They walked down the left side of the beach, if you know what I mean. They went to see girls...there were girls, but no clothes to be seen.


After we ate one hamburger and a chip or was it two, We took a couple of Freshmen and buried them in a sand dune.




Christ the king...a time of celebrating Christ; a fun-filled day; a gathering, a Mass, games.


The carnival was gone.




TO THE STAFF, STUDENTS, ALUMNI, AND FRIENDS OF ST. ANTHONY'S

After my tenure of fifteen years (1970-1985) at SAS, I could only sum up those times by repeating the line from Charles Dickens: "They were the best of times; they were the worst of times." Somehow I suspect that those are your feelings as well.

There were some great times and happenings for each of us. We all learned to love God and each other a bit more; we all discovered the support of living in community with one another whom we had to serve; we explored the great ideas of civilization; we looked into our hearts and souls and began to appreciate ourselves more; we walked in the way of St. Francis and challenged ourselves and each other to live the Gospel; we prayed and celebrated the goodness of God as revealed in Jesus; and we played and partied so well.

But all of this came at a cost. At times things were said and done that hurt us; decisions were made that we thought were unfair; we were disappointed because our expectations of the school or staff or students or community were not met; homesickness and loneliness touched us all at one time or another; all of us made sacrifices to be a part of SAS.


As I watch the sun set in its tranquility, its last rays warmly reflecting on the tower, I reflect on the day when St. Anthony's began for me.


I remember the mixed feelings of sadness and excitement as I kissed my family farewell. I was frightened and lonely.

The number of students, too, was equally unimpressive: a maximum enrollment of a dozen the first year. But the number of applicants soon increased, and on a low hill adjacent to the Mission a new St. Anthony's Seminary was begun. In January, 1901, it was ready to receive students and has continued that noble function through all the ensuing years.

Within ten years the student body had risen to approximately ninety, and a curriculum, profoundly academic, was adopted from the beginning. Much attention was paid to the study of English. Among the foreign languages taught, Latin received the greatest emphasis, with classes each day during the entire four year course. German received slightly less emphasis and was a required subject each year of high school. Greek received slightly less emphasis, but was not part of the curriculum until the student advanced to the sophomore year. When the senior year was reached, the course was enriched by the addition of three classes each week in Spanish. Arithmetic was spread over a three year course and was replaced in the fouth year by Algebra. History and Geography received minor roles, and Music was taught throughout the entire course.

Four score years and more have passed since St. Anthony's received its first students. As with similar institutions, it has undergone many changes; changes that are evinced in its structural features, its instructional tools, its now diversified curriculum. St. Anthony's makes no apology for these innovations, for it recognizes, with Cardinal Newman, that "to live is to change." And numerous though recent changes have been, implicit in all modifications is a basic, an obvious continuity: the underlying, never-changing effort of St. Anthony's to interpret for each new generation the poetry, the mysticism, the dedication to poverty, the total commitment to the service of God and fellow man exemplified in the life of the Saint of Assisi, the Father of all Franciscans, the one who Chesterton envisaged as a charismatic figure, appearing "suddenly on a little hill above the city, dark against the fading darkness...about him a burst of birds singing, and behind him the break of day."

A Note from Ten and a Quarter Hours Away!

On one of the walls at SAS there hangs a lovely picture of Oxford. I remember seeing it for the first time when I walked studyhall on March 11, 1986! In fact I made a note of it in my diary which reads, "tonight I walked studyhall and now I really know what 'walking' means! My feet ache and I'm sure the soles of my shoes are thinner! How lovely to see a picture of Oxford on the wall nearby -Oxford with its dreaming spires. I enjoyed trying to name some of the buildings on the picture, that was in between students asking, 'may I go type,' 'may I go to the library?', 'may I go see Steve?', 'may I go to the bathroom?' ... "

