Roland D. Johnson Killed By Auto

Roland D. Johnson, manager of Summit service station, in upper Mint Canyon, was struck by an auto, Saturday night, in Los Angeles, and so badly injured that he died early Sunday morning.

Mr. Johnson was 23 years old, a graduate of the University of Southern California and a writer particularly on philatelic subjects. Several months ago he started in business at "Summit" and later began sending to the Signal the news items from that locality. He was a man of pleasing personality, courteous and accommodating in business, and a favorite with all who knew him.

Pioneers Petroleum Society Buys Memorial Site

By a deal which was closed last week a tract of land amounting to 29 acres, of the H. Clay Needham ranch, two miles south of Newhall has been purchased by the Petroleum Pioneers Society of California. The ground is located just east of Mr. Needham's ranch house, and includes four acres on the west side of the boulevard and the beautiful twenty-five acre tract opposite, on the east side.

Each of the tracts is one of the beauty spots of this section, and the Society plans to erect a fitting memorial to the memory of the men who made Southern California possible as the oil center of the Pacific coast. The whole tract will be gone over carefully, and no expense spared to make every foot of the tract a pleasure to see, and a credit to the worthy object to which the whole tract will be dedicated.

No statement is made as to when the work of building and improving is to commence, but it is stated that the memorial building will be dedicated some time next summer, and that the total cost of the improvements may reach to a quarter of a million dollars.

W. W. Orcutt is president and G. M. Swindell secretary of the memorial association.

Say! What about more rain?

Secretary Wilbur had better sit down and read one of his famous bedtime stories, till they get thru scrapping about sinking that battleship.

Harry Dunlap having been tried and convicted and sentenced to prison for about 400 years, besides three life sentences, is about to be tried for something else. That seems a silly thing to do.

Governor Richardson certainly knows what he is about when he refuses to send troops to Inyo county. He is only authorized to send troops to suppress "armed insurrection," and those ranchers fighting for their water rights are entirely unarmed.

A strong effort will be necessary to carry the child labor amendment to the national constitution. There seems to be an organized effort to defeat it, and if the present proportion of non-ratifying states keeps up, it will be defeated. Now is the time for the women's clubs to show their power.

Nebraska elected a republican governor, 27 republican senators out of 33 and 60 republican representatives out of 100. Governor Bryan must have felt the shock coming, and concluded the honor of being defeated for vice president was better than being defeated for re-election as governor.

Naval officials have queer ideas at times. Scrapping a battleship is effected by using it as a target for other battleships that must also be scrapped. These ships cost \$30,000,000, and with any kind of an effort for efficiency a good share of this could be saved and used in the manufacture of airplanes or other modern and more effective defensive war material. Of course there will be charges a landsman knows nothing about scrapping battleships, which may be true; however, a landsman can be sure of one thing; naval men who know only the "blowing up" method of scrapping, are certainly not qualified to judge of even a landsman's knowledge.

The New York stock exchange witnessed its greatest activity in years, during the first few days following election. Warnings that the big speculators were preparing for a great harvest are entirely ignored, while the share buying continues. Of course if the money is used for investment, and the stocks paid for, there need be no general drop in prices, for this class of investments will not be thrown recklessly on the market at the first drop in prices, but will be held for the dividends they will yield. To affect this class of investments the speculators would have to be able to control the dividends, and manipulate business in a manner hardly tolerated these days. But if the market is purely speculative, the usual pinch will come, and some gamblers will lose.

In Japan we would learn what the Japanese idea of cleanliness is. In this quaint country of beautiful sunsets and colorful costumes people bathe twice daily. And there is no question that many of them have no convenient bathroom as we do. In China the family has a large stove which is used for a bed at night so they can keep warm.

Between this picturesque empire and India, separated by miles and miles of lonely country and ocean, a great change of customs would be seen. In these out-of-the-way places we find people living in mere hovels. They enjoy no running water systems and other conveniences as the most segregated parts of our country enjoy.

In India, where plagues continually cause the death of thousands of families, you will find towns that have no water and sewerage systems. You can see the Indian women balancing on their heads huge jars which they have filled with water drawn from the town well or the sluggish and muddy river.

From Calcutta to Bagdad, thence to Constantinople, you will see that bathing is considered only for the white man and the native aristocracy. On the deserts of Arabia, where water is necessarily used only for drinking, the desire to keep clean is accomplished in a rather "rough" manner. Instead of using water for the bath the Arab vigorously rubs himself with the sand of the desert.

