Although clear weather is in prospect for tomorrow north of Tehachapi, Forecaster Reed said "below normal temperatures" will continue and they already are "unseasonably low." There will be killing frosts in all parts of the State tomorrow morning.

To date smudging is reported to have prevented crop damage. Water-shortage bugaboos appear effectually banished. Snow lies deep in the mountains and is packing for the spring run-off. The sun broke through today following early showers in the lowlands
