase the number of Society members. Such plans are presented at least annually to the Board of Directors for approval (more frequently if so directed).

Recommendations of the Committee are advisory only and are not binding on the Society. Committee recommendations are presented to the Board for approval. The Board, by vote, may approve them, reject them, modify them or refer them back to the Membership Committee and/or other Committees for modification. The Board may also direct the Membership Committee to work in tandem with other Committees (such as Community Relations) to achieve mutual goals.

# SANTA CLARITA VALLEY HISTORICAL SOCIETY WAYS & MEANS COMMITTEE

The Ways & Means Committee (the "Committee") shall be comprised of a Chair (appointed by the President with approval from the Board of Directors) and members (appointed by the Chair). It shall meet regularly and assist and provide direction to paid Staff concerning fund-raising activities.

In the absence of paid fund-raising Staff, the Committee shall examine proposals and develop ideas for Society fund-raisers, which proposals and ideas shall be submitted to the Board of Directors for approval. The Committee shall also review and make recommendations concerning any fund-raising proposals presented by outside vendors or other third parties and submit such recommendations to the Board for approval.

Once a volunteer fund-raising proposal is approved by the Board, the Committee shall develop an action plan and implement it (subject to further Board approval when appropriate). The Committee shall assist with third-party-operated fund-raising activities as directed by the Board.

The Committee shall submit a budget annually to the Treasurer and/or Budget Committee, detailing all fund-raising activities planned for the fiscal year (July 1 - June 30), no later than the Board meeting in May.

In all cases, decisions of the Ways & Means Committee are advisory only and subject to Board approval.

# SANTA CLARITA VALLEY HISTORICAL SOCIETY SITE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

The Site Management Committee (the "Committee") shall be comprised of a Chair (appointed by the President with approval from the Board of Directors) and members (appointed by the Chair). It shall meet regularly and shall be responsible for making recommendations and implementing Board-approved plans concerning the maintenance of collections and of historic and non-historic structures within Heritage Junction.

Among other responsibilities, the Committee shall appoint volunteers, subject to Board approval, to fill the roles of Station Master, Curator, Librarian, Resource Center Manager and Docent Coordinator. The Committee shall maintain a master event calendar to coordinate Station use by the Society and outside organizations. The Committee shall maintain collections, donations and exhibits in good shape, at the direction of the Board.

In all cases, decisions of the Site Management Committee are advisory only and subject to Board approval.

# SANTA CLARITA VALLEY HISTORICAL SOCIETY COMMUNITY RELATIONS COMMITTEE

The Community Relations Committee (the "Committee") shall be comprised of a Chair (appointed by the President with approval from the Board of Directors) and members (appointed by the Chair). It shall meet regularly and maintain good relations between the Society and the media, schools and the public at large.

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Other than the President, a person appointed by the Committee (and approved by the Board) shall be the sole point of Society-generated contact with the media, so that the Society speaks with a uniform voice.

The Committee, or an appointee, shall consistently work to maintain friendly and open relations with the County of Los Angeles and the City of Santa Clarita, informing each in a timely manner when a decision or action of the Society affects either agency.

The Committee shall be responsible for answering the Society's telephone and responding to callers or passing along information to the appropriate party in a timely fashion. The Committee shall organize and maintain a Speakers Bureau and coordinate school tours of the Station and Heritage Junction. The Committee, or an appointee, shall promote filming and tourism within Heritage Junction and perform other duties as assigned by the Board.

In all cases, decisions of the Site Management Committee are advisory only and subject to Board approval.

# Executive Director's Report Restoration Activity 19 April 1998

SITE DEVELOPMENT: Weeding continues to counteract El Nino growth. One-half ton of wall-stone acquired from Bouquet Canyon Stone for picnic area walls. Two motion-sensor lights donated for Feedtrough Canyon by Phyl - Mar Electric.

KINGSBURRY HOUSE: Vandalism during week of 5 April resulted in breaking of one pane in the living room window on Schoolhouse side. All window screens installed on 12 April.

EDISON HOUSE: Painting on three sides of house completed, with the exception of a small amount of trim. Windows on bathroom restored and reinstalled. Approximately 10 other windows in various stages of restoration. Painting of Interior woodwork in progress.

PARDEE HOUSE: False ceiling in "conference room" removed. Former electrical wiring removed from main room and "conference room". Additional original doorways and windows discovered with removal of lath and plaster. Three new doorways constructed from 1 3/4 inch redwood; to be installed after completion. Rear doorway will be widened to 36 inches from current 34 inch width (Evidence from structure indicates original rear doorway was fitted with double doors). 300 feet of Flex conduit donated by Phyl-Mar Electric. More items on order.

NEWHALL RANCH HOUSE: Two layers of flooring removed from "dining room", rear hallway and kitchen; one more layer partially removed from kitchen. Remaining floor is now only subfloor. Refinishing of one solid exterior door completed; to be installed at rear hallway with current door placed in front, west bedroom. Three sides of second floor repainted with Hampton Green. First floor repainting underway. Stripping of the wainscoating in "dining room" and rear hallway completed; kitchen approximately 40% complete.

CHAPEL: Electrical load center installed on rear of building; wiring pulled to two interior outlets and two ceiling fixtures. Steeple bell secured, due to suspected attempted theft.



#### Restoration Report

Notes/Up-dates Narrow Guage/Mining Display
Have obtained historic photos (copies) and articles
from Mr. Ted Faye, Archivist for the U.S. Borax Co. for
the display board. The display board will include mines
of all types in the SCV and surrounding areas. It will
also include the role narrow guage or baby guage railroads
played in developing these mines and why. We have several
examples on site. Info on the Borax Visitor Center would
be included as I am sure they would be happy to reciprocate
since they will be a big part of the display. Any events
would be kept up-dated. Once all information is gathered
for the display board it will be passed through U.S. Borax
Administration for approval since their name is being used.

After approval is gained, a request for display items ie; mining cars or small narrow guage ore cars will be made from the U.S. Borax Co. A request for support and involvement by the U.S. Borax Co. will be made.

In the next week or so I will pick up paint from Vista Paint in Burbank. A good primer has been the major problem and they have a red oxide primer that will seal with very little preparation. The local utilities use this in their industrial stations. They will also give a 10% discount since this specialty item is very expensive.

Other display items that could be done after engine painting and display board are completed as follows;

- 1. A 5" or half scale replica of the head stock of the Sterling Borax Mine.
- 2. A5" or half scale mining car used at Sterling Borax or local mines.
- 3. A small engine house built to represent buildings at Sterling Borax.

- 4. An attractive fence will be put up to replace the present chain link (similar to that by the station).
- 5. Small information boards would be used to give as much history and information as possible.

At this time I have to contact Phil Serpico who is writing a book on the mines in the SCV--Mr. Ted Faye provided the contact. I also have to pick up information from Pam Helvey provided by Philip Scorza. Once again when I have the display board information completed and approved by U.S. Borax it will be presented to committee. I will also be contacting the BLM to see if they have any information on local mines. At this point I am inundated with information and I have to pick and choose due to limited size of the display board! Would like to keep it to 3' X 6' or 4' X 8'. Some samples are attached.

#### Restoration Report May 18, 1998

#### Site Development

Efforts have concentrated on weed removal. Rose gardens were cleared by volunteers from the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints during Pride Week. Pardee parking lot and portions of Feed Trough Canyon werecut by County Workers, with large portionsof these and others mowed by Tom Frew and his trusty machine. #### Newhall Ranch House



The Santa Clarita Valley Historical Society would like to thank you and your partners for the revisions you have made to your proposal for the Society's proposed involvement with the Tesoro del Valle Historical Site Preservation. Also, thank you for your hospitality in making the site available for tour by the Board of Directors.

As you requested, the Board has taken a long, hard look at the partnership you have proposed. The Board believes that the site needs to be preserved and will do whatever it can to make sure that that happens. We also understand your desire to partner with someone who is confident that they can live up to their end of the bargain. For that reason, the Santa Clarita Valley Historical Society reluctantly must inform you that, based on the most recent proposal, it can not accept the agreement. The Board considered the commitment of both volunteer time and financial resources and concluded that your proposal is too big of a challenge. We do not want to set ourselves up for failure.

The Society has begun the process of changing how it does business. We realize that we must increase our fundraising capabilities and the level of commitment from our members to furthering the goals of the Society. We will be hiring professional staff to assist us, but this is not an overnight solution. We believe that it will take two to four years for us to reach our potential. Unfortunately, that does not fit into your timeline.

At the request of Mr. Vanatta, please accept this letter as our response to the comments contained in the letter to you dated October 21, 1997 from Mr. Tom Frew of the Santa Clarita Valley Historical Society ("S.C.V.H.S.").

#### **Background**

As the developers for the former Harry Carey ranch, it has always been our intention to preserve for future generations the unique history as exhibited in the adobe Ranch house and surrounding buildings and grounds (the "District"). Since first being contacted in 1992 by the late Jerry Reynolds, a recognized expert on the history of the Santa Clarita Valley and member of the Society, we pursued through State process a plan to initially restore and then turn over to a third party foundation the operation and preservation of a museum to showcase the District, the Carey collection, and become a regional cultural resource for the Valley.

Engineering evaluation, submittal to the State Office of Historic Preservation("S.H.P.O."), and an approval in concept of the District Plan were no small undertaking. We accomplished such a planning and feasibility study with the cooperation of three different Boards of the Society. After structuring a Letter of Intent that went through numerous draft revisions, all at the request of the Society, we were both surprised and disappointed to learn in July, 1997 that the Society was unable to proceed. We still believe that S.C.V.H.S. is the logical party to assume the long term role as operator and manager for the District. They have the experience and expertise. We are hopeful that S.C.V.H.S. will ultimately develop a-fund raising program to augment the owners initial endowment, and the comfort level necessary to long term commitment for operation and funding of the property. In the meantime, the owners are willing to accept, as a condition project approval, the obligation to restore and maintain the District until an operator is identified. Also, should the County wish to become such party, we would work toward a program provided the proper financing safeguards and public trust were incorporated.

Our project pro-forma includes a reservation of funds in the amount of \$500,000, most of which was intended for the endowment of the District after its cooperative restoration. It is true that we had expected 1,500 hours, or \$160,000, of volunteer labor from the Society to accomplish the restoration before a final fee title transfer to the S.C.V.H.S. for the sum value of \$1.00.

The withdrawal of S.C.V.H.S. has left us with a short term dilemma. S.H.P.O. will not process our District preservation plan to the Corps of Engineers for final approval until a substitute responsible operator is identified and contractually obligated. Also, we cannot proceed with physical improvements or restoration processes until such approval is granted. For example, we have one building, scheduled for demolition and salvage, which collapsed during a January storm after suffering severe damage from the Northridge seismic event. Also, technically, we cannot proceed to salvage until the cultural part of the Tesoro del Valle EIR is certified. Its tough to deliver on best intentions when suspended in a long entitlement process and now abandoned by S.C.V.H.S.

We nevertheless are strong in our resolve to preserve this historic resource and will continue the full time caretaker security and normal maintenance of the buildings and grounds until a solution is found. Also, the owners continue to use it for family recreational and civic and charity event purposes. It is not going to be neglected or compromised by the proposed Master Plan Community or its development process. Of course, some economies will be forfeited if the site improvements and restoration are not completed in concert with the first phase of development.

### MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

THIS MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING ("MOU") is entered into as of October \_\_\_\_, 1998 ("Effective Date") by and among West Soto Street Partners, Clougherty Packing Corporation, Joseph Dennis Clougherty and Montalvo Properties, LLC, (collectively, "Owners"), \(^{\Delta}\) the William S. Hart Union High School District ("District"), and the Santa Clarita Valley Historical Society ("Society" \(^{\Delta}\) and together with District, the "Grantees").

### ARTICLE I. - RECITALS

- 1.2. A portion of the Project site includes that certain historical site consisting of approximately 1.1 acres, and improvements, consisting of an adobe ranch house, three other adobe structures and one \$\triangle\$ wood\_frame structure (collectively, \$\triangle^\circ\*Historical Site")\$ as identified in a Structural Evaluation Report for Tesoro del Valle Project, Clougherty Ranch, dated April 4, 1996, prepared by Melvyn Green and Associates, Inc. ("Green Report") and depicted as Lot 672 on that certain \_\_\_\_ tract map, attached hereto as Exhibit \_\_\_\_.
- 1.3. Owners desire to ensure the long term preservation of the Historical Site as provided in this MOU.
- 1.4. Owners also desire to convey to District a parcel adjacent to the Historical Site for educational uses by District ("District \(^\District\) Site" and together with the Historical Site, the "Donated Properties"). The District Site is depicted as Lot 707 on that certain \_\_\_\_ tract map, attached hereto as Exhibit \_\_\_.
- 1.5. Owners intend to convey Lot 1715 to be dedicated for trail use and Lot 714 for a neighborhood <u>park</u> (collectively, "<u>Recreational Facilities</u>"). The parcels on which the Recreational Facilities ("<u>Recreational Facilities Site</u>") will be developed is depicted as on that certain \_\_\_ tract map, attached hereto as Exhibit \_\_\_.
- 1.6. Owners intend to develop a parcel adjacent to the Historical Site and the District Site for use by, and conveyance to, a to-be-formed master homeowners association for Tesoro del Valle ("Master Association") for homeowner association uses, including without limitation a Clubhouse, and swim and racket club ("Homeowner Association Site"). The Homeowner Association Site is depicted as Lots 671 and 674 on that certain \_\_\_\_\_ tract map, attached hereto as Exhibit \_\_\_\_.
- 1.7. District desires to own, develop and operate the District Site for educational purposes and to participate in the preservation and operation of the Historical Site.

- 1.8. Society desires to participate in the preservation and operation of the Historical Site.
- 1.9. As a part of the longer term possibility that areas within the Tesoro del Valle Project may be annexed to the City of Santa Clarita ("City"), the City is an interested party in this MOU and shall provide a courtesy review of the documents and plans to confirm compliance with City ordinances which would be applicable to the Donated Properties if they were located within the jurisdiction of the City.

### ARTICLE II. - CLOSING

### 2.1. Closing.

### 2.1.1. Deliveries. At the Closing:

- <u>^(a)</u> The Parties shall <u>negotiate</u>, execute and deliver the Reciprocal Easement Agreement, the Joint Use and License Agreement and the other Definitive Agreements, each acknowledged and in recordable form as appropriate;
- The Owners shall execute and deliver deeds conveying fee title to the Historical Site to the Society, or the District, as the case may be, in accordance with the terms and conditions of Article III;
- $\triangle$ (c) The Owners shall execute and deliver deeds conveying fee title to the District Site to the District; and  $\triangle$
- <u>Add</u> Each of the Parties shall have executed and delivered such certificates and other customary closing documents, or as may be reasonably requested by any other Party.
- △<u>2.1.2.Closing Date.</u> The Closing shall occur on December 31, 1999, or as soon as reasonably practicable thereafter. Each Party shall utilize reasonable efforts to satisfy the conditions to Closing set forth below and to carry out the Closing on or before December 31, 1999.
- △ 2.1.3. Conditions Precedent to Closing. The following are the conditions precedent to the execution and delivery of the Definitive Agreements and to the Closing.
  - <u>County Approval of Project and Entitlements</u>. Final approval of the Tesoro del Valle Project, and its entitlements, by the County of Los Angeles.
  - △(b) <u>Definitive Agreements</u>. Approval by the Parties of the Definitive Agreements (including, without limitation, the Reciprocal Easement Agreement △ or the Joint Use and License Agreement △ and any other documents required by this MOU):

- <u>Acc</u> <u>Permitted Encumbrances</u>. Approval by the Parties of the permitted encumbrances on the Donated Properties;
- Add Schematic Design for District Site. Approval by the Owners and the Society of the District's schematic design for construction of improvements on the District Site;
- <u>Ae</u>) Schematic Design for Rehabilitation. Approval by the District and the Society of the Owner's schematic design for relocation of structures within, and rehabilitation of structures on, the Historical Site;
- Party to the other Parties reaffirming that the representations and warranties made by such Party in this MOU remain true and correct as of the date of such Party's execution and delivery of the Definitive Agreements; and
- (g) Completion of Rehabilitation. Completion of the relocation, rehabilitation and construction of the historical structures within the Historical Site pursuant to this MOU and the Green Report (the "Rehabilitation"). During the Rehabilitation, Owners shall maintain liability and property damage insurance on the property in the normal and customary amounts. The risk of loss during the Rehabilitation shall be borne by each of the parties in accordance with their relative capital contributions and interests in the Historical Site.
- 2.2 . Definitive Agreements. Among the various Definitive Agreements, the Parties will enter into:
- (i) the Reciprocal Easement Agreement in the event  $\triangle$  the Historical Site is conveyed to Society in accordance with the terms and conditions of  $\triangle$  Section 3.1; or
- (ii) the Joint Use and License Agreement in the event  $\triangle$  the Historical Site is conveyed to District in accordance with the terms and conditions of  $\triangle$  Section 3.2.