**Long and Short Lives
in Scheme of Nature**

One of the most wonderful things in Nature is the manner in which things are balanced up. The long-lived things propagate their species slowly; the short-lived, rapidly. For instance, elephants, whales, tortoises and carp have been credited with lives of anything from four hundred years downward. And at the other end of the scale we find insects which have a life of hours only. Many theories have been put forward to account for these remarkable distinctions, but the one now most commonly accepted is that the slower the creature, in its reaching full maturity and the less its powers of reproduction, the greater will be its average longevity or length of natural life. Nature's object in such an arrangement is fairly plain even to our limited human intelligence. For if such creatures as locusts, breeding with incredible rapidity, had themselves a life of centuries, the world would be within a little while impossible for other existence. And the same result would occur did an elephant with a life of perhaps a couple of hundred years, breed like a locust. In some way, which as yet we may not fully understand, the principle of Nature is to maintain a balance of power in our world.

Explorer's Ruling Passion

When Columbus landed for the first time in the New world he found the Indians, who greeted him "a very poor people." His friend, Las Casas, who wrote the abstract of the Journal of the First Voyage to America, gives the admiral's own account of his interview with the natives as follows: "I was very attentive to them and strove to learn if they had any gold. Seeing some of them with little bits of this metal hanging at their noses, I gathered from them by signs that by going southward or steering around the island in that direction there would be found a king who possessed large vessels of gold and in great quantities." Big Power Appropriations

Twenty-five million dollars was authorized by the directors of the Southern California Edison Company this morning as the Company's new construction budget for the year 1925. This is believed to be one of the largest annual appropriations ever made in the United States for hydro-electric development and the distribution of electricity. In communicating this information to District Manager D. H. Rowan, Vice-President and General Manager, Mr. R. H. Ballaro called attention to the fact that including the budget passed this morning, the company will have spent and authorized one hundred and forty-three million dollars for electric development and distribution since the close of the World's War.

The recent rains and the early completion of the Long Beach steam plant mark the end of the power shortage which existed during the past season and the indications of large business increases and general prosperity had a bearing with the directors upon passing this large budget for the ensuing year. While District Manager D. H. Rowan has not yet been advised of the amount that the company will expend in this district and will not be able to state the exact amount for some weeks to come, he has been notified in a general way that his recommendations have been given very full and liberal consideration.

The twenty-five million dollar budget for 1925 will be expended on the following lines:

- For hydro electric development on the Big Creek-San Joaquin river project \$ 7,535,000
- For completion of steam plants now under construction 3,965,000
- For increasing the 220,000 Volt transmission facilities between Big Creek and Southern California. 1,500,000
- For extension of distribution system and betterments in this and other districts 12,000,000

The Florence Lake Tunnel which will cost when completed approximately seventeen million dollars, will be finished early in March, and the construction program on the Big Creek-San Joaquin River project will increase the water power generating capacity during the ensuing year by 55,000 h. p., which will bring the total generating capacity of the company in water and steam up to six hundred and eighty-seven thousand horsepower, including the new one hundred and twenty-seven thousand horsepower steam plant, in time to carry the expected increase in business for next year.

While the company spent about thirty million dollars last year in new construction, approximately ten million dollars were spent for the steam power construction, which was speeded up at an enormous rate to relieve the water power shortage which existed. With the steam plant at Long Beach nearly completed and the work at that place very nearly taken care of by the 1924 budget, this year's appropriation will provide largely for hydro electric development.

The expenditure of the company for 1924 and 1925, which will aggregate

fifty-five million dollars, will make a repetition of the shortage conditions of the year of 1924 impossible, so far as service on the system of the Southern California Edison Company is concerned.

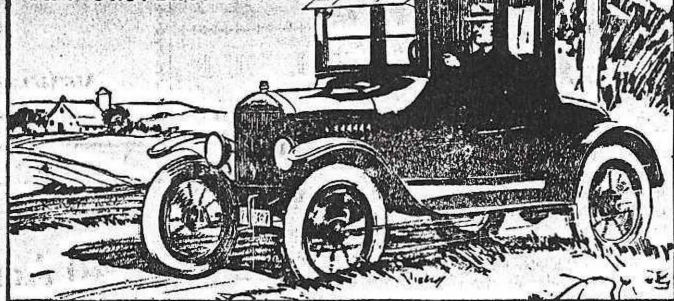
