Ruth Newhall

Ruth Newhall is richly deserving of the accolade "The First Lady" of the Santa Clarita Valley. Through her vision and that of Scott, her husband of nearly sixty years, the sleepy little Santa Clarita Valley was transformed from its backwater, rural status into a burgeoning community with a bright future.

Arriving in the Santa Clarita Valley in the early 1960s, Ruth and Scott Newhall began this metamorphosis through the publication of a crusading newspaper which alternately scolded and chastised bigotry, mendacity, and tawdriness and commended those efforts to build a valued community with education, culture, acceptance of diversity, and reverence for the past. The publication of *The Signal*, coupled with their influence in the design and fulfillment of the planned community of Valencia, set the stage for the continued growth of the Valley as it turned from a series of scattered housing tracts to become a thriving metropolitan area that offers true quality of life for its residents.

Ruth has touched the lives of many thousands of residents of this area. She has molded public opinion and generously contributed her time and energies to dozens of worthy causes; she has stimulated political actions which ultimately created local government; and she successfully championed the creation of, and improvements within, the community college. Ruth vigorously advocated the expansion of the local hospital, and she was joined by the Newhall Foundation and magnanimously assisted it and many charitable and cultural activities throughout the valley.

Boys and Girls Club

She strongly supported the development of the Boys and Girls Club and helped unite community leaders to serve as its board members. They developed an organization that provided recreational activities and professional guidance for children who, until then, had no direction or programs for youth.

Over the past two decades Ruth has personally donated thousands of hours to this organization. She has in the past actually written the entire Auction catalog, proofed it when others participated, offered the use of her beautiful mansion for dinners which she personally prepared and served to the top bidders at the Auction. As a means of focusing attention to the special items in the Auction, she has generously opened her home on numerous occasions for previews of the Boys and Girls Club Auction, where she served as hostess of the events.

Kelly LangeSpecial Guest Speaker



Best known as the co-anchor of Channel 4 News at 6 and 11 p.m., Kelly Lange began her news broadcasting career as a helicopter traffic and spot news reporter for KABC Radio in Los Angeles. She hosted a talk radio show on KABC, served as a field reporter with KABC-TV and joined KNBC-TV in March 1971.

She began "anchoring" the KNBC -TV newscasts in 1975 and has reported and narrated numerous documentaries, news stories and specials which have aired on Channel 4 and other NBC owned stations.

Kelly received the Golden Mike and Emmy awards for the best 30-minute broadcast, which she co-anchored for several years with John Beard.

She was honored with the Genii award, presented by the American Women in Radio and Television, joining the ranks of past recipients Lucille Ball, Mary Tyler Moore, and Beatrice Arthur. In 1989 Kelly was named a recipient of the St. Augustine Award for Alumni Achievement from Merrimack College, located in North Andover, Massachusetts.

She was born in New York and was graduated from Merrimack College. She moved to Los Angeles in 1956 and currently resides in the Hollywood Hills.



THE SANTA CLARITA VALLEY BOYS AND GIRLS CLUB

The Club is a non-profit, non-sectarian organization that offers social development and prevention programs which provide positive alternatives and reinforce values and principles. These alternatives, such as co-ed sports, crafts, field trips, tutoring, and professional guidance offset some community conditions such as low income, single parent home situations, and latchkey children.

In 1968 a group of community-minded Santa Clarita Valley citizens convened to discuss the growing problem of unsupervised youths and "latchkey" children in an expanding population. Santa Clarita had one of the highest delinquency rates per capita in Los Angeles County. Several organizations were considered as the need for quality programs to promote the health and the social, educational, vocational, and character development of youth in our area was apparent. The decision to establish the Newhall-Saugus Boys Club in response to these needs signalled the commencement of a dynamic partnership of committed youth-work professionals and concerned volunteers which is now celebrating twenty-five years of service in Santa Clarita.