Here at my school in Abingdon a similar picture of Oxford hangs on one of the walls, and every time I pass it I am reminded of the one at SAS which in turn reminds me of studyhall, the students, especially the Sophomores and Juniors, and the friars. And what memories I hold and how good to have these memories. But memories fade and what then will I have? Well, there's myself - me! A constant reminder of my days at SAS because I know that I returned to England not quite the same person as when I left it. I feel better for having met so many wonderful people, for having shared in the Franciscan spirit of joy and love of life, for having experienced the tremendous warmth and affection which seem so characteristic of SAS, for being able to observe the dedication of faculty and students in their pursuit of knowledge, truth, beauty and goodness, for having


listened to Finbar's words of wisdom, experienced Albie's gentleness, Gus's great generosity, Steve's fine academic qualities, Jan and Fabian's kind words in the midst of a busy schedule, Berard's loyalty to the students, Jeff's gentle nature and listening ear...

Did I omit someone? Yes, but the best wine has to be kept until the end! When one is at the helm, so much more is expected. People look to the Rector for leadership, direction, patience, cheerfulness at all times - in short, he is supposed to be a new creation! Faculty and students at SAS have a fine leader, one who reassures people of their worth, whose gentle and peace-loving way endear him to many. Perhaps he is not a new creation, but he is a very special one! From Robert and from all at SAS I learned much and I owe everyone a lot.

Do students realize what is happening to them while at SAS? On January 16, 1987, the feast of the Franciscan Protomartyrs, Robert VanHandel made an announcement. Ninety-one years after Father Peter, Robert, the fourteenth Rector, told students and friars St. Anthony's Seraphic College would close forever in June 1987. His simple words were met with shock, tears, anger, and whatever else history is a record of.

## Franciscans to Mark 50th Birthday Here

:heck was ap pointed to inaus eminary for the western part of the Sacressart Province in August, 1896. Old Mission Santa Barbara was chosen as the site of the new Seraphic College.

Santa Barbara

The first classes, under the most primitive of conditions, commenced on Tuesday, September 22, 1896, under the protection of St. Anthony of Padua. There were three teachers and twelve stu-dents. Two of these boys eventually received the priesthood: Fr. Dominic Gallardo and Fr. Anthony Linneweber.

On June 18, 1897, work commenced on the renovation and enlargement of the Old Mission buildings; and by September, a new Seraphic Seminary at the Old Mission was ready for the official second year. Nevertheless, it remained inadequate

Permission was obtained to erect an entirely new and separate building for the Seraphic College, and excavation began on August 24, 1898. The cornerstone was laid on June 13, 1899, by Bishop George Montgomery of Los Angeles. Classes started in the new building in January, 1901; and on

April 25 of the same year Bishop Montgomery solemnly blessed the new structure


During the spring of 1923, under the rectorship of Fr. Theophilus Richardt, excavations were made for the construction of the west wing of St. Anthony's. This new wing - made of reinforced concrete and brick, in Spanish style - contained a study hall, an auditorium, classrooms, and a dormitory. Another wing was built along Mission Canyon. This wing contained a refectory for the Fathers, a garage, storerooms, guest rooms, and an infirmary. These buildings were dedicated on January 3, 1924, by Bishop John J. Cantwell.

The great earthquake of June 29, 1925, which destroyed much of the Old Mission, also did ex-tensive damage to the seminary. Mr. John Shea, a workman, was killed by falling stones, and the upper story of the original sandstone building was completely wrecked.

Reconstruction began immediately; and on May 3, 1927, Bishop Cantwell dedicated the new second and third stories of frame and stucco, and the new and imposing concrete chapel and tower. Especially striking in the new chapel was the reredos, designed by Ross Montgomery and based on a sketch conceived by Fr. Theophilus Richardt.

A house for workmen of the seminary was

built by Fr. Louis Schoen in 1938; and during the same year a new dormitory wing was constructed along Mission Canyon on the northwest side of the seminary property.