The Parties shall proceed diligently to complete the forms of the Definitive Agreements, consistent in substance with this MOU.

### ARTICLE - III. - CONVEYANCE OF HISTORICAL SITE

- △ 3.1. Conveyance to Society. Provided that the Society is not in default under this MOU, the Society may elect to be the grantee of the Historical Site, in accordance with the terms and conditions of this MOU.
- ^ 3.1.1. Society Commitment. As a condition precedent to the election of the Society to be the grantee of the Historical Site, the Society shall make an aggregate commitment of resources ("Society Commitment") to the ^ Rehabilitation. The Society Commitment shall be equal to (i) One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000) ("Dollar Commitment"); (ii)

1,500 hours of donated labor by volunteers recruited and organized by Society ("Labor Commitment"); or (iii) a combination of Dollar Commitment and Labor Commitment, \(^\Delta\) whereby the total Dollar Commitment is reduced by One Hundred Dollars (\$100) for each hour of Labor Commitment. The Dollar Commitment may also be satisfied through in-kind contributions of goods, materials and services valued at fair market value. Each month the Society shall provide written notification to the Owners of the status of the Labor Commitment, including such information as total number of volunteer hours expended since the date of the previous monthly report and the exact number of bours expended per each specifically identified volunteer during such period.

- 3.1.2 \(^\). Promissory Note. If \(^\) upon the completion of the \(^\) Rehabilitation, the Society Commitment has not been fully satisfied, the Society shall execute a promissory note substantially in the form \(^\) attached hereto as Exhibit \(^\) and in the principal amount equal to One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000) less the sum of any Dollar Commitment previously paid by Society to Owner and One Hundred Dollars for each hour of Labor Commitment (the "Society Promissory Note"). The \(^\) Society Promissory Note shall bear interest at the rate of seven percent (7%) per annum simple interest. The maximum amount due and payable in any given year shall not exceed fifty percent (50%) of the aggregate of the Owner Endowment and Master Association Dues Subsidy.
- \$\triangle \frac{3.1.3. Time and Manner for Election}{\text{Preservation Election}}\$. The Society shall make its election to be the grantee of the Historical Site ("Grant Election") for so long as the Historical Site shall be used in accordance with the terms and conditions of the preservation covenant, attached hereto as Exhibit ("Preservation Covenant") no later than December 31, 1998 ("Grant Election Date"). The Grant Election and its covenant to make the Society Commitment shall be evidenced by a resolution of the Society's Board of Directors certified by its secretary.
- $\triangle$  3.1.4 Effect of Election. In the event  $\triangle$  the Society makes the Grant Election prior to the Grant Election Date, the Historical Site shall be conveyed to the Historical Society, subject to the terms of this MOU and the Definitive Agreements; provided that Society is not in default under this MOU or the Definitive Agreements.
- △ 3.1.5. Effect of Non-Election. In the event that the Society fails, or chooses not, to make the Grant Election prior to the Grant Election Date, the Society shall operate the Interpretive Center pursuant to a joint use and license agreement ("Joint Use and License Agreement") to be entered into by and among the Owners, the District, the Society and the Master Association △(if so formed at the time of execution).
- △ 3.2. Conveyance to District. In the event that the Society fails, or chooses not, to make the Grant Election prior to the Grant Election Date, the Owner shall convey the Historical Site to the District for so long as the Historical Site shall be used in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Preservation Covenant and this MOU; provided that the District is not in default under this MOU or the Definitive Agreements.
- △ 3.2.1.District Commitment. In the event the that the Historical Site is conveyed to the District, the District shall make an aggregate commitment of resources

("District Commitment") to the Rehabilitation in the amount. The District Commitment shall be equal to One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000) but may be offset by a credit ("Additional Facilities Credit") equal to \$\times\$ as set forth in Section 3 of that certain Memorandum of Understanding Between William S. Hart Union High School District Relative to Possible Acquisition of Junior High Site and Additional Site Areas Within Tesoro del Valle Project ("School MOU").

- Right of First Refusal. If, at any time, it is proposed that all or any portion of the Historical Site (i) be used for any purpose or in any manner other than in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Preservation Covenant or this MOU, or (ii) be sold, conveyed, leased or otherwise transferred to or used by any individual or entity for residential, commercial or industrial purposes, then, in such event, the Owners, and each of them, shall have the first right of refusal to purchase the Historical Site (including all improvements thereto) at a purchase price equal to cost of the donated materials and the fair value of the volunteer labor provided by the Society, but in no event more than the share of Capital Contribution, as described in Section 4.1.1 hereof, actually provided by the Society, if the Society makes the Grant Election. If the parties are unable to agree on the value of the donated materials and the fair value of the Labor Commitment, and/or the share of the Initial Capital Contribution actually provided by the Society, then either party may submit the matter to binding arbitration before a single arbitrator sitting in Los Angeles County operating under the rules of the American Arbitration Association ("AAA"). The parties shall mutually attempt to select the arbitrator and if they are unsuccessful within the first thirty (30) days after receipt of filing of the initial request for arbitration, then the AAA shall provide a list of names and if the parties are unable to agree on a single arbitrator for thirty (30) days thereafter, the AAA shall designate the arbitrator. The burden of proof regarding the value of the donated materials and the fair value of the Labor Commitment shall be on the Society. The right of first refusal granted to the Owner of the Historical Site (as hereinafter defined) shall be set forth in a recordable document which shall he recorded prior to the conveyance of the Historical Site to the Historical Site Owner.
- 3.4. Historical Site Owner. The owner of the Historical Site, whether said owner is the Society pursuant to Section 3.1 hereof or the District pursuant to Section 3.2 hereof shall be referred to throughout this MOU as the Historical Site Owner ("Historical Site Owner") when the context does not require specification between the two.

### ARTICLE IV. A - ALLOCATION OF RESPONSIBILITIES AND COSTS

### △ 4.1. Responsibilities of Owners.

 $\triangle$  4.1.1. Historical Site. Except as otherwise expressly set forth in this MOU, the Owners shall be responsible for those undertakings related to the development, planning, design, relocation, rehabilitation, and construction within the Historical Site which are customarily the responsibility of a developer or owner in development projects of this character and magnitude. In the event the Historical Site is conveyed to the Society in accordance with the terms and

conditions of <u>A Section 3.1</u>, the Owners agree that, except as otherwise expressly set forth in this MOU, △(a) △ District shall have no responsibility for the costs of such undertakings in connection with the Historical Site and (b) A Society shall be responsible for the costs of such undertakings to the extent of the Society Commitment as provided in Section \$\triangle 3.1.1\$. In the event that the Historical Site is conveyed to the District in accordance with the terms and conditions of △ Section 3.2, the District shall be responsible for the costs of such undertakings to the extent of the District Commitment, as may be reduced by the Additional Facilities Credit.

△ 4.1.2. District Site. Except as otherwise expressly set forth in this MOU, the Owners shall not be responsible for those undertakings related to the development, planning, design, construction and operation within the District Site which are customarily the responsibility of a developer or owner in development projects of this character and magnitude. The District agrees that, except as otherwise expressly set forth in this MOU, the Owners and the Society shall have no responsibility for the costs of such undertakings in connection with the District Sitc.

4.1.3. Homeowner Association Site. Except as otherwise expressly set forth in this MOU, the Owners (or the Master Association, following conveyance of the Homeowner Association Site to the Master Association) shall be responsible for those undertakings related to the development, planning, design, construction and operation within the Homcowner Association Site and the Recreational Facilities Site which are customarily the responsibility of a developer or owner in development projects of this character and magnitude.

### 4.1.4. Funding. Owners shall be responsible for the following forms of funding towards the Rehabilitation, regardless of the identity of the Historical Site Owner:

- Owners shall make a capital Capital Contribution: contribution to the Rehabilitation in the amount of Two Hundred Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$270,000). This capital contribution shall be used in conjunction with the Society Commitment or the District Commitment (the Society Commitment and the District Commitment referred to alternatively, the "Grantee Commitment") to complete the initial restoration and renovation of the Historical Site, including earthquake repairs, relocation and seismic upgrades. Owner shall advance the Grantee Commitment the ensure the Rehabilitation is completed in a timely manner.
- Operating Expenses: Owners shall make a maximum contribution to the Historical Site Owner in the amount of Two Hundred Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$225,000) to assist with operating costs for the first five years of operation of the Historical Site, allocated as follows: Sixty Five Thousand Dollars (\$65,000) in years one and two: Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) in year three; Forty Five Thousand Dollars (\$45,000) in year four, and Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000) in year five. The annual amounts shall be payable in equal monthly installments.

- (c) Owners Endowment: Provided that the Historical Site Owner is not in default under this MOU or the Definitive Agreements, Owners shall make a charitable contribution in an aggregate amount not to exceed One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) payable in annual amounts not to exceed Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000) to the extent that the Historical Site Owner matches such contribution from other sources, exclusive of the Master Association Dues Subsidy, for provides a dollar for dollar credit to the Owners as an Additional Facilities Credit to endow the initial operations and management of the Interpretive Center.
- 4.1.5  $\triangle$ . Examples of Sole Responsibilities of Owners. By way of example only and without limiting the generality of Section 4.1.1, the Owners agree that, except to the extent of the  $\triangle$  Grantee Commitment  $\triangle$ , such responsibility shall include the following:
  - △(a) The costs of Tesoro del Valle Project, including the provision of all site utilities, grading of the site transition to and for the adjacent trails, parking and driveways, the construction of the roadways, parking facilities, perimeter landscape and hardscape improvements:
    - $\triangle$ (b) On-site and off-site costs directly related to  $\triangle$  Rehabilitation:
  - ^(c) The costs of utility, road and other infrastructure within the Historical Site;
  - The costs of utility, road and other infrastructure within the District Site;
    - 4(e) The costs of mitigation required by the EIR;
    - A(f) Payment of all permit, development and similar fees;
    - ^(g) The costs of private consultants retained by the Owners; and
  - (h) ^ The costs of compliance by the Owners with all permit and development conditions imposed by County and State laws, rules or ordinances for development of the Tesoro del Valle Project^1

### △ 4.2. Responsibilities of District.

△ <u>4.2.1. District Site</u>. Except as otherwise expressly set forth in this MOU, the District shall be responsible for those undertakings related to the development, planning, design, construction and operation of the District Site which are customarily the responsibility of a developer or owner in development of projects of this character and magnitude. The District agrees that, except as otherwise expressly set forth in this MOU, the Owners and the Society shall have no responsibility for the costs of such undertakings.

- $\triangle$  4.2.2. Historical Site. In the event that the Historical Site is conveyed to the District in accordance with the terms and conditions of  $\triangle$  Section 3.2, the District shall be responsible for the costs of undertakings in connection with  $\triangle$  Rehabilitation to the extent of the  $\triangle$  District Commitment.
- $\triangle$  4.2.3 Examples of Sole Responsibilities of District. By way of example only and without limiting the generality of Section 4.2.1, the District agrees that it is solely responsible for the following:
  - $\triangle$ (a) The costs of all development, planning, design, construction and operation within the District Site;
  - Ab Payment of all permit, development and similar fees for development within the District Site;
  - ^(c) The costs of private consultants retained by the District (including, without limitation, architects and strategic planning consultants);
  - 4(d) The costs of compliance by the District with all permit and development conditions imposed by County and State laws, rules or ordinances for development within the District Site;
  - ^(e) the costs (including those incurred prior to the execution of this MOU, as well as thereafter) for the District's administration of its responsibilities under this MOU and the Definitive Agreements and review and processing of the Definitive Agreements and the costs of District attorneys; and
  - <u>^(f)</u> The costs (including, without limitation, court costs, expert testimony costs and attorneys' fees) of any litigation, arbitration, request for a tax ruling or similar proceeding which the District may engage in for the purpose of validating any aspect of the financing of their obligations under this MOU.

### △ <u>4.3</u>. Responsibilities of Society.

- $\triangle$  4.3.1. Historical Site. Except as otherwise expressly set forth in this MOU, the Society shall be responsible for providing historic preservation expertise to the Owner in connection those undertakings related to the development, planning, design and Rehabilitation within the Historical Site. In the event the Historical Site is conveyed to the Society in accordance with the terms and conditions of  $\triangle$  Section 3.1, the Society agrees that, except as otherwise expressly set forth in this MOU, it shall be responsible for the costs of such undertakings in connection with the Historical Site to the extent of the Society Commitment as provided in Section  $\triangle$  3.1.1. The Society shall also be responsible for operations in connection with Interpretive Center uses.
- △ <u>4.3.2. District Site.</u> △ <u>The Society shall not be responsible for those undertakings related to the development, planning, design, construction and operation within the</u>

District Site which are customarily the responsibility of a developer or owner in development projects of this character and magnitude. The District agrees that, except as otherwise expressly set forth in this MOU, the Owners and the Society shall have no responsibility for the costs of such undertakings in connection with the District Site.

- △ <u>4.3.3</u>. Examples of Sole Responsibilities of Society. By way of example only and without limiting the generality of <u>Section 4.3.1</u>, the Society agrees that, except to the extent of the Owners Endowment, it is responsible for the following:
  - $\triangle$ (a) costs of development and maintenance of interpretative materials, appropriate displays, and curation of artifacts, if any, possessed or managed by the Society in connection with the Interpretative Center; and  $\triangle$
  - <u>A(b)</u> the costs (including those incurred prior to the execution of this MOU, as well as thereafter) for the Society's administration of its responsibilities under this MOU and the Definitive Agreements and review and processing of the Definitive Agreements and the costs of Society attorneys.
- ^ 4.4. Responsibilities of Master Association. Until such time as the Master Association is formed, the Owners shall be solely responsible for all covenants, obligations and responsibilities delegated to the Master Association under this MOU.
- 4.4.1 ^.Historical Site. Except as otherwise expressly set forth in this MOU, the Master Association, following conveyance of the Homeowners Association Site by Owner, shall be responsible for maintenance and operation of the Recreational Facilities <u>Site.</u>
- <u>4.4.2</u> $^{\triangle}$ . Examples of Solc Responsibilities of  $^{\triangle}$  Masters Association. By way of example only and without limiting the generality of Section 4.4.1, the Master Association  $^{\triangle}$  shall be solcly responsible for the following:
  - <u>^(a)</u> the costs of operations, security and management personnel, (including, without limitation, salaries, wages, benefits, and payroll taxes) in connection with the Homeowners Association Site;
  - △(b) payment of the annual Master Association △ <u>Dues Subsidy</u> to <u>the</u> owner of the Historical Site equal to \$10 per month per member of the Master Association, as set forth in the Reciprocal Easement Agreement, until such time as the owner of the Historical Site is able to continue operations based solely on either the Owner Endowment or other means, but in no event for a period longer than twenty (20) years;
  - payment of property tax or possessory interest tax, if any, in connection with the Homeowners Association Site; and
  - (d) the costs (including those incurred prior to the execution of this MOU, as well as thereafter) for the Master Association's administration of its

responsibilities under this MOU and the Definitive Agreements and review and processing of the Definitive Agreements and the costs of Master Association attorneys.

### 4.5. Responsibilities of the Historical Site Owner..

- 4.5.1. Historical Site. Except as otherwise expressly set forth in this MOU and by way of example only, the Historical Site Owner shall be solely responsible for the following:
  - (a) costs of operations, security and management personnel, (including, without limitation, salaries, wages, benefits, and payroll taxes) in connection with the Interpretative Center and the Caretaker and the Caretaker's Residence, if the Society does not make the Grant Election;
  - (h) property tax or possessory interest tax, if any, in connection with the Interpretative Center, if the Society does not make the Grant Election; and
  - (c) maintain public access to the Historical Site as set forth in Section 8.1.3 hereof.

### **ARTICLE V.** △ - LICENSES AND EASEMENTS

### △ 5.1. Reciprocal Easement Agreement.

- $\triangle$  5.1.1. Grant of Rights To Use. At the Closing, the Owners, District, Master Association, and in the event that the Historical Site is conveyed to the Society in accordance with the terms and conditions of  $\triangle$  Section 3.1, the Society, shall enter into a Reciprocal Easement Agreement  $\triangle$  which:
  - (a) shall be recorded against the Historical Site, the District Site and the Homeowners Association Facilities Site;
  - shall be superior to any financing recorded against the Historical Site, the District Site, the Homeowners Association Site, and/or Recreational Facilities Site; and
  - A(c) shall address such issues as (i) the joint use of Historical Site by the Parties, (ii) reciprocal parking rights, (iii) common utilities, (iv) vehicular and pedestrian ingress and egress, (v) appropriate insurance and indemnity provisions, (vi) payment of the Owners Endowment and the Master Association A Dues Subsidy, and (vii) other matters customarily addressed by adjoining landowners in comparable projects, all as more particularly described in the Reciprocal Easement Agreement.

