### OFFICERS MEET BULLETS IN ATTEMPTED ARREST

Gus LeBrun, Crazed by Drink and Jealousy Fights Till Dead. Fatally Wounds Ed Brown

As a climax to the tangled love and business affairs of Gus LeBrun and Bonita Darling, or Nellie Bayless, LeBrun was killed and Deputy Constable Ed Brown was mortally wounded in a fierce gun fight which took place about 9:30 Sunday morning when Constable Jack Pilcher and Mr. Brown drove to the Darling ranch to arrest LeBrun who, the woman claimed was waiting to kill her.

As the officers drove into the ranch which is about a mile south of town along the railroad, LeBrun jumped from behind a bush and ordered them to throw up their hands, at the same time covering them with a rifle. Mr. Pilcher swung the car around so the back was toward LeBrun just as the latter opened fire. The first shot came thru the back seat and cut a top standard close to Mr Pilcher's head. The officers threw themselves out of the & and returned the fire, Both Brown and Pilcher made their shots count. and after emptying his rifle, shooting part of the time from the ground, LeBrun cried, "You've got me, boys; I'll quit," The officers had escaped injury so far, and walked over to where LeBrun lay crumpled on the ground, his hands clasping his body. As they stooped to lift him up, be suddenly jerked a large revolver from beneath his jacket and fired two shots, one at each officer. Quick as a flash both officers fired, and it was the finish for LeBrun. Brown clapped his hand to his side, remarking, "Well Jack, he got me that time." Mr Pilcher saw that Brown was hard hit, and hurried him to town, where Dr. McAdory gave him first aid. He was then removed to the General Hospital at Los Angeles, where an operation was performed but the wound was found be in vital parts, having gone entirely thru the body, just below the ribs. He never rallied from the operation, and passed away about four o'clock, Sunday afternoon.

Captain Bright, of the sheriff's office, came up Sunday afternoon, and after viewing LeBrun's body, turned it over to undertaker Noble of San Fernando.

LeBrun's body bore half a dozen wounds, any one of which would of the fight including the killing free, no collection.

was in a dying condition. He was apparently careless of what happened to him, and fought desperately to the last.

Gus' troubles with Bonita Darling began when he went to dig a well for her and followed that up with other work He alleged in a letter written a few days before the crime that she had promised to marry him if he would loan her \$200, which he states in his letter he did, only to have her turn him down and "give him the horse laugh." That letter was written a week before the crime and was a lo g rambling account of the affairs of himself and the woman. closed with the statement that he was going to end his middle aged life which he alleged she had ruined, and expressed a determination to fix her so she would never fool anybody else as she had him.

Saturday afternoon, after a jour wrangle the affairs of the two were settled, Judge Miller arranging the matter and drawing up the note of \$150, the amount agreed on as the amount due LeBrun. Mrs Darling signed and Gus accepted it and agreed to stay away from the ranch.

Ed Brown was born in Missouri forty-four years ago and was one of a family of several brothers and sisters. About fourteen years ago he with his wife came to Saugus from Nevada, where they have since lived, with the exception of one year spent on their ranch at McFarland.

About two years ago he was appointed deputy constable and at once made his mark as a brave, efficient and competent officer.

We are at a loss to find words that would express the esteem in which Ed Brown was held by his fellow citizens. Every one loved and respected Ed Brown. alifornia motorists are watchwith interest the enforcement e new state motor vehicle law in New York which goes into effect of October 1. New York is the only state rivalling Cali-fornia in the number of automobiles and its problems are some-what similar. The particular teature of the new law that is attracting the attention of the Automobile Club of Souhern California is the provision for the elimination of unsafe drivers of motor vehicles.

A corps of 125 inspectors been trained as enforcement ficers ready for service when the new law goes into effect.

Regarding the elimination of unfit drivers, Commissioner Charles A. Harnett of the New

York police, says
"Primarily the work of this force will be to pass upon the competency of every driver applying for a license, after we will have accomplished the issuance of 1,250,000 licenses now confront-

ing us.
"As I see it, the law was en acted for the protection of all the people and no one is entitled to nor will be shown any fayeritism. A person is either safe or unsafe as the operator of a motor ve-hicle. The unsafe driver must be eliminated, regardless of who he is, and the responsibility for pass-ing upon his qualifications rests largely with the inspector on the

May inspector who knowingly enses an incompetent or unafe driver or allows such a driver to retain a license is potentially guilty of whatever crime that driver may be accused as the licensed operator of a motor vehicle.

"With proper administration of the law, it is the sincere co-oper-ation of the public, there can be no queston as to the success of no queston à to the success of our new venture. We are ready and anxious to do our part. If may be your wife mother, child of other relative wife will be offerted on the altar of unsafe or careless motor vehicle operation tomorrow. Let us all unite in an effort to prevent that very thing happening."