Bishop Garcia Diego High School, Santa Barbara

Bishop Garcia Diego High School opened its doors to about 420 boys and girls, grades nine through twelve, for the first time on September 12, 1959. The combination gymnasium-auditorium building had been completed a year previous, and dedicated on December 2, 1958.

dedicated on December 2, 1958.

Bishop High, as it is commonly known, is located at Cieniguitas and La Colina Roads. It was
dedicated on March 5, 1961, by the Cardinal Archbishop of Los Angeles, James Francis Cardinal
McIclayte. Present for the ceremony was Reverend
Ozias B. Cook, co-ordinator for the archdiocese,
under whose capable direction the new school had
been constructed. Bishop High School, operating
on a co-institutional basis, replaced Santa Barbara's
old Catholic High School which had been run by
the Sitters of Charity, B.V.M., under the guidance


of the Jesuit Fathers of Our Lady of Sorrows Parish.

The new school had an archdiocesan co-ordinator, and was staffed by Franciscan and Jesuit Fathers, B.V.M. Sisters, and lay teachers. Fr. Alexander Manville, O.F.M., was appointed as first principal of the boy' division, and was assisted by Franciscan Fathers Everett Chandler, Salvador Parisi, and Bernard Stokes. Ultimately Fr. Blaise Cronin, who arrived in 1961, replaced Fr. Everett. Sr. Mary St. Ellen, B.V.M., former principal of Santa Barbara Catholic High, became the first principal of the girls' division. The Sisters received a new convent to the east of the school in 1961.

Scholastically, Bishop High was very fortunate. Over 40% of the students had parents who
were college graduates, and about 7% of their parents held a doctorate. Consequently, many of the
boys and girls had a tradition of education in
their families. The faculty, under able leadership,
took advantage of this tradition. During the years
1962 and 1963, Bishop High received an award for excellence from the University of California — one
of two Catholic schools in California to be so honored — and was included among the top thirty
high schools of the state. Personal commendations
were given several times by various department
heads from both Santa Barbara Ciry College and
the University of California at Santa Barbara, for
excellence of training. Several off Bishop's students
were National Merit Scholarship winners; and one
young man not only was chosen as one of the two

State at "Atoms for Youth" in Chicago in 1964, but also was awarded a complete eight-year scholarship (through doctorate) at the University of Harvard — a scholarship which carried with it a \$16,000 stipend.

Mrs. Eva J. MacDonald, who passed away during 1963, left about \$120,000 to Bishop High for improvements, especially in athletics. Other than for tennis courts which were completed in 1964, the money was used for construction of a new wing; the building of which started during April, 1965, and was completed in time for the opening of the 1965-1966 school year.



St. Anthony's Seraphic Seminary, Santa Barbara
Under the rectorship of Fr. Augustine Hobrecht, the Hoffman property, west of the seminary, was purchased in the spring of 1942, and the residence was used as a faculty building during the

1942-1943 school year. A Brothers' school, founded at San Luis Rey in 1943, was transferred to the Hoffman house, better known as the "Cass Sans Cruz", on March 2, 1946. The school remained at the Cass until 1949, when it was again transferred, this time to Old Mission San Antonio. Since 1958, the Cass has been the location of the seminary library.

A capacious swimming pool was built along the Old Mission property line on the east side of the seminary grounds in 1945 and 1946. In 1964, a heating unit was installed.

In 1949, due to the efforts of the rector, Fr. Herbert Patterson, a new wing containing a kitchen, refectory, and dormitories was built on the east side of the seminary plant. This building was of Spanish style, to blend with the other seminary buildings.

In 1953, the "fifth class" of the seminary legally became the first year of San Luis Rey College, and for this class the seminary became legally the Santa Barbara Campus of San Luis Rey College. The 1938 dornitory wing was set saids each college wing and was remodeled accordingly. A special library was set up in the main room of the Cass for the college rundent. The lars scholastic year of the Santa Barbara Campus at St. Anthony's Seminary was 1955-1956, the freshman course was

thereafter located at San Luis Rey.