- $\triangle$  5.1.2. No Interference. The Reciprocal Easement Agreement shall not permit uses upon a Site which materially  $\triangle$  interfere with access to the entrance to, or the operation of any other Site.
- △ <u>5.1.3. Shared Cost of Maintenance</u>. The Parties shall equitably allocate the costs of repair, maintenance and out-of-pocket operating costs in those areas subject to joint use by the District, the Society and the Master Association. Other than the foregoing costs and the Owners Endowment and the Master Association Dues Subsidy, there shall be no rent, license, maintenance or similar fees charged to a Party for its permitted use of any of the Sites.

### △ 5.2. Joint Use and License Agreement.

- $\triangle$  5.2.1. Grant of Rights To Use. At the Closing, the Parties shall enter into the Joint Use and License Agreement which:
  - <u>^(a)</u> shall establish the rules and regulations for the joint use of the Historical Site, including hours of operation, priorities for use, and operational responsibilities among the Parties ("<u>Historical Site Rules</u>");
  - △(b) shall address such issues as construction coordination and identification of cost-effective opportunities to link use of the Historical Site and the District Site facilities;
  - △(c) following conveyance of the Historical Site by Owners, shall provide a license to the Owners and/or the Master Association for interim use of the Historical Site as provided in Section 5.2.2 of this MOU ("Interim License"); and
  - $\triangle(\underline{d})$  shall provide, in the event the Historical Site is conveyed to the District in accordance with the terms and conditions of  $\triangle$  Section 3.2, for a license to be provided by the District to the Society for use of the Historical Site as an Interpretative Center ("Society License") as provided in Section 5.2.3 of this MOU.

### △ <u>5.2.2</u>. <u>Interim License</u>. The Interim License shall:

- △(2) commence upon the conveyance of the Historical Site and shall terminate upon the opening of the Clubhouse, and swim and racket club constructed on the Homeowners Association Site;
- subject to the Historical Site Rules, allow use of the Historical Site as an information center and Tesoro Del Valle Project promotional office; provided, however, that no sales functions or transactions shall occur within Historical Site in connection with the Interim License, and

- $\triangle$ (c) subject to the Historical Site Rules, allow use of the Historical Site as initial meeting space for the Master Association until such time as the Clubhouse has received a certificate of occupancy.
- $\triangle$  5.2.3. Society License. In the event the Historical Site is conveyed to the District in accordance with the terms and conditions of  $\triangle$  Section 3.2, the Society License shall:
  - ^(a) commence upon the later of (i) the conveyance of the Historical Site or (ii) completion of ^ Rehabilitation and shall be for a term of fifteen (15) years evergreen; provided that the Society is not in default under this MOU or the Definitive Agreements; and
  - <u>^(b)</u> subject to the Historical Site Rules, allow use of the Historical Site as an Interpretive Center.

### ARTICLE 4 VI. - COORDINATION

### △ 6.1. General Cooperation.

- \$\triangle \frac{6.1.1.\triangle Scheduling}{6.1.1.\triangle Scheduling}\$. The District, the Society and the Master Association agree to make a good faith effort to exchange information regarding the scheduling of events and use of the Sites.
- $\triangle$  6.1.2. Construction Management Plan. The Parties agree to cooperate in establishing a construction management plan for construction of the Tesoro del Valle Project, and on any of the Sites. The goal of such plan shall be to (a) minimize conflicts with operations of any of the Sites, (b) minimize conflicts and delays in construction of the Tesoro del Valle Project and (c) ensure the safety of all visitors.
- \$\triangle \frac{6.1.3. Coordinating Committee}\$. The District, the Society and the Master Association \$\triangle \frac{\shall}{\shall}\$ form a Coordinating Committee which will coordinate with the Owners to identify and discuss any issues which, under the provisions of this MOU, require the coordination or cooperation of the Owners and one or more of the other Parties. Such Coordinating Committee will be comprised of one member of each of the \$\triangle\$ District, the Society and the Owner, until such time as the Master Association is formed and replaces the Owner as a member of the Coordinating Committee, and shall be formed and governed in accordance with the rules and criteria established by its members.

### ARTICLE △ <u>VII.</u> - REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES

- △ 7.1. Representations and Warranties of the Owners. The Owners hereby represent and warrant to the District and the Society, as of the Effective Date, as follows:
- $\triangle$  7.1.1.Authorization. The Owners have taken all necessary action to authorize its execution, delivery and, subject to any conditions set forth herein, performance of this MOU.



This MOU constitutes a legal, valid and binding obligations of the Owners, enforceable against them in accordance with its terms.

- △ 7.1.2. No Conflict. The execution, delivery and performance of this MOU by the Owners do not and will not conflict with, or constitute a violation or breach of, or constitute a default under (a) the charter documents of the any of the Owners, (b) any applicable law, rule or regulation binding upon or applicable to the Owners, or (c) any material agreements to which the Owners are parties.
- △ 7.2. Representations and Warranties of the District. The District represents and warrants to the Owners and the Society, as of the Effective Date, as follows:
- △ <u>7.2.1.Organization</u>. The District is a school district duly organized and validly existing under the laws of the State of California.
- △ <u>7.2.2. Authorization</u>. The District has taken all necessary action to authorize its execution, delivery and, subject to any conditions set forth herein, performance of this MOU. This MOU constitutes a legal, valid and binding obligation of the District, enforceable against it in accordance with its terms.
- △ <u>7.2.3. No Conflict.</u> The execution, delivery and performance of this MOU by the District do not and will not conflict with, or constitute a violation or breach of, or constitute a default under (a) the charter documents of the District, (b) any applicable law, rule or regulation binding upon or applicable to the District, or (c) any material agreements to which the District is a party.
- △ <u>7.3</u>. <u>Representations and Warranties of the Society</u>. The Society represents and warrants to the Owners and the District, as of the Effective Date, as follows:
- △ <u>7.3.1</u>. Organization. The Society is a <u>public benefit</u> non-profit organization duly organized, validly existing and in good standing under the laws of the State of California, and is a tax-exempt organization under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, with full power and authority to conduct its business as presently conducted and to execute, deliver and perform its obligations under this MOU.
- △ <u>7.3.2.Authorization</u>. The Society has taken all necessary action to authorize its execution, delivery and, subject to any conditions set forth herein, performance of this MOU. This MOU constitutes a legal, valid and binding obligation of the Society, enforceable against it in accordance with its terms.
- △ 7.3.3. No Conflict. The execution, delivery and performance of this MOU by the Society does not and will not conflict with, or constitute a violation or breach of, or constitute a default under (a) the charter documents of the Society, (b) any applicable law, rule or regulation binding upon or applicable to the Society, or (c) any material agreements to which the Society is a party.

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### △ ARTICLE VIII. - COVENANTS

### △ 8.1 Covenants of All Parties.

- △ 8.1.1 Further Assurances. Subject to the terms and conditions of this MOU, cach Party will use all reasonable efforts to take, or cause to be taken, all actions and to do, or cause to be done, all things necessary or desirable under applicable law to consummate the transactions contemplated by this MOU. The Parties agree to execute and deliver such other documents, certificates, agreements and other writings and to take such other actions as may be reasonably necessary or desirable in order to consummate or implement expeditiously the transactions contemplated by this MOU.
- \$\triangle \text{8.1.2.Preservation of Historical Site.}\$ Each Party agrees that the historical and architectural significance of the Historical Site and the structures thereon, shall be preserved, rehabilitated and maintained in accordance with the terms and conditions of this MOU, \$\triangle\$ the Reciprocal Easement Agreement and the \$\triangle\$ Preservation Covenant. The Preservation Covenant shall be included within, and recorded against the Historical Site, in the grant deed conveying the Historical Site to the \$\triangle\$ Historical Site Owner.

### △ 8.2. Covenants of the Owner.

- △ <u>8.2.1</u>.Responsibility for Financing. △ Owners covenant that any financing required in connection with its development and operation of the Tesoro del Valle Project, shall be the sole responsibility and cost of the Owners or Merchant Builders upon assignment thereto.
- $\triangle$  8.2.2. Rehabilitation. The  $\triangle$  Rehabilitation shall be undertaken by Owner, in consultation with the Society, in accordance with the recommendations of Green Report and in conformance with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation.
- A <u>8.2.3</u>. Completion of <u>Construction</u>. The Owners shall commence the <u>Rehabilitation</u> within the Historical Site, Homeowners Association Site and the Recreational Facilities Site as soon as reasonably possible and shall prosecute the same diligently to completion, using all commercially reasonable efforts to complete the improvements at the Historical Site, Homeowners Association Site and the Recreational Facilities Site at the earliest possible date but in no event later than December 31, 2002.
- $\triangle$  8.2.4.Funding Obligations. Owners shall provide for the financing of the Rehabilitation and continued operation of the Historical Site  $\triangle$  in accordance with  $\triangle$  Section 4.1.4 hereof.

### △ <u>8.3</u>. Covenants of the Society.

△ <u>8.3.1. Operating Covenant</u>. The Society covenants to operate the Interpretive Center in a first class manner consistent with the historical and architectural significance of the Historical Site and with the preservation purposes of this MOU and the Preservation Covenant,

as more particularly set forth in the  $\triangle$  Reciprocal Easement Agreement and/or the Joint Use and License Agreement.

△ 8.3.2 Continued Existence. The Society covenants to maintain its continued legal existence as a <u>public benefit</u> non-profit corporation throughout the term of the Definitive Agreements or to assign its right, title and interest in the Historical Site and the Definitive Agreements: (i) to the City of Santa Clarita; or (ii) to a non-profit organization the mission of which is similar to the Society's mission, subject to the consent of the Parties, which consent shall not be unreasonable withheld; or (iii) under the direction of the Attorney General of the State of California as may be provided under California law.

#### △ 8.4. Covenants of the District.

△ <u>8.4.1. Operating Covenant.</u> The District covenants to operate the District Site in a first class manner consistent with the purposes of this MOU as more particularly set forth in the △ <u>Reciprocal Easement Agreement</u> and/or the Joint Use and License Agreement. In the event the <u>District becomes the</u> Historical Site △ <u>Owner</u>, in accordance with the terms and conditions of △ <u>Section 3.2</u>, the District covenants to operate the Historical Site in a first class manner consistent with the historical and architectural significance of the Historical Site, with the preservation purposes of this MOU and the Preservation Covenant, as more particularly set forth in the △ <u>Reciprocal Easement Agreement</u> and/or the Joint Use and License Agreement, and the District's educational uses of the District Site.

#### △ 8.5. Covenants of the Historical Site Owner.

△ 8.5.1.Grantee Commitment. The Historical Site Owner covenants to provide the Society Commitment.

8.5.2. Public Access. The Historical Site Owner covenants to make the Historical Site open to the public on a regular and continuous basis in response to public demand for said access, but in no event less than twelve days per year, and at such other times by appointment to permit persons affiliated with educational organizations, professional architectural associations and historical societies to study the Historical Site. Any such public admission may be subject to restrictions as reasonably designed for the protection and maintenance of the Historical Site. Such admission may also be subject to a reasonable fee.

#### **ARTICLE IX. - INDEMNIFICATION; INSURANCE**

△ 9.1. Owners Indemnification. △ Owners hereby indemnify and agree to forever save and hold harmless △ Society and District, and their respective officers, agents and employees from and against any and all damages, claims, losses, demands, costs, expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees and costs), obligations, liens, liabilities, actions and causes of action, threatened or actual, which △ District or Society may suffer or incur arising directly or indirectly

with respect to Owners' construction of the Tesoro del Valley Project, Rehabilitation of the Historical Site and other obligation pursuant to this MOU or the Definitive Agreements.

- 9.2. District Indemnification. District hereby indemnifies and agrees to forever save and hold harmless Society and Owners, and their respective officers, agents and employees from and against any and all damages, claims, losses, demands, costs, expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees and costs), obligations, liens, liabilities, actions and causes of action, threatened or actual, which Owners or Society may suffer or incur arising directly or indirectly with respect to District's construction of the District Site and the Historical Site, if applicable, operation or other obligation a pursuant to this MOU or the Definitive Agreements.
- 9.3. Society Indemnification. Society hereby indemnify and agree to forever save and hold harmless Owners and District, and their respective officers, agents and employees from and against any and all damages, claims, losses, demands, costs, expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees and costs), obligations, liens, liabilities, actions and causes of action, threatened or actual, which Owners or Society may suffer or incur arising directly or indirectly with respect to Society's operation or other obligation pursuant to this MOU or the Definitive Agreements.
- △ 9.4. Insurance. The Parties agree that the △ Reciprocal Easement Agreement and the Joint Use and License Agreement shall contain insurance provisions reasonably agreed to by the Parties.

#### ARTICLE - X. - PARTIES; ASSIGNMENT

- △ 10.1. General. The qualifications and identity of the District and the Society are of particular concern to the Owners and such qualifications are required for a party to be a Responsible Party as required by the California State Historic Preservation Officer. It is because of those qualifications and identity that the Owners have entered into this MOU with the District and the Society. No voluntary or involuntary successor in interest of the District or the Society shall acquire any rights or powers under this MOU, except as expressly set forth herein.
- $\triangle$  10.2. Restriction on Assignment by District or Society. Except as otherwise expressly provided herein, neither the District nor the Society may assign all or any portion of its interests in this MOU, in any of the Definitive Agreements, or in the Sites or in any portion thereof  $\triangle$ , without the prior written consent of the Owners, which consent may be withheld in the sole but good faith discretion of the Owners.
- ≏ 10.3. Assignment by Owners. The Owners may assign all or any portion of their respective interests in this MOU, ≏ the Definitive Agreements, ≏ the Tesoro del Valle Project △ the Sites, or ≏ any portion thereof, to Merchant Builders of the respective neighborhoods of the Tesoro del Valle Project without the consent of the District or the Society; provided that such assignee shall agree in writing to be bound by the terms and conditions of this MOU and the Definitive Agreements.

- $\triangle$  10.4. Collateral Assignment to Lender. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this MOU, the District or the Owners may collaterally assign their interest in the Definitive Agreements or  $\triangle$  the Sites or  $\triangle$  any portion thereof, to a lender as security for the District's obligations in connection with the financing of the improvements on the Sites or any  $\triangle$  portion thereof.
- △ 10.5. Successors and Assigns: Assignment. This MOU together with the Exhibits attached hereto and forming a part hereof shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the Parties and their respective successors and permitted assigns.

#### ARTICLE A XI. - GENERAL PROVISIONS

- △ 11.1. Applicable Law. This MOU shall be construed in accordance with and governed by the internal laws (without reference to choice or conflict of laws) of the State of California.
- △ 11.2. Force Majeure. The Definitive Agreements shall provide reasonable force majeure provisions
- △ 11.3. No Third Party Beneficiaries. No person or entity other than the Parties shall have any right, benefit or obligation under this MOU as a third party beneficiary or otherwise.
- △ 11.4. Notices. All notices shall be in writing and shall be addressed to the Parties as set forth below. Notices shall be (a) delivered by Federal Express or other courier service to the addresses set forth below, in which case they shall be deemed delivered on the date of delivery (or when delivery has been attempted twice, as evidenced by the written report of the courier scrvice) to the address(es) set forth below, (b) sent by certified mail, return receipt requested, in which case they shall be deemed delivered three (3) Business days after deposit in the United States mail, or (c) transmitted by facsimile transmission (promptly followed by delivery under option (a) or (b) above), in which case they shall be deemed delivered the first Business day after delivery has been electronically confirmed by the recipient's facsimile machine, as evidenced by the written confirmation produced by the sender's facsimile machine. If the Owners or the District have provided an address and facsimile machine number for any lender related to the Tesoro del Valle Project or the District Site, respectively, no notice from any Party to the Owners or the District shall be effective unless and until a copy of such notice has been delivered to such lender(s), to the extent such delivery is otherwise required by this MOU or the Definitive Agreements. Any Party may change its address, its facsimile machine number, or the name and address of its attorneys by giving notice in compliance with this MOU. Notice of such a change shall be effective only upon receipt. Notice given on behalf of a Party by any attorney purporting to represent a Party shall constitute notice by such Party if the attorney is, in fact, authorized to represent such Party. #### PRESERVATION COVENANT

Grantee hereby covenants on behalf of itself, its successors and assigns, to preserve and maintain those certain historical structures consisting of an adobe ranch house, three other adobe structures and one wood-frame structure (the "Historical Structures"), each identified in a Structural Evaluation Report for Tesoro del Valle Project, Clougherty Ranch, dated April 4, 1996, prepared by Melvyn Green and Associates, Inc. and depicted as Lot 672 on Final Tract Map No. (the "Historical Site") located in County of Los Angeles, State of California in order to preserve and enhance those qualities that make the Historical Structures eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historical Places and to provide public access to the Historical Site. This covenant shall be a binding servitude upon the Historical Site and shall be deemed to run with the land.

