SPILLIKIN CORNERS, AT MAGIC MOUNTAIN


Spillikin Corners, a colorful and unique slice of contemporary Americana, where master craftspeople ply their timehonored arts within full view, and with guest involvement, as an entirely new area of Magic Mountain, the popular family entertainment park in Valencia, California.

In planning for three years, Spillikin Corners is the year-round home to a gifted group of American craftspeople brought to Magic Mountain from across the United States.

Termed "a folk fair and food fest for all ages," the innovative area spotlights sixteen major American crafts, demonstrated and exhibited on a large scale by masters of each specialty. In addition, skilled Corners' craftspeople fully explain the history and methods of their crafts, inviting questions and guest involvement.

Potters, weavers, confectioners, doll-makers, woodworkers, printers, silversmiths, glass blowers, blacksmiths, candlemakers and basketbroom fashioners are among the varied artisans at work. In one of Spillikin Corners' most unusual attractions, master woodworkers operate an authentic duplicating lathe, powered by a chugging steam tractor, Circa 1909.

Doll Dreams and Weaving







Applehead, cornhusk and rag dolls are three of the traditional American folk dolls made at Doll Dreams and Weavers' Spells.


The Clay Bake is a fully operating pottery shop where guests can learn to "throw" a pot!





Wood and Steam






Jewels and Stones









Spot...








Glass Crafts


At **Sassafrass Glass**, a gifted glassblower uses his blow-pipe and molten glass to create stunning free-form objects.





Lampworkers and glass cutters also demonstrate and discuss their arts.








Candle Craft

The Wick Dip features a demonstration on how to make novelty candles.






Wood Carving

Dr. Weatherby's Rainmaker


This entertaining and educational street show is performed several times daily.


Brooms and Baskets

Blacksmithing and Leather











Entertainment



PROFESSOR SAMUEL J. SPILLIKIN entertains guests with his traveling medicine show.




SPILLIKIN CORNERS offers guests a restful and educational experience.






A unique and creative blend of old and new, the buildings of SPILLI-KIN CORNERS emphasize natural materials (wood, logs, stone) and Earth colors.

SPILLIKIN CORNERS AT MAGIC MOUNTAIN

Magic Mountain currently covers 260 acres. One hundred acres are devoted to rides, attractions, entertainment, shops and food facilities with 75 acres of paved parking available for approximately 8,500 cars. 60 acres are reserved for future growth. Valencia is a clear air, high desert area where winters are cool and mild; summers are dry and warm during the day while evenings are comfortably cool. The entrance plaza is 1,120 feet above sea level, and there is an elevation gain of 120 feet from the entrance to the Park to the summit of the Mountain.



Magic Mountain is situated in the heartland of the historic 44,000 acre Rancho San Francisco, renamed Newhall Ranch after its purchase by Henry Mayo Newhall. Located just 34 miles northwest of Los Angeles Civic Center, the Park is reached by taking the Golden State or San Diego Freeway north to Valencia to the Magic Mountain Parkway exit. It is reached from U.S. 101 in Ventura by taking State Highway 126 through Fillmore, then turning south for about one mile at the junction of Highway 126 and Interstate 5. The Park is approximately one hour's driving time south of Bakersfield on U.S. 99 and Interstate 5.