With population spread over a wide area, it was decided that future program expansion should occur in decentralized locations. In 1969, a second Club began operation at an elementary school. During the 1970s, services were expanded to youths in the communities of Saugus and Canyon Country. The name officially became the Santa Clarita Valley Boys and Girls Clubs in 1978. Though girls had already been a part of the membership, this gave the Club the distinction of becoming the first in the nation to include 'Girls' in the Club's name. A satellite Club was opened in 1981 at Val Verde, a high-crime, low-income neighborhood, to better serve youths in that area.

The Santa Clarita Valley Boys and Girls Club network now proudly includes a central facility with administrative offices located in Newhall Park between Hart High School and Placerita Junior High, along with three satellite locations. Membership includes over 1200 youths, aged 7 to 17. Daily attendance averages nearly 225, valley-wide.

The Club is a full member of the Boys and Girls Clubs of America, a national organization composed of dedicated full-time youth professionals, part-time assistants, and volunteers, supported by the contributions of private individuals, corporations, and foundations. Boys and Girls Clubs are the nation's only major network of youth development organizations with a primary focus on youth from disadvantaged circumstances.

Lawrence Strauss, principal of Hart High School in Santa Clarita, has said that the SCV Boys and Girls Clubs are virtually the only full-time, low-cost programs accessible after school and full-time on weekends during vacations which provide everyday involvement and "belonging" for youngsters who would otherwise not have the opportunity to develop the skills and determination to become all they can be.

Today the SCV Boys and Girls Clubs are being asked to do more than ever before. In the wake of increased gang activity in our area, we are committed to enabling youths of all backgrounds develop the qualities needed to become responsible citizens who contribute to the community.





The Boys and Girls Club became a family affair as son Tony was the first Auction Chairman and later President of the Club in 1980. Her son Skip has joined Tony in participating in many Club activities, including tonight's event.

Local Government

Ruth's preference for the Santa Clarita Valley was to secede from Los Angeles County and to develop a separate county in the area. She provided leadership and counsel for the creation of Canyon County in the mid-1970s. After two county formation attempts where the local citizenry strongly favored "separation" but the balance of the huge county voted NO, her attention was gradually turned to the advantages in forming a separate city. Without her understanding, journalistic prowess, and the direction she gave to the news coverage, cityhood may not have happened.

Historical Society

As she had done before in saving historical sites in San Francisco, Ruth recognized the value in saving the old Saugus Railroad Station from destruction. She stimulated an active fund-raising campaign which successfully moved the Station to a safe haven at Hart Park. Her leadership in the Historical Society laid the foundation for Heritage Square, where a number of valued historical buildings are now located, and the future for acquisition of more is bright.

Henry Mayo Newhall Memorial Hospital

The community hospital received very generous support from the Newhall Foundation. Ruth recognized the need to expand services and facilities of this medical institution as the community grew. Ideas for additional fund-raising came from many sources, but perhaps the most creative endeavors had the stamp of Ruth and Scott Newhall on them! The Debutante Ball was envisioned as a means of both heightening the cultural levels within the Valley and adding a substantial amount to the hospital's growing needs for funding. It has blossomed into a beautiful, prestigious event that enriches the lives of the young ladies and their families who participate.

Acknowledging that contributions to the hospital must be varied in their scope so that all citizens who choose to do so can become involved, Ruth strongly advocated diverse activities and found numerous ways to support these events. Even today, when she has earned every right to be fully retired, she is researching and writing articles to describe houses and entice viewers to see

The Dream Becomes a Reality

Jim Ventress, Executive director of the Boys and Girls Club, had a dream. It was for a large central facility that would provide a save and positive haven for "at risk" kids to flourish and grow, a place where they could play and learn and develop into productive young adults.

Under the leadership of Board President Tom Veloz, then president and CEO of Aquafine Corporation (and now president and CEO of Ultraviolet Devices, Inc.), the Board of Directors had identified Newhall as the area of greatest need. For two years Tom led the effort to acquire community support, obtain City Council approval, and prepare the plan to launch a capital campaign.