- (1) Except for ordinary maintenance and repair, no construction, alteration, remodeling, demolition or other action ("alterations") shall be undertaken unless such alterations are consistent with the Secretary of Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation.
- (2) Grantee will take prompt action as and when required to secure the Historical Structures from the elements, vandalism, or arson and will make any emergency stabilization. Grantee will make every effort to retain or reuse, to the extent practicable, the Historic Structures.
- (3) Grantee shall provide the [County of Los Angeles / SHPO] a written summary of actions taken to implement the provisions of this Preservation Covenant within one (1) year after the effective date of transfer of the Historical Structures.
- (4) Grantee may modify for good cause any or all of the foregoing restrictions.
- (5) Grantee shall make the Historical Structures open to the public on a regular and continuous basis in response to public demand for said access, but in no event less than twelve days per year, and at such other times by appointment to permit persons affiliated with educational organizations, professional architectural associations and historical societies to study the Historical Structures. Any such public admission may be subject to restrictions as reasonably designed for the protection and maintenance of the Historical Structures. Such admission may also be subject to a reasonable fee.
- (6) In the event of damage resulting from casualty, as defined in Section 165(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, which is of such magnitude and

The Santa Clarita Valley Historical Society is pleased to report that the above referenced project has been completed and is ready for final inspection.

Attachment (1) lists all expenses, both in material and in contracted labor. Supporting documentation, in the form of copies of contracts and invoices for all expenses, is also enclosed. The total amount expended for the project was \$23,270,02, a Net Small Project Cost Overrun above the \$18,100 originally estimated of \$5170.02, for which we respectfully request reimbursement.

In response to your letter, dated 3 December 1997, and included as attachment (2), none of the cost overrun can be attributed to the delay in completion. Reasons for all costs over and above the original estimate were detailed in prior letters, also included as attachments (3), (4) and (5), and resulted from an initial incorrect estimate as to the area requiring replastering.

It should also be noted that the initial estimate was based on square-foot costs supplied by me and based on volunteer labor for demolition of damaged lath and plaster and the subsequent installation of new lath. This voluntary labor resulted in a saving of approximately \$12,600 over the cost of having this work completed by the plaster contractor.

With respect to the above referenced DSR, The Santa Clarita Valley Historical Society wishes to report on the current status and to clarify several aspects of the project.

The application of insulation and lath will be completed by 7 July. The plaster contractor will begin his work tomorrow, 2 July, with the installation of Western Angles in the corners of of each room. This will be followed by the application of the initial or "brown" coat sometime next week. This coat needs to dry for **at least** ten days before the application of the final or "skim" coat. The plasterer claims that this drying time is crucial to the final integrity of the plaster and would prefer a period of about two weeks. Unfortunately, this would move the completion date into the first week of August, exceeding the scheduled date by a week or so.

Is such a minor extension of the completion date acceptable to OES?

The question of finances has also arisen. All materials for the application of lath have been purchased, with installation done at no cost by volunteer labor. We are on the verge of signing a contract with the plasterer. The total cost of the project will then be:

In a recent letter, dated 1 July 1997, requests were initiated for a minor time extension and for additional funds, both required to complete the above referenced DSR. The purpose of this letter is to provide information to your office to justify this request for a supplemental DSR.

As described in the Letter of 1 July, the initial award granted under the DSR was \$18,000; however, with the project nearing completion, current expenses are:

Materials (insulation, lath, staples, etc.)	\$ 3,054.49
Plastering Contract (materials and labor)	+ 20,007.00
Total	\$ 23,054.49

The cause for this \$5,054 increase is not a change in the scope of work, but rather an error in the original estimate for the square feet involved in the project. In the initial inspection of this 1865 historic ranch house, an area of 4000 square feet was judged to need replacement of the lath and plaster; however, 4000 square feet is the floor area of the structure, not the surface area of the walls and ceilings. Instead, the surface area to be restored amounts to approximately 6300 square feet.

The plaster contract is based on a cost of \$3 per square foot (plus an additional cost to provide for the installation of Western Angles in all corners). It should be noted that all demolition of old lath and plaster and installation of new lath was completed at no cost through volunteer labor. These demolition costs were also not included as part of the initial estimate, even though they are a necessary and unavoidable part of the project.

In order to meet the scheduled completion date, the plaster contractor has already initiated his work in the house and is waiting for a contract to be signed. As an all-volunteer, non-profit group, the Society does not have the funds to absorb the additional costs necessary to complete the project. If FEMA does not grant te supplemental DSR, the area to be plastered will have to be reduced to fit the money available, and several rooms will not be plastered. Therefore, time is of the essence, and the Society would greatly appreciate a timely decision to our request.

In reference to your letter sent by Paul Krutzer, Executive Director, on February 26, 1999, the following is approved or denied due to the Oak Tree Ordinance. These decisions are based on the conclusions that the trees planted are of "mitigation" in nature.

- A) Re excavation of the drainage channel. **Revised**. Permission is granted to place the drainage from the Edison house to within 15' of the Oak Tree. From there to the Chapel the drain must be 15' outside of the drip line and hand dug. (Reference Title 16, Section 22. 56.2060 sub paragraph C.)
- B) Low wall Revised to meet the same standard as stated in A.
- C) Excavation and installation of French drain in front of the little red school house. **Revised**. Excavation will be 5' outside of the drip line of the oak tree.
- D) Change in grade on the west side of Kingsbury. Permission **granted** as long as the grading is hand dug 5' outside of the drip line of the oak.

In addition to the above was the request to install an irrigation line around the Kingsbury and Edison house. **Denied**. Irrigation lines are not allowed under the drip line of the large oak or 15' of the small mitigated oaks.

In reference to the letter sent August 29, 1999 regarding the following requests:

- 1) Construct a semicircle pergola adjacent to the Mitchell adobe. **Denied.** Can not be anywhere within 15' of the oaks.
- 2) Construct a semicircle pergola constructed east of the Mitchell adobe. **Denied**. If structure is anywhere within 15' of the oaks.
- 3) Wooden boardwalks in front of the Mitchell adobe. Permission granted as long as the boardwalk is 15' away from any oak tree.



Since 1980, the Society has moved eight historic buildings to our Park and has been gradually restoring them so that they will be available to the public, especially to the thousands of school children who visit us annually. This letter and the enclosed documentation, is to provide you with information concerning the construction of what we think will be an asset to not only our facility at Heritage Junction, your North Region, Hart Park Facility, and the Communities of the Santa Clarita Valley, but also to the County, and it's Parks and Recreation Department as a whole.

In our effort to preserve our Local Historical Heritage, in as many venues as we can, we have found that there is one area that has been seriously neglected. The various Trades Groups, i.e. The Blacksmiths, Carpenters, Tinsmiths, Cabinet Makers, Coopers, Wheelwrights, and others.

Of this group, the Blacksmith, who in truth was at the very center of almost every budding industry in our early Southern California History, has faded into oblivion, especially here in Los Angeles County. We, in our research find that there is only one functional, historically correct, Blacksmith Shop (replica,) in Southern California, and that is in Orange County at Knotts Berry Farm.

In the days of our Historic past, starting with the Spanish Explorers, the Blacksmith, was the center of many of our Local Industries; The Manufacturing Industry, The Farming Industry, The Petroleum Industry, The Mining Industry, The Building Industry and others. Some of these, the Petroleum Industry, (Chevron Oil and Union Oil Companies,) and the Mining Industry (U. S. Borax,) had their beginnings, or some of their early operations, right here in our Santa Clarita Valley.

In addition, as you know, the portion of the Hart Park Facility which is being used by our Society, as Heritage Junction, was once the Property, and Estate of Thomas M Frew II, who was the second Blacksmith in the City of Newhall.

Mr. Wheeler, considering the above, and finding that there is, to our knowledge, only one functional Historic Blacksmith Shop display in all of Southern California, we of the Santa Clarita Valley Historical Society, submit to you, and The Department of Parks and Recreation, of the County of Los Angeles, the enclosed outline, and basics, of a program, that would provide for the replication of this Historic Shop. Through this replication, we would be able to display much of the original equipment used in the original T. M. Frew and Son Blacksmith Shop. Dear Mr. Phillips:

Drainage in the Feed Trough Canyon area has been a regular problem since the Society sited structures there many years ago. In order to correct the problem, the following projects hopefully will be completed during the next few months:

- a) re-excavation of the drainage channel that runs from north of the Chapel and behind the Edison House to the previously installed catch basin; an eight inch (or better) drainage pipe will be installed in the channel to drain the area behind the Chapel diversion wall. Gravel will be used to cover the perforated drain pipe (a "French Drain"), thereby taking care of the run-off from the hillside. The material excavated will be used to construct a small terrace between the Chapel wall and the Edison House.
- b) construction of a low wall (2 3 ft in height) alongside and parallel to the drainage channel, on its south bank.
- c) excavation and installation of a shallow three inch French drain on the south side of Feed Trough Canyon Road in front of the Little Red School House and the Kingsburry House to drain off water exiting the previously installed drain pipe behind the Chapel wall, which now floods the base of these two buildings.
- d) a change in the grade on the west side of the Kingsburry (less than one foot ) to divert water which now pools there to the French drain described in c) above.

Though not related to canyon drainage, irrigation lines to water proposed flower beds around both the Kingsburry and Edison Houses will be installed. These will require excavation of 12 inch deep trenches, the installation of plastic pipe and risers, and immediate backfilling.

Excavation for the above projects hopefully will be completed at one "session", to be followed by installation of irrigation and three inch piping almost immediately. Construction of the wall and installation of the eight inch drain pipe listed in a) will be completed as money and manpower become available.

During October, 1997, board members of the Santa Clarita Historical Society asked me to examine former Southern Pacific steam engine No. 1629 and provide an evaluation to cosmetically restore the locomotive. In a letter to past president Tom Frew, (see attached) I identified several missing parts and expressed more concerns if my team accepted this project. Motion picture projects outside of this area have prevented us from considering this endeavor but our current schedule may allow us to accept this project and complete it within the next nine to ten months.

Although we have not reexamined the locomotive for seventeen months, I wish to offer this preliminary proposal based on our <u>earlier</u> evaluation. It is our intent to:

- 1. Cosmetically refurbish ex-S.P locomotive No. 1629 and tender with existing parts. Prepare, paint, and letter it for outside display.
- 2. Obtain necessary parts to replace missing pieces where <u>cosmetic enhancements</u> only are necessary.
- 3. Collect all extra parts including new and replacement pieces that were obtained during the past ten years for eventual steam operations. These parts will be properly packaged and sealed in the cavity of the boiler and/or tender so that a complete operational restoration can be completed if funding is ever available.
- 4. Repair and enhance all wheels and running gear so the locomotive/tender can roll on the existing display tack.
- 5. Equip the locomotive with operating lights and electrical circuits. Provide plumbing whereby an air pressure system can be installed to operate the whistle for motion picture work or society activities.



Therefore, before commencing with any of the projects in the two page letter, please send us a "record drawing" of all the underground utilities and drains that your organization has placed in the ground up to the present. Indicate on your record drawings, or "as builts" as they are sometimes referred to, of your proposed projects you are requesting. This will give us a better understanding of the area you wish to work on. If you do not have "as builts" or record drawings it is time your Society does one. These drawings help when adding utilities or digging in the future.

In reply to your recent letter requesting clarification of Historical Society plans for the Feed Trough Canyon Area of Heritage Junction Historic Park, the Society is currently preparing "as built" plans for completed construction work at the park, as well as plans for and descriptions of future projects. These will be transmitted as soon as possible.

With respect to the two projects that were underway at the Ramona Chapel, it has been the Society's belief that an entrance stairway is merely a part of its building and would therefore not require County permission to either construct or replace. In addition, the new stairway is only an improvement to stairs that have been in existence for approximately ten years; it was constructed to match the brick stairway through the wall fronting the chapel grounds.

The walkway to the Chapel is depicted on the map accompanying the latest ratified contract between the Society and the County. The current work is again an improvement to the existing cement walkway, with Bouquet Canyon Schist flagstone being added to its top surface. These materials have only recently been donated. Currently, there are only about ten feet of walkway to be grouted in order to complete the project, about three hours of work. The Society would like to complete this final phase as soon as possible.

Since materials and skilled labor are already on site, the Society would like to request an additional small project in the same area. A four foot long sidewalk is needed in order to connect the road to the Kingsburry House. It would replace the existing gravel path and would match the walkway to the Chapel described in the preceding paragraph.

The Society is an all-volunteer, non-profit organization. As such, we have many restrictions as to the timing and completion of construction projects and can only initiate work when donated materials and volunteer labor become available. When skilled personnel appear, projects must begin or the chance can be lost. The Society greatly appreciates your past understanding and will make every effort to cooperate with the County and comply with its rules and regulations. We trust the County will take into consideration the special conditions under which the Society operates and the responsible way it has carried out its activities during the last twenty years.

Dear Alarm Owner/User:

On 6/13/99, the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department responded to a false alarm at 24107 San Fernando. This was the first incident reported at this address since January 1, 1999.

Please be aware that the City of Santa Clarita's False Alarm Ordinance provides for two false alarms between the periods of January 1, 1999, to December 31, 1999. If a third is received during this time, you will be charged the cost of providing that service, which is \$107.

The City of Santa Clarita adopted Ordinance No. 97-15 of the Santa Clarita Municipal Code, entitled Burglar and Robbery Alarms, on October 15, 1997. The purpose of the Ordinance is to encourage the maintenance of alarm systems. The City allows two false alarm warnings per calendar year. The third, and all subsequent false alarms, will result in a fee of \$107. The goal of the Ordinance is to reduce the number of calls to the Sheriff's Department so that they may better allocate their time on other calls.

Enclosed is a self-addressed, postage-paid postcard. Please fill in the information in order to establish an accurate data base of alarm owners/users within the City of Santa Clarita. Per the Ordinance, you will be given two free false alarms per year if the card is returned within 30 days. If the card is not returned, you will be charged for each false alarm notice received by the City.

A climate control system has recently been installed in the Pardee House. This will necessitate the extension of the existing natural gas service from the meter at the Saugus Train Station to the Pardee House, as depicted in the attached plot plan.

Excavation, currently scheduled for August 25th or 26th, will be accomplished by Preferred Landscape, the contractor which handled trenching for Hart Hall. Gas line will be installed by Southern California Gas Company.

A permit has been obtained for this work, a copy of which is attached.







Dear Mr. Mann,

Exactly two years ago, selected board members of the Santa Clarita Historical Society contacted me about the possibility of completing a restoration on ex Gene Autry Southern Pacific steam locomotive No. 1629. Following informal discussions, I provided an opinion that all work by museums volunteers must stop until the project could be properly evaluated. It also appeared the most practical outlook for this locomotive was strictly a <u>cosmetic</u> refurbishment. The board members agreed they no longer had an objective for possible steam operations, realizing the project would need an additional infusion of approximately \$350.000. ( see letter dated Oct. 15, 1997), and that they were conducting an internal audit of the project.

Also, in October 1997, my staff and I examined the locomotive at Hart Park. We observed several missing items that would be needed to reassemble the engine or could be of resaleable value. Since that time we have located most of the missing appurtenances scattered throughout the yard area or in the container located on the property. However, of great need to anyone who embraced this project, are the whereabouts and return of the steam air pump, tubes and flues, removed leaf spring, gauges, bolts of all kinds and yet unnamed parts after the container could be emptied and a better inventory accomplished.

At this time, I advised former president, Tom Frew, that costs to complete a cosmetic refurbishment could be \$72,000. Tom indicated funding was not available at the time.

During conversations, I maintained a position that <u>no</u> mechanical work should occur until funding was in place and the whereabouts of all components could be determined. Although discussions continued through 1998 on an off, the issue of expenses to this point, missing parts, and past management of this project were offset by my desire to have the recommended funds at hand to then move quickly, assuming there was no further dismantling of the engine.

In September, 1999, I was advised that funds were now available. My project managers, Bob Kredel, Bill Palmer, and myself reinspected the locomotive and were shocked to observe it suspended above the track on top of blocks and girders with major heavy hardware and pipes disassembled or removed. The man hours expended since the 1997 inspection clearly indicated the volunteers continued to pursue their personal desire to make the locomotive operational by virtue of deeper disassembly. This action was completely opposite of the boards stated position

and added an additional \$15,000. to the proposed cost of refurbishing the engine as a static display.

Recently, as we continued to search for items, my sources located a similar working locomotive in need of new flues and superheater tubes in the state of Texas within the next twelve months. We suggested the possibility of selling all redundant parts made for No. 1629; however, contrary to prior reports, we were advised by the president of Dixon Boiler Works that they possess no tubes or other equipment destined for this boiler. If these parts had been purchased, all unclaimed material stored at their shop was scrapped when former owners recently sold the company. Regarding the missing cab floor, we were told it was still awaiting repairs at an unknown foundry, and that the steam air pump was located at the Department of Water and Power???

With regret, I believe it is in the best interest of my company to not participate with future restoration efforts of ex-S.P. locomotive No. 1629. Some items removed during the past sixteen years are still not accountable and continued dismantling, in spite of museum board directives, clearly demonstrates the possibility of intervention and/or possible disruptions during an eventual cosmetic restoration process. Most of my staff are also on other projects that prohibit completion of engine No. 1629 in the requested time frame.