During May, 1954, St. Anthony's Seminary
was granted full accreditation by the University of
California. This was another great advance in the
educational program of the province, and it tended

to force the improvement of library facilities and an improvement in the teacher-training program.

Fr. Alexander Maaville, Everet Chandler, Selvador Parisi, and Bernard Sockes took up endence at St. Anthony's Seminary in August, 1999. They had been given the task of searing the avera rachdiocean high school, Bishop, Garcia Diagoulight School, near St. Vincent's School, Bill gour friam lived at the seminary and commuted daily so the high school.

In 1963 Br. Ivo Stuewe left St. Anthony's Seminary for St. Joseph's in Los Angeles, after over twenty-nine years of faithful service. Over thirty priests and Brothers gathered to pay tribute to Br. Ivo on the occasion of his departure. Br. Simon Walsh replaced Br. Ivo at the seminary.

Increased emphasis on scholastic attainment in the San Luis Rey College demanded an increasad emphasis on intellectual branches in the minor seminary. Great strides in this direction took place with the advent of Pr. Xavier Harris as rector of the seminary in 1964.

Host Lions; and Douglas Blois, Dos Pueblos High, Mesa-Harbor Lions.

## **Seminary Students And Faculty Honor** Dr. Paul Munch







The seminary, run by the Order of Franciscan Fathers, has been operated at the site near Troutdale for nine years, beginning operation in 1958, The school's 28 students packed their personal belongings Tuesday and Wednesday departed by plane for Santa Barbara, Cal. St. Anthony Junior Seminary.

St. Anthony's is known in the community for its free style of worship celebrations. Their 9:30 A.M. Sunday Mass originated for the boys at the school, and by word of mouth quickly caught on with the broader community of faith. St. Anthony's is located at 2300 Garattend are not Roman Catholic or have no training in the church. How do you meet the needs of such a diverse group of people?

Fr. Xavier: First of all, I think that what most people find here is not given to them by the seminarians alone, nor by the priests, but by the whole community that comes here. It's kind of a difficult thing to explain. I think that what they find here - the joy, the exuberance, the Christian love, and the acceptance

is provided as much by those who come as by the seminary staff or community. It is both self-perpetuating and self-expanding. I keep saying that the people who come won't believe that, but we would have nothing without all those who bring their desire to celebrate Christ's love to this place of wor-

New Focus: When did you begin to experiment with a contemporary liturgy?

Xavier: I guess about 1966. I came here in '64 and for the first two years things were pretty much as they had always Then in 1966, our music director began doing a larger range of instrumentation with some of the bossanova type music and that led into folk music, new liturgical music and more and more experimentation. As you know, it has only been since Vatican II that the Catholic orders have begun to expand into contemporary areas of expression.

It's interesting that many of the things that are having much success at St. Anthony's are failing in the church at large. Joseph Nolan wrote an article in the U. S. Catholic (March 1971) based on a nationwide survey done on the congregational level asking questions about the new liturgy and mass. The survey showed, for instance, that music was considered on the national level to be the church's biggest failure. People did not like to sing new songs, they missed having a professional choir, and they were generally not used to singing. At St. Anthony's we duplicated that survey and we found that singing is our binding element. In the area of something like the kiss of peace, on the national level it was found that this was the biggest taboo. In our "no touch" culture people were repulsed by it. At St. Anthony's each Sunday morning the entire congregation gathers around the table for the Eucharist, and at the time indi-





because of declining enrollment and staffing shortages, school officials said today.

The distinctive school, which sowned and administered by the Franciscan Order of Friars Minor, will graduate its last senior class May 30.

However, the 16-acre site adjacent to — the Mission Santa Barbara will remain under the control of the order and be used, said Father Robert Van Handel, the school's rector, "We'll continue to use it as neducational facility because that's what I'we also want to look at other things that we can do with it."