Two dynamic gentlemen graciously accepted the offer to spearhead the campaign. They were Tom Lee, Chairman of the Board and CEO of Newhall Land and Farming Company, and Dr. Clyde Smyth, then Superintendent of the William S. Hart School District. With Tom's long history of support and involvement with the Club, and Clyde's care and concern for youth, no two men could have been chosen with more heart for the task ahead. Estimates were now at \$1.7 million, and the campaign volunteers forged ahead to raise the needed funds.

On July 17, 1992, the Central Facility opened to a membership of 1100 youths! Thanks to three very special men, countless hours of work by dedicated volunteers, and generous contributions from local businesses, foundations, and residents, the dream of a central facility became a reality.

SCV Child and Family Development Center

As the Community grew so did its special needs. Children who were physically and mentally challenged, as well as their parents, needed outlets and guidance. When the Special Children's Organization was founded it had the support and interest of Ruth, who oversaw extensive publicity in the Signal, first to garner support for its creation, and secondly as a means of raising much needed funding.

As the organization developed, so did demands for its services. In what has become a hallmark occasion for the community, the "Taste of the Town" fund-raiser was developed. Ruth once again played a leadership role and opened the mansion to thousands who bought tickets so that they could troop across the meticulously landscaped grounds while dining on samples from the finest dining spots in the Santa Clarita Valley.

College of the Canyons Foundation

Ruth and Scott's strong belief "that the greatest hope for a free society is through a more educated populace" made it natural that they would be involved in the College of the Canyons. Advocates of improving and developing curriculum and leadership and of making the college available to all who had a genuine quest for learning, they not only wrote extensively about the college in the local paper and challenged the community to be supportive, but once again became personally involved in fund-raising activities.

They served as the recipients—and were catalysts for funding—when they were honored at the College of the Canyons Silver Spur awards.

The Arts Council

A few years ago, when the Arts Council was formed to bring more enrichment and exposure to fine arts in the Santa Clarita Valley, Ruth was once again in the forefront, serving as a staunch supporter and as a member of the first Board of Directors. She assisted in bringing the San Francisco Opera Company to the Valley for a performance of "Carmen." Her leadership skills helped develop a viable organization under the Arts Council's first president, Jack Shine.

Goals and Objectives of the Boys and Cirls Club

The primary goal of the Santa Clarita Valley Boys and Girls Club is to provide appropriate services and opportunities responsive to the needs of a diverse child and youth population—particularly those from socially or economically disadvantaged homes, one-parent homes, and latchkey children. The Club is dedicated to a program consisting of social adjustment, social development, and prevention, which strives to help young people feel good about themselves and to provide positive alternatives and to reinforce values and principles. In order to meet its goals, the Club has identified the following objectives:

- 1. To provide new and innovative programs and services for delinquency prevention and intervention, for youths 13 to 17 "at risk" of entering the juvenile justice system and for court-referred offenders.
- 2. To offer a wide range of educational, cultural, recreational, and social activities for children and youths between the ages of 7 and 17.
- 3. To provide citizenship and leadership development programs for children and youths, and to help develop interpersonal skills and community involvement.
- 4. To provide a wide range of sports and recreational activities, for children and youths not usually involved in school or community sports leagues.
- 5. To promote understanding and sharing, through cultural enrichment activities built around arts and crafts and ethnic heritage programs.
- 6. To assist teenagers in obtaining employment, by providing assistance with job-search skills and job placement.
- 7. To provide residential and overnight camping experiences, nature hikes, environmental awareness, and energy conservation education.
- 8. To provide individual counseling, "rap groups," guidance, and support geared to various age groups.
- 9. To expose children and youths to a wide range of educational, cultural, and recreational experiences not readily available in their lives, through field trips to museums, amusement parks, sports events, and similar facilities and activies.