It is disappointing that initial funding was not directed toward the development of an <u>exceptional</u> static display. Although disassembly of this locomotive continued after my advisement's to the board members, I still have a strong interest of helping the Society complete this endeavor. If the board wishes to raise additional funds for this or other museum projects, I will solicit the possibility of selling all new fabricated superheater tubes and any rediscovered saleable items.

At this time, after many calls to outside sources, I have no recommended vendor to complete this job, but, as a museum member, I also offer my assistance to evaluate any potential provider and will continue to broker a qualified candidate.



The expiration date will be six months from the date issued or from the last inspection date, whichever is more recent. Unless work is commenced prior to expiration, or a time extension is granted, the permit file will be closed. The City may file a declaration of possible code violations or unsafe conditions with the County Recorder's Office for any construction work which has not been inspected and/or finalized as required by the Building Code. Once a permit has expired, a new permit and fees will be required prior to making any further inspections that are required for finalizing the permit. Often times only a final inspection is required as the contractor or owner will forget to call for the inspection after the work is completed. You may call for final inspection or any other inspection at (661) 286-4097.

This letter and the enclosed documentation, is to provide you with information concerning the construction of what we think will be an asset to not only our facility at Heritage Junction, your North Region, Hart Park Facility, and the Communities of the Santa Clarita Valley, but also to the County, and it's Parks and Recreation Department as a whole.

In our effort to preserve our Local Historical Heritage, in as many venues as we can, we have found that there is one area that has been seriously neglected. The various Trades Groups, i.e. The Blacksmiths, Carpenters, Tinsmiths, Cabinet Makers, Coopers, Wheelwrights, and others.

Of this group, the Blacksmith, who in truth was at the very center of almost every budding industry in our early Southern California History, has faded into oblivion, especially here in Los Angeles County. We, in our research find that there is only one functional, historically correct, Blacksmith Shop (replica,) in Southern California, and that is in Orange County at Knotts Berry Farm.

In the days of our Historic past, starting with the Spanish Explorers, the Blacksmith, was the center of many of our Local Industries; The Manufacturing Industry, The Farming Industry, The Petroleum Industry, The Mining Industry, The Building Industry and others. Some of these, the Petroleum Industry, (Chevron Oil and Union Oil Companies,) and the Mining Industry (U. S. Borax,) had their beginnings, or some of their early operations, right here in our Santa Clarita Valley.

In addition, as you know, the portion of the Hart Park Facility which is being used by our Society, as Heritage Junction, was once the Property, and Estate of Thomas M Frew II, who was the second Blacksmith in the City of Newhall.

Mr. Wheeler, considering the above, and finding that there is, to our knowledge, only one functional Historic Blacksmith Shop display in all of Southern California, we of the Santa Clarita Valley Historical Society, submit to you, and The Department of Parks and Recreation, of the County of Los Angeles, the enclosed outline, and basics, of a program, that would provide for the replication of this Historic Shop. Through this replication, we would be able to display much of the original equipment used in the original T. M. Frew and Son Blacksmith Shop. The Blacksmith Shop display area would be developed as a functional unit so as to provide actual "Smithing"

demonstration for visitors to our center.

In order to recognize the traditions of others of the Tradesmen who served in our Historical Past, we will also provide in this building, display areas, "shops," representing others of the Trades Groups, i.e. Carpenters, Tinsmiths, and others.

As you will see in our outline, we are well along in our early efforts to develop and finalize a program to provide what we believe will be an attractive and educational segment of our Historical past, that has heretofore been neglected throughout Southern California.

We, of the Santa Clarita Valley Historical Society define the following as the whole purpose of this BLACKSMITH SHOP PROJECT;

This Project is to preserve for our Community, through "working," exhibits, a portion of our Heritage, that hereto fore, has been neglected not only in our area, but throughout Southern California;

#### The Trades Groups in our Pioneer Communities.

The Blacksmiths, the Tinsmiths, the Cabinet Makers, the Coopers, and other Artisans.

We are confident, that if we are allowed to move forward with this Project, we, working with you and your people will be able to fill a very large void that now exists in our areas' Historical Heritage.

#### B. COMMITTEE PLANNING: The following plans were discussed:

- 1) KINGSBURRY: Paul reported Window screen hooks installed. Twist hooks needed at midway point of long side of frame to stop warping. / Parlor ceiling light fixtures installed. / New dining room fixture to be installed. / Bedroom light fixture not working Paul to check wiring & bulb assemblage.
- 2) EDISON HOUSE: Diana reported Installation of front porch light fixture pending upgrade of electrical wiring. Paul checked with Building & Safety: Active knob & tube electrical fittings are currently legal if all elements are concealed in walls and ceiling construction. Mike reported that all electrical circuits were transferred from fuses to breakers when house moved to site. New electrical wiring donated and ready for CSR to install in house. / Painting of exterior back porch begun. / Back door striped of paint and little repaired is needed. Door hardware needed: Exterior & Interior knobs, spindle, mortise lock, and strike plate. Mike & Diana to confirm location of original hardware. / CSR preparing interior woodwork for painting (wash & prime) before application of top coat: Sherwin Williams "White Muslin". / Painting of interior walls and ceilings pending completion of electrical wiring installation needs. / Front door frame and wood sill stabilized. Bring back a historical community celebration, "May Day." This event came to this country from Europe. Traditional celebrations in this community were celebrated in Saxonia Park. The event waned with the connection of May Day to communism and the cold war of the 1950's. Before the celebration faded away, it was a community event where neighbors got together gave each other candy and flowers, children danced around a maypole, and had picnics. I would like to use this historical event to educate the current adult population about May Day, since it was something that current generations have never experienced. The Society could use this as a "neighbors getting to know neighbors" event–perhaps gather some botanical exhibits and plants from local nurseries.

By using this event as an adult education, community event, I believe it is possible the Society may be able to apply for a grant with the California Institute for the Humanities. Their limit for one month's grant money is \$2,500. So that would be the maximum budget for this event.

If we want to use this grant approach, our proposal must be provided to the Institute by March 1, so that we can get funding by April 1 and have the money to purchase whatever is needed.

#### **Suggested Events:**

Date:

Saturday, May 1, 1999 (Traditional May Day) or

Sunday, May 2, 1999

Time period: Noon to 4 p.m.

Speaker:

A speaker to talk about what May Day meant historically to the community;

Pageant:

A "Miss May Day" Beauty Pageant (it was traditional then-I am not sure if this would be politically correct now; or who would be interested in chairing this sub-event.) I have a friend who was Miss May Day 1947 in this community. Perhaps we could invite her as a special guest.

Music:

→ Local college, junior college, high school and junior high band and choral groups; perhaps the Santa Clarita Symphony (that instrumental that

performed in the park 4th of July)-maybe we could get a mix of big band, jazz and symphonic music to accommodate everyone's taste.

Floral Exhibits: Open houses up decorated floral donations from local florists (we place their cards in or near the arrangements to advertise their businesses); if event is held May 2, 1999 it would be the Sunday before Mother's Day-good advertising for florists. Perhaps we could invite the local forestry department to provide a speaker and/or an exhibit-re: vegetation, drought tolerance, California native plants, or fire prevention.

Photo

→ In the station, we could do a community historical photo exhibit. Perhaps we could exhibit some of the old photos as well as more recent photos of the community.

Club Booths Since we are proposing a "neighbor" event, why not invite other local non-profit organizations to participate and set up informational booths. This would allow the community to become familiar with many local organizations in one place, and it would also draw a lot of participants from these other groups to the Society such as Senior Groups, DAR, Chamber of Commerce, Quilting Groups, Scouts, 4-H, Campfire, local high school clubs, etc.

Vendor Booths → Merchandising for profit-crafts, foods, arts

#### Possible Fund Raisers for the Society:

- → Grant money for the event;
- → Vendor booths would be sold by the space or percentage of sales:
  - a. Plants and flowers provided by local nurseries;
  - b. Craft fair booths;
  - c. Sales of Soda, Water, Juices, Sarsparilla, Popcorn, Candy Apples by the Society.
- → Club booth space rental (sliding scale).

Dear Carl:

Thank you for your letter dated March 9, 1999 as well as the opportunity to make a brief presentation to the Board of the Santa Clarita Valley Historical Society. In advance of the meeting, addition, we thought it might be helpful to outline several of the key deal points particularly beneficial to the Society:

- 1. The Historical Site will be conveyed to the Society, free and clear of all liens and encumbrances, following completion of the Rehabilitation. The Owner has committed to expend \$270,000 to complete the Rehabilitation of the Historical Site.
- 2. Owner will diligently pursue, the approval by the Department of Real Estate of a fair and reasonable amount to be charged against each member of the Master Association.
- 3. The Society shall be under no obligation to perform its obligations under the Memorandum of Understanding until such time as the Department of Real Estate establishes and the Society approves the amount established as the Master Association Dues Subsidy.

4. Owner has established several financial resources with respect to the maintenance and operation of the Interpretive Center:

Operating Expenses. Owner shall contribute \$255,000 over a period of five years to assist with the operating costs of the Interpretive Center.

Owner Endowment. Owner shall contribute an additional amount up to \$100,000, payable in annual installments not to exceed \$20,000, for so long as the Society matches such contribution from other sources, exclusive of the Master Association Dues Subsidy, to endow the initial operations and management of the Interpretive Center.

<u>Furnishings</u>. Donation of substantially all furnishings in the ranch house plus historically significant equipment in the out buildings (e.g., equestrian gear in the stable tack room, agricultural tools, etc.). The family has also secured the offer of certain artifacts from Harry Carey, Jr. to memorialize his father's period of ownership.

<u>School District</u>. Owner has secured the support of the William S. Hart School District to develop a learning center on the property and contr4ibute up to one-third of the operation and maintenance costs of the school facilities.

- 5. Owner shall work diligently with Society over the next few months to develop a realistic budget and Terry Clougherty will serve as a committee member for any fundraising events.
- 6. The Society's operation of the Historical Site provide a direct, tangible and ongoing relationship with hundreds of new families and would provide a stable, long-term membership base.

The foregoing benefits total over \$625,000 of direct economic subsidy, exclusive of the Master Association Dues Subsidy or the value of the Historical Site itself. In addition, the Master Association Dues Subsidy would ultimately provide thousands of dollars of monthly operating assistance.

The Owners and we recognize that there concern has been expressed regarding the uncertainty of the amount of Master Association Dues Subsidy that the Department of Real Estate will approve. Therefore, the Owners are willing to add the following provisions to the MOU:

In the event that the Department of Real Estate approves a Master Association Dues Subsidy that is less than \$10 per month, Owner shall increase the \$255,000 contribution to operating expenses up to an aggregate additional amount of \$50,000 to offset any actual shortfall in the operating and maintenance budget during the first five years of operation.

Society agrees to use all funds received from Owner or the Master Association only in connection with the operation of the Historical Site and shall place such funds in a segregated account.

The Owners do not believe that there will be any shortfall given the previously offered subsidies and given the effort to obtain approval of the Master Association Dues Subsidy. However, the Owners are committed to promoting the ultimate success of the operation of the Historical Site, therefore, the Owners are willing to offer the additional amount to defray operational shortfalls.

We remain positive and passionate about the great things that will result from a joint endeavor among the Owners, Society and District to rehabilitate, renovate and operate the Historical Site at Tesoro del Valle. The Owners would be pleased to host the next Society Board meeting scheduled for March 22 at the Ranch. Please give either me (213-891-7913) or Amber FauntLeRoy (213-891-8527) a call.

Dear Ms. FauntLeRoy and Mr. Delvac:

These are the comments of the Santa Clarita Valley Historical Society ("Society") on the February 1999 draft of the proposed Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") regarding the Historic Site at Tesoro Del Valle. Please understand that this letter does not constitute any agreement to any terms in the MOU.

The addition of the Society as an insured should be unlimited, not tied to any "extent of interest" as defined in section 2.1.3 (g). Also, the risk of loss should be with the Owner until transfer of ownership to the Society.

As discussed with Bob Lee and Tim Collins, the language in section 3.1.1 is incorrect as to credit for time worked by students. The Hart School District has no objection to the Society receiving credit for student work as long as there is a system in place to assure that the students are not skipping classes to do the work.

Please define "matched funding basis" in section 3.1.2.

If the Society for any reason either does not become the owner or loses ownership of the property they do not want to be responsible for operating the Interpretative Center. That would appear to be the role of the "Approved Grantee." Thus, the language in section 3.2 needs to be changed.

As mentioned previously, if the Society decides to sell or transfer its interest in the Historical Site, there should be no restriction on the purchase price. Market conditions at the time of the sale or transfer should dictate that.

Section 4.3(e) refers to a section 8.1.3, which does not exist in the MOU as presently configured.

To avoid any confusion or ambiguity, the language in section 4.3.3(a) regarding "the grant of the Historical Site" should be identical to that in section 2.1.2.

Section 4.4.1 says that except as otherwise set forth in the agreement, the HOA is responsible for maintenance and operation of the Recreational Facilities Site. The Society is not aware that it was responsible for any portion of the maintenance and operation of the Recreational Facilities Site. That being the case, then the phrase, "Except as otherwise set forth in this MOU ..." should be stricken.

Section 5.1.1(c) provides for use of the Historical Site for fundraising for the HOA. The Society would be opposed to this.

Article 7 concerns representations and warranties. Section 7.1.2 limits the Owner's statement of no conflict to agreements where the Owner is a responsible party. That distinction is not made in section 7.3.3 relative to the Society's representations. The language should be the same for all parties.

If, pursuant to section 10.3, the Owner does assign its interests in the MOU, then the Society and the District should be notified in writing immediately as to this transfer, the identity of the transferee, and the rights and obligations transferred.

The Promissory Note simply seems too harsh. A much simpler Note should be used, one in which the Society promises to pay whatever amount is left over from the \$100,000 commitment, allows unlimited prepayment, and is non-transferable. Acceleration clauses, restrictions on prepayment, and the default language do not strike as an agreement that reflects the intent of the MOU.

Finally, you already have the Society's comments on the proposed HOA funding. The Society's position on this issue has not changed.

#### RESTORATION REPORT MOGUL 1629 N. HARRIS 1/30/99

The Mogul 1629 Restoration Project continued working in 1998 toward the goal of completion by the Centennial of its manufacture on November, 2000. Earlier work completed on the Mogul 1629 Restoration Project included removal of the lagging and asbestos insulation, removal and overhaul of the generator, bell, whistle, headlight, throttle, boiler flues, flue sheets, and dry pipe. New superheater tubes and flues were fabricated and purchased. A 20 foot shipping container was purchased and 100 amp power was installed underground for welding and use of an air compressor.

During 1998 a restoration plan was prepared which included quotes from individual contractors for boiler sheet metal lagging, cab restoration, repair of the tender tank holes, sand blasting, and painting the locomotive and tender. The restoration plan includes a 20% contingency and still is within our existing funding. The completion of the Mogul 1629 restoration will be expedited by the use of several commercial contractors working in parallel on separate portions of the project to complement the work of our volunteers.

The locomotive was raised 4" by Master Housemovers so that the wheels and axles could be lowered for maintenance and lubrication. This task was delayed by the El Nino rains for the first part of 1998 but is nearing completion now. Master Housemovers will lower the locomotive after the axle cleaning and lubrication is completed.

Securing a shelter for the locomotive and tender has commenced with the dismantling and moving of the Newhall Hardware Garden Shop roof lattice structure. The shelter that is planned will bolt the posts and beams together and cover them with an awning so that it can be removed if need be for film location work.

The Board has approved purchase of the steel needed to repair the corroded portions of the cab walls and the floor. This task will be completed in the next two months by Welding Unlimited so that the cab will be ready for replacement on the locomotive. Full restoration of the cab woodwork and windows will then be performed during the remainder of 1999.

Concurrently the tender axle lubrication and repair of tank holes will be performed in 1999. The locomotive piping and reassembly of the air compressor will continue through 1999.

The final detail work in preparation for painting will be performed in early 2000 followed by the sand blasting and painting. The paint will consist of an epoxy primer followed by a polyurethane top coat. Finally the Southern Pacific lettering and

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numbers will be applied over the glossy black epoxy coating. The epoxy coating is expected to last more than 20 years. All this is to be done in time for a Mogul 1629 Centennial Celebration in November, 2000.

- 4.1.2. <u>District Site</u>. Except as otherwise expressly set forth in this MOU, Owner shall not be responsible for those undertakings related to the development, planning, design, construction and operation within the District Site which are customarily the responsibility of a developer or owner in development projects of this character and magnitude. The District agrees that, except as otherwise expressly set forth in this MOU, neither Owner nor the Society shall have any responsibility for the costs of such undertakings in connection with the District Site.
- 4.1.3. <u>Homeowner Association Site</u>. Except as otherwise expressly set forth in this MOU, Owner (or the Master Association, following conveyance of the Homeowner Association Site to the Master Association) shall be responsible for those undertakings related to the development, planning, design, construction and operation within the Homeowner Association Site and the Recreational Facilities Site which are customarily the responsibility of a developer or owner in development projects of this character and magnitude.
- 4.1.4. <u>Funding</u>. Owner shall be responsible for the following forms of funding with respect to the Rehabilitation:
  - (a) <u>Capital Contribution</u>: Owner shall make a capital contribution to the Rehabilitation in the amount of Two Hundred Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$270,000). This capital contribution shall be used in conjunction with the Society Commitment or the Approved Grantee Commitment (the Society Commitment and the Approved Grantee Commitment referred to alternatively, the "<u>Grantee Commitment</u>") to complete the restoration and renovation of the Historical Site, including earthquake repairs, relocation and seismic upgrades. Owner shall advance the Grantee Commitment to ensure the Rehabilitation is completed in a timely manner.
  - (b) Operating Expenses: Owner shall make a maximum contribution to the Society as the owner of the Historical Site in the amount of Two Hundred Fifty Five Thousand Dollars (\$255,000) to assist with operating costs for the first five years of operation of the Historical Site, commencing thirty (30) days after issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy and certification that the Rehabilitation has been completed as set forth in the Green Report, allocated as follows: Sixty Five Thousand Dollars (\$65,000) in years one and two; Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) in year three; Forty Five Thousand Dollars (\$45,000) in year four, and Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000) in year five. The annual amounts shall be payable in equal monthly installments.
  - (c) <u>Owner Endowment</u>: Provided that the Society is not in default under this MOU or the Definitive Agreements, Owner shall make a charitable contribution in an aggregate amount not to exceed One Hundred Thousand Dollars

- (b) Payment of all permit, development and similar fees for development within the District Site;
- (c) The costs of private consultants retained by the District (including, without limitation, architects and strategic planning consultants);
- (d) The costs of compliance by the District with all permit and development conditions imposed by County and State laws, rules or ordinances for development within the District Site;
- (e) the costs (including those incurred prior to the execution of this MOU, as well as thereafter) for the District's administration of its responsibilities under this MOU and the Definitive Agreements and review and processing of the Definitive Agreements and the costs of District attorneys; and
- (f) The costs (including, without limitation, court costs, expert testimony costs and attorneys' fees) of any litigation, arbitration, request for a tax ruling or similar proceeding which the District may engage in for the purpose of validating any aspect of the financing of their obligations under this MOU.

#### 4.3. Responsibilities of Society.

- 4.3.1. <u>Historical Site</u>. Except as otherwise expressly set forth in this MOU, the Society shall be responsible for providing historic preservation expertise to Owner in connection with those undertakings related to the development, planning, design and Rehabilitation within the Historical Site, including, but not limited to the following:
  - (a) except as otherwise expressly set forth in this MOU, costs of such undertakings in connection with the Historical Site to the extent of the Society Commitment as provided in Section 3.1.1;
  - Commitment as provided in Section 3.1.1;

    (b) A costs of operations, security and management personnel, (including, without limitation, salaries, wages, benefits, and payroll taxes) in connection with the Interpretative Center and the caretaker and the caretaker's residence;

(c) post-closing CJF

(d) property tax or possessory interest tax, if any, in connection with the Interpretative Center;

(e) Post-Closing CTF
maintain public access to the Historical Site as set forth in Section
8.3.4 hereof; and

(f) on the first anniversary of the Closing Date and each anniversary thereafter until such time as the Society ceases to receive monies in the form of Master Association Dues, provide Owner with an annual report which lists the income and expenses of the Historical Site and the sources of income.

- 4.3.2. <u>District Site</u>. The Society shall not be responsible for those undertakings related to the development, planning, design, construction and operation within the District Site which are customarily the responsibility of a developer or owner in development projects of this character and magnitude. The District agrees that, except as otherwise expressly set forth in this MOU, neither Owner nor the Society shall have any responsibility for the costs of such undertakings in connection with the District Site.
- 4.3.3. <u>Examples of Sole Responsibilities of Society</u>. By way of example only and without limiting the generality of <u>Section 4.3.1</u>, the Society agrees that, except to the extent of the Owner Endowment, it is responsible for the following:
  - (a) following the Closing, the costs of development and maintenance of interpretative materials, appropriate displays, and curation of artifacts, if any, possessed or managed by the Society in connection with the Interpretative Center; and
  - (b) the costs (including those incurred prior to the execution of this MOU, as well as thereafter) for the Society's administration of its responsibilities under this MOU and the Definitive Agreements and review and processing of the Definitive Agreements and the costs of Society attorneys.
- 4.4. <u>Responsibilities of Master Association</u>. Until such time as the Master Association is formed, Owner shall be solely responsible for all covenants, obligations and responsibilities delegated to the Master Association under this MOU.
- 4.4.1. <u>Recreational Facilities Site</u>. The Master Association, following conveyance of the Homeowner Association Site by Owner, shall be responsible for maintenance and operation of the Recreational Facilities Site.
- 4.4.2. <u>Examples of Sole Responsibilities of Masters Association</u>. By way of example only and without limiting the generality of <u>Section 4.4.1</u>, the Master Association shall be solely responsible for the following:
  - (a) the costs of operations, security and management personnel, (including, without limitation, salaries, wages, benefits, and payroll taxes) in connection with the Homeowner Association Site;
  - (b) subject to the approval of the California Department of Real Estate, payment of the annual Master Association Dues Subsidy to the Society (commencing ninety (90) days after the last date of the month in which the first escrow closings occur; provided, however, that the Interpretive Center is in use and operational and is incurring operating expenses) equal to \$10 per housing unit per month as set forth in the Mutual and Reciprocal Easement Agreement, until such time as the Society is able to continue operations, as such term is defined in the Mutual and Reciprocal Easement Agreement, based solely on either the Owner Endowment or other means, but in no event for a period longer than twenty (20) years;

- (c) payment of property tax or possessory interest tax, if any, in connection with the Homeowner Association Site; and
- (d) the costs (including those incurred prior to the execution of this MOU, as well as thereafter) for the Master Association's administration of its responsibilities under this MOU and the Definitive Agreements and review and processing of the Definitive Agreements and the costs of Master Association attorneys.

#### ARTICLE V. - LICENSES AND EASEMENTS

#### 5.1. Mutual and Reciprocal Easement Agreement.

- 5.1.1. <u>Grant of Rights To Use</u>. At the Closing, Owner, District, Master Association and the Society shall enter into a Mutual and Reciprocal Easement Agreement which:
  - (a) shall be recorded against the Historical Site, the District Site and the Homeowner Association Site (collectively, the "Sites");
    - (b) shall be superior to any financing recorded against the Sites; and
  - (c) shall address such issues as (i) the joint use of the Sites by the Parties with respect to the use of the grounds, picnic areas, walking trails, shared educational facilities, including the occasional use of the interior of the Historical Site by the HOA and the "as scheduled" use of the exterior grounds of the Historical Site by the HOA for social activities ("Joint Use"), (ii) reciprocal parking rights, (iii) common utilities, (iv) vehicular and pedestrian ingress and egress, (v) appropriate insurance and indemnity provisions, (vi) as consideration payment of the Owner Endowment and the Master Association Dues Subsidy, and (vii) other matters customarily addressed by adjoining landowners in comparable projects, all as more particularly described in the Mutual and Reciprocal Easement Agreement.
- 5.1.2. <u>No Interference</u>. The Mutual and Reciprocal Easement Agreement shall not permit uses upon a Site which materially interfere with access to the entrance to, or the operation of any other Site.
- 5.1.3. Shared Cost of Maintenance. The Parties shall equitably allocate the costs of repair, maintenance, including, but not limited to, landscape maintenance, parking lot sweeping, pest control, sight lighting, utilities and any property management fees, and out-of-pocket operating costs in those areas subject to Joint Use by the District, the Society and the Master Association. Other than the foregoing costs and the Owner Endowment and the Master Association Dues Subsidy, there shall be no rent, license, maintenance or similar fees charged to a Party for its permitted use of any of the Sites.

#### 5.2. <u>Joint Use and License Agreement</u>.

- 5.2.1. <u>Grant of Rights To Use</u>. At the Closing, the Parties shall enter into the Joint Use and License Agreement which:
  - (a) shall establish the rules and regulations for the Joint Use of the Historical Site, including hours of operation, priorities for use, and operational responsibilities among the Parties ("<u>Historical Site Rules</u>");
  - (b) shall address such issues as construction coordination and identification of cost-effective opportunities to link use of the Historical Site and the District Site facilities;
  - (c) following conveyance of the Historical Site by Owner, shall provide a license to Owner and/or the Master Association for interim use of the Historical Site as provided in <u>Section 5.2.2</u> of this MOU ("<u>Interim License</u>"); and

#### 5.2.2. Interim License. The Interim License shall:

- (a) commence upon the Closing and shall terminate upon the opening of the Clubhouse, and swim and racket club constructed on the Homeowner Association Site;
- (b) subject to the Historical Site Rules, allow use of the Historical Site as an information center and Tesoro Del Valle Project promotional office; provided, however, that no sales functions or transactions shall occur within Historical Site in connection with the Interim License; and
- (c) subject to the Historical Site Rules, allow use of the Historical Site as initial meeting space for the Master Association until such time as the Clubhouse has received a certificate of occupancy.

Owner shall use good faith efforts to cause the completion of the Clubhouse within eighteen months of the Effective Date. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if Owner is unable to complete the construction of the Clubhouse within such eighteen month period, the Society shall grant Owner the right to continue the Interim License for a period of six months, and each successive six month period thereafter that Owner is unable to complete the construction of the Clubhouse, but in no event after December 31, 2003.

#### ARTICLE VI. - COORDINATION

#### 6.1. General Cooperation.

6.1.1. <u>Scheduling</u>. The District, the Society and the Master Association agree to make a good faith effort to exchange information regarding the scheduling of events and use of the Sites.

9.4. <u>Insurance</u>. The Parties agree that the Mutual and Reciprocal Easement Agreement and the Joint Use and License Agreement shall contain insurance provisions reasonably agreed to by the Parties.

#### ARTICLE X. - PARTIES; ASSIGNMENT

- 10.1. <u>General</u>. The qualifications and identity of the District and the Society are of particular concern to Owner and such qualifications are required for a party to be a Responsible Party as required by the California State Historic Preservation Officer ("<u>SHPO</u>"). It is because of those qualifications and identity that Owner has entered into this MOU with the District and the Society. No voluntary or involuntary successor in interest of the District or the Society shall acquire any rights or powers under this MOU, except as expressly set forth herein.
- 10.2. <u>Restriction on Assignment by District or Society</u>. Except as otherwise expressly provided herein, neither the District nor the Society may assign all or any portion of its interests in this MOU, in any of the Definitive Agreements, or in the Sites or in any portion thereof, without the prior written consent of Owner, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld.
- 10.3. <u>Assignment by Owner</u>. Owner may assign all or any portion of its respective interests in this MOU, the Definitive Agreements, the Tesoro del Valle Project, the Sites, or any portion thereof, to the merchant builders of the respective neighborhoods of the Tesoro del Valle Project without the consent of the District or the Society; provided that such assignee shall agree in writing to be bound by the terms and conditions of this MOU and the Definitive Agreements. Owner shall promptly notify Society and District of any assignment, the identity of the assignee and the rights and obligations transferred pursuant to this Section.
- 10.4. <u>Collateral Assignment as Security</u>. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this MOU, the District or Owner may collaterally assign their interest in the Definitive Agreements or the Sites, or any portion thereof, to a lender as security for the District's obligations in connection with the financing of the improvements on the Sites or any portion thereof.
- 10.5. <u>Successors and Assigns; Assignment</u>. This MOU together with the Exhibits attached hereto and forming a part hereof shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the Parties and their respective successors and permitted assigns.

#### ARTICLE XI. - GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 11.1. <u>Applicable Law</u>. This MOU shall be construed in accordance with and governed by the internal laws (without reference to choice or conflict of laws) of the State of California.
- 11.2. <u>Force Majeure</u>. The Definitive Agreements shall provide reasonable force majeure provisions
- 11.3. <u>No Third Party Beneficiaries</u>. No person or entity other than the Parties shall have any right, benefit or obligation under this MOU as a third party beneficiary or otherwise.

- 11.5. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This MOU, together with the Exhibits attached hereto and forming a part hereof, constitutes the entire agreement among the Parties with respect to the matters covered herein and supersedes any prior negotiations, understandings or agreements with respect to the matters contemplated hereby.
- 11.6. <u>Severability</u>. If any term, provision, covenant or restriction of this MOU is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or unenforceable, the remainder of the terms, provisions, covenants and restrictions of this MOU shall remain in full force and effect and shall in no way be affected, impaired or invalidated to the extent the essential purposes of the Parties can be satisfied.
- 11.7. <u>Interpretation</u>. This MOU shall be interpreted in accordance with its fair meaning and shall not be interpreted in favor of one party or the other.
- 11.8. <u>Amendments and Waivers</u>. This MOU may only be amended in a writing signed by all Parties. Any provision of this MOU may only be waived in a writing signed by the party against whom the waiver is to be effective.

- 11.9. <u>Confidentiality</u>. Each Party will treat as confidential all confidential information provided by the other Parties to this MOU which does not otherwise become available to others, unless disclosure thereof is required by law.
- 11.10. <u>Counterparts</u>. This MOU may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be an original, but all of which together shall constitute one and the same agreement.
- 11.11. Construction. Headings at the beginning of each Section and subsection are solely for the convenience of the Parties and are not a part of this MOU. Whenever required by the context of this MOU, the singular shall include the plural and the masculine shall include the feminine and vice versa. Unless otherwise indicated, all references to Sections and subsections are to this MOU. All Exhibits referred to in this MOU are attached and incorporated by this reference. In the event that the date on which any Party is required to take any action under the terms of this MOU is not a business day, the action shall be taken on the next succeeding business day. For purposes of this MOU, the term "business day" shall not include Saturdays, Sundays or legal holidays.

#### Memorandum of Understanding

#### PRESERVATION COVENANT

Grantee hereby covenants on behalf of itself, its successors and assigns, to preserve and maintain those certain historical structures consisting of an adobe ranch house, three other adobe structures and one wood-frame structure (the "Historical Structures"), each identified in a Structural Evaluation Report for Tesoro del Valle Project, Clougherty Ranch, dated April 4, 1996, prepared by Melvyn Green and Associates, Inc. and depicted as Lot 672 on Vesting Tentative Tract Map No. 51644 (the "Historical Site") located in County of Los Angeles, State of California in order to preserve and enhance those qualities that make the Historical Structures eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historical Places and to provide public access to the Historical Site. This covenant shall be a binding servitude upon the Historical Site and shall be deemed to run with the land.

- (1) Except for ordinary maintenance and repair, no construction, alteration, remodeling, demolition or other action ("alterations") shall be undertaken unless such alterations are consistent with the Secretary of Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation.
- (2) Grantee will take prompt action as and when required to secure the Historical Structures from the elements, vandalism, or arson and will make any emergency stabilization. Grantee will make every effort to retain or reuse, to the extent practicable, the Historic Structures.
- (3) Grantee shall provide the County of Los Angeles and the California State Historic Preservation Officer ("SHPO"), a written summary of actions taken to implement the provisions of this Preservation Covenant within one (1) year after the effective date of transfer of the Historical Structures.
- (4) Grantee may modify for good cause any or all of the foregoing restrictions.
- (5) Grantee shall make the Historical Structures open to the public on a regular and continuous basis in response to public demand for said access, but in no event less than twelve days per year, and at such other times by appointment to permit persons affiliated with educational organizations, professional architectural associations and historical societies to study the Historical Structures. Any such public admission may be subject to restrictions as reasonably designed for the protection and maintenance of the Historical Structures. Such admission may also be subject to a reasonable fee.
- (6) In the event of damage resulting from casualty, as defined in Section 165(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, which is of such magnitude and extent as

to render repairs or reconstruction of the Historical Structures using all applicable insurance proceeds impractical or infeasible, then

- (i) Grantee may elect to repair or reconstruct the Historical Structures using insurance proceeds, donations or other funds received by Grantee on account of such casualty, but otherwise at its own expense; or
- (ii) Grantee may elect to salvage any portion of the Historical Structures and remove them from the Historical Site. In the event that all of the Historical Structures shall be removed from the Historical Site, the Historical Site shall be subject to the supervisory powers over charitable trusts held by the State of California Attorney General under California law. It shall be the responsibility of the Attorney General to appoint a viable entity capable of fulfilling the terms and conditions of the Preservation Covenant and this MOU.

This covenant is binding on the Grantee, its successors and assigns, in perpetuity. The restrictions, stipulations, and covenants contained herein shall be inserted by the Grantee, its successors and assigns, verbatim or by express reference in any deed or other legal instrument by which it divests itself of either the fee simple title or any lesser estate in the Historical Site, or any part thereof. To the fullest extent permitted by law and equity, the Grantor and its successors in office shall have the right to enforce the foregoing covenants. The Grantor and its successors in office shall be entitled to institute legal action to enforce performance and observance of these covenants, enjoin acts which violate these covenants, and exercise any other legal or equitable right or remedy with respect to covenants. These rights and remedies may be exercised separately or in connection.

Tasks Proposed for Completion During the Next 30 Days (Assuming the Board will Approve Resumption of Work):

- 1) Complete drilling bolt holes in the cab floor panels and install the floor on the locomotive.
- 2) Complete center punching and drilling rivet holes in the cab side and back panels.
- 3) Weld side and back panels on cab, grind the welds and prime with zinc chromate paint.
- 4) Complete painting second coat of black glossy enamel on the locomotive after sanding the first coat to promote adhesion.
- 5) Sand first enamel coat, prime repaired areas with zinc chromate primer, and paint second coat of black glossy enamel on the tender.



Dear John,

In reference to your letter sent by Paul Krutzer, Executive Director, on February 26, 1999, the following is approved or denied due to the Oak Tree Ordinance. These decisions are based on the conclusions that the trees planted are of "mitigation" in nature.

- A) Re excavation of the drainage channel. **Revised**. Permission is granted to place the drainage from the Edison house to within 15' of the Oak Tree. From there to the Chapel the drain must be 15' outside of the drip line and hand dug. (Reference Title 16, Section 22. 56.2060 sub paragraph C.)
- B) Low wall Revised to meet the same standard as stated in A.
- C) Excavation and installation of French drain in front of the little red school house. **Revised**. Excavation will be 5' outside of the drip line of the oak tree.
- D) Change in grade on the west side of Kingsbury. Permission **granted** as long as the grading is hand dug 5' outside of the drip line of the oak.

In addition to the above was the request to install an irrigation line around the Kingsbury and Edison house. **Denied**. Irrigation lines are not allowed under the drip line of the large oak or 15' of the small mitigated oaks.

In reference to the letter sent August 29, 1999 regarding the following requests:

- 1) Construct a semicircle pergola adjacent to the Mitchell adobe. **Denied.** Can not be anywhere within 15' of the oaks.
- 2) Construct a semicircle pergola constructed east of the Mitchell adobe. **Denied**. If structure is anywhere within 15' of the oaks.
- 3) Wooden boardwalks in front of the Mitchell adobe. Permission granted as long as the boardwalk is 15' away from any oak tree.

Exactly two years ago, selected board members of the Santa Clarita Historical Society contacted me about the possibility of completing a restoration on ex Gene Autry Southern Pacific steam locomotive No. 1629. Following informal discussions, I provided an opinion that all work by museums volunteers must stop until the project could be properly evaluated. It also appeared the most practical outlook for this locomotive was strictly a <u>cosmetic</u> refurbishment. The board members agreed they no longer had an objective for possible steam operations, realizing the project would need an additional infusion of approximately \$350.000. ( see letter dated Oct. 15, 1997), and that they were conducting an internal audit of the project.

Also, in October 1997, my staff and I examined the locomotive at Hart Park. We observed several missing items that would be needed to reassemble the engine or could be of resaleable value. Since that time we have located most of the missing appurtenances scattered throughout the yard area or in the container located on the property. However, of great need to anyone who embraced this project, are the whereabouts and return of the steam air pump, tubes and flues, removed leaf spring, gauges, bolts of all kinds and yet unnamed parts after the container could be emptied and a better inventory accomplished.

At this time, I advised former president, Tom Frew, that costs to complete a cosmetic refurbishment could be \$72,000. Tom indicated funding was not available at the time.

During conversations, I maintained a position that <u>no</u> mechanical work should occur until funding was in place and the whereabouts of all components could be determined. Although discussions continued through 1998 on an off, the issue of expenses to this point, missing parts, and past management of this project were offset by my desire to have the recommended funds at hand to then move quickly, assuming there was no further dismantling of the engine.

In September, 1999, I was advised that funds were now available. My project managers, Bob Kredel, Bill Palmer, and myself reinspected the locomotive and were shocked to observe it suspended above the track on top of blocks and girders with major heavy hardware and pipes disassembled or removed. The man hours expended since the 1997 inspection clearly indicated the volunteers continued to pursue their personal desire to make the locomotive operational by virtue of deeper disassembly. This action was completely opposite of the boards stated position



  - 2) EDISON HOUSE: No progress report. Project details to follow.
- 3) **STATION:** Paul reported Loading dock cleaned up, items moved, skirting completed as far as can be until additional dock planking is installed.
- 4) **PARDEE HOUSE:** Paul Reported Exterior work pending approval of permit for all HJHP restoration and construction projects.
- 5) **NEWHALL RANCH:** Paul reported CSV to build new frames and sashes for kitchen and panty rooms. Materials to be purchased from Terry Lumber.
- 6) **MITCHELL:** Pam reported Kawanis Club may sponsor restoration and construction projects next year.
- 7) **SITE DEVELOPMENT:** Paul reported Priority was clean up around Mitchell Adobe: Bouquet Schist moved, mulch distributed around oak trees, and area raked and cleaned. / Drainage drains, east of Newhall Ranch House, cleaned of debris and re-graveled; drain pipes are clear and free flowing. / All exterior work is pending approval of permit for all HJHP restoration and construction projects.
- 8) HERITAGE JUNCTION RAILROAD: Kevin O'Neill reported Work to dismantle and remove cars will continue when fire danger (high winds and low humidity) on site changes to allow for use of torch equipment.

- b) <u>SCVHS Headquarters & Visitor Center Requirements:</u> Barrier free entry to accommodate all citizens to public buildings without discrimination to disabled visitors. Removal of barriers to wheel chair and walker usage from historic buildings used as public meeting places required.;
- c) <u>Americans With Disabilities Act:</u> Required removal of barriers to wheel chair and walker usage. Change in elevation from parking lot surface to level of front porch is 5'. Compliance accomplished by construction of handicap ramp for access to building's front porch.;
- d) Americans With Disabilities Act: Required removal of barriers to wheel chair and walker usage. Change in elevation from front porch into building interior is 6". Compliance accomplished by construction of ramp for access into building's entry at threshold. Current configuration of front porch restricted compliance. Construction of ramp into building interior at front porch entry allowed for compliance of barrier removals at public buildings for citizens with disabilities while maintaining the significant historical character of Pardee house.




Illustration of 1629 in 1989 shortly after restoration disassembly began.

- The document is divided into named and numbered "Sections." Each section is identified by a whole number followed by decimal divisions, as needed, to denote subsidiary points within that topic.
- Each section uses its own discrete page numbering, beginning with the section number, a hyphen, then the sequential number of the page within that section. For example, page 3-6 would be the sixth page of Section 3, and it comes before page 4-2, the second page of Section 4.

Here is the budget summary contained in my bid proposal. I will mail or deliver the full 18 page package to you if this much appears acceptable. Please note that two items related to "drag along" costs of employing workers are still awaiting quotes; these are line items 3.4 and 3.5. All else is complete.

I have spent the last several days consulting with some of the most knowledgeable and skilled steam locomotive restoration experts in the country. I am pleased to report that a number of them have agreed to serve as consultants to me for the project, should I receive the contract.

Also, there has been no mention of need for an "RFQ" (Request for Qualifications) to function as a resume. Still, I believe you should have one from me, and it is contained in the full package.

It has required a great deal of careful analysis, all documented, to produce the accompanying bid. Let me assure you that a commitment to use only top quality, durable materials has been foremost; obviously, everyone wants this to produce a showpiece in which all can take pride, and one that will not entail high maintenance after the fact.

I simply would not submit a bid unless and until I could achieve confidence that <u>a first-rate cosmetic restoration can be completed with the available funds</u>. The restoration I propose will produce a finished job: an extremely attractive displayed engine, completely authentic in appearance, with working lights, bell and whistle, and with capability to be rolled and stopped safely using the engine's own brakes.

In addition, I propose that any funds remaining in the project account when the job is completed be divided equally between your organization and the project manager. This provides an incentive for everyone to maximize the use of qualified volunteer help (including members of the Friends of STEAM) and to make use of any donated materials that meet the standards of quality. It can create significant savings in budget line item 3.1, required personnel, and may defer costs of some line items of materials.

I anticipate that most weekends will be work days on the project. That corresponds to the "days off" regular jobs for most individuals qualified in the key areas as Restoration Specialists. Please allow me to emphasize once again that the engine's state of disassembly makes this a big job to be completed in 180 days, the amount of time given. It can be done, provided the Project Manager is himself a handson restoration specialist with the necessary skills in managing schedules, budgets, people, inventory, scope and sequence of work, mechanical reassembly, safety, quality, and historical integrity - all with specific application to restoring steam locomotives. I am your man, if you choose to give me that role. The timing is opportune for me to focus full-time on the project, and that usually would not be the case.

#### 1.2 Qualifications, Past Projects & References

This Section presents the experience, qualifications, resumé and references of the proposal author and project manager, Larry Wines.

In four sub-sections, it also details the participation of the nonprofit Friends of STEAM; that organization's board and members have voted to assist as volunteers should Larry Wines receive the bid from SCVHS.

The Section also lists highly experienced consultants that are available to the project.

#### 1.3 Restoration Protocols & Methodology

This Section establishes the requirements and desired outcome of the project as communicated by SCVHS. It describes the methods and techniques that will applied to complete the project, and cites standard short line railroad and museum standards as authority. The outcome of the restoration is described using four sub-sections.

In summary, the proposed project will produce a cosmetically restored 1629, with finished cab interior; all lights, the bell, and the whistle will operate; the locomotive will be capable of safe movement on its own wheels, pulled by a cable, and capable of safe stopping on its own brake system.

The finished restoration will produce a movable display that will have an authentic appearance and attractive presentation, capable of the described movement for marketing to the motion picture industry and for interpretive demonstrations.

#### 1.4 Scope of Work: Presence and Status of Components

This necessarily lengthy Section provides a detailed evaluation of the current status of 1629 and what is required to complete the project. It describes the large number of removed components and what is required for restoration, reassembly and cosmetic finish work. It also addresses the work required on specific systems to make 1629 capable of moving and stopping. It features five sub-sections.

Using a sample GANT chart, Section 5 also describes the project schedule and the time required to complete the project. The conclusion reached is the project would require at least six months working through the long days of summer, and with a mid-winter start, eight months should be allowed from the date of authorization to proceed.

#### 1.5 Project Budget, Accounting, & Financials

Seven sub-sections are used to describe the fiscal dimensions of the project.

Reporting requirements to SCVHS are established at four-week intervals for the duration of the project. These reports feature complete financial updates and reports on the progress of work.

The project budget contains provisions for purchase of all required and desirable insurance.

A copy of the budget from Section 5, identical to that submitted on September 16, 1999 except for line-item identification codes, is reproduced in this Section on the next page.

#### 1.6 Alternatives to the Proposed Project

The author's experience with steam locomotive restoration projects and, separately, with environmental impact reports that require an appraisal of alternatives, converge in advocacy that SCVHS consider alternatives to the proposed cosmetic restoration of 1629.

The author is professionally compelled to assure that SCVHS is aware that several reasonable alternatives exist to the current proposed action, and some have potential to realize savings from the amount that cosmetic restoration will consume, or even to generate revenue if a mechanical restoration is complete and 1629 is marketed for operation.

Four sub-sections describe alternatives for (1) removing 1629 to a more appropriate location and completing the mechanical restoration; (2) the potential for revenue from marketing an operating 1629 on a tourist railroad; (3) exchanging 1629 for a cosmetically-restored similar locomotive; or, (4) selling 1629's rebuilt and acquired (new) components for use on other operating locomotives.

#### 1.7 Conclusion

L. Wines/Friends of STEAM

Both the author and the Friends of STEAM are prepared to assist SCVHS in completing the restoration of 1629. The financial information contained in Section 5 is a firm and realistic bid. The detailed, complete document will enable an agreement to perform the project as proposed by SCVHS; it also provides sufficient information for any additional evaluation SCVHS may wish to perform.

The full document emphasizes, in Sections 3, 4 and 5, that participation of volunteers is necessary to supplement the limited amount of paid personnel that the limited budget will permit. The full proposal document, in Section 5.7, establishes a division of any funds remaining at project completion. This is a major incentive for both SCVHS and the Friends of STEAM to participate as volunteers in the project.

Only one caveat remains. Steam locomotive restoration projects always present some unanticipated need, challenge or problem, regardless of who is performing the restoration. It is conceivable that a serious mechanical deficiency may be found that will prevent 1629 from being rolled or stopped as desired. Worst case scenario for the proposed project is that 1629 will be beautifully cosmetically restored, with functioning lights, bell and whistle, but otherwise static and stationary. No indication has yet surfaced to suggest that the engine is not capable of much more than that.

#### 2.1 The Project Manager & the STEAM Team

The author of this proposal, Larry Wines, offers SCVHS considerable experience to complete the 1629 restoration as project manager. A full resume appears in Section 2.2, and specific experience with steam locomotives is enumerated in Section 2.3.

In addition, a number of highly qualified people have agreed to be available to the project manager as consultants, including one of North America's most experienced steam locomotive restoration specialists. Consultants are listed in Section 2.4, along with professional references.

A key role can be performed by the nonprofit Friends of STEAM, an organization now entering its fifth year. STEAM is an acronym for Steam Train Excursion And Museum, the organization's principal focus. The organization's board of directors and its membership have both voted to actively participate should this proposal be accepted. The author is principal founder and two-term past president of the Friends of STEAM.

## 3.0 Restoration Protocols & Methodology

This Section establishes what will constitute an appropriate outcome for the proposed project. It describes what is included and excluded, and the parameters, protocols and methodology that will be applied to completing the restoration of 1629.

The underlying and qualifying factor in this Section is adherence to the most cost effective measures. While all financial aspects of the project are described in detail in Section 5, the importance of keeping the project within its limited budget must be a constant companion in all phases of planning and execution. This caveat is necessary to produce the best outcome in terms of authentic appearance and presentation, durability of the restoration, and producing a display locomotive capable of safe movement — and safe stopping — for motion picture work and interpretive demonstrations.

#### 3.1 Requirements & Desired Outcome

SCVHS has not issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) or other formal enumeration of project specifications. The desires of SCVHS for completion of the restoration of 1629 have been articulated by John Mann; all points and issues raised by him to date are addressed in Section 4.2 (page 4-18) of this document.

In basic terms, the desired outcome of the proposed project is that 1629 be cosmetically restored as an interpretive display, with operating lights, bell and whistle, and that it be made capable of limited movement and safe stops on its own wheels; this latter provision is made to enable marketing of 1629 for motion picture and television work, and to enable interpretive demonstrations to be developed.

#### 3.2 Reassembly of 1629

A particular challenge concerns items removed from 1629. Substantial disassembly has been performed during the past eleven years. This is, ostensibly, in accordance with expected protocols for a mechanical, or operational, restoration of a steam locomotive; that is, it has been appropriate to produce a running steam locomotive rather than a displayed monument. The mechanical restoration has been pursued in an outdoor environment with limited on-site secure or weatherproof storage for old or new parts or new materials. This has necessitated off-site storage for many removed components.

Substantial new parts, some of them custom-made and expensive, have been procured for the mechanical restoration. Some are at the project site, while verbal reports cite others.

Some of the original removed parts, and some new parts and materials, are stored inside a cargo shipping container adjacent to 1629, and anecdotal reports indicate that many more are

safely maintained at various other locations. There is an obvious question of the availability of these off-site components.

Therefore, a methodology must be applied to limit parts, materials, and components for inclusion in the project. Two criteria apply:

- 1) Only parts, materials and components made available at the project site will be included in the project; the sole exceptions are those items procured in accordance with the budget for the project and indicated in Section 5.
- Only externally-visible components will be reassembled onto 1629; this applies to both the engine and tender; the sole exceptions are components necessary for preservation, and for the safe operation of 1629's brakes and/or other safety issues as determined by the project manager.

Components and materials will be applied to 1629 in accordance with standard short line rail-road industry and/or museum methods, as appropriate. Techniques and protocols have been developed to minimize rust, corrosion, electrolysis, and other causes of deterioration and these will be applied. Examples include the application of treated wood blocks to support the boiler jacket in place of insulative, but water-retaining lagging, and a coating of Apexior to seal and protect the inside of the boiler (these are described in Section 4). Work performed on 1629 will conform to established standards wherever possible within budget constraints. Detailed descriptions are included in Section 4, Scope of Work.

#### 3.3 Cosmetic Restoration

The 1629 restoration project includes a provision for rolled movement. Generally, a cosmetic restoration produces a stationary artifact. Properly executed, it is akin to a taxidermist's effort in a natural history museum, wherein the "beast" is portrayed in a realistic pose in a microcosmic representation of its natural habitat. If 1629 were simply "stuffed and mounted" and parked as a static display adjacent to the Saugus depot, the usual result of a cosmetic restoration would be achieved, and it would meet the satisfaction of those who are undemanding.

SCVHS wisely wants to achieve a better effect. 1629's headlight, number box lights, class lamps, and cab lights are to be made operational on 110 volt a.c. ground power. In addition, the bell and whistle are to be made operational, with the latter to be operated on compressed air.

Section 4, the Scope of Work, describes in detail each aspect of cosmetic restoration within the context of the total project. It describes restoration of the cab interior as well as all externally visible features.

1629 will be finished in an attractive and authentic Southern Pacific paint scheme. This is described in Section 4.3.1, Paint and Lettering, on page 4-18.

#### 3.4 Ability for Movement

SCVHS, through John Mann, has expressed the desire that the locomotive be made capable of rolled movement, as described in Section 3.1. This is a worthwhile feature that should be attainable. The inspection of 1629 did not yield any indications that it must be relegated to stationary static display. All reasonable effort, within the constraints of the project budget, will be made to enable 1629 to be safely rolled on its own wheels and safely stopped with its own brakes. Section 4, Scope of Work, includes the work to be done to enable these capabilities.

## 4.0 Scope of Work

A cosmetic restoration with capability for rolling movement is not common. The only examples that could be found are Santa Fe 2-6-2 # 1010, rolled using air pressure in its boiler so that it could take part in a pageant for Railfair '81 in Sacramento, and a treadmill that has operated for many years beneath Baldwin # 60004 at the Franklin Institute in Philadelphia.

The primary measures of difficulty derive from two needs:

- 1) the engine's running gear and bearings must operate freely.
- 2) the engine must be assured of stopping safely on its own brakes.

These issues are addressed in Section 4.1 in the course of evaluating 1629's mechanical systems. It appears from that evaluation that both needs can be met, and barring unforeseen complications, 1629 can be made capable of movement on a tow cable for motion picture work or interpretive demonstrations.

The information developed in this Section demonstrates the degree of complication inherent in the proposed project based upon two unusual circumstances. These are the extreme state of disassembly of 1629, and the various off-site locations of removed components.

If the project to date had proceeded in a restoration shop, reassembly of 1629 now would be a straightforward proposition: everything needed would be in one place, protected from the weather, with all associated nuts, bolts, brackets and plumbing kept with the disassembled parts, both rebuilt and unrebuilt. Likewise, restored and rebuilt components would readily present themselves. However, the outdoor work environment, eleven-year span of the project to date, limited on-site protected storage for removed and disassembled components, and off-site storage — and status — of many critical parts and subsystems makes the project something of a jigsaw puzzle with a high potential to become a scavenger hunt.

It should be recognized that the disassembly encountered is in accord with protocols of a complete mechanical restoration performed solely by a volunteer crew; no hint should be taken of criticism of the previous effort by SCVHS volunteers to achieve an operational restoration of 1629. Presumably, their careful, methodical approach features a log of off-site parts and status.

SCVHS may determine from the evaluation in this Section that it is appropriate to investigate other opportunities, off-site, for completing the mechanical restoration of 1629. Indeed, a large amount has already been spent to achieve that purpose, and other venues exist for the engine to operate. Alternatives to the proposed action are addressed in Section 6.

This Section demonstrates the need for a thorough listing of the location and status of the large number of removed components that are currently off-site, whether the goal is to achieve a cosmetic restoration or to reconsider completion of the mechanical restoration for 1629 to run.

## 4.1 Work Required, from Inspection and Research

Field inspection was performed 9-9-99 to enable this assessment for preparation of bid.

Standard abbreviations: ES= Engineer's Side, the right-hand side of the locomotive or tender.

FS= Fireman's Side, the left-hand side of the locomotive or tender.

This evaluation uses alphabetically-coded groupings to address 1629's major parts. Sections are listed in alphabetic order, except: (1) "Miscellaneous" appears last; (2) Components within each section are not alphabetized, allowing related components to be listed together.

#### 4.3.1 Paint and Lettering

Sealing and painting the locomotive and tender is the sole restoration function not already addressed. Most of the outer surfaces are metal, and will be primed with a paint designed for that purpose.

The finish color scheme to be applied is mostly black, with either white or "aluminum" lettering; either of these lettering colors meets Southern Pacific standards. Some red and white trim is used, and will conform to SP standards.

The cab interior wood and metal walls are to be painted a pale green, again to achieve the SP standard. Backhead details are red and white on the basic black.

#### 4.3.2 Project Schedule and Duration

One item has yet to be addressed in the project specifications communicated by telephone from John Mann. This is the duration of the project. In early September, it was specified that the project is to be completed in six months.

This presents a challenging deadline, given that many components are off-site and both the schedule of their availability and their suitability for use without additional work are not yet known. Careful planning requires positive responses for return to the site of the detached parts; indeed, any effort to plan in the absence of missing components would be predicated upon reassembly without them. That would produce an unsatisfactory outcome, at least in terms of authentic appearance and presentation.

The project could probably be completed in six months if the long days of summer were available for volunteer participation after normal working hours. But a six month schedule that depends upon volunteer participation is not realistic in winter, working outside with diminished daylight hours and the vagaries of temperature and weather. The budget is not sufficient to employ all the labor, highly skilled and semiskilled, that is required to complete the project, even if the work environment were improved with lighting.

A carefully prepared, and perhaps negotiated, work plan should be developed to avoid disappointments and achieve a mutually agreed upon schedule for project milestones. Eight months is probably realistic given the constraints of budget, absent parts to be made available, and winter season.

Figure 4a, on the next page, shows a conceptual example of the type of schedule that should be developed for the project.

### **5.1** The Project Account

A separate account shall be established and maintained for all funds deposited for the project. This account shall be at Antelope Valley Bank, an accredited financial institution that maintains two accounts for and in the name of the Friends of STEAM. The project account shall be established under the authority and control of the project manager, and the account shall not be used for any purpose other than the 1629 restoration project or to receive or disburse funds for any purpose other than the project.

### 5.2 Financial Accounting and Reporting Requirements

In the fifth week of the project, the first report shall be issued to SCVHS describing both progress and funds expended in the first four weeks. Four weeks later, in the project's ninth week, an updated progress and financial report shall be issued on the preceding four weeks, and subsequent reports shall follow at the same intervals, each time describing the preceding four weeks' activity, through completion of the project.

### **5.3 Funding Schedule**

A deposit to the project account shall be made upon acceptance of a signed agreement, consisting of 40% of the funds required in the project budget. An additional 40% of the funds shall be deposited at the start of on-site work within two weeks of acceptance of the signed agreement. The final 20% of the funds required in the budget may be held by SCVHS to pay budget-item bills as they are presented.

It is standard in the industry to establish a greater up-front sum, generally 60%, with 20% due at the start of work, and the final 20% held as described above. However, much of the cost of this project is labor. Both a provision and an incentive are present to maximize the use of volunteers and realize a savings in paid workers; this is described in Section 5.5. It should therefore be possible to commence the project with the lesser up-front sum, as indicated.

This budget was developed with careful research and analysis. It maintains a commitment to use only top quality, durable materials that will produce a showpiece in which all can take pride and that will not entail high maintenance after the fact. Every effort will be made to match, or where possible to reduce, the amounts cited in the budget while achieving the required work.

The project manager reserves the right and authority to increase expenditures for any given category or line item by decreasing expenditures in other areas, as necessary or possible, to successfully complete the project. All tools, materials and equipment purchased as project budget items and left-over at completion of the project are the property of the project manager.

### 5.5 Required Personnel & Volunteers

SCVHS has proceeded with an all-volunteer mechanical restoration for the past eleven-plus years. Quality of the completed work observed at the site is high, and care is evident in all disassembled interfaces where components have been removed from 1629. Volunteers can do excellent work; the usual situation that develops problems is that volunteers must work on their own schedules while making a living at other pursuits.

The desire expressed by SCVHS to achieve a completed cosmetic restoration within a matter of months necessitates the use of paid workers to achieve a predictable schedule. Personnel costs in the budget are based upon a "safe minimum" estimate for use of paid employees to complete the project within the parameters of the schedule desired by SCVHS. Specific skills required, and the project schedule, necessitate use of paid personnel in several specializations.

Nonetheless, volunteers must play a key role to keep the project within budget. Personnel costs are the largest category in the budget. Participation by volunteers can produce substantial cost reductions. SCVHS volunteers already have a general incentive to participate, to achieve the goal for their organization and add to the appeal of Heritage Junction. Friends of STEAM members have a general incentive to participate, and have voted to do so, for the experience and knowledge that can be disseminated, learned, and applied to later projects. A tangible, financial incentive for both organizations is also present in Section 5.7.

Participation by volunteers requires that most weekends will be work days on the project. This corresponds to the "days off" regular jobs for most individuals qualified in key skill areas.

1629's state of disassembly makes this a big job to be completed in 180-240 days, the time parameter for the project. It can be done on time and within budget, provided the project manager is a hands-on restoration specialist with the necessary skills in managing schedules, budgets, people, inventory, scope and sequence of work, mechanical reassembly, safety, quality, and historical integrity - all with specific application to restoring steam locomotives.

### 5.6 Insurance and mandated employee overhead

Note that two budget line items are not yet included in the total. These are P.4, workers compensation insurance costs, and P.5, state disability, unemployment insurance, and employer

portion of taxes. These are unavoidable "drag along" costs that must be borne in any scenario that utilizes paid workers on the project. A quote from State Fund for item P.4 is pending; the Employment Development Department will assist with item P.5, but does not have standard reference information from which they can quote.

Insurance for the project is listed and its cost is included as line item P.6. This insurance will be provided by the firm of Hamman-Miller-Beauchamp-Deeble in Long Beach, California. Mike Deeble, partner in that firm, personally provided the quote. His firm writes insurance for a significant portion of the nation's railroad museums and tourist railroads, assuring that the specialized needs of a steam locomotive restoration project are met by the coverage provided.

### 5.7 Close-out at completion of project

The project will be completed when the following is achieved:

- 1) Reassembly or reattachment of all externally-visible components provided at the site is completed, and other work specified in Sections 3 and 4 is completed.
- 2) The cab is restored, by the same criteria as above.
- 3) A demonstration is made of the operability of 1629's lights and bell, and of the whistle, blown on air pressure.
- 4) Finish paint and lettering are in place.
- 5) 1629 will demonstrate capability to be safely moved twenty feet on its own wheels and safely stopped on its own brakes, provided no compelling reason is previously encountered and reported that will prevent either of these capabilities.
- 6) All final bills are presented, and a report describing these is appended to the series of reports.
- 7) Any remaining portion of the twenty percent (20%) of funds held by SCVHS for payment of line-item bills shall be deposited to the project account, and final bills shall be paid.

Upon completion of the project, the project manager will issue to SCVHS a table of contents guide to the series of reports produced during the restoration in accord with Section 5.2. This will constitute a final report on the restoration project.

Any funds remaining in the project account when the project is completed shall be divided equally between SCVHS and the project manager. SCVHS will receive fifty percent (50%) of any amount remaining in the account for the organization's other needs or future projects. The fifty percent (50%) disbursement of remaining funds received by the project manager shall, at his discretion, compensate the Friends of STEAM and/or individuals who have proven to be key personnel in completing the project. The account shall be closed upon disbursement of funds according to this formula. The Friends of STEAM are agreeable to this arrangement in return for the organization's participation as volunteers.

The formula for disbursal of realized savings can play an important role throughout the project, providing a positive incentive for everyone to maximize the use of qualified volunteer help. If this potential has in fact been realized, funds should remain at project completion. Similarly, a positive incentive to seek and make use of any donated materials that meet the standards of quality may enable reduced costs. These factors, if maximized throughout the project, can accrue significant savings in budget line item P.1, required personnel, and may reduce or defer costs of some line items within budget category M, materials.

### 6.0 Alternatives to the Proposed Project

The author's experience with steam locomotive restoration projects and, separately, with environmental impact reports that require an appraisal of alternatives, converge in advocacy that SCVHS consider alternatives to the proposed cosmetic restoration of 1629.

The author is professionally compelled to assure that SCVHS is aware that several reasonable alternatives exist to the current proposed action, and some have potential to realize savings from the amount that cosmetic restoration will consume, or even to generate revenue if a mechanical restoration is complete and 1629 is marketed for operation.

### 6.1 Completing the Mechanical Restoration

This Section is included primarily because a mechanical restoration has been pursued by SCVHS volunteers, at significant expense to the organization, for more than eleven years. The proposed change of outcome to produce a cosmetic restoration should be carefully considered in terms of lost investment of time, money, and human resources.

Clearly, there are problems present at the work site in terms of aesthetics and appearance. In the years since the Saugus depot arrived, the membership and focus of SCVHS has transitioned away from a railroad preservation emphasis; today, the principal concerns and achievements are demonstrated by the community of restored homes from bygone eras, tastefully clustered around two sides of the depot. As one "old house" project after another has been completed, the appearance at 1629's outdoor work site continues to feature an array of disassembled components and the rough appearance of an exposed boiler.

Still, the work evident in the mechanical restoration appears to be in accordance with established protocols and it appears to be of high quality. If anecdotal reports are correct, that a substantial portion of off-site components removed from 1629 have been rebuilt and are ready for reassembly and return to the engine, then the mechanical restoration may well be fifty to seventy percent complete.

This begs the question whether 1629 could not, and should not, be relocated to a more appropriate site where the mechanical restoration could be completed. While this would deprive Heritage Junction of a displayed locomotive, it would likewise remove the rough appearance of an outdoor restoration site that many find unsightly and objectionable. The next topic describes a revenue-producing rationale for this alternative.

### **6.2** Potential for Revenue from Operating 1629

Several current examples can be cited of operating steam locomotives that are "sojourners,"

going from one place to another to operate. In each case, revenue is produced for the locomotives' owners. Standard-gauge Milwaukee Road 4-8-4 # 261, owned by a nonprofit organization, has worked throughout the midwest and spent time in Pennsylvania operating under contract for the National Park Service at Steamtown National Historic Site. Dan Markoff's narrowgauge Eureka & Palisade 4-4-0 *Eureka* has visited Colorado and California from its home in Nevada, running to the delight of excursion train riders who pay handsomely for the opportunity to ride behind and photograph the engine.

There are more numerous examples of steam locomotives whose ownership is independent of the lines where they regularly operate. Ross Rowland's ex-C&O 4-8-4 # 614 runs excursions on New Jersey Transit from New York City, across New Jersey, to south central New York state. In nearby Fillmore, ex-Great Western 2-8-0 # 51 is owned by Boulder Scientific Corporation in Colorado, who is well paid each time the engine runs.

The key point is that an operating 1629 can find work, and in so doing, produce revenue for SCVHS on an ongoing basis. The author is available to enter into an arrangement with SCVHS to research and identify potential operators and anticipated revenues that could accrue to SCVHS.

### 6.3 Exchanging 1629 for a cosmetically restored similar locomotive

At least one other Southern Pacific steam locomotive of the same class and virtually identical appearance may be available to exchange for 1629. That locomotive was disassembled to undertake a mechanical restoration before it was realized that deterioration of its boiler prevented it from holding pressure. That project is currently on hold, assessing whether funding will be available to have a new boiler constructed.

The potential is quite good that the owners of that locomotive would agree to provide their 2-6-0 fully cosmetically restored at their expense, in return for the SCVHS 2-6-0 in its current, partly restored "kit form."

This could be a winning alternative for all participants, since:

- The work already done by SCVHS volunteers over the past eleven years would provide the basis for another operator to complete the operational restoration of 1629.
- SCVHS would obtain the same outcome the proposed project would produce.
- Additional expense to SCVHS for the author to manage the exchange is a fraction of the cost of the proposed project.

Other opportunities exist for mutually-beneficial exchange that would result in 1629 returning to steam for a new owner or operator. The author is prepared to enter into an arrangement with SCVHS to investigate and/or effect an exchange of 1629 for a cosmetically-restored replacement.

# 6.4 Selling Rebuilt & Acquired Components for Use on Operating Locomotives

Should the proposed project go forward as described in the verbal SCVHS request for proposal, an important decision must be made governing the rebuilt and newly acquired parts, components, and materials in which SCVHS has invested for mechanical restoration of 1629. Many of

these items have objective monetary value if marketed to other steam locomotive restoration projects. Sale of components not needed for cosmetic restoration would produce revenue for SCVHS that could be applied to reduce the cost of cosmetic restoration, or for the organization's other needs. At the same time, the sale of these items would end any reasonable hope of resuming a mechanical restoration of 1629 at some future time. It is a decision that should be taken after due consideration.

Retaining all components requires that secure, weatherproof storage be maintained indefinitely. Many components require continuous protection from the gradual onset of atmospheric rust, and a rudimentary "mothballing" is needed, following the example of a stored naval vessel. Periodic inspection and maintenance is an important part of the protocol for components and materials that are most susceptible to deterioration. Marketing these items is therefore better done sooner, rather than later.

Personalities and organizational politics should be scrupulously kept out of this decision. Perhaps the process could consider the feelings, attitudes, and future value to the organization of those who have volunteered for years in hope of seeing 1629 run again.

It is a question of seeing parts of 1629 run on other engines and realizing revenue from that, versus the possibility there may be a future in-house mechanical restoration of 1629 or some other steam locomotive to utilize the parts and materials already prepared or brought to SCVHS. It may be appropriate to call upon the individuals who have worked on 1629 to gauge their preference in this decision.

If the decision is made to market parts, components, and materials not required for cosmetic restoration, the author is prepared to enter into an arrangement with SCVHS to achieve it in the most effective manner.


